Hispanic Workers Retreat Emphasizes Church Growth

LAKE UNION—In order to promote the work of soul-winning and to bring the mission of the church into sharper focus, the first unionwide Hispanic Workers Retreat was conducted January 23 to 26, 1983.

The seminar, directed by Robert C. Connor, ministerial director of the Lake Union, was held at the Holiday Inn Convention Center in Harvey, Illinois.

From the outset, the mood of the workers indicated a great sense of urgency for lost souls. This was even more evident as Elder Connor, who has served in the Lake Union ministerial department for the past 5½ years, welcomed and introduced the workers from the conferences of the Lake Union.

Elder Connor said the church has planted long enough, and we should be caught up in the urgency of these 1,000 Days of Reaping.

He said, "Because of our cold weather, and because our union territory has two of the hardest hit states economically, we have more Adventists transferring out of our territory than we have coming in.

"The work of winning souls is not only crucial in keeping the church alive, but we also need to play a vital part in the work of Faith Action Advance, which has become the watchword for this time"

Emphasis continued on soul-

winning when John Hayward, secretary of the Lake Union, gave the keynote challenge to the workers. All of the devotional speakers, Luis Leonor, Hispanic coordinator of Michigan and pastor of the Berrien Springs Spanish Church; Silvio Fernandez, coordinator of Hispanic affairs for the Illinois Conference, and J. P. Valentin, Hispanic coordinator of the Lake Region Conference, without consulting each other, carried through with the theme Elder Hayward introduced in his keynote address.

Galeb Rosado, pastor of the All Nations Church in Berrien Springs, Michigan, gave an inspirational, historical presentation on the "Challenge of Cross Culture Diversity." Elder Rosado's congregation is composed of members from 55 different nations.

Miguel Cerna, a pastor from Southern California, baptized more than 120 persons in 1982 without conducting a public campaign. In four hours of lecturing, he explained how he did it through the "small group concept."

Conference time was given to administrators and departmental men. The meetings were blessed with the presence of Robert Everett, secretary of the Illinois Conference; R. R. Rouse, treasurer of the Illinois Conference, and Charles Case, youth director of

the Lake Union.

The topics "Public Evangelism" and "The Evangelistic Invitation" were discussed by Elder Connor. The time that was given to "Issues and Answers" gave helpful answers to issues that perplex many workers.

The six major Hispanic groups in the United States are comprised of persons from countries in Central and South America, the Spanish language islands of the Caribbean, and Europe.

The United States, with 14.6 million Hispanics, has the fifth largest Hispanic population in the world.

The Hispanics are the fastest growing minority in the United States, and have the fastest growing membership in the Adventist Church.

There are more than 2,000 Hispanic members in the Lake Union Conference—464 Hispanics were baptized in this union last year, and a goal of 1,000 was set by the workers for 1983.

With much prayer, information, inspiration and recreation, the retreat came to a dramatic close when the workers knelt in a season of prayer led by the Hispanic coordinators from the conferences in the Lake Union.

A Modern Guardian Angel

The fourth quarter 1982 NO ONE BUT YOU program, "With

Each Tick of the Clock," contained the story of David Livermore who is a member of the Escanaba,

Michigan, Church and director of the jail ministry for the Delta County Jail in Escanaba.

Dave volunteers his time, and spends about 12 to 15 hours per week at the jail. However, his ministry extends far beyond the time he spends at the facility.

For example, Dave has been working with a prisoner, whom we'll call Bill. He is 31 years of age and has been imprisoned 58 times. Dave has been encouraged by seeing some positive progress in



Recently Bill expressed a desire to see his 9-year-old son, and he told Dave, "I don't pretend to have ever been a father to my son, but maybe I can make an attempt

Dave not only located the man's ex-wife, but took the child to the prison to meet with his father.

When Bill came into the visitor's section with the little boy, Bill looked at his son, then at Dave and said, "I can't thank you enough, Dave." According to Dave, all the thanks he needed came as he watched the father and son embracing in a big bear hug.

Sometimes Dave can't be near those he works with when they pass through difficult times, but



he still has concern for them. He makes every attempt to alert local pastors about individuals he feels must have additional spiritual attention. Such was the case with two brothers whom we'll call Stan and John.

John was the weaker of the two brothers, both physically and emotionally, while Stan appeared strong and hardened.

"Being processed through the prison system can be an emotional ordeal," says Dave. "Many prisoners break under the strain.'

Dave feared for John's emotional stability when he left the Delta County Jail for another prison. So he contacted the local Adventist pastor, who went to see John at the prison and talked to him about the biblical story of

Four months later Dave went to visit the brothers in the prison where they were serving their sentences. He discovered that Stan had suffered emotional strain, but John had made it through the ordeal.

John told Dave, "I could have never made it without what the Adventist pastor told me about Job." When Dave asked John what he was going to do when he finished his time, John said, "I'll tell you, Dave. I'm going to go to church with you."

Dave not only believes in assisting those in jail, he believes in preventive jail ministry as well. Dave seeks to educate young people about what life behind bars is really like. To make it more real, he has written a play entitled "A Day in Jail."

The 30-minute play has been performed by Dave and his cast at Wilson Junior Academy in Wilson, Michigan, and at Wisconsin Academy-complete with a simulated jail cell.



Before the play begins, Dave explains how prisoners react psychologically, and suggests things the students should watch for in the play. It ends with a soloist singing "At My Worst You Found Me."

Recently a trustee at the Delta jail came to Dave and said, "Do you know what they call you 'in the back' [the inmates' term for the cells]? When Dave appeared dubious about wanting to know, the trustee said, "Oh it's nothing bad-they call you their guardian angel."

Andrews Gets Computer for Teaching Teachers

ANDREWS UNIVERSITY-Elementary and secondary teachers in training at Andrews are learning how to bring the computer into the classroom, thanks to a donation from the Lake Union Conference.

Dr. George Akers, chairman of Andrews' education department, said the Lake Union has donated a Radio Shack TRS-80 III double disk drive computer to be used specifically for teachers in undergraduate, masters and doctoral degree programs.

"The Lake Union board of education has said that all teachers in Adventist schools in this union must be computer literate by the summer of 1985. The Michigan Conference has pushed that date up to 1983 for its teachers," Dr. Akers said.

He also noted that the Michigan Board of Education is considering a mandate to make all certified teachers computer competent by 1985. "We are playing catch-up ball, but we are not alone," Dr. Akers said. "Schools of education all across the country are facing the same challenge."

Warren Minder, director of

education for the Lake Union, views computers as an integral part of the future of education. "The Lake Union is looking to Andrews to provide crucial computer training for our teachers," he said. "The bottom line is to make the more than 7,000 students in our schools in the Lake Union computer literate. Our students must be able to function in today's society. Computer use is a skill they must have."

In addition to the computer itself, valued at more than \$2,300, the Lake Union also provided more than \$1,100 worth of manuals and computer software.

Dr. Akers said, "Even though Andrews has a department of information and computer science and a massive computer system, elementary and secondary teachers must become familiar with the equipment they will have to use when they go out to teach."

Dr. Akers said that regular classes in computer use for the classroom teacher will begin next fall. Three workshops will be held this summer through Lifelong Learning, Andrews division of continuing education.

Horn Museum Creates Program for Churches

ANDREWS UNIVERSITY—The Siegfried H. Horn Archaeological Museum at Andrews University has developed a program on archaeology and Adventism for churches in the Lake Union, according to Bjornar Storfjell, assistant curator of the museum.

The program consists of the Sabbath sermon and an afternoon meeting where a 30-minute slide show and archaeological artifacts will be shown.

"There is a lot of misunderstanding about archaeology and its role in the Adventist church," Mr. Storfjell says. He feels that people often question the need for archaeology, saying the time involved and expense do not justify the results.

Others even question whether archaeology supports the beliefs of the Adventist church. "This program sheds light on the

relevance of archaeology to the church's message," he says.

The slide show, entitled "Archaeology, Adventists and Andrews," was produced by David Merling, a student at Andrews who has had experience as a pastor, evangelist and ar-

The show contains information on the history of archaeology, the dig sponsored by Andrews at Heshbon, Jordan, and plans for a future dig.

Artifacts will be taken to the churches for people to examine. There will be time for questions and answers after the program.

Lifeline Saves Lives

HINSDALE, Ill.—Three days after Hinsdale Hospital installed the first Lifeline System in the western suburbs of Chicago, one of the subcribers signaled for emergency help.

The hospital's emergency department alerted the fire departthe emphasis of a series of ment of Downers Grove, Illinois, which dispatched a Paramedic Unit within three minutes.

> Lifeline provides round-theclock access to emergency services. Equipment consists of a base unit attached to the telephone line of the subscriber, a wireless unit, and the receiving unit at the hospital.

When users push the button on the wireless device, they activate the unit attached to the telephone which automatically dials the emergency room at Hinsdale.

A signal flashes, alerting personnel to the identity of the person who has activated the system.

The sender's personal medical records are pulled, and within minutes appropriate help-a friend, relative, or ambulance-is on the way to the caller.

With a timer which automatically signals for help if not reset after a 12-hour interval, the Lifeline System can send an SOS even if a person is unconscious.

This new system enables the elderly, handicapped or chronically ill to live independently in their own homes without threatening their peace of mind.

This service extends to the area within a 28-mile radius of the hospital. Kathy Manella Gros, clinical director of ambulatory care, says, "If medical treatment is needed, patients will be transported to the nearest hospital or family doctor. We are providing Lifeline as a community service."

To help reduce costs, the hospital is looking for civic organizations to purchase the \$450 units or sponsor patients by paying their \$10 monthly charges.

Industries Thrive at Broadview

ILLINOIS—A new industry added recently to the Broadview Academy campus has created valuable work opportunities for students.

A feather-duster industry, managed by Jonathon Fish, employs five students who make feather-dusters out of South African ostrich feathers for both commercial and home use. The students work on a piece-rate basis and earn up to \$4 an hour. This new industry provides approximately \$1,000 in student labor each month at the present time. As sales increase, more students will be added to this work force.

Four other industries have been sources of student labor for several years.

The Harris Pine Mills factory is the main source of work for students 16 and older. It employs more than 50 students at present, according to Ken Carlson, manager.

The Academy Pak, managed by Ray Miller, has 30 student workers and needs 5 to 10 more. This industry involves packaging small items such as nuts and bolts. The work is piece-rate work, and many students make more than \$4 per hour.

The Academy Gardens and the farm are two other sources of student labor, employing 10 to 12 students between them. Their peak work seasons are spring, summer and fall, but a few students also work during the winter months.

Broadview Academy has the philosophy that all students should work, and those who do not get assigned to one of the industries are placed in one of the many office, dorm, cafeteria or maintenance jobs available on campus.

While it is true that Christian education is costly, the unique work/study program at Broadview Academy, along with other financial aids, makes that education possible for every high-school-aged student in Illinois.

Nine Persons Baptized After Battle Creek Revelation Seminars

Economics, fear, anxiety and budgets seem to be the hallmark of the spirit of our churches today.

Anxiety pulses through our personal, family and church lives. The recession and inflation seem to occupy much of our waking moments. On top of that, we are told that nuclear blackmail is threatening us 24 hours of the day. The talk of energy independence is high on the agenda.

On top of that, there's talk of the "White Lie," the great investment loss, and the evangelical movement. One member said that some of us are so hyper we could light up and

heat our homes by simply using our fears as current.

This scene reminds me of the situation of King Ahaz, of whom the Bible says at one point "shook as the trees of the forest shake before the wind." Ahaz was so afraid of the King of Assyria that he gave up all of his dependence on God and turned outside for answers.

But before he did it, he consulted Isaiah, whose counsel was for him just to slow down; the Lord would give him a sign. A young woman would conceive and bear a son, and his name would be called Immanuel, "God with us." Ahaz didn't trust the Word and turned to the King of Assyria with gifts. He received favors in return but the end of it all was that he lost his life.

There is no doubt that we are faced with serious economic times and church problems. Stories of complete devastation are coming from the mouths of some of our close brothers and sisters. Conference budgets are being strained and broken. Church schools are crying for more. All of this would suggest pending doom-but God is with us.

The demand of today is not more from the General Conference; the impact is felt there also. More and more as we struggle to find answers, the subiect of the "unfaithful" continues to rise to the surface. I remain convinced that a response of complete commitment to stewardship in these trying times would result in more than enough to meet the crisis of today.

The answers are not found outside but inside—inside your heart, mind and serving ability. We have only to turn to the Lord for the answer to our situation. We cannot now think of ways to find deliverance outside His care. He will deliver just as he delivered the children of Israel from the seemingly invincible power of Pharaoh.

The counsel of Isaiah remains true: Calm down, the Lord himself will give us a sign-Immanuel-that means "God with us." It will be by resting and trusting in God's promises that we will be saved.
