MISSIONARY ENTERPRISE THE OBJECT OF CHRIST'S CHURCH.

JESUS said, "He that followeth Me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life." Those who follow Jesus will be labourers together with God. They will not walk in darkness, but will find the true path where Jesus, the Light of the world, leads the way; and as they bend their steps Zionward, moving on in faith, they will attain unto a bright experience in the things of God. The mission of Christ, so dimly understood, so faintly comprehended, that called Him from the throne of God to the mystery of the altar of the cross of Calvary, will more and more unfold to the mind, and it will be seen that in the sacrifice of Christ are found the spring and principle of every other mission of love. It is the love of Christ which has been the incentive of every true missionary worker in cities, in towns, in the highways and byways of the world.

The church of Christ has been organized on earth for missionary purposes, and it is of the highest importance that every individual member of the church should be a sincere labourer together with God, filled with the Spirit, having the mind of Christ, perfected in sympathy with Christ, and therefore bending every energy according to his intrusted ability to the saving of souls. Christ requires that every one who would be called by His name should make His work the first and highest consideration, and disinterestedly cooperate with heavenly intelligences in saving the perishing for whom Christ has died.

Debtors to All Men.

Jesus taught His followers that they were debtors both to the Jews and the Greeks, to the wise and the unwise, and gave them to understand that race distinction, caste, and lines of division made by man, were not approved of Heaven, and were to have no influence in the work of disseminating the Gospel. The disciples of Christ were not to make distinctions between their neighbours and their enemies, but they were to regard every man as a neighbour who

needed help, and they were to look upon the world as their field of labour, seeking to save the lost. Jesus has given to every man his work, taking him from the narrow circle which his selfishness has prescribed, annihilating territorial lines, and all artificial distinctions of society; He marks off no limited boundary for missionary zeal, but bids His followers extend their labours to the uttermost parts of the earth. He says to them, "Say not ye, There are yet four months, and then cometh harvest? behold, I say unto you, Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest. And he that repeath receiveth wages, and gathereth fruit unto life eternal; that both he that soweth and he that reapeth may rejoice together." The field of labour presents one vast community of human beings who are in the darkness of error, who are filled with longing, who are praying to One they know not. Thev need to hear the voice of those who are labourers together with God, saying to them, as Paul said to the Athenians, "Whom therefore ye ignorantly worship, Him declare I unto you."

Need of Faithful Workers.

The members of the church of Christ are to be faithful workers in the great harvest-field. They are to be diligently working and earnestly praying, making progress, and diffusing light amid the moral darkness of the world; for are not the angels of heaven imparting to them Divine inspiration? They are never to think of, and much less to speak of, failure in their work. They are not to fail nor to be discouraged. They are to be filled with hope, knowing that they do not rely upon human ability or upon finite resources, but upon the promised Divine aid, the ministry of heavenly agencies who are pledged to open the way before them. The promise is given, "Thy righteousness shall go before thee." We of our-We have only selves have no righteousness. that righteousness which is imparted from Christ, the fountain of righteousness. He is "the Lord our righteousness." Angels of God will break the way before us, preparing hearts for the Gospel message, and the promised power will accompany the labourer, and " the glory of the Lord shall be thy rearward." MRS E. G. A FORWARD MOVEMENT.

DURING the latter part of last year an earnest effort was made and largely taken hold of by our friends in the sale of the book "Carist's Object Lessons." I need not take time to explain that this book was devoted by Sisten E. G. White for the benefit of our educational work. In America it is being sold to pay off the debts on the schools, but here we are selling the book to raise a fund for the establishment of a school. We are glad to say that our school has already begun operations. The first term opened on January 6th. of the present year. The interest from the first has been most excellent, and the enrolment has reached nearly forty, which is a much larger number than we had expected. The Lord's blessing is on the school, and prosperity is attending the effort which will bear fruit to the glory of God. We are now looking about for a permanent location, and we earnestly desire that we may see the guiding hand of the Lord directing every step that is taken; but a permanent location will call for funds. We are very thankful for what has been done, for the contributions that our brethren and sisters have made towards the educational fund. We started out to sell an edition of 5,000 copies of the book "Christ's Object Lessons," and the arrangement is such that the whole proceeds from the sale goes to our school fand. Up to this time we have disposed of 2,000 of these books, so there are still 3,000 remaining, and as the funds for the school are needed, it seems to us that the time has come when we should all put forth a renewed effort in selling this We have asked our brethren and sisters to book. contribute to the Material Fund, to pay for paper and binding, and the Publishing House has offered to do the work of printing, thus bringing forth the book free of cost, and now we ask our brethren and sisters to sell it and return the full price of the book for the benefit of the school.

We are sending letters in this enterprise to many of our churches and friends and we also want to mention it here. We cannot say too much with reference to this movement. The demand for our school is great; we are all glad that a beginning has been made, and now by the blessing of the Lord attending the united effort we can also raise the funds to secure a permanent location for the school; so we ask every one to give us all the assistance they can. Let us not excuse ourselves by saying, "We can't," but do as many have already done, take the matter to the Lord in earness prayer, seek for His blessing and help, and then take the book and go forward, and God will give success. In selling this book, we should also appreciate that we are doing a most excellent misssionary work,—placing the truth into the hands of the people, and thus accomplishing a large amount of good. Besides this we secure the blessing of the Lord in our personal experience. We hope that every brother and sister in every church will take up this matter anew, and go forward, accomplishing the work to the glory of the Lord. O. A. OLSEN.
