The work of nine out of the twelve World Divisions was started by literature evangelists. If we consider the work of the North American Division and two other Divisions somewhere along the way, the contribution of literature evangelists cannot be ignored. We may trace North America's work to the Advent movement, William Miller and Joseph Bates, but James White's small start with the publishing work in the beginning really helped in the establishment of the worldwide work. At one time the Publishing work and the General Conference were synonymous. Any country with more active literature evangelists is a place where our work in general is advancing prosperously.

On November 18, 1848 when Mrs. White had the vision on Publishing work she told her husband, "You must begin to print a little paper and send it out to the people. Let it be small at first; but as the people read, they will send you means with which to print, and it will be a success from the first. From the small beginning, it was shown to me to be like streams of light that went clear round the world." (Life Sketches, p. 125.) Since then almost 150 years have passed, and God's messenger's vision is fulfilling before our eyes everyday.

Now we are at the end of time, our Lord's coming is close, even at the door. Even with all the modern technology such as Radio, TV, satellite and Net Evangelism, in order to prepare a people to meet their God we still need literature evangelists to finish the work. It is just like modern warfare. The war may be ended within a short period of time with push button high technology, but foot soldiers are still needed to occupy the enemy's territory.

The Northern Asia-Pacific Division is planning for its first Publishing Advisory on the 20th - 22nd of April, 1998. The main purpose is to call the attention of Adventist leaders to how the published message will meet the urgent needs of the 1/4 of the world population who live in our territory.

With our limited resources, we are willing to try translating and publishing EGW's complete book series, 45 books in total, into NSD's three major languages. To bring unity to SDA churches, there is no other means better than giving the message directly from the pen of God's messenger.

The translation of the SDA Bible Commentary is another ambition of the NSD Publishing Department. SDA's have rich literature resources for nurturing and reaching out but the 25% of the world population in our division cannot be benefited without making greater efforts for translation.

It is a tremendous challenge to the NSD, but with God's help we can start the long process. It would be a great honor for anyone who is willing to contribute his or her resources to make these two projects a reality.

Your donation of love will last until eternity. Because of these two series of publications hundreds, even thousands will be ready to welcome the soon coming Lord.



Church in Korea

Growing Despite Economic Crisis

hough Korea's economic crisis is severely impacting the nation, the Seventh-day Adventist Church still anticipates growth, according to church officials.

"To date we have reports of 6,500 baptisms for 1997 which brings the Adventist membership in Korea to 145,000 or one in 310 of the total population, worshipping in 670 churches," said B.S. Um, executive secretary of the Adventist Church in Korea.

K.D. Kim, treasurer for the church, reported that tithe income for 1997 (funds given to support the church's ministry) had increased by 18 percent over 1996.

This has occurred despite the dramatic fall in the foreign exchange value of the Korean Won which has meant significant price increases on imported goods, as well as lay-offs and pay cuts by both private and state employers.

The economic situation, however, is affecting the Church's employees. No salary increases are planned for 1998, and no new hirings of office staff. Pastoral staff numbers will only be slightly increased in spite of the growth in membership. Foreign workers who receive their wages in local currency will be particularly

hard hit, since their salaries have dropped by almost half in relation to major world currencies.

However Adventist Church leaders in Korea remain positive, and have a "good and courageous spirit" for the future. This attitude is clearly demonstrated by S.W. Han, president of the Adventist Church in Korea, who declared his strong desire to establish a medical school at the Adventistowned Korean Sahmyook University during the East Central Korean Conference Session on January 8, 1998.

Youth Ministry

The primary focus of youth ministry is the salvation of our youth. It is, therefore, the purpose of the Youth Department to facilitate and support the ministry of the church in winning, nurturing, holding, and reclaiming its youth by -

- Providing youth with a Bible-based foundation that will enable them to develop a life long relationship and commitment to the Lord;
- Leading youth to understand their individual worth in Christ and to discover and develop their spiritual gifts and abilities;
- Equipping and empowering youth for a life of service within God's church and the community;
- Ensuring the integration of youth into all aspects of church life and leadership in order that they might be full participants in the mission of the church.

In order to approach these challenges in a viable and logical manner, four major youth ministry *emphases* have been chosen for this quinquennium.

1996: SPIRITUALITY - Developing and maintaining a living and meaningful relationship with God.

1997 : LEADERSHIP - Involving and leading out in the life and work of the church.

1998: MISSION - Participating in the finishing of God's work on earth.

1999: STEWARDSHIP - Committing totally to God in the use of time, talents, energy, influence, and finance.

It is important to note that each of these emphases will build on the one that precedes it so that at the end they will become a total approach, leading and preparing the youth to be the Lord's effective witnesses for the 21st century, if time shall last.

Thus, it is clear that the Youth Department will emphasize YOUTH in MISSION in 1998. It is our expectation that the Adventist youth, with spiritual fortitude and leadership skills acquired from the nurturing and training during the previous two years, convicted by His message and convinced of their responsibilities, will consider it a matter of great urgency to proclaim the everlasting gospel. These youth, being an integral part of the remnant church, will be challenged to be part of the mission of God's church. It is therefore the intent of youth ministry in 1998 to help youth find joy and satisfaction in such service and see it as both a privilege and a responsibility. All the youth ministry-related events that have been planned for this year will aim to fulfil the goal of making mission the lifestyle of every young man and young woman in the Adventist Youth movement.

Do you know? No.1

This year, 1998, is the 110th Anniversary of the beginning of the NSD mission, because Abram La Rue, the first Seventh-day Adventist missionary in Asia, came to Hong Kong in 1888. On his way to Hong Kong he stopped in Japan. It is good for us to make some plans for reminding ourselves about the beginning of the work in this Division.

Do you know? No. 2

This year, 1998, is the 50th Anniversary of the Universal Declaration of human rights. This special anniversary began on December 10, 1997 and will culminate on December 10, 1998. Article 18 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights by the United Nations is as follows:

"Everyone has the right to freedom of thought, conscience and religion; this right includes freedom so to change his religion or belief, and freedom, either alone or in community with others and in public or private, to manifest his religion or belief in teaching, practice, worship and observance."

ADRA Japan Feeds Mongolian Street Children

The temperature of Ulaanbaatar, the capital of Mongolia, in the mid-winter is very cold. It is minus 30 centigrade even in the day time, and it becomes minus 40 centigrade at night. In such severely cold weather two representatives from ADRA (Adventist Development and Relief Agency) Japan arrived in Mongolia on January 23, 1998 to feed 500 street children in Ulaanbaatar. Stephano, Tsukamoto, Director of ADRA Japan, planned to stay for one week and a young Japanese volunteer, Watanabe, planned to stay nearly three months for monitoring the distribution of food and winter clothes.

It is estimated that there are around 4,000 street children in Mongolia since the political changes in the country which occurred in 1991. The ages range from two to sixteen and they are living by begging, doing small jobs, and stealing. During the winter season they survive in manholes under the ground. According to Tsukamoto, as he went to see the street children in the Ulaanbaatar station, about 60 children were in the area. Since the station was closed in the evening, they went into manholes. Then Tsukamoto himself followed them and entered into a manhole where they stayed. It was an awful place of smelling badly with high humidity even though the temperature was only plus 10 centigrade. Having no opportunity to have education or health checks, many of them have health problems including venereal diseases. ADRA Japan was asked to help these children by the National Center for Children in Mongolia.

With the cooperation of ADRA Mongolia ADRA Japan has made a detailed plan for this project. They are going to distribute 180,000 meals and used or new winter clothes and blankets for street children. While ADRA Japan was responsible for food (US \$ 50,000), ADRA Canada and US were responsible for clothes and blankets. When Tsukamoto met Mr. Kapofe, the Ambassador of Japan to Mongolia, at the Japan Embassy in Claanbaatar, he was asked by the Ambassador to plan for a Japan Embassy might cooperate with some projects more strongly in the future.

ADRA is a service organization of the Seventh-day Adventist church. There is just one Seventh-day Adventist Church in Mongolia that was organized at Ulaanbaatar with 26 charter members on October 11, 1997. According to Tsukamoto, however, there were already about 45 people who came to worship on January 31, 1998 and most of them were young people.
