Let It Shine

It's not a new concept.

Many of us have known it since we sang in cradle roll, "This little light of mine, I'm going to let it shine."

This truth even precedes our infant years.

"Ye are the light of the world . . . let your light so shine," said Jesus.

At the creation of this spinning satellite that we call earth, God made clear His desire to replace the dense darkness with life-giving light.

He sent His Son—the Light of the World—to demonstrate the effectiveness of bringing heaven's light into the lives of humankind.

In preaching to the multitude on the hillside—and to all future generations—Jesus urged us to lift our light to the top of a candlestick and the summit of a hill.

"Let it shine!" He said.

Never has this been more clearly demonstrated to me than on a holiday our family enjoyed this year in Haiti. There we observed the active witnessing of motivated laymen.

Their activities were described to us by Robert J. Kloosterhuis, president of the 92,000-member Franco-Haitian Union. Elder Kloosterhuis, whose home church is Kalamazoo, Michigan, spent 11 years as a pastor and departmental director in Illinois.

"The laymen," said Elder Kloosterhuis, "are key to the success of the evangelistic work in Haiti."

During a single three-month period last year, church members held 250 crusades in Port-au-Prince, the capital city, each person preaching for three or four weeks to 25 or 30 neighbors.

Elder Kloosterhuis also described a simple yet strikingly effective method of evangelism used in the rural areas. The laymen use only a Bible and a kerosene lamp.

"Only about 10 percent of Haiti has electricity," he said, "so when the laymen hang their kerosene lamps on poles, the villagers are curious and go to see what's happening. The singing begins and the laymen preach."

Last year there were 200 evangelistic lamps used in Haiti. Each—with God's blessing—helped bring an average of 15 new members into the church.

More than 3,000 people baptized!

One layman led more than 100 people to accept Christ. The light from his lamp brought them to hear the Gospel story.

"The laymen are begging for more lamps," said Elder Kloosterhuis. "The 200 lamps we have are used constantly—many members hold three or four crusades a year. If only we could secure 500 or 600 more," he said. "They cost only \$25 each, but our tight budget will not stretch very far."

"Give us the tools," challenge Haiti's laity, "and we'll move our country to Christ."

During the '70's the church grew faster in the Inter-American Division than in any other part of the world.

May the '80's bring the same experience to the Lake Union and the rest of the world.

Through God's grace, let us individually determine to actively accept Christ's challenge: "Ye are the light of the world."

'I'll be the first to join'

DOES persistence pay? John Stachnik of South Haven, Michigan, would tell you it does. In fact, not only has he seen 44 people baptized because of his persistence, he is still giving Bible studies at age 82.

John's whole life has been one story after another of patiently persevering. As a young man in Chicago, he searched for 21 years to find the true church.

One day he discovered a paper called Signs of the Times in his mailbox. Eagerly he read its message about the Sabbath, and said to his friends, "I have a magazine here. I don't know who sends it, or who sponsors it, but I studied this for a whole week. There are people in California observing Saturday as the Sabbath. We are wrong by keeping Sunday. And I'm here to tell you, if that movement ever comes to Chicago, I'll be the first to join it."

For several years John patiently attended every series of meetings he could find advertised in the newspapers, until one day he saw a notice announcing a curious subject, "The Mark of the Beast."

After a few meetings his wife refused to continue going with him, but he never missed a night of the series. After the evangelist presented the lecture on the Sabbath, he made a call for those who believed the message to commit their lives to God. John was the first one down the aisle.

A few months after his baptism, his fellow church members elected him to be a delegate to the North American Lay Congress to be held at Grand Ledge, Michigan.

Mr. Stachnik felt he was not ready yet for such responsibility; but Elder Scott, his pastor, said, "John, the people agreed. You had better go."

After praying about it, John decided to go, and he has never been sorry.

"When we got to the meeting, the man who talked to us cried with us," said John. "He told us that he might never see us again until we would meet in heaven. And he set us on fire!"

John was "set on fire" to give Bible studies, and before he returned home he purchased a projector and set of Bible studies so he could begin right away to share his faith.

Unfortunately, John's wife did not share his enthusiasm for the church. Soon after he became a member she locked him out of his home and divorced him.

About 10 years after he became an Adventist, John settled in South Haven. He has never once stopped his persistent efforts to win people to Christ.

During the 33 years he has been an Adventist, John has studied with 484 people. With at least 44 baptisms, this means his success rate, with the direction of the Holy Spirit, is about 10 percent. He keeps a careful record of all those he studies with, just as he knows an angel keeps a record of his deeds. For him, the second coming will be a great reunion day.

John lives in a retirement apartment now. He deserves a rest from his persistent labor. But he still spends every possible moment, in spite of his limited ability to get around, in sharing his faith with his neighbors. At any given time, John has two or three Bible studies going with his friends.

Not long ago he watched as one of his "candidates for heaven," Thelma Teele, became a member of the South Haven Church.

Are you "over the hill" at age 63—or 45—or 35? Do you think you've fulfilled your mission in life? If so, just go visit John Stachnik. He'll set your thinking straight!

They were excellent teachers and have been teaching in church schools for about seven years. They told me the story of how they met at a drug party. While talking to the owners they were introduced to **Listen** magazine and began to read it faithfully. They asked many questions and, to make this long story short, they accepted Christ and joined the Adventist Church.

They wanted some children, but doctors at Loma Linda Medical Center told them they had only a 50-50 chance, because of all the drugs they had taken. God blessed them, however, and now they have two healthy children.

CAMPUS HIGHLIGHTS

● Andrews' nursing department has received a six-year accreditation from the National League for Nursing, the highest accrediting body for the profession. The department is the only nationally accredited four-year program in this area of Michigan, according to Dr. Zerita Hagerman, chairman.

● John E. Small, manager of the Sears retail store in Benton Harbor, Michigan, presented a check for \$1,800 to Andrews' President Joseph G. Smoot recently. The grant was part of \$37,000 distributed to 31 privately supported colleges and universities in Michigan and \$1,500,000 across the country by the Sears-Roebuck Foundation.

● The physics department presented films and lectures January 13 to 20 to celebrate the centennial year of Albert Einstein's birth. The event also featured a display about Einstein, created by the Institute for Advanced Studies of Princeton University in cooperation with the American Institute of Physics and the National Endowment for the Humanities.

● The Federal Aviation Administration has given Andrews Airpark approval to administer eight written examinations for aviation licenses. Chairman of the aviation and transportation department Raymond Swensen said this means the school can now give students the written tests as well as the flight or practical tests for licenses as private pilots and airframe-and-power-plant mechanics. The school can also give the written tests for commercial and instrument pilots' licenses and for flight instructors' licenses.

● An open house of the men's residence halls on January 27 commemorated the last year of Burman Hall as a dormitory. Sponsored by the men's club, this last official public function of Burman emphasized the 1920's, the decade in which it was opened. A

new dormitory is being constructed to replace the Burman facility.

● Harold Moll, a former industrial research scientist with the Dow Chemical Company, is an adjunct professor at Andrews this winter. He is teaching chemistry classes. He has had ex-



perience in such areas as chemical engineering, organic synthesis and instrumentation science and holds 39 patents.

PARENT'S ADVISORY GROUP CREATED BY TRUSTEES

Andrews University's Board of Trustees met January 13 and 14, giving preliminary approval for a college in Kenya to affiliate with the university.

According to Dr. Joseph G. Smoot, Andrews president, the board tentatively approved the University College of Eastern Africa for affiliation with Andrews.

This affiliation will help the university college to develop and maintain academic programs of high quality, and will keep it aware of developments in higher education abroad.

Andrews will regularly audit academic standards and the physical facilities and each institution will accept qualified transfer students and undergraduate credits.

Dr. Smoot said the board also approved the formation of a parents' advisory council consisting of a parent of at least three students from each class of the undergraduate colleges. He said the administration will be able to look to the 14-member group "for counsel on how best to serve their children."

In other actions, the board named Chan Shun, chairman and managing director of the Crocodile Shirt Company, of Hong Kong, and John Wall, president of Florida Extrusion Inc., of Sanford, Florida, to fill two vacancies among its membership.

The board also heard a report by representatives of Andrews Broadcasting Corporation on the operation of WAUS-FM.

Two new staff members were approved by the board. A. L. Brown, who has been with the university since 1978, was named director of development, filling a vacancy to be left this summer by P. T. Jackson who is retiring after 10 years in that position.

Mr. Brown is a native of Stoneham, Massachusetts, and a graduate of La Sierra College in 1958 with a bachelor's degree in business administration.

He has held various administrative positions related to the treasury and trust services in the Southern California and Central California Conferences, Loma Linda University and the North Pacific Union Conference.

He and his wife, the former Alberta Greene, have two sons.

Kevin McClanahan, a 1979 graduate of Andrews, was named public information officer. He is a native of Indianapolis, Indiana, and is married to the former Lynn Greene.

He served in the public relations office at Washington Adventist

Hospital in Takoma Park, Maryland, and was employed in Andrews' public relations department prior to his appointment.

Temperance—a favorite subject of Ellen G. White who often wrote articles and spoke to the public on its contemporary issues—is a subject which has great evangelistic potential.

LOCAL BANK PAYS TITHE

More than \$3,000 has been given to the Lake Union Conference by officers of the Heritage Bank in Berrien Springs, Michigan.

A check for \$3,311.60, representing a tithe on the bank's 1979 profits, was presented to Lake Union Conference President Lowell Bock by Ornan A. Bailey, bank president, and Leon Slikkers of Holland, Michigan, chairman of the bank's board of directors.

According to Elder Bock, the tithe funds have been divided equally and forwarded to the Lake Region Conference and the Michigan Conference. The funds were sent to these two conferences, Elder Bock said, because the bank is in both of their territories.

"A union conference receives its tithe income—according to denominational policy—only from the local conferences," said Elder Bock.

When the bank opened in August 1978, according to Mr. Bailey, the board voted to tithe on the profits. But the bank was not expected to make a profit for about three years. Instead, the bank was operating in the black after only four months.

"I know of some thrilling experiences where God has blessed industries when the owners returned a portion of their prosperity to the Lord," said Elder Bock. "This is another evidence of how God rewards such faithfulness."

The bank, presently housed in temporary quarters at University Plaza on U.S. 31-33, will move into a new building nearby in the spring, says Mr. Bailey.

Andrews University's medical center and professional offices will also locate in the new complex.

The bank, which is owned by about 250 stockholders, will lease the building from the university.
