## President's Address

Beloved delegates and representatives of the Northern Union Conference assembled, Greeting:

The fleeting hours of time bring us to the second biennial session of the Northern Union Conference, thus marking four years since the organization. How soon these years have passed! Yet how great have been the events of human history. We have assembled not only as the representatives of this union conference, but as an organization representating a movement foretold by ancient seers, born in due time, and now well under way in its mission to the world of giving the glad tidings of the return of Christ to consumate the Christian's hope.

#### AREA

The area of the Northern Union Conference is 2,890,906 square miles. This territory contains a large foreign population of many languages, besides a majority of the Indians in North America.


