# BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The following plans and resolutions were adopted by the B. C. Conference convened at Victoria, May 24-26:

# No. 1.

Whereas, The prospering hand of our God has dealt bountifully with us during the past year in all branches of the work,

Resolved. That with grateful hearts we hereby express our gratitude to Him for His fostering care.

#### No. 2.

Whereas, The winter season being in the mind of this committee the better time to convene in annual conference, we therefore recommend,

That the fiscal year of this conference close the 31st day of December of each year, and that the executive committee call this conference togethe. as soon thereafter as in their judgment may be deemed best.

#### No. 3.

Whereas, It is very evident that our larger cities are rapidly ripening up tive instruction to us that we should in wickedness and corruption to a condition where the judgments of God will soon fall upon them, thus rendering the work of the third angel's message very difficult therein,

Therefore Resolved, That, now, while there is time left us, we advise the executive board of this conference, as quickly as possible to strengthen and build up the work in such cities as Vancouver and Victoria and other of our larger towns in this province.

#### No. 4.

Whereas, The scattering of our literature is one of the most potent factors in giving the third angel's message to the world and lays the foundation for the work of the ministry, and

We Recommend, That all our conference laborers and churches put forth special efforts to encourage this line of work:

- (a) By urging our people who are adapted to it to engage in the sale of our books and periodicals.
- (b) By systematic efforts among our churches and scattered Sabbathkeepers to constantly scatter tracts, pamphlets and papers.

We further recommend that this conference make an earnest appeal to the North Pacific Union Conference to give us its general canvassing agent, as soon as possible, to spend some weeks in thoroughly organizing this

#### No. 5.

Whereas. The influence surrounding our public schools is becoming such that it is unsafe to trust the education of our children longer to them, and

Whereas, The Lord has given posigather our children out from these schools into schools of our own where they can be taught the truth for this time: threfore.

Resolved, That the executive committee be instructed to give careful attention to the education of our children and vouth by establishing church schools in our churches.

# No. 6.

Whereas, The Western Washington Conference has so liberally donated their colporter boat, "Evangel," and released Brother David Dodge to go with it: therefore.

Resolved, That we extend to that conference our heartfelt thanks for thir liberality and pledge ourselves to

Whereas. We believe that the end faithfully use the boat in carrying the message in this field.

#### No. 7.

Resolved. That the conference elect. at this session a Religious Liberty Secretary who will be in close touch with the Union Conference Religious Liberty Secretary and who will lead out in this work in this province.

#### No. 8.

We Rocommend (a) That all credentials and licenses of workers be extended to December 31, 1906; (b) That the following papers be given by this conference:

Missionary Credentials-Edward C. Widgery, Mary G. Widgery, David Dodge.

# No. 9.

Resolved. That we will give our hearty support to The North Pacific Gleaner, our Union Conference paper, by securing subscriptions for the same and by furnishing live reports from the field.

#### No. 10.

We Recommend, That the Conference Secretary be instructed to send the tithe and trust funds to the North Pacific Union Conference each month and that the secretary of the North Pacific Union Conference be requested to send our appropriation monthly.
