Dear Friends,

At the time of this writing, I am in the midst of the officer's Council. The officers of the six conferences and the union officers are meeting together to look at our program and to discuss future plans.

We have just concluded a session on the growth rate of our church.

We can see in this report some room for improvement. Statistics show that we should be experiencing a growth rate of some 3.5 per cent, and yet most of our conferences are growing at a rate of just over 1 per cent. This fact is the cause of no small concern to our church leaders. We have prayed earnestly about this matter and want you to share our burden.

Earlier this year, there were two or three of the Lay Evangelist Training Seminars conducted in our territory with Samuel Monnier of the General Conference. We are amassing quite a group of trained lay evangelists. Many of these are conducting full-scale evangelistic meetings. I trust that we are giving these men and women the support they deserve in this great endeavor.

The *Outlook* has been carrying some promotional information on "Harvest Time — '81." This is a program, which, properly executed, could do wonders for our church growth. For instance, a church of 300 could have over 100 baptisms per year without even having the benefit of a public meeting. If one out of four would make just four witnessing contacts per week, statistics reveal that this could result in 37 people joining the church. If one out of ten would give just one Bible study per week, 52 people would request baptism. Then if the pastor would give five Bible studies per week, this would result in at least nine baptisms. The total of these three areas is 98! Then when you add the effects of the church school, literature evangelists, visitors days, et cetera, the number grows to more than 100.

When I think of what the Lord has in store for us when we put forth just a little effort, it really excites me.

It really concerns me when I read statements about the remnant church like this one: "Not one in a hundred among us is doing anything beyond engaging in common, worldly enterprises. We are not half awake to the worth of the souls for whom Christ died." *Testimonies*, volume 8, page 148.

New Church Dedications in Mid-America

H.M.S. Richards, Sr., planted the seed in Estes Park, Colorado when he conducted the first evangelistic crusade in this area. That seed grew and matured until finally a brand new church building was dedicated on July 4, 1981. Caris Lauda and others prevailed on Maranatha Flights International to build the church. One hundred volunteers spent two weeks in erecting the building July 28-August 12, 1978. During the 1970's, Eden Valley Institute kept the program going with a Branch Sabbath School. The church was formally organized in the home of Dr. and Mrs. Russell Hanson in the spring of 1976. This memorial stands at the gateway to the Rocky Mountain National Park.

The 275-member Brighton, Colorado Church was dedicated on June 27, 1981. This strong church is an outgrowth of the witness begun by the August Beierle family who came to this community from France in 1901. The church was organized as the Brighton German Church in 1908. Services continued in the German language until 1942.

The Detroit Lakes, Minnesota Church was organized in 1905 with 14 charter members. H. M. Christensen, the first Seventh-day Adventist in the area, was the first elder. For the first three years the church clerk kept the records in the Scandinavian language. Just 10 years after the church was organized, a church school was begun and has been in continuous operation since that time. The Detroit Lakes Church has outgrown its facilities twice and is now housed in the third Seventh-day Adventist Church to be built in the city. The church is famous for the large number of its sons and daughters who have gone out in foreign mission service. The spacious church houses the church school and a very active community service center.

The Jamestown, North Dakota Seventh-day Adventist Church was officially organized July 22, 1901. It is interesting to note that a number of the charter members had been baptized but had membership in no church. These people were accepted by profession of faith. The organization was begun with 14 members and has grown to well over 300. Also interesting to note is the fact that at the early business meetings the report revealed the number of people who paid tithe. A church school was begun in 1918 and continues to this date with the very strong Hillcrest School. In 1919, Mr. and Mrs. Sam Reile were added to the church. These were the parents of Mid-America Union President, Ellsworth S. Reile. In 1971 discussion was begun on the idea of building a new church home and moving from the downtown location. Two years later fund raising was begun and the ground breaking ceremony was conducted. The present building was occupied in May, 1974.

The highlight of the Eureka, Kansas Church dedication was the baptism of four lovely candidates. The church is intended to be a house of prayer for all people. (Isaiah 56:7) Elder Harold Yates came out of retirement and moved from California to Eureka to spearhead the building of the new sanctuary. Yates was a native of this area and had a real desire to see a new church in his home town. Much of the labor was done by volunteers. The work was under the supervision of the Kansas Conference builder, Don Clemmens. L. Curtis Dale is the present pastor.

Hyannis, Nebraska is a small town of 345 population situated in the northwestern part of the state at the crossroads of state highways 61 and 2. The Seventh-day Adventist Church was organized in Hyannis in 1977. This is the place where the Nebraska Builders, an organization similar to Maranatha Flights International, converged to renovate and remodel the old church building. The volunteer workers went at their work with such zeal that the job was completed in just one week. The original building was a school house that was moved to the present site and completely rebuilt. The church was dedicated to the Lord's service on July 11, 1981 with Kansas-Nebraska Conference President, Joel Tompkins, and Mid-America Trust Services Director, Howard Voss, officiating. Art Liebelt organized the church and began the building plans. Bruce Roberts is the present pastor.

God is truly blessing His people as is evidenced by so many of our new facilities being dedicated debt free. We can heartily sing "Praise God from whom all things flow." Our people are to be commended for planning these dedication services and then carrying out these plans. Surely this is an encouragement to other church groups to plan for dedication services. Now that these facilities are debt free, energies can be directed to the all-important task of evangelism—personal and public.

"I saw jets of light shining from cities and villages, and from the high places and the low places of the earth. God's word was obeyed, and as a result there were memorials for Him in every city and village." *Testimonies*, volume 9, page 28, 29.

May this time soon arrive in Mid-America!

New Church at Estes Park

The Estes Park, Colorado, Church was dedicated on July 4, 1981. The building was begun in the summer of 1978 and was completed in the fall of 1979.

The years 1911-1914 saw the first steps toward a church in Estes Park. During those years H.M.S. Richards, Sr., a student at Campion Academy, held the first evangelistic meeting in Estes Park. This was followed many years later by a series of meetings by the Loveland Church. In the early 1970's, the Eden Valley Institute of Loveland conducted a Branch Sabbath School for approximately six years.

In the spring of 1972 the dream of a church in Estes Park was finally crystallized in the hearts of Dr. and Mrs. Russell Hanson. In the fall of 1975, Elder and Mrs. Caris Lauda and Mr. and Mrs. Dan Cornforth of Loveland joined the Hansons in laying the preliminary ground work for the actual construction of the church. Elder Lauda at that time was the chaplain of Maranatha Flights International, so he said, "Let's get Maranatha involved." It was from this contact that Maranatha later became involved in the construction of the church.

In 1976 Estes Park became one of the conference evangelistic targets. Consequently, all the homes in Estes Park were sent the *Signs of the Times* and evangelistic meetings were held in the Stanley Hotel.

On May 21, 1977, the Estes Park Company was organized into a church with 30 charter members with Ben Trout as the first pastor. Avery Dick became the second pastor on October 1, 1979. In the spring of 1977, building and fund raising committees were selected with Dr. Marlin Dunker and Dr. Russell Hanson in charge. Maranatha Flights International came with a hundred volunteers from July 28 through August 12, 1978. Campion Academy provided housing and meals.

Melvin Kraft and his son Duane, of Boulder, and Don Hay of Estes Park, supervised the construction. John Thacker of Boulder was the architect.

The church plant is valued at more than \$350,000. The actual cash investment is \$154,461. The conference provided \$45,000 of this cash investment. Man hours of donated labor numbered in the thousands.

Brighton Dedication

The Brighton, Colorado church was dedicated on June 27, 1981. The commodious and well-appointed church plant that is the pride of both community and congregation is a far cry from the private home where the

group of 19 adults and 36 children were first organized as the Brighton German church in 1908. It was the August Beierle family who came from France in 1901 and provided the foundation for Adventism in Brighton. The story was told by Ray Beierle at the dedication service. Services were conducted in German until 1942.



Horticulture Program Flourishes At Campion

Where will your son and daughter spend eternity? Of course you don't know! But—are you providing everything you can to help them to spend it with the Saviour?

What about Christian education this fall? Will they attend a local church school or Campion Academy? You know that a Christian education will not guarantee them a place in Heaven—but could it help?

The Campion Academy Horticulture and Greenhouse program is alive and growing! During the 1980-81 school year, over 20 students were involved in work responsibilities directly related to the nursery. These duties ranged from transplanting asparagus to building benches; and from constructing greenhouse bays to carefully planting tiny gardens in our popular terrariums.




Products of the greenhouse this year have included a variety of ornamental plants, such as hydrangeas, marigolds, geraniums, lilies, fuchsias, daisies, columbines, et cetera. Also, the nursery worked with the Wyoming Pathfinders and with major retail outlets in Boulder and Loveland, for the sale of bedding plants this spring. Numerous terrariums have been sold and the plant rental business is off to a solid beginning.

Each Sunday the nursery is represented at local flea markets and swap meets. Participation in these Sunday sales has proven an excellent opportunity for distributing plant material and for teaching the essentials of good salesmanship.

The major purpose of the Campion nursery is to make a practical horticulture education available to the youth of the Rocky Mountain Conference, a goal which current programs are reaching very effectively. A number of students have now received training which equips them to secure employment at most greenhouses or nurseries. Those students especially are excited about the practical nature of their education and work experiences.

You know that a Christian education will not guarantee a place in heaven for your son or daughter — but — could it help?

Nevada SDA School Aids Des Moines Zoo

The Des Moines Zoo is having financial difficulties. The city council even decided to reduce the size of the zoo because of the problem.

The students in Mr. Albert Wiggins' room at the Nevada, Iowa, Seventh-day Adventist Elementary School, however, feel that children in Iowa shouldn't have to go to another state to see a tiger or a camel. So they decided, following a presentation about animals by Carolyn Beal of the Nevada Church, to form a promotional club called CATSZ (Children Acting To Save the Zoo) to help the zoo solve its financial problems.

Beal noted that there are 532,683 school children in Iowa; if each student would give a dime, \$53,268.30 could be raised for the zoo. That would be \$1,000 a week for a year for the animals.

Beal noted there are 10,443 students in Story County. The class hopes the whole state of Iowa will help in promoting help for the zoo and invited other classrooms in Nevada and Story County to join in having a Zoo Day. The class hopes that Zoo Day will become a yearly event to help support the zoo.

Literature Program Revived In Davenport

On July 9, Pastor LeMert and Junior Nichols, one of Davenport's elders, arrived at the Adventist Book Center in Des Moines and went on a shopping spree, purchasing \$1,550 worth of mass distribution literature, books and pamphlets on specific topics, devotional materials, and audio-visual supplies.

Their heavily loaded car then returned to Davenport to unload and restock the personal ministries room of a delighted church family.

"The Davenport Church now virtually has a branch of the ABC from which we can draw material to use in our work for Christ," stated Pastor LeMert.

McClelland Paintings to be Published by Smithsonian

Union College artist James McClelland is painting the illustrations for a new book to be published next year by the Smithsonian Institution. Entitled *Hummingbirds of North America*, the book will be authored by Dr. Paul Johnsgard, a widely published University of Nebraska-Lincoln ornithologist.

McClelland will depict all sixteen species of North American hummingbirds. Some of these species have never been photographed and so McClelland is using museum specimens on loan from the Field Museum of Natural History in Chicago to make his paintings. He is also using herbarium sheets from the University of Nebraska to provide the proper setting of plant life for the paintings.

An associate professor in Union's Division of Humanities, McClelland won this year's National Wildlife Federation's "Best of Show" award in the songbird category. In 1980 he won the Nebraska Wildlife Federation Print of the Year.



McClelland is currently at work on the hummingbird paintings and plans to complete them this month. The paintings will be exhibited at Union

College in September before being sent to the publishers.

Dan Duff of Union Named 'Aid Administrator of Year'

Dan Duff, financial aid officer of Union College, has been chosen Administrator of the Year by the Nebraska Association of Financial Aid Administrators. He received the plaque at a semi-annual meeting in Kearney from the organization of about 70 colleges and universities.

BCH Equipment Fund Drive To Provide ICU Monitors

"The heart monitors are the main thing we need," says Evelyn Swartz, R.N., head nurse in Brighton Community Hospital's Intensive Care Unit.

Of the five presently in use, two were purchased new in 1969, and three used ones have been purchased since. They are all about the same age as the two we originally installed.

Indeed, the heart monitors play a vital role in the unit. Patients come to the Intensive Care Unit to be monitored for cardiac arrhythmia, and thus prevent life-threatening arrhythmias.

According to Mrs. Swartz, "We watch for premature heartbeats, causing the patient to suffer irregularities of the heart which could prove fatal."

The new heart monitors will have five oscilloscopes located in the ICU nursing station console, with bedside scopes for observation while examining the patient. Transducers, for arterial blood pressure monitoring, and telemetry which allows the patient to move about, even to another ward, and still be monitored, are additional features of the proposed equipment.

Community Support Puts Equipment Fund Drive Over Goal

After four months of active solicitation, Brighton Community Hospital's \$400,000 Equipment Fund Drive is completed. On closing day, June 30, campaign leaders announced a final balance of \$426,065.10 in pledges. It was the sum of donations from 483 contributing sources.

"No one segment of the community provided an overwhelming majority of the donations," states Mrs. Jeanne

O'Dell, fund drive chairwoman. "Gifts were pretty well balanced between individuals, organizations and businesses. They ranged from \$2.00 to \$25,000."

"We will still be receiving payments on pledges until March 1983, so it's not too late to make a commitment, or add to the one you have already made." Says Mrs. O'Dell, "There will always be more needs than available money."

HIGHLIGHTS

Are Church-Owned and Operated Schools "Exempt" From Unemployment Compensation Tax?

The answer is Yes! But if your inquiring mind would like to know why—read on. The reasoning is intriguing and critical to institutional freedom and church-state relationships.

The Supreme Court of the United States ruled May 26, 1981, that St. Martin Evangelical Lutheran Church and Northwestern Lutheran Academy of South Dakota, as petitioners, are exempt from federal and state unemployment compensation tax. The church and its educational institutions are eligible for exemption under Title 26 U.S.C. #3309 of the Federal Unemployment Tax Act, "by virtue of the nature of their relationship to the church bodies that employ them." These organizations are members of the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod.

Justice Blackmun, in delivering the opinion of the Court, reached into the legislative history of the law to obtain the intent of Congress in the enactment of the statute in 1970. The report of Subsection (b) (1) of 3309 as recorded from the House of Representatives "excludes services of persons where the employer is a church or convention or association of churches but does not exclude certain services performed for an organization which may be religious in orientation, unless it is operated primarily for religious purposes, and is operated, supervised, controlled, or principally supported by a church or convention or associa-

tion of churches. Thus, the services of a janitor of a church would be excluded, but services of a janitor for a separately incorporated college, although it may be church related would be covered. A college devoted primarily to preparing students for the ministry would be exempt. On the other hand, a church related (i.e. separately incorporated) charitable organization would not be considered under this paragraph to be operated primarily for religious purposes." H.R. Rep. No. 91-612 p. 44 (1969).

The Senate report contained identical language.

This decision by the Supreme Court of the United States is important to church leadership. In a day of fragmentation and separate legal incorporation the court has come down squarely on the side of those incorporations defined as in the inner structure of the church (not separately incorporated). The church is their defense. For other separately incorporated organizations and institutions the door is open to state involvement and harassment. With the present attitude of government and its agencies, especially the Internal Revenue Service, as to what constitutes an integrated or nonintegrated (closely related) auxiliary or institution of the church our separately incorporated institutions seem to have two strikes against them. It appears that the defense of these institutions outside the legal inner-church structure will only become more and more difficult in a fast-developing secular society.
