GRANOLA GRIDDLE CAKES.

By request I write the following recipe, from which may be prepared a very palatable breakfast dish:—

Use one and one half cups of sweet milk, one egg beaten light, salt to taste, one half teacup of flour, one half teaspoonful of soda, and one of cream of tartar. Add sufficient granola to make a thin batter, which becomes thicker as the granola softens. If the batter becomes too thick, add milk; bake on slightly greased griddle. These cakes bake more quickly, brown more readily, and are more healthful than others, as the granola has previously been thoroughly cooked.
