## An Inspirational Council

The leaders of the remnant church have just closed one of the most inspirational councils in the history of this denomination. Elder Branson, who has spent about fourteen months in the foreign fields, brought an inspiring report, part of which I shall quote:

"I saw the largest congregation of Seventh-day Adventists ever assembled anywhere in the world, in Ruanda, where 18,000 gathered under the blue canopy of heaven to hear the gospel. I stood on a knoll while they sat down upon acres and acres of ground and never spoke a word as I pointed them to Jesus Christ as their Savior and Redeemer. I watched them as they came within a radius of sixty miles in all directions. Not an automobile was used, but they came on foot, and we could hear them singing gospel songs as they drew nearer. Four hundred heathen came to join in the services with our believers, and when I called for the unconverted to come for prayer, four hundred responded, led by the paramount chief of all that country, who for years had been a bitter foe of missionaries and Christianity. I found thousands more in Uganda, the Central Congo and other parts of South Africa, once held in the clutches of superstitious heathenism, rejoicing in their belief in Christianity."

The Lord surely is opening the way for His people to bring the last warning message to those in darkness. As followers of the Lord and Master, let us do our part in bringing our offerings to carry on God's work.

### China Mission Destroyed

Hardly a day passes but we receive thrilling word of Harvest Ingathering success. This week it is reported that Anoka, Waukon, Palisade and Glenwood have made their super goal, which is a gain of 10% or more over last year. So many of our churches this year have swept on past their goal to their super goal, that our motto has become "The Super Goal in Every Church."

Our people are spurred on to greater activity by the word from Elder McElhany of the situation in China. He said at the Fall Council, "Incendiary bombs (those that set fires) were dropped during an air raid, in a group of ten buildings of the Hongkew mission station, and the fire destroyed these together with adjoining buildings belonging to our mission. All the personal belongings of our workers are gone. This is a serious situation for

### The Printed Page Among the Indians

"He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing: bringing his sheaves with him." Ps. 126:6.

Eternity alone will reveal the good that is accomplished by the papers which have been sent to our Indian mission for distribution. One dear old Indian woman especially appreciates the Review and Herald. She passes it on to relatives who live about fifteen miles distant, but never until she has completely devoured it first, and some issues she prizes too highly to

part with them. When the relatives receive it, they say they cannot stop reading until they have read it all through, and they then explain the contents to their children.

Recently a niece of this woman moved to LaPlant, and she brought her over to visit us. Later she told us we should give her niece some of those papers, as she was eager to borrow hers before she was through with them. We immediately took her a good supply. When we called on her and the husband a few days later and gave a Bible study on Daniel, we met a hearty response. She and the children had been attending Sabbath school since moving here, and the morning after our visit, the children brought to us this note:

"Dear Mrs. Smith: — You don't know how sorry I am and how disappointed the children are that we have to go to the agency on business this morning instead of attending Sabbath school. I hope you can come more often evenings and visit us. It did my husband good because I can't get him to go to church. He is older than I am and he thinks I should't tell him what is right. But your visit impressed him very much. Thanks very much for the visit. Sincerely, Alyce D."

We requested that they leave the children with us so they could attend Sabbath school, and the little boy stayed. He listened very attentively, though he is only eight years old, and when we called on them last evening, she said he came home and told them all about the Sabbath school and sermon. Then she said that when she finishes reading the papers, she takes them to her sister and mother living twenty-two miles away. They read them and pass them on to other relatives living twenty-five miles in another direction, who, in turn, pass them on again. She also said her mother had requested that we visit her. This we plan to do tomorrow; and so the work grows. We have interested people for many miles in different directions who are waiting for us to visit them. After they learn the truth, their universal question is, "Why didn't our first missionaries tell us these things?"

Brethren and sisters, please pray earnestly that they may have the courage to leave the churches and the traditions of men for God's remnant church and the last warning message.

Our special request at this time is for used Junior Sabbath School

quarterlies for the third quarter of 1937. These we have found especially adapted for work among the Indian people, and we would like all we can get for future use.
