### CANVASSERS, ATTENTION!

Several of the canvassers when they have a small report either fail to send it in, or dislike very much to do so. I think there is some pride in this which is not good. Of course we all want to see all the canvassers do well and we are praying for that, but if after they have done the best they can, (and this means putting in good time of course) they have a small report, there is nothing to be sorry for or ashamed of.

There are different reasons for small reports. Sometimes it is in the territory; that is on some whole roads the people are wholly indifferent to Bible subjects, and we cannot get them interested enough to invest in the truth. They may be fairly good people too, as the world goes. Some others care nothing for books, cannot appreciate any book. We can't tell anything about this till after we have been over the road and with patient effort done the best we could. "Here is the patience of the saints."

It will do some of the canvassers good to figure up the averages occasionally in the Indicator reports. For instance in one week's reports one of the most successful and faithful canvassers only averaged one order to every three hours and 1 order to  $6\frac{3}{4}$  exhibitions, and yet there was by 5 days work a fair report. Another had 1 order to  $4\frac{3}{4}$  hours, and  $8\frac{3}{4}$  exhibitions.
