Two have taken a decided stand for the truth, one a lady living near the ground, and the other a merchant, both of them being among the oldest inhabitants of the town

The expenses of the meeting were more than met, and all have returned to their homes rejoicing in God, and thanking him for the benefits of the Potsdam camp-meeting.

Have had some sales but not extensive. We find people friendly and they seem willing to hear, and we expect some fruit. Some nights are so cool that we have set up a stove in our tent which makes it very comfortable. I am still alone and have no help except that Mrs. Thurston acts as tent master when I am speaking.

I find my hands more than full during the day filling invitations to call on my hearers. is good to us for which we are thankful. One week ago I spoke upon the subject of "The Devil' which was advertised by handbills; it worked so well that we tried the same thing this week with good results. Last Sunday our donations were \$7.12, and although we are presenting the subject of the Sabbath now, we received \$8.70 to-day, making \$39.40 cash donations in just seventeen days. To-day I spoke by special request at a M. E. camp-meeting held near this place to some interested listen-Our work in this place is the first of the kind in the county: God has given an increase in other new counties and we expect to find some faithful oncs here.

As soon as possible I shall return to Middletown and Slate Hill and hold a few services there.
