"There was a man named Jai Ryong Lee in the Philippines, Korean who worked with full of faith and passion of mission as Dean of Theology Department in AIIAS. While praying with anxiety for Jesus' Advent, the Holy Spirit touched his heart. He heard some crying sounds from Asia. He began planning day and night to send missionaries to unreached lands. Then the Lord called him to speak out his Missionary-sending Movement at the Far-Eastern Division. The Holy Spirit touched all the participants to vote to agree on his plan. Finally, 1000 Missionary Movement was launched through this resolution. The fire of the Holy Spirit had come upon thousands of young people in Asia. They were sent to preach the Kingdom of God to nonbelievers. The Church

had become more and more powerful in glorifying God's name. Ten years later, pastors and missionaries gathered to worship the Lord with thanksgiving for His guidance. More than 2,700 missionaries from 44 different countries have dedicated their lives to the Lord for one year as 1000 Missionary. They have baptized about 27,000 members and built hundreds of churches bringing new congregations every




Paticipants in the 10th Aniversary Ceremony of 1000 MM at the Gym of 1000 MM Headquarters

Tokyo Adventist Hospital

A model hospital for ISO 9001 Certificate

he Welfare and Labor Ministry Department of Japan recently chose only two hospitals in the whole country as the model hospitals for the International Organization for Standardization (ISO) 9001 Certificate. One of them is Tokyo Adventist Hospital and another one is Mito General Hospital operated by the HITACHI company. It is very rare in Japan for the 188-bed-hospital like Tokyo Adventist Hospital to be chosen as a model hospital for ISO 9001 Certificate. Teruo Koromogawa, manager of the hospital, says, "Our hospital was chosen because of excellent quality work for a long time."

The International Organization for Standardization (ISO) was established as a non-governmental organization (NGO) in 1947. ISO 9001 is a model for quality assurance in design, development, production, installation, and servicing. It is a documented system outlining twenty specific elements of quality. It is active in nearly 130 countries, which creates, administers, and monitors worldwide quality standards in technical industry and commerce.

The ongoing demand of customer satisfaction within the global marketplace indicates a profound shift in the future of quality management. It is clear that quality is becoming the international business language for worldwide trade networks and it's concepts and management are fundamentally being changed.

This certification process involves a demanding schedule and extensive documentation redevelopment at the Tokyo Adventist Hospital before the coveted ISO mark of approval is awarded. The hospital has to improve its quality service for patients much more for the coming two years under the guidance of the Welfare and Labor Ministry Department.

Kazuhiko Hongo, M.D. and president of the hospital, comments, "It is of great advantage to us that our hospital was chosen as a model hospital to receive the ISO 9001 Certificate. We would like to continue to work for quality medical service from the viewpoint of standard care." In a sense, the ISO 9001 Certificate means that it is considered as a five-star-hospital.

Tokyo Adventist Hospital began its medical service in 1929 and it has had good reputation as well as two other Adventist hospitals in Kobe and Okinawa, Japan. The Adventist hospitals are operated by the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Japan whose church membership is near 15,000.

Higher Education Overload... Really?



or years, Chinese Union Mission has struggled with an apparent overload of colleges. The fact is that for such a small union we have two institutions of higher learning: Hong Kong Adventist College and Taiwan Adventist College. And now, seemingly, things are going from bad to worse because a new institution of higher

learning, Griggs University Asia, has been born in CHUM territory. But make no mistake. Exciting times are just ahead.

In order to serye 1.6 billion global Chinese with systematic theological training using the Chinese language medium, Griggs University signed an agreement with Chinese Union Mission to set up Griggs University Asia. By using modern technology such as Internet, VCD, DVD, etc., college degree courses can be offered to Chinese people around the world.

The project was voted at the Chinese Union Mission midyear meeting 2001. At present, we have 17 college professors producing different courses. GUA (Griggs University Asia) office is located in the Chinese Union Mission office. At present, there are four video technicians (two studios), one website master, one editorial specialist, one registrar, and one executive director, etc.



One exciting part of GUA is how the teachers at Hong Kong Adventist College (HKAC) and Taiwan Adventist College (TAC) are pitching in to create these courses. Of course it puts lots of pressure on them to create clear lesson plans and Power Point programs accompany every lesson. Nevertheless,

it is a win-win situation. The TAC and HKAC students get higher quality instruction and at the same time we are serving Chinese around the world.

Since Chinese Union Mission already has two colleges in its territory, GUA mainly serves those who wish to get theological training as they work for their living. Also, those individuals who wish to get a college degree but do not have a high school degree and are over 25 years old, may apply as a GUA student. In the other words, GUA is an open university.

For the needs of local church, GUA also provides systematic lay training certificates to strengthen local church ministry. We provide courses to help laypersons grow from "interest" level to "soul winner disciple" level in order to accomplish Jesus' great commission.

Despite being in the initial stages at present there are more then 150 students taking course. (Check out the GUA site at www.guasia.org)
