ENCOURAGING WORDS FROM AFRICA.

Worker readers will be interested to learn that, in spite of many difficulties incident to the war, the truth is making steady advancement in South Africa. A recent number of The Fortnightly Visit or, the organ of the South African S D A Conference, informs us that a new chapel has just been dedicated at Uitenhage. The brethren in that place have been putting forth earnest efforts to obtain this place of worship, and the Lord has blessed their self-denying labours. We also learn of four new Sabbath keepers baptized in this place, and of six baptisms in East London, where Brother David Tarr has been holding some meetings.

Brother Reaser writes of encouraging experiences in Natal, where people are accepting the truth, and the canvassers are pushing forward the work with the best of courage. Arrangements have been made for the translation of "Steps to Christ" in the Zulu language. The South African brethren are also very active in working with our periodicals.

Thousands of copies of our German and Dutch publications are being circulated weekly in the Boer camps and prisons. The English publications are also having a wide circulation. A while ago it was difficult to sell 2,500 copies of the South African Sentinel; but the last month the circulation was 4,500, and this month the brethren are printing an edition of 6,500, and expect that all will be used. Brother Hyatt writes that most of these papers are sold on the streets on Saturday nights, and that those who are engaged in the work are realising the Lord's rich blessing.

These are truly encouraging words from South Africa. How evident it is that the progress of the Lord's work is not dependent on human conditions or circumstances, but only calls for whole hearted devotion on the part of His people. Let us all pray that the cause of truth in South Africa may still continue to advance with rapidity, and that the warning message may be given effectively to all parts of that field.

EXPERIENCES WITH PRESENT TRUTH

Last Sunday, the canvassing for PRESENT TRUTH, I came across a man who takes the same every week from the newsagent, and is much interested in the Sabbath.
