MUCH IN LITTLE

The following action of the General Conference Committee will explain what the heading of this aricle means:

"Whereas, During the depression of the last two years, our people have responded even to the point of sacrifice in providing funds to maintain strongly the work in the world field, making possible the continued proclamation of the message in many tongues, resulting in a rich harvest of souls, and,

"Whereas, During recent months there has been a marked shrinkage of income to the General Conference in this hour of need when unprecedented openings for the proclamation of the message are everywhere significantly mani-

fest, and,

"Whereas, A small added donation if given weekly, even so small an increase as five cents a week per member might carry us through the present financial crisis,

"Resolved, 1. (a) That we ask all our people everywhere to arise to the present need by giving weekly such increase of offering as they

are able.

"(b) That in North America we ask every one to give through the Sabbath school an additional offering of at least five cents, a nickel a week to help to bridge the present crisis.

"(c) That we ask the Sabbath School Department to promote strongly in every Sabbath school the idea of the added offering of a nickel a week, or more for missions.

"(d) That the financial needs of the General Conference be clearly set forth at each union session, and every delegate attending these sessions be asked to endorse and strongly promote the plan of an increase of five cents, or more, for missions, through the Sabbath school.

"(e) That we seek through our union papers to call to our people to give to bridge the present crisis five cents a week per member through the Sabbath school.

"2. Further resolved, That we earnestly request our people whom the Lord has blessed with means, to come forward at this time with large special offerings to help save our missions from retrenchment."

We believe this proposed measure of relief is practical and workable. If all our Sabbath school membership responds, it will mean a \$300,000 increase in our mission treasury, and fully reimburse the deficit of 1931. Therefore, we appeal to all our membership to make this proposed plan an actuality in your contribution. You will note it is not a change in Sabbath school goal from thirty cents per week to thirty-five cents per week, but it is an appeal for us to give each Sabbath five cents more in our offering than we have been putting in. I feel confident that a unanimous "amen" will be heard from all our Sabbath schools, and a corresponding effort upon the part of all to "add a nickel" to our regular offering.

I well remember when we rode on the street cars for a five cent fare. Now it costs a nickel more, and we pay it without a murmur or complaint. This is in principle what this plan means. The added amount for each is the "little" which in aggregate makes the

"much."

I am impressed with the idea of dedicating a pocket to this fund, and when I am thirsty, instead of a glass of lemonade, I put two nickels into this dedicated pocket, and quench my thirst with water. When I want to chew some gum, just say "no" to myself, and put another nickel into the pocket. When I see a person buy a package of cigarettes, just thank God for the truth that makes me free, and contribute three nickels to the mission pocket; and thus we would find ourselves abundantly able from our present income to add an increased offering of at least five cents per week to our offerings

and thus add \$300,000 to the mission treasury.

Therefore, we urge all our people to accept of this appeal and plan from the General Conference, and begin now to put it into practice. I feel sure we will; hence, I say, "Thank you."

-0-BOWDON, NORTH DAKOTA

I had often heard of Bowdon and was glad to spend a few days with our church there. The thing that impressed me most was their efficient and orderly working of the Home Bible Study League.

A large club of "Signs of the Times" was lying on a table near the front of the church. At a specified time six ladies of the church came forward, took their places at the table and began wrapping these papers. (The wrappers were supplied by the conference, with the conference return on them.) As soon as this was finished, six young people came forward and addressed these papers that were wrapped. The young people's secretary had charge and gathered them up ready for mailing. I was told that the home missionary secretary would take charge the next week, as they divided the time with the young people.

At one of our services Elder B. A. Scherr exhibited a long list of cards which had been returned by interested people from the various churches. I then thought of what a great work could be done in the Northern Union if every church were carrying on a similar program. The following instructions are taken from Elder B. A. Scherr's 1932 Bulletin for home missionary offi-

"Judging from our experience in this field of systematic work for outsiders we have found that the best results from missionary endeavor come from churches that use the "Signs of the Times" regularly, sending them out every week to the same addresses and then following up with one letter which is sent after the last paper is mailed. To help our churches in making up their orders for the coming year the conference is making the fol-lowing offers. In ordering please order according to offer number.

"Instructions for Home Bible Study

League

"Home Bible Study League. We would like to have every home missionary officer start at once at the beginning of the year to get his members to send out 'Signs of the Times' or 'Present Truth' system-atically through the mails or from house to house. Here is the way to proceed with the work:

Through the Mails

"A. If your society has no literature begin at once to lay plans to order a club for regular systematic distribution. (Notice special club rates on pages 5 and 6.)

"B. Order wrappers for these papers with 'Home Bible Study League' printed on same. (Price,

\$1.75 a thousand.)

"C. Pick out your best writers and have them address the wrappers before wrapping the papers. (Typewrite them if possible. If not use pen and ink. Do not use lead pencil.)

"D. Home missionary secretary should put mucilage on the ends of the wrappers at home and let them dry. After addresses are written have the people all take a hand and wrap papers. They can easily wrap a few papers and paste them each week.

"E. Send papers out regularly every week if possible. The societhat have been doing their work regularly with pen and ink or typewriter have had the best re-

sult.

"F. Change your names every ten weeks and send letters. We have found it is better to send to less names and change oftener. Do not send papers to one address for months. Change often and be sure

to send letters.

"G. Do not write anything but name and address on wrapper. Do not paste anything on wrapper. Do not wrap any tracts in with papers. Do not write your own name on wrapper. Do not wrap in plain paper and write 'Home Bible Study League' in corner. Do not address any to parties outside of United States.

"H. Be sure to send letter and post card to every name at end of ten weeks. (Notice letter herewith attached with post card. Letters are better sealed with a two-cent stamp on, but you may send them open with a one and a half cent stamp.)

"I. Home missionary secretaries should not do all the work. It is a poor home missionary officer who cannot get the church to work. It is the object of systematic work to get everybody to work. A man who can get ten men to work is better than a man who does ten men's

Every church ought to take up this plan. Many have already accepted the Sabbath truth in the Northern Union as a result of the Home Bible Study League. to your conference missionary secretary and ask him to come to your church and help you get started. Increase your "Signs" club for 1932. V. G. Anderson.

A CALL FOR GREATER FAITH-FULNESS.

In this number of the Reaper will be found the statement of tithe and offerings for the churches in the North Dakota Conference for the year, 1931. This statement is being sent to the church officers and is published here for the benefit of our isolated people and the members of the churches who may

not see it otherwise.

We are very sorry to report a still further drop in tithe and offerings for 1931. In fact the tithe received in 1931 is the lowest for at least ten years. Even in 1921 when amount received was very small, it was more than for 1931 and it must be remembered that we have increased our membership considerably since 1921, so that our tithe should be much more now. The average tithe per member in 1930 was \$13.36, while for 1931 it is only \$10.55, an average of \$2.81 per member less than for 1930, or a decrease of 21 per cent. This is really a very serious matter, when it is remembered that it is the tithe which is the operating fund of the local conference, and without it the work cannot go forward. I am sure our people do not want the work of the Lord in North Dakota to stop nor to go backward It is necessary, therefore, to have funds in the treasury with which to carry on the work. If we as a people want to triumph in the end we must go forward with the work of

God, and not let ourselves fall back in trying times any more than in

prosperous times.

The Lord has promised that those who are faithful in a few things will be made rulers over many things. This is the way, then, to get greater responsibilities and greater prosperity. Demonstrate to the Lord that you are faithful in that which you now have, and He has promised that He will give you added responsibility and prosperity. This gives the person with a small income the same chance before God that the one with a large income has. It is not the size of the gift, and the ability to give, but whether the person is faithful or not, that counts with God. If we are faithful with what we have, we have the sacred promise of the Creator of heaven and earth that He will open the windows of heaven and pour out such a blessing that there will not be room enough to receive it. We all want the blessings, but sometimes are tempted to try to bring prosperity to ourselves by withholding some of the Lord's portion. This never fails to bring the opposite result. Instead of prosperity, such a course will bring adversity and poverty.

The principle question before us now is, "What are we going to do in 1932?" Are we going to continue to fall behind or are we going forward with the Lord's help? I am not unmindful in writing this that many of our people have been hard hit by the drouth, banks closing, and the general depression in the business world. It is not my idea to criticize those who are doing their best, nor to unduly press those who are faithfully giving the Lord His portion of their incomes. But I fear that there are those who do not realize their responsibility as they should, and who, for one reason or another, are holding back their tithe, while knowing in their hearts that they should not do so. To all those I appeal, will you not make a new resolve with the new year, that you will deal faithfully

with the Lord?

There are some who have lost large sums of money in closed banks, and some of those have said to me that they wished they had given this money to the Lord's work rather than have it wiped out and do nobody any good. But after the bank closes it is too late to think of such things. How sad that they did not act on that impulse and send in the money while the bank was open. If there are persons in any of our churches or among the isolated members who have money lying idle in the banks, how much better it would be to place it in the conference NOW, either as an out

right gift, or as an annuity, or at least to give the conference the use of it without interest, than to let it be wiped out by banks closing. If there are such, and they wish advice and counsel as to how to handle the matter, if they will write to me, I shall be glad to help them in any way to place their

funds where they will be safe from loss and at the same time help win souls for Christ.

Brethren, let us all be faithful, and let us work together in 1932 for the finishing of the Lord's work, so that He can come and take His faithful ones home with him.

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO CHURCH ELDERS AND OTHERS IN THE NORTH DAKOTA CONFERENCE

A few days ago the Executive Committee met and had to give careful study to the matter of financing the work in the conference. It was brought to the attention of committee that frequently emergency calls come in from the churches for a worker to come to conduct a funeral or wedding ceremony. Our people have been advised repeatedly not to call for a worker outside of their district because we must avoid unnecessary traveling expenses. As a conference and as workers we are glad to be of service on such occasions to such of our people who are supporters of the work, however, quite often people ask for a worker to come and serve them on such occasions but who are neither tithe payers and at times not even members. On account of the awful shortage of funds in the conference treasury the committee:

Voted that such who want the service of a conference worker for special occasions, such as named above but who are not tithe payers or not even members, must pay the traveling expense of the worker who is called upon to serve them on such special occasions.

SUNDAY LAW HEARING

Word has just come from Elder Longacre stating that there will be a Sunday law hearing before the Senate District Committee on Friday afternoon, January 22. On December 9, Senator Copeland of New

York introduced bill S 1202 which is a Sunday closing barber bill for the District of Columbia. The bill is similar to the one which was favorably reported by both the Senate and the House District Committees during the last session of Congress. We understand that the American Federation of labor is using its influence to railroad this bill through. A crisis exists and requires action. There is a strong probability that this bill will be passed. We trust that our church elders will push the matter of obtaining signatures to the petitions that are being sent them and that our people will join in doing everything possible to prevent this proposed legislation.

In spite of the general decrease during 1931 in both tithe and mission offerings, there were nineteen churches and companies which showed an increase over 1930; that is, there were nineteen which had an increased tithe for 1931 and also nineteen which contributed a larger amount of mission offerings than in 1930. In ten of these churches there was an increase in both tithe and offerings. This is an encouraging feature of the report and the increase effected by those churches was especially appreciated. Six churches and one company reached or passed the average goal of sixty-cents-a-week per member. They are indicated by the stars in the foregoing report, and the spe-

cial efforts put forth on their part to make that measure of success possible are also particularly appreciated.

Inasmuch as the comparison of the total receipts with those for 1930 was given in the Reaper last week it will hardly be necessary to repeat that information here. The total figures for the year reported above should agree with the church treasurers' records except in those cases where the remittance was late at either the beginning or the close of the year. I trust this report will be helpful and will encourage all to do their best for the Master and the salvation of others during 1932. It is possible also to give here the number of baptisms reported

for 1931 which was 185. This compares favorably with other recent years, as the report for 1930 was 168, that for 1929 was 147, and 136 for 1928. The Lord has manifestly blessed the efforts of both the ministry and laity as is indicated by the steady growth in the number of baptisms even though the number of laborers has decreased somewhat. I sincerely hope and pray that the report for 1932 will show still another good increase in the number of baptisms. Shall we not all work and pray earnestly to that end?

In his unselfish labor to save others, he is a living epistle, known and read of all men. His life shows that he has been converted to Christ and has become a co-laborer with him." Vol. 5, p. 386.
"He who becomes a child of God,

"He who becomes a child of God, should henceforth look upon himself as a link in the chain let down to save the world, one with Christ in His plan of mercy, going forth with Him to seek and save the lost." "Desire of Ages," p. 105. The spirit of God is given for service. The church was organized for missionary activity, and if it affords no plan which will give opportunity for the members to engage in soul-winning service, it has fallen short of its purpose. But there are several effective plans for the spreading of the message that are dependent upon the laity for support. Fore-most among these is the "Signs" method, and it presents one of the most economical methods of personal evangelism.

The "Signs" does win souls, and this was demonstrated again this last year in Iowa. Every church should try this method. Many of ur churches are now using the rns" and we hope they will rew their club of papers this year. Every church should have at least a club of five "Signs." If a club of fifteen or more is ordered, the rate of \$1 a year applies, or about two cents a copy per week. Thus you see that by ordering a club of at least fifteen, the price of a copy is reduced to the price of a tract. Surely you want to have a part in the "Signs" campaign this year, when you stop to consider the negligible investment in comparison with the effectiveness of this medium in winning souls. Because of a general shortage of funds, evangelistic efforts may be hindered for a time, but this should only increase the work and opportunities of the lay members with the "Signs." Do your part.

BAPTISM AT HAWARDEN

This title may be a little misleading, and, therefore, a word of explanation is in order. Since the writer assisted by Brother M. N. Skadsheim came to Hawarden a baptismal class has been developed as a result of the series of meetings conducted in the tent and city auditorium. This class, consisting entirely of new believers is now ready for baptism. Thorough study of the Bible and ample time has been given these new believers to prove their worth for citizenship in the heavenly country.

It has been hoped that the baptismal services could be held in Hawarden, but the enemy of souls working with all his might has made this impossible. A request to the Baptist people in Hawarden for the use of their baptistry was denied. Two meetings of the board of trustees were held before our request was refused. At these meetings the pastor resigned as did also the president of the board of

trustees. Now the Baptist church will be without a pastor as the members are divided and cannot support another minister. In these experiences we have learned that more than half the Baptist people are very favorable toward the truth and many of them are keeping the Sabbath and have requested rebaptism. We were told by the president of the board of trustees that only one man was opposed to our request for the use of the baptistry and that the other members of the board would not oppose him since he was the financial backbone of the church.

However, we believe all things work together for good to them that love the Lord. The Baptist people in Sioux City have granted us the use of their Central Baptist church for our baptismal services and on January 30 at 2:30 the Hawarden people will be granted the privilege to follow their Lord in baptism. Thus, in spite of the efforts of the enemy, the cause of God goes forward.

The new church at Hawarden has been completed, and following the baptism, church organization will be effected. A church of about thirty members will be organized with a good prospect of about fifteen or twenty more added later.

An invitation is extended to all within driving distance to attend the baptismal services in Sioux City. Services will be held as usual in the Seventh-day Adventist church in Sioux City beginning at 9:45 with the Sabbath school. In the afternoon the baptismal services will be held in the Central Baptist church located on tenth and Virginia. The time is 2:30 o'clock.
