

Faith For Today Moves Ahead: New Programs and New Markets



Dan Matthews, director/ speaker of Faith For Today since 1980, is the new host of Westbrook Hospital and will soon begin a new TV program.

NEWBURY PARK, Calif.— Cameras will roll on Faith For Today's newest program venture in mid-February. However, according to Director/Speaker Dan Matthews, "Westbrook Hospital" won't be sitting on a shelf gathering dust.

The Faith For Today staff has selected and packaged 52 Westbrook Hospital programs for ongoing syndication.

This collection of programs represents an investment of \$2.5 million in religious television ministry. To make the same programs today would cost \$5 million.

"Stories about people last forever, and as long as our programs continue to air, they are a good investment that will help people through the trials and triumphs of life for many years to come," says Pastor Matthews, who now hosts the series.

The Westbrook series is presently seen on 110 broadcast stations in North America, reaching a weekly audience of approximately 300,000 people.

This figure does not include a large number of cable and satellite viewers for which no official audience data is available. This is because more than half of Faith For Today's audience is reached by stations giving free air time. With satellite and cable coverage, Faith For Today's "Westbrook Hospital" series can now be seen by more than 40 percent of the total United States population. At present five religious satellite networks broadcast the series at least once a week. These satellite broadcasts are carried by several thousand cable systems across the country that are wired into some 20 million homes.

Faith For Today is feeling the growth of the cable audience with a large number of responses coming from places where the program is not available on regular broadcast television.

And what do viewers say about "Westbrook Hospital"?

A typical letter comes from a Presbyterian woman in Tennessee who writes:

"I find your program to be very pertinent to daily living. It has been a great comfort to me at times of stress and also has made me examine some of my own beliefs. [Westbrook Hospital] transcends denominational barriers and offers insights to all. I hope that the excellent quality of your program continues into the future for many years."

Another letter comes from a woman who found some very practical help from watching "Westbrook Hospital":

"About a month ago a program was on TV about kids getting their parents to stop smoking ["The Quitters"]. I watched it and wrote down the suggestions they gave. I never wrote for the booklet but I stopped smoking. I feel just great and my husband is thrilled. I drank gallons of water and prayed and did everything you said, and I quit."

> The localized Westbrook series consists of 26 specially edited programs with "holes" for the local host to present a brief message. In addition to video tapes, the local host also receives a complete guidebook of instructions.

One advantage of the localized program is that story topics may be selected to coincide with local church events such as Five-Day Plans to Stop Smoking, prophecy seminars, or cooking schools. It also gives the host an opportunity to invite people to special church services.

In the past year, four pastors have been hosts for the localized program in Georgia, New Mexico, Virginia and West Virginia. Pastor Matthews hopes to interest several more people in the local TV ministry this year.

Because Faith For Today also wants to assist the church's overseas television ministry, 26 "Westbrook Hospital" programs are now available for foreign language translation. Japan has already translated 13 programs and is discovering that the story format is well-accepted in a non-Christian country.

Faith For Today is also carried in English in 11 countries and islands outside North America.

As we near Annual Offering Day on February 12 and the taping of the new TV series in mid-February, Faith For Today asks you to remember the needs of the television ministry as we continue a strong outreach for the glory of God.

I recently lost my child and this book *Steps to Christ* is an answer to prayer." The girls were happy to pray with the woman, and talk with her about Jesus, the great Comforter.

Currently, the students are compiling a booklet for the residents of a local nursing home, based on the stories the students gained from interviews with the

elderly persons.

Also, the Witnessing class recently wrapped literature for overseas mission requests, and invited local church members to mail the packages.

In one of the most stimulating class projects, students team up to give Bible studies in class to ministers of various denominations. The visiting minister takes the last half of the class to discuss his point of view, or ask questions.

The clergy are made aware that the purpose of the visit is not to debate, but for the students to learn to defend their faith with confidence and courtesy, as well as hear another's viewpoint.

Representatives of many denominations have visited the classes, including Episcopalians, Latter-day Saints, Baptists, Methodists, Mennonnites, Jehovah's Witnesses, Presbyterians, and a Jewish Rabbi.

The churches of Bad Axe, Morris, Otter Lake, Fenton, Long Lake and Towas have had the Adelphian Witnessing class as Sabbath guests, with the students providing the 11 o'clock service.

ANDREWS UNIVERSITY— February 14 is a critical deadline for Michigan students applying for financial aid as freshmen for the 1983-84 school year, according to Esther Hare, Andrews' financial aid officer.

Mrs. Hare said that the deadline for Michigan students comes one month earlier than for other students in the Lake Union, who must apply by March 15.

The applications will be evaluated primarily on the basis of undergraduate grade point average and scores on the Graduate Management Admission Test (GMAT). Dr. Twomley said financial need will receive minimal consideration in awarding the scholarships.

Dr. Twomley urges potential applicants to register for the next GMAT, if they have not already taken it. Students must register for the test before January 26 to take the test administered in March, or register by April 25 for the test in June. For the student who takes the test in June, the application for scholarship and other information must be completed by May 1, but consideration for the scholarship may be held until GMAT scores arrive if other scores are high.

Students may contact the nearest college or university or write Educational Testing Services for the location of the nearest testing center for the GMAT.

INDIANA-Indiana Advance funds for 1982 totaled \$161,969.93, or an average of .56 of one percent. These funds were distributed as follows: Indiana Academy Development received \$64,787.97; elementary education, evangelism. \$56,689.47; \$32,393.99; and Timber Ridge Camp \$8,098.50.

Seven churches gave more than one percent. They are: New Harmony, 1.48; Alexandria, 1.15; Crawfordsville, 1.12; Plymouth, 1.12; Vincennes, 1.06; Madison, 1.04; and Washington, 1.02.

These churches gave above the average: Indianapolis Glendale, .63; South Bend, .61; and Cicero, .59.

LAKE REGION-The Family Health Education Service literature evangelists recently held their annual incentive retreat at the Holiday Inn at the International Airport in Tampa, Florida.

Literature evangelists were represented from each of the nine regional conferences. Elder T. Samuel Barber, publishing director for the Lake Region Conference, reported the sales for Lake Region during 1982 to be \$1,077,232.37

This is the first time that a regional conference has reached one million dollars in book sales, and was the highest amount of sales of the regional conferences.

In addition to making an overwhelming number of deliveries, the leaders, students, and literature evangelists made the following report of their missionary activities: 77,987 pieces of literature distributed; 5,503 Bible correspondence school enroll-

During the summer of 1982, Lake Region witnessed the largest participation from students ever: 230 students worked along with eight student leaders, three assistants, and Elder and Mrs. Barber.

Total deliveries by students in magazines and small books was \$236,182. According to Elder Barber, this is a real blessing from God.

The highest number of deliveries was by Willie Mae Cooper who reported total sales of \$42,700. The second highest was made by Brent H. Ellis with total sales of \$35,272.65.

District 1, with the leadership of Arthur Suttle, reported the highest district sales for Lake Region. Mary G. Jones, student leader, reported the highest sales for students under her leadership.

The grand total in deliveries for the eight conferences reporting was \$3,939,673.98. Most important was the report of 1,024 baptisms that were the result of contacts made by the literature evangelists in the regional conferences.

WASHINGTON, D.C.-Since the appeal of military service with its benefits attract many young people, Seventh-day Adventist youth should be aware of all that is involved.

To help church members become aware, the National Service Organization (N.S.O.) has introduced The Conscience Project. This project includes a training program for draft-age youth that will be available in each local conference by January 1983.

One phase of this training is an N.S.O. computer game called "Pick and Choose" featuring a two-track system. First, a student can follow a computerized military draft scenario, and by punching the "help" button, find available options for possible problems.

Or the user can use the data and get from the computer specific Selective Service information which has been previously programmed and indexed.

The "Pick and Choose" program will be supplied to all requesting academies and colleges having TRS-80 I or III, or Apple-II computers.

Let's Make Satan Tremble

"In every thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God." Philippians 4:6. Our personal lives, our churches, our communities, and our nation would be different if God's people around the world would spend more time in prayer. We are told that "Prayer is the opening of the heart to God as to a friend."-Steps to Christ, p. 93. When we meet with true friends, we never tire of talking. We eagerly share news, ideas, and hopes with one another. Why then are we so reluctant to commune with the One we often say is our Best Friend?

"God is ready and willing to hear the sincere prayer of the humblest of His children."-Steps to Christ, p. 94. We all know what happens when we do not pray. We begin depending upon our own strength, and we fail miserably. It must hurt our Heavenly Father terribly when we do not want to speak to Him.

Also Satan rejoices, because when God is shut out the evil forces move in. "The darkness of the evil one encloses those who neglect to pray. The whispered temptations of the enemy entice them to sin; ... "-Steps to Christ, p. 94.

Let's think a few moments about our prayer life:

1. We should spend some time every day in thanks and praise to God for all of His wonderful blessings to us. "The angels . . . regard communion with God as their highest joy;"-Steps to Christ, p. 94.

2. A portion of our daily prayer life should be in secret personal prayer. "Secret prayer is to be heard only by the prayer-hearing God. No curious ear is to receive the burdens of such petitions."-Steps to Christ, p. 98.

3. We should seek to pray with our families before parting for the day. We need the protection of God's Holy angels every moment and should ask for it.

4. We may in confidence place both our physical and spiritual needs before God. "Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need." Hebrews 4:16.

5. Every week as we worship with fellow believers we may share in the blessing of public prayer. As we enter God's house, may we bow in prayer, seeking His blessing upon the Sabbath School and worship hours.
