Korean Union Conference New Officers Elected

The former president, Pastor Kei Hoon Shin, who has been fighting pancreatic cancer since last March tendered his resignation and sent word from the US where he is receiving treatment, that his condition is improving slowly.

Pastor Jung Kwon Chun has been working on behalf of Pastor Kei Hoon Shin for the last 6 months during Pastor Shin's treatment. He will complete Pastor Shin's term which finishes in Dec. 2004.

Pastor Chun, said in his acceptance speech that he was very sorry for Pastor Shin and for all the Korean members who have been praying for Pastor Shin's return and quick recovery. The Korean Adventist members love Pastor Shin very much and know how 2 much he wanted to finish his term.

Pastor Jung Kwon Chun committed himself to do his best for the remaining part of this term as a servant. Dr. Jairyong Lee, who chaired the committee said that leading and pressing this church forward is our mission. He encouraged church leaders to cooperate and address the present KUC challenges so that many souls will be won and have a good harvest. All the executive committee members stood and clapped to welcome the new KUC leader.

Pastor Kim, Kwang Doo was elected Secretary of KUC on Sept 25, 2003 by the Korean Union Conference Executive Committee in KUC Auditorium. His term will extend until December of 2004. He had been working in the Northern Asia-Pacific Division since 2000 as associate treasurer. Pastor Kim said, "It is very hard to accept this decision, but because the leaders of the church decided, I will follow their decision. I feel a very heavy burden on my shoulders. I really want to ask for prayer from the church members."

Family Ministry Education Started in NSD

fter God created the world, sin entered and His original plan for the happiness and beautiful nature of our very first family system became tarnished and distorted. As time went by, the constant influence of sin continued to inflict damage until today's family system is dangerously on the verge of becoming extinct.

Furthermore, all the leaders, counselors, and aides have worked tirelessly in order to positively and effectively bring together and unify this program. After researching and preparing for this endeavor for the past year, the International Family Ministry Counseling Association was finally unveiled and the inaugural ceremony was held on August 13 at 4:00 pm.

I wish to thank Dr. Ki-Don Lee, first president of Sahmyook University, Pastor Shin Sup Kim, vice-president and chairman of the Christian Counseling Department of Sahmyook University, and Dr. Young Ja Lee, director of Morning Glory Gardens for their efforts and assistance. And I wish to extend special gratitude to Dr. Ron Flowers for his welcome message and presentations to this new establishment, along with Dr. Daegeuk Nam, president of Sahmyook University, and Pastor Dong-Hee Shin, director of the NSD Youth Department.

Evangelism Conducted *in Shinchang*

Pastor Kwon JohngHaeng conducted an evangelistic series in Shinchang from September 19-27. This rural church was the first one established in the area of the Middlewest Korean Conference and this year is its 90th anniversary. 50-60 church members attend this church regularly and faithfully attended the meetings along with 30-40 new interests, as well as members from neighboring churches. One deaconess who is a



factory worker and whose son was a former 1000 Missionary Movement missionary and now is a pastor invited five Indonesians, one Pakistani and one Sri Lankan to the meetings. Although they are not fluent in the Korean language, they attended faithfully comparing the texts in English, Korean and their own languages.

One Christian attendee suffered through great persecution in his home country. Over 1000 churches were destroyed during that time. Financial crisis plagued his home country so eventually he was able to come to Korea to work.

Chunnan Shin Bu Dong Language School Director, Kim, Dong Soo was invited to come to meet these new foreigners and organize a group. He brought Doug Arne, an American English teacher with him and they are attempting to arrange regular English worship services with them.

These sowing meetings were just the beginning. Those who attended have been invited to the Satellite meetings in November 7-15 which will be conducted by Doug Batchelor.

Signs Celebrates

1000th Issue

n September 6 a celebration of the 1000th issue of the Signs Magazine was held. The Signs has the longest history nationwide as a monthly magazine. Although its first issue appeared in 1910 during Japanese occupation, the difficulties were overcome and it delivered the message of God's grace and warning to Korean people who were suffering during that time. It was a magazine that encouraged keeping a healthy body and mind. 1941 it was forced to stop publication temporarily and 1944 the magazine ceased then again in publication. At the time, the title of the magazine was The Three Angel's Message. Finally, after the liberation of Korea, it was restored and began publishing again to console and heal the people who were hurt and in pain.

Among the honored guests were Hong, Sa Rib, Dongdaemun District office head and Congresswoman Kim, Hee Sun. Congresswoman Kim shared in her testimony that when she was in



prison in 1987 protesting for a democratic society, she noticed the beautiful green foliage on the cover of the magazine and said it gave all the prisoners hope.

Dr. Lee, Jairyong commented during the ceremony, "I would like to thank God and all the workers of the Korean Publishing house and the literature evangelists who have continued working up to now for the part they played in helping the Signs Magazine to survive even though all secular magazines disappeared. I hope that the Signs Magazine will continue to deliver the message of certainty, courage and hope to the people in this very chaotic world."

1000MM Consultation

Meeting held

n September 16, 2003, the NSD held a daylong 1000MM Consultation Meeting, with 35 members in attendance.

The purpose of the meeting was to evaluate the history of the 1000MM for the last 10 years from 1993 to 2003. The 1000MM celebrated its 10th anniversary and set new strategic plans for the next 10 years.

Attendees included the Youth & Children's department directors from 5 conferences, representatives from the educational institutions, 1 pastor and lay person from each conference who have personal experience with the 1000MM, missionary-sending experience or who have 1000MM missionaries in their own churches...

Then, the final day the group visited elderly church members who cannot come to church regularly. It was the first experience for almost all the youth to visit in an elderly person's home and they received a wonderful blessing from God.

Therefore, various activities are offered to help the society. The youth experience the joy which participating in God's work gives as it is shared and it moves forward.

Mongolia Mission Field Second Batch 1000 MM Missionaries Trained

n April 2002 we graduated our **1st batch** of 1000MM in Mongolia. Twenty-one candidates received diplomas. These missionaries were sent to 11 different locations. Some were to start work in brand new areas and some to give leadership to small worship 5

groups that had already been started. One of the graduates never accepted a mission field assignment, two of the graduates were dismissed for cause within a few months of graduation, and one resigned after a year of work. During the past year there have been 155 baptisms in areas where 1000MM missionaries are working. We pray the Lord will continue to pour out his Holy Spirit upon them and their ministry.

In August 2003 MMF graduated the **2nd batch** of 1000MM-Mongolia branch with 15 graduates. Eight of the graduates have been assigned to new fields where there is no SDA presence. One of the graduates could not be assigned a territory because of health reasons. The other six were given leadership of small worship groups that had already been started.

The 2003 training for the 1000MM consisted of five one-week classes on the following topics:

<u>Spiritual Disciplines</u> was taught by Elder John Denne from Australia. He taught the missionaries how to maintain spiritual growth in their life.

<u>Bible Doctrines</u> was taught by Elder Kwon JohngHaeng from NSD. He taught how to understand and share Bible Doctrines with others.

<u>Preaching</u> was taught by Elder Dale Tunnell from MMF. He taught how to prepare and present sermons to a public audience. Each missionary had to preach eight sermons during the course of the training.

Health Ministries was taught by Michael and Miriam Welch from Sahmyook University. They taught about the need for medical missionaries, how to do massage and hydro-therapy. This class was a most useful training for meeting people in the community.

<u>Small Groups and Health II</u> was taught by John and Denise McGhee from NSD. Their approach strengthened and enabled the missionaries to apply what was taught the previous week.

Youth Alive, formerly known as Adventist Youth to Youth, has been upgraded recently by a team of leaders from the General Conference Health Ministries, Youth Ministries, Family Life and Education departments. The purpose of Youth Alive is to help teenagers experience positive relationships with peers who have chosen to enjoy life without being addicted to alcohol, drugs, tobacco, or sex.

Chinese Union Mission Sir Run Run Shaw Hospital

any of you are aware that Loma Linda University has been involved in a cooperative venture with the Sir Run Run Shaw Hospital in Hangzhou. This is their ninth year of involvement. Much of the hospital's original funding came from Hong Kong movie mogul Sir Run Run Shaw, whose original donation was conditional upon whether Seventh-day Adventists ran the hospital.

Elder James Wu was asked by the Northern Asia-Pacific Division President Elder Jairyong Lee to represent him at their recent board meeting on Sept. 26. Elder Wu has many years of experience in hospital administration so it was with keen interest that we listened to his report this morning.

The hospital is embarking on aggressive human resource training and LLU is very much involved. The hospital will be pursing the American JCI hospital certification next year.

According to Elder Wu, three years ago there were already signs of wear and tear. Maintenance was lacking and some areas showed peeling paint. In addition to the modern new 12 story patient tower that opened in 2002, there has been extensive remodeling of the original hospital tower. It is arguably one of the top hospitals in China. At more than 700 beds, its occupancy rate is higher than 95%. Most of their 15 surgical theaters are booked daily from morning till late at night, leaving one open for emergencies.
