South England Conference.

In the South and West of England.—1

ON the 12th of February I left London for the purpose of visiting our churches in the south and west of England. I made my first stop at Brighton. For some time, Miss Emily Gresswell has been engaged here in the work of selling Present Truth, Good Health, and various books. Her health is not very good, and this has interfered with her work to some extent. But the Lord is blessing her efforts, not only in the way of distributing literature, but also in bringing the truth home to different persons who have shown an interest in Bible study. Some have already begun the observance of the Sabbath, and others are deeply interested. I remained there until Tuesday morning, holding several meetings every day. Although the attendance was not very large, the interest was deep, and the Word of the Lord was studied with diligence.

Southsea.

ON February 16th, I arrived at Southsea, and found Brethren Knight and A. E. Bacon busy and of good courage in the Lord. The weather has been unfavourable for a large attendance at their meetings, and some have been prevented by illness, but we found the work making progress. We all appreciate the difficulties which the work has encountered in Southsea, but this is nothing new. As we look over the history of the church in the past, we find that such circumstances have been very frequent. But the truth will accomplish its work, and will gather out a people for the coming of our Lord.

Our meeting on the Sabbath was one of much encouragement, and I was pleased to hear testimonies of courage and confidence from others. The brethren and sisters are firm in the truth and are growing in Christ.

Southampton.

My next visit was at Southampton. On Sunday evening, February 21st, we had a large attendance at the meeting, and a very interesting service. I also spoke to them on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, the latter being the regular Good Health League meeting. This gathering was well attended, the subject for the evening being, "Health and Healing from a Bible Standpoint."

The brethren and sisters are of good courage. Their Sabbath meetings are increasing in attendance and interest, and the outlook for the work is very favourable.

I called several times on Brother Bundy, who was lying at the point of death. He had been a great sufferer for a long time, but the Lord had given him a very rich and precious experience. He told me how the Lord had opened up to him the glories of the new earth, and the preciousness of Jesus as a personal Saviour. On Thursday, the 25th, I bade him farewell, never expecting to see him again in this life. I have since learned that he has passed away. May the Lord comfort his bereaved wife and children, who mourn a dear husband and father ! His testimony will live after him, to the encouragement and strengthening of his brethren and sisters.

East Cowes.

WHILE at Southampton, I made a brief visit to East Cowes, and we had a profitable meeting at the home of Brother Sargent. One more soul at that place has taken his stand definitely for the Sabbath, and the truth of God. The little company feel greatly encouraged.

Plymouth.

LEAVING Southampton, our next call was at Plymouth. Since my last visit there in May, the brethren and sisters have passed through varied experiences, but the Lord has blessed the work, and a number of souls have accepted the truth. During my present visit, five were baptized, and six united to the church, and several others are interested in the Sabbath and the truth. Our meetings were a source of much encouragement, and as we studied the truth for this time, and the dangers and perplexities of which the Lord has warned us, our faith was much strengthened. On Sunday evening we celebrated the ordinances of the Lord's house with much joy, and the stirring testimonies that followed cheered our hearts.

"We have enjoyed the work here with 'Great Controversy' very much, and thank the Lord for His many blessings to us. We know that He has been with us, and has blessed us in many ways. We ask your prayers that we may ever be found faithful to Him, and doing His will."

"Our Day."

Our Day: Its Events and What They Mean, is the title of a paper now about ready for circulation. We will not undertake to describe the paper, but would ask all who have not already received it to send for a copy at once. We will post a sample on receipt of a penny stamp.

If Our Day meets with general approval, and is largely circulated without materially hindering the sale of *Present Truth* and *Good Health*, it is our purpose to make it the first of a series of papers covering in an interesting and conclusive manner the essential features of the message that God has commissioned us to give to the world. Each paper will have an appropriate, illustrated title of its own, differing from the other titles. We hope to be able to select only such titles as will induce the people to buy the paper rather than to cause them to turn from it.

Each number will deal with only one general subject; yet at the same time it will be related to the other papers so as to form a link in the grand chain of truth for these days. The subjects will be illustrated with appropriate pictures, one or more in each paper to be drawn especially for it by a first-class artist. We believe the truth published in this manner will be

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very effective and more easily brought to the attention of the people than in any other form. As Our Day is published as a trial number, we are anxious to give it as general a circulation as possible. To this end we most earnestly desire the hearty co-operation of all our people. No doubt many feel they are already doing all they can so that it will be impossible to take on more without dropping something now in hand. We know that most of our good brethren are working very hard, many of them from early morning until late at night, and still the work in this field has only just begun. Truly the harvest is great and the labourers are few.

It was with a knowledge of these things that we decided to start this new line of work. It seems to us that our paper agents, as they go on their rounds each week, delivering Present Truth and Good Health to their regular customers, can sell Our Day to those who do not care for the other papers, and quite likely many will buy the new paper with Present Truth and Good Health. Our book agents can sell Our Day instead of giving away tracts. Our people who are not directly connected with the work will have something new to sell to their neighbours and friends. In these and other ways many papers could be sold each week. The papers are not dated, and so can be sold at any time, as the truths they contain will always be timely.

The paper will sell for one penny each; ninepence per dozen of thirteen, and in lots of fifty or more at the rate of four shillings per hundred. Few will care to buy less than fifty at a time. Our church members can order through their librarian, and thus secure the lowest rates. We most sincerely hope that each Seventhday Adventist will order at least fifty copies of *Our Day*, and see to it that they are disposed of to good advantage. The time to labour will soon be past. "Let us work while it is day, for the night cometh when no man can work."

ALL orders for the new paper, *Our Day*, must be accompanied by the cash. The publishers cannot fill any orders which are sent in without money. The price is 1d. per copy; one dozen of thirteen, 9d.; and fifty or more at the rate of 4/- per hundred. To persons ordering more than one copy, but less than one dozen, the price will be 1d. for each copy ordered.

Our Bealth Work.

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Notes by the Way.—No. 2.

LEAVING Hull on Wednesday, February 10th, I visited Edinburgh, where I had the privilege of meeting the same evening with a company of interested people in Brother Westworth's drawing room. I was sorry to miss seeing Brethren Miller and Nethery, who had gone to Aberdeen to look up a location for a tent. The following day I spent with Brother W. B. Scott at Dundee, where a considerable interest is developing in the health and other branches of the message. Brother Scott has his hands more than full giving Bible readings during the intervals that he can spare from introducing our literature.

Kirkcaldy.

The evening of the same day I met with the brethren and sisters at Kirkcaldy, the gathering including quite a number of friends from outside, mostly readers of *Good Health*. The '44 movement had a considerable following in Kirkcaldy, which was also for a time the headquarters of the oldest vegetarian society in the Kingdom. The Lord richly blessed the labours of Brother and Sister Ritchie last summer, and I was greatly pleased to meet so many earnest Sabbathkeepers, all of whom showed likewise a deep interest in the health principles. Sister Sparks is doing a splendid work with *Good Health* in this town, and Brother Monteith has a large list of *Present Truth*.

Glasgow.

At Glasgow, my next stopping-place, I spent about four days, and had the pleasure of addressing the brothers and sisters and other friends several times. Brother Ritchie is conducting a special effort in this place, and though the work has been hindered by various circumstances, the interest is a growing one. Brother John Brown, as most of our readers know, is carrying a very large list of Present Truth readers. Brother Taylor and his sister, Miss Berta Taylor, have been doing much for Good Health, and Brother and Sister Young, and Brother and Sister Seymour, and several others, have worked very materially. Brother Dyer, whom the Lord has especially blessed in the circulation of the large books, is giving his attention on Sundays to Good Health. - I was much pleased to have the privilege of going out with him on the Sunday I was there. We

visited one of the worst slums in the city, and had some special opportunities of speaking with the people, whom we found intelligent and ready to buy the paper. Brother Dyer's two sons, Charlie, aged twelve, and Wallace, aged eleven, have been selling the paper for some time. Charlie has in this way earned enough money to buy himself a bycicle, and Wallace has paid for a violin and a football out of his profits. These boys are enjoying the work, and are getting a valuable training in missionary. effort. I mention them especially with a view of encouraging other boys and girls to take up the sale of Good Health, not with a view of profits, although the work is not unprofitable. but for the purpose of doing good. There is no reason why our children with the encouragement of their parents, could not sell thousands of copies of Good Health every month.

On Sunday afternoon we had a meeting of the Good Health League Committee, and it was there decided to take up as one branch of the League work, house to house visiting in a slum region near the church. The sisters, especially, will call on people, first with Good Health, and as they get further acquainted, they will endeavour to arrange cottage meetings, at which simple instruction will be given in healthful cookery and household hygiene. They will not take a large district to work, but endeavour to concentrate their efforts on a small territory with a view of making some definite impression. The effort will doubtless be more fully reported later in the WORKER.

We had a public meeting of the League on Tuesday evening, at which quite a number of friends from the outside joined us in the study of the health princples. Brother Aplin, president of the Glasgow League, is planning to give special attention to working up the interest during the next few months, and I am sure he will have the hearty co-operation of all the members.
