- 3. District the t on and country, and assign to workers according to their adaptability to work in the various localities.
- 4. Give copies to all libraries, reading rooms, schools, other institutions and public places where they will be received.

5. Supply waiting room racks.

- 6. Make a special effort to place the paper in the hands of the leaders and members of other Young People's Societies.
- 7. Mail copies to friends and acquaintances, and follow by faithful correspondences
- 8. With such a preparation as can be obtained, let certain ones sell the papers on the streets and in business houses, observing propriety and Christian curtesy in all the work.
- 9. Nothing of value was ever done for God without prayer. Let every individual and the entire society pray earnestly for success in planning and executing the work.

C. Follow-up Work-

Carefully note the interested ones; take to them other literature, and give Bible Readings as opportunity offers:

Let none say, "It is a good work, but I cannot help". Let none order a supply, and then, repulsed, at the first door, turn about and lay the papers on the shelf. Let each Missionary Volunteers be a member of Gideon's three hundred,—ready to seize the opportunity, ready to lift the responsibility, and then ready to stick to it in the spirit of earnest prayer, until the work is done.

# REPORTS FROM THE FIELD.

## THE THIRD ANGIL'S MESSAGE AMONG THE FINNS.

Shortly after our return from camp-meeting, a Finlander came to our door and requested me to baptise him. This man, Brother Evonon (Evans) had had Brother Bjork's son, Victor, working for him a few weeks and was so impressed with the fact that the boy would not work on the Sabbath that he began to study the matter. Later bhe bought Great Controversy and Elder Conradi's book on Revelation, both in the Finn language, from Brother Bjork, but found no time to read them until he was sick for several months last winter and spring with rheumatism, which time he devoted to the study of these books and the Bible.

He came to one of our meetings last winter in Laurium and told me at that time he thought we had the truth. After reading Great Controversy he was so delighted with the new light which he had found that he began to talk it to his neighbors and loaned the book to a friend by the name of Loganen, who upon reading the book carefully comparing it with the Bible, was convenced of the Sabbath, and began to keep it with his family before he had finished the book.

The next week after Brother Evens came to our home I visited these people, holding meetings among the settlers, Brother Evens acting as interpreter as he can speak the English quite good. He lives several miles back in the woods from Toivola in a scattered community of Finnish homesteaders. Following a trail for several miles through the deep woods we came to the house of Brother Logenin with whom we spent the afternoon

and night in studying the Bible-

In tears this man said through the interpreter. "Surely God must have some great message to give, that He would move upon the heart of an Englishman to tramp through the woods in the rain and mud, to look up the poor Finne" He said he did not feel worthy that I should come under his roof. He wanted me to tell him the message God had sent to I assure you it gave me pleasure to give him the Third Angel's Message and see the joy with which he received it.

Ho told us his neighbors had all turned against him, and he could not get work, and did not know what he should do to support his family. I told him the Lord would open the way before him, citing him to His sure promises, and many similar cases where God had wrought.

During this visit I used the book Hebrews, and spoke of the work of Christ as our High Priest, not knowing that I was opening to his mind a great mine of precious But on my last visit I learned that the Laustodians ( the church to which he had belonged) teach that the work of Christ was finished when He died on the cross and since that time He has nothing to do for man, consequently the book of Hebrews to them is a great mystery which has not been revealed yet. Brother Loganin is now rejoicing in the light of the Heavenly Sanctuary.

He is now working in a lumber camp for a rouch ungadly man-Finns went to the boss and demanded that Brother Loganin be discharged because he went home every Friday, the boss replied, "I cannot answer for this man's sins. The Bible tells him to keep Saturday and if he believes that to be right, I would have to answer for his sin if I made him work on that day." So the Lord has opened the way before him A, what a glorious truth we have. How we ought to rejoice for Which we praise Him-

There are many doors open, where the families have invited me to come and nem the Bible. There is another family there whom we hope will take their stand. In Hancock the interest among the Finns is growing. I am holding a meeting with teach them the Bible. Most of those who come are Baptists them every Sunday afternoon with a good attendance. and one of them, Brother Storm, interprets for me. The Finnish Baptist minister was present at one of the meetings. The subject was, "The First Day of the Week in the New Testament." He said that Christ was the end of the law. The Lord helped me to present the truth and gave us a signal victory. We were glad the minister was there, for the truth stood out in such clear contrast with error that all in the house saw it. Some of the Finns have been to our Sabbath service and prayer meetings.

The work among the English is onward. Brother Stedman is doing good work with the club of SIGNS and Sister Campbell has her hands full with the Bible work. Mrs. Montgomery and I made a flying trip to Greenland and hold five meetings there, watering the seed sown and as a result one sister is keeping the Subbath of the Lord-

Brethren and sisters, are you praying for the Finnish work; and are you putting your coppers, dimes, and dollars with your prayers? How about the "Copper Fund for the Finnish Work." Have you forgoteen it? () let us come up to the help of the Lord with out means. Let us be faithful in our tithes and offerings that the work may not It will pay. languish.

The end is coming on like a whirlwind. We must be quick to help now. it will be too late. Are you doing all you can?

## REPORT FROM MESICK.

Some raised chickens, others planted gardens, sold mottoes, etc., until some earned as high as two dollars and fifty cents from the small investment of eight cents. The money raised by these boys and girls together with the collection taken up at the ingathering amounted to nearly twenty-dollars. Their faces fairly shone as they brought their willing offerings for missions. Surely the blessing of the Lord rests upon this kind of work.

The Mesick church intends to raise a larger sum of money next spring as to give their young people a good start. Would it not be well for all our Sabbath-schools to help and encourage the children in this line of work.
