Our College Library.

WE wish to thank our friends heartily for responding so generously to our appeal for books with which to found a library. From practically nothing at the beginning of the year, we now have a library of 250 volumes, whose existence is largely due to the generosity of one brother—Brother George B. Drew—who has taken a very practical interest in the College from its very beginning; for it was he who gave me the first donation made to the school. That was in the year 1901, a month before the College first opened its doors.

When a call was made for books with which to help establish a library, Brother Drew responded by sending one box of books, and since then has sent more until his donation has reached 126 volumes of the most valuable books. Brother Drew spent many years in collecting this carefully selected library. He has often refused to sell the books, as he said he valued them too much; however, when he heard of the needs of the College, he gave them outright to the institution.

Following this donation came one from the International Tract Society, giving us a copy of each of the books published by the Society, and a donation from the Review and Herald Publishing Company in Washington, and the Modern Medicine Publishing Co., of Battle Creek, of the books published by them. This made about fifty more volumes.

This week I received a letter from Brother

Ballenger, stating that he was sending the College a box of books for its use. Several others have made us small but very welcome donations. One brother sends word, "I have no suitable books to send you, but buy any two books you need and send the bill to me."

These gifts, together with the books which we have been able to purchase with the donations given last summer at our general meetings, are making it possible for us to get a good start toward a most useful and much needed library for our Training College.

We will be most happy if many more would send us books on the subjects of history, science, history of missions and lives of missionaries, literature and general books of reference.

There are now eighty one students attending the school. As the classes are now two months along, it would be better, unless for some special reason, for no more students to come until the beginning of the next session, September, 1905.

IT has been some time since I have written to the WORKER. I am glad to say that the truth is beginning to advance in this city. Within the last month three have taken their stand to keep the Sabbath,—Miss Chapman, and Mr. and Mrs. Nipper.

The gentleman's case is very interesting. He is in business as a lithographer. On October 5th he decided to keep the Sabbath, and he went to his employer on Thursday morning, and told him that he was going to keep the Sabbath, Saturday. The director thought he was wrong, and asked him to reconsider it, and see if he had not made a mistake. On Friday his employer asked him if he had found out anything. He replied that he was still sure he was right.

Sabbath came and instead of going to busi-

ness he came to our meeting. The foreman thought he was away unwell, and when our brother on Monday morning explained to him, he asked, "Are you always going to stop away on Saturday?" "Yes," he replied; the foreman became angry, and told him they would not allow him to keep the Sabbath there.

On Friday, October 14th, his employer called for him and asked him many questions. He said he had never heard of anyone obeying the Gospel in face of losing his situation, and was anxious to know what he intended to do. He replied that God says, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added," and that, as he was convinced that Saturday was the Sabbath, he should keep it under any circumstances.

"But," said his employer, "what are you going to do?" He replied that he did not know but could only trust in the Lord. "Why," his employer said, "you are more sincere than the Jews;" he asked if he was a Jew, and how he learned about the Sabbath truth, so he told him of our tent meetings, and our cottage meetings, which we have held since the tent was taken down.

"Well," said the employer, "I think you are wrong." He expected to be told he would not be required, but instead, to his joy, the director told him that they had decided to keep him, and that he need only work five days instead of six

When he went back to his room the foreman and other shop workers asked him how he got on. When they were informed that the firm had decided to keep him they were astonished, and said it was a miracle. "Yes," he said, "it is in answer to prayer." We had prayed, and how glad we were to see our prayer answered.

Many look on the Sabbath as a burden and the loss of situation, but we were refreshed to see that the Most High still rules in the kingdom of men, and He can cause those who will obey Him to find favour before employers.

Others who have been attending our meetings are convinced that we have the truth, so we trust that the experience of this brother may be the means of encouraging others to take their stand.

On November 6th I have been requested to take a Bible class at the Bristol City Mission, and on December 11th at the Totterdown Baptist Chapel to give a paper on the Sabbath. It is to encourage those who may be isolated that I am writing these few lines, telling a little of our experiences. Until something more than a year ago, Mrs. Green and I had never done any public work or given Bible readings; we did not feel any capacity for such work. But by a blessed inspiration from God alone, we decided to hold Bible studies at our house on Friday evening. We succeeded after some effort in gathering a nice company of young people together, all of whom were very interested in the illustrated studies on Daniel.

One of the young men soon left Boston and went to Lincoln. I wrote to Brother Clarke at Lincoln and he followed up the work, which resulted in this young man's accepting the truth and going to college, where he is now studying to go and spread this glorious message to others.

This brother's move caused a great deal of controversy in our town, and the families of the other young people began to object to their attending our Bible studies. So we were left without anyone for a time.

When Elder Corliss visited Boston I passed round our visiting card announcing a Bible study at our house on Saturday afternoon. About two months after two ladies came down and became deeply interested in the truth. Seeing the light of the Sabbath they bravely took their stand. The daughter of one of these sisters was converted at the Leicester campmeeting, and is now a bright and shining light for the truth. They have all been buried in baptism.
