Youth Congress Delegates to be Selected

In order that the inspiration of the North Pacific Union Golden Anniversary Youth Congress may be carried into the local churches during the last half of 1957, delegates are to be selected from each church or senior MV Society before April 1.

The approved plan calls for one delegate from each church or senior MV Society plus one additional delegate for societies with a membership of twenty or over. Our senior academies will send one delegate for each one hundred students enrolled. It is imperative that there will be a full representation from the North Pacific at the congress: therefore, we are asking the pastors, MV societies and local churches to give attention to the selection of their delegate or delegates at once. Deadline for sending in the official delegate names to the local conference office is April 1. An alternate delegate should also be selected in case of illness or other circumstances which would prevent the delegate's attendance at the congress.

Delegates are to be senior youth (or MV society officers) in good and regular standing with the church. The delegate is to be one who has a working interest in Share-Your-Faith evangelism and one who has leadership qualities. Each delegate will be expected to attend all the meetings and bring back a good report to the local society or church following the congress, and also help in organizing the youth to carry out plans outlined at the congress.

The method of selecting the Youth Congress delegates is as follows:

(1) The MV executive committee shall nominate and the MV society membership approve by vote the names of young people who can qualify as delegates. (Church board will select delegate where there is no society.)

(2) The church board shall select the delegate(s) from the MV society list of nominations and the name(s) shall be forwarded to the conference MV secretary by the MV executive committee (or church board where there is no MV society).

(3) The full delegation list of names will be due at the local conference office not later than April 1, 1957.

To assist the delegates with their expenses while at the congress each society (or church where there is no society) is to provide their delegate(s) with a minimum of \$18: \$3 of this amount is for registration fees, and the balance is to go for housing and meals. In addition to this minimum amount financial assistance should be given to each delegate to help with the transportation. No fixed amount has been set up for this because distances will vary in each conference and there is to be no general transportation pool. The conferences are not contemplating chartering special busses or trains, therefore transportation for the most part will be by private automobile, and car pools may be worked out within each district.

The locating committee, with Elder A. J. Reisig as chairman, are preparing a list of available motels, hotels and private rooms in the Spokane area for both delegates and non-delegates. Each individual will be responsible for making his own reservation. A complete list of available space will be published in the GLEANER soon.

On March 16 (MV Day) a special offering is to be taken in all churches in the North Pacific Union during the 11 o'clock hour to assist the church or MV society in financing their delegates. This offering has been approved by the union committee, and we are asking all elders and pastors to please take note of this date, disregarding the printed offering schedule which you have received from your local conference which may list another offering for March 16.

Give liberally March 16 to send your delegate to the Youth Congress.

No. 4. Work for the Youth Not of Our Faith

The missionary endeavors of our Young People's society should not end with the youth of Seventh-day Adventist families. Your society may do, also, what other societies have done in conducting Sunday schools, or branch Sabbath schools, and through this medium interest boys and girls in our work, and later invite them to the society and other church services. Many of those interested by this method will take their stand for the truth, and may then be enrolled as active members of the society.

Also everyone can take part in the circulation of the excellent leaflets and periodicals, as well as books, that are made available by our publishing houses. Probably more persons are brought to a knowledge of God's truth in this way than any other.

Nothing, however, can take the place of Bible readings and cottage meetings conducted in the homes of interested persons. Many members of the society should qualify themselves for this type of personal work. Let us watch for and take advantage of every opportunity of reaching the youth of every community and lead as many of them as possible to enlist under the banner of Prince Emmanuel. Report of Board Actions at Annual Meeting

Special items considered at the annual meeting of the Walla Walla College Board of Trustees were the college budget for the 1957-58 school year amounting to over one and a half million dollars, and the approval of faculty personnel for the coming year. A number of campus improvements were authorized, one of which is the drilling of an additional well for the college. A special appropriation of \$2,500 was made for improvements at Rosario Beach, and authorization was given for an addition to the chemistry building.

Approvals for fourteen leaves of absence for faculty members to do graduate work during the summer quarter were given. Because of the enrichment of the academy curriculum, two additional academy faculty members were approved: one in the field of Social Studies, and the other in the field of English.

A leave of absence for the 1957-58 school year was granted to Cecil Ashley of the Engineering Department, to work on a master's degree at the University of Washington. Morris Taylor was also granted a leave of absence for the coming summer and the year 1957-58 to work on the doctor of musical arts degree at the School of Fine and Applied Arts, Boston University, Massachusetts.

A post-doctoral leave of absence was granted to Dr. Sterling K. Gernet for the summer quarter of 1957.

The following faculty members were granted promotion to the rank of associate professor: H. G. Coffin, Melvin W. Davis, and Evelynne Wright. Those promoted to the rank of assistant professor were Richard L. Litke, Robert E. Silver, and Calvin Trautwein.

A comprehensive statement of policy regarding the future of the Rogers School was approved. The purpose of this policy is to recognize that the primary objective of the Rogers School is to meet the observation, demonstration, and practice teaching needs of the students who are enrolled in education courses at the college. Plans have been laid which will enable the Rogers School to fulfill these primary functions.

Campus News

Elder D. E. Rebok, one of the general field secretaries of the General Conference, will visit the college campus February 24 to March 4. Elder Rebok is visiting all Seventh-day Adventist colleges in North America, making a survey of ministerial potential. While at Walla Walla College he will meet a number of speaking appointments and will also have personal interviews with ministerial students.

Recent visitors to the campus were Miss Ann Stratton, associate dean of the School of Nursing, and Mrs. Loretta Drake, associate registrar. They interviewed a bout fifty-five students who have made application to the hospital division of the Walla Walla College School of Nursing, and also met with the recommendations committee for pre-nursing students for both the June, 1957 and January, 1957, groups.

Elder W. O. Baldwin, educational secretary of the Oregon Conference, recently spent some hours interviewing students interested in teaching in the Oregon Conference.
