THE CAMP-MEETING.

(Continued.)

Securing Attendance.

At some of our camp-meetings, strong companies of workers have been organised to go out into the city and its suburbs to distribute literature and invite people to the meetings. By this means hundreds of persons were secured as regular attendants during the last half of the meeting who otherwise might have thought little about it.

We must take every justifiable means of bringing the light before the people. Let the press be utilised, and let every advertising agency be employed that will call attention to the work. This should not be regarded as nonessential. On every street-corner you may see placards and notices calling attention to various things that are going on, some of them of the most objectionable character; and shall those who have the light of life be satisfied with feeble efforts to call the attention of the masses to the truth?

Those who become interested have to meet sophistry and misrepresentation from popular ministers, and they know not how to answer these things. The truth presented by the living preacher should be published in as compact a form as possible, and circulated widely. As far as practicable, let the important discourses given at our camp-meetings be published in the newspapers. Thus the truth which was placed before a limited number may find access to many minds. And where the truth has been misrepresented, the people will have an opportunity of knowing just what the minister said.

Put your light on a candlestick, that it may give light to all who are in the house. If the truth has been given to us, we are to make it so plain to others that the honest in heart may recognise it and rejoice in its bright rays.

Nathanael prayed that he might know whether or not the One announced by John the Baptist as the Messiah was indeed the Lamb of God that taketh away the sin of the world. While he was laying his perplexities before God, and asking for

light, Philip called him, and in earnest, joyful tones exclaimed, "We have found Him, of whom Moses in the law, and the prophets, did write, Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph." John i. 45.

But Nathanael was prejudiced against the Nazarene. Through the influence of false teaching, unbelief arose in his heart, and he asked, "Can there any good thing come out of Nazareth?" Philip did not try to combat his prejudice and unbelief. He said, "Come and see." This was wise; for as soon as Nathanael saw Jesus, he was convinced that Philip was right. His unbelief was swept away, and faith, firm, strong and abiding, took possession of his soul. Jesus commended the trusting faith of Nathanael.

Proclaim the Truth.

There are many in the same condition as was Nathanael. They are prejudiced and unbelieving because they have never come in contact with the special truths for these last days or with the people who hold them, and it will require but attendance upon a meeting full of the Spirit of Christ to sweep away their unbelief. No matter what we have to meet, what opposition, what effort to turn souls away from the truth of heavenly origin, we must give publicity to our faith, that honest souls may see and hear and be convinced for themselves. Our work is to say, as did Philip, "Come and see."

We hold no doctrine that we wish to hide. To those who have been educated to keep the first day of the week as a sacred day, the most objectionable feature of our faith is the Sabbath of the fourth commandment. But does not God's Word declare that the seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord our God? True, it is not an easy matter to make the required change from the first to the seventh day. It involves a cross. It clashes with the precepts and practices of men. Learned men have taught the people tradition till they are full of unbelief and prejudice. Yet we must say to these people, "Come and see." God requires us to proclaim the truth, and let it discover error.

THE GENERAL MEETING IN SCOTLAND.

THE first annual meeting of the Scottish Mission convened at Glasgow, March 31st, closing Sunday evening, April 5th. It was well attended by the friends in Scotland, and we enjoyed a very profitable season. We were also favoured with the presence of J. O. Corliss and E. E. Andross, whose labours and counsel were greatly blessed and much appreciated.

Scotland is the newest mission field in the British Union. It is only a little more than one year since Brother and Sister Harry Armstrong located in Glasgow, taking up aggressive work. We made mention of the organisation of the Glasgow church in December last, the first and still the only one in Scotland; but the work is making progress. The blessing of the Lord is attending the circulation of our literature in a marked manner. So much so that at present Scotland is taking the lead in the sale of our books.

Brother Westworth is also meeting with encouragement in his work in Edinburgh. While the attendance at the services has not been large, still a number of people are much interested, and the outlook is very encouraging.

During the general meeting the different lines of work received considerable attention, and the business was transacted with perfect harmony. The Mission committee chosen for the coming year are:—W. A. Westworth, Superintendent; other members of the committee: W. B. Scott, E. Aplin, R. M. Lamie, and Chas. Dyer. E. Aplin, Treasurer, and W. B. Scott, Secretary and Canvassing Agent.

Plans are being laid for decided aggressive work, and we expect to see rapid advancement made during the coming year. Scotland is a good field, and the Lord has much people there, and it is important that the brethren and sisters, one and all, stand unitedly together, faithfully supporting the work with their earnest prayers, their faithful lives, and their tithes and offerings, so that the fulness of the blessing promised in Mal. iii. 10 may be experienced.

I was glad to have the privilege of attending this meeting, and to note the spirit of courage and earnestness with which all the workers enter upon their different lines of work for the year to come. Our earnest prayer is that their efforts may be crowned with abundant success.

The Health Work.

We have received a number of interesting reports of work with the Temperance Number of *Good Health*. Some of our workers found that it was a little more difficult to sell than the ordinary number because of being devoted so exclusively to temperance. Others again found that this very fact opened up homes which had not been accessible hitherto. All seemed to recognise that there is real need of instruction on this subject, and we believe everyone has been blessed in the endeavour to put this budget of temperance information in the homes of the people. We wish to tender our hearty thanks to all, and especially to those who have put forth extra efforts to circulate this number of *Good Health*.

The May number will take up quite a different subject. The leading article is entitled, "The Battle Creek Idea," and gives quite a full setting forth of our sanitarium work, and the principles underlying it. We believe that this will meet a widely-felt want, as so many persons have enquired at different times with reference to the work, how it is carried on, etc. The little company at Belfast has ordered 5,000 copies of this number, which means one-tenth of the entire edition. Workers who have been questioned on this point, and desire to make known the principles of our medical missionary work, and the special features of our sanitariums in Belfast and Caterham, will do well to order freely of this number, which we believe will also be a very saleable one.

Among other interesting features Dr. Kellogg has an excellent article entitled, "The Living Temple," showing the presence of the Spirit of God working in our bodies. Mr G. A. Olley, the champion long-distance bicycle rider, tells of his habits while in training. Many persons will also be interested in the out of Mr. Olley, who has had a unique record as a cyclist. Dr. Olsen writes a two-page article on "The Hygienic Treatment of Eczema." Dr. Bell has a contribution on the subject of "Tea as a Beverage;" and Dr. Waggoner on "The True Nature of Alcohol." An illustrated article on "The Health Habits and Customs of the Beers," is another attractive feature. There are three or four new hygienic recipes, and an article on "Fat as a Part of the Diet." The frontispiece gives a picture of the family of the Battle Creek Sanitarium, and we are sure all our workers will be interested in it. The picture was taken in the summer of 1897, and shows a very large and happy family indeed.

Dr. Eulalia Sisley left London on Friday for Portsmouth where she will remain a week giving practical talks on various phases of the health work, and helping our sisters to carry out the principles in their homes. From Portsmouth she will go on to Plymouth for a longer stay and work of the same kind. Brother and Sister Borrowdale report a very encouraging interest in health principles in that town. Dr. Sisley has given some excellent talks in connection with the London Good Health Leagues, and we feel sure that her visits to these churches will result in much good.

Brother and Sister Buckland report good progress, and many encouraging experiences in their work at Leicester. As some of our readers are aware, it is expected that Elder Corliss, with other workers, will conduct a tent effort in Leicester this summer, and we have no doubt that the faithful work which Brother and Sister Buckland have carried on in this place since last summer has made an excellent impression, and prepared the way for work in other lines of Gospel effort.

Brother and Sister Barnard have recently come from South Africa, and have connected with our work in this country. They are located at present at Tunbridge Wells. Brother Barnard tells the following experience in connection with the Temperance Number of *Good Health* :—

"Noticing one day an announcement outside the Baptist Church that a meeting of the Christian Endeavour Temperance Society was to be held on Good Friday in the schoolroom, I thought it would be a good opportunity to introduce the April number of *Good Health*. I went there a few minutes before the time, and was cordially welcomed by a young man, who kindly invited me to take tea with them, which I did without the tea. In the meantime he introduced me to many others, including the chairman, W. Usher, M.D. Having explained to him what brought me here, viz., that I had seen the announcement of the meeting, and being a temperance worker myself, came to distribute the Temperance Number to the people, and would be glad of any assistance he would give me, he took a copy for himself, and said that he would mention it to the people, which he did in a most favourable way. He mentioned my presence, and my purpose in being there, told them that they could get *Good Health* for a penny, read the list of contents, and remarked that it was the cheapest pennyworth he had ever seen. He also mentioned that the paper was published under the auspices of the Surrey Hills Hydropathic Institution, whose principles, he was sure they all, as teetotallers, were in sympathy with, and he thought everyone in the room ought to purchase a copy. I sold thirty-six copies in all, there being about 100 adults present.

"After tea, the doctor asked me to address the

meeting for a few minutes, which I did, briefly giving them my experience of becoming an adherent of temperance principles. One gentleman gave me his address, asking me to call with next month's issue, and for a twelvemonth's subscription.

"We came to this town to canvass, and found it the hardest field, as regards reaching the people with religious books, that we have ever been in. These papers, which Mrs. Barnard brought down with her, just came in time as an entering wedge for the truth. The experience has done me good, and suggested to us the way of reaching the people. Mrs. Barnard will take *Good Health* over a certain piece of territory, canvassing the same afterwards for 'Home Hand Book' as an experiment."

We might mention other encouraging experiences, but must preserve them for the next number of the WORKER. We are thankful for the kind interest our *Present Truth* workers and book canvassers have taken in *Good Health*, and we believe that as they continue to push the work, and endeavour to do still more with the health magazine, they will make friends wherever they go, and it will be a help to them in handling the books and other papers. There is a real demand for reading matter on the subject of health, and the Lord has given us principles of which the world stands in great need. Let us be of good courage, and press forward in the work. This is the sowing time, by-and-by we shall have the reaping. If we are diligent, we shall have many sheaves to lay at the Master's feet.

PITCAIRN ISLAND.

WE quote below from a letter received by Brother G. R. Drew from Brother G. F. Jones. Both he and his wife, formerly Miss Marion Valentine, are so well known to most readers of the MISSIONARY WORKER that we need not introduce them here.

"I am writing (January 21st) from Pitcairn Island, a very paradise on earth as far as climate and productiveness are concerned. Hence Prince Deceiver has visited this place and scattered his prolific seed, and therefore we are here uprooting his weeds and sowing the good seed.

"Since we left England we have found plenty of work to do on the ships and trains; and our roughing it on the seas and prairies and in sin-daring cities has served to make us both fearless in the cause we love. I never enjoyed the work so much as now. Infectious diseases, overwhelming heat, tornadoes, desperados, etc., have only proved a more powerful stimulus to our labours. Herein is this Gospel verified to us, 'He that loveth his life shall lose it, but he that hateth his life in this world, shall keep it unto life eternal.'

"Since last June I have been sailing the cutter, 'Pitcairn' and have taught seven native young men to run their own vessel. Our brethren here can now find their way about all over the globe, and carry the Pearl of great price to others. My wife has accompanied me on several trips. We have no 'couch of ease' in our life here, and indeed I never remember having any since being a Christian. We have learned together to 'endure the cross, despising the shame,' for the joy that is set before us.

"The Lord is giving us His whole Gospel, and in this we possess everything. Although poor, we are able to make many rich. It begets in us a fearless confidence to go anywhere, though epidemics are raging and people are dying all around; for it promises to preserve blameless unto the coming of the Lord, our 'whole spirit, soul and body,' therefore we are not afraid. I wish we all knew the power of salvation there is in true health reform. According to the above Scripture none can expect to be preserved blameless unto the Lord's coming unless they submit to the Gospel that saves the body as well as the soul and spirit.

"We expect to sail to-day for the Gambier Islands to work. Please pray for us. Our address will be as follows: Mangereva, Gambier Islands, South Pacific."
