TO THE BRETHREN AND SISTERS OF THE SYRACUSE CHURCH.

DEAR Brethren and Sisters of the Syracuse Church who are scattered abroad, greeting.

For several days I have felt like writing you each a letter concerning matters here in the city, but as my time is too limited for this I will write through the Indicator.

I have now been working for the church here since Jan. 4. During this time I have spoken twenty-five times. We have held about twenty prayer meetings, besides other meetings, in the interests of the work here.

Each week I have been able to see more and more the importance of the work here in the city, and the needs of the church both spiritually and financially. And in proportion as I have seen, my heart has reached out to all the members, not only here, but those separated from the blessed privileges we have been sharing together. We have not forgotten to pray for these scattered ones, and we have felt that you were praying for us here. As the result the Lord has been coming near to some hearts and we have had some precious seasons together. While our rooms have been almost crowded each Sabbath, yet I have thought of several faces, dear to me and to us all, who have not been present. We could have made room to give you a hearty welcome. I have remained here much longer than I expected, but circumstances seem to permit me to remain here another week, for which I am truly thankful. May we not see a general gathering of all who have not been attending, at our meeting next Sabbath, and if possible on Sunday also, meetings will probably close at that time, and I have some matters to present before the church that I wish all to hear. Matters that pertain to the future welfare of the church and the work in this city. If it is not consistent for you to come will you not send a letter of encouragement to the church.

When we began meetings the rooms were in a sad condition. The brethren and sisters have been struggling with hard times, and with interest money and taxes on the property here; and at the same time trying to add to their accumulative fund toward a new church building, and so the present rooms have been neglected until they wore a very dingy appearance. It seemed to me that the Lord's house was being allowed to "lie desolate." I did not feel like urging or even asking the church to do more than they were doing, as the interest on the mortgage due Jan. 1, amounting to about \$17.

00 had just been raised, and another payment of \$32.00 to be made Feb. 15; but I felt that the work ought certainly to be done, and I decided to do it myself.

We were greatly favored in buying paper, paint, matting, carpet, and several took hold gladly and helped put it on. We papered and painted both rooms, bronzed the old chandeliers, put down seven yards of matting on the large room, two and one-half yards of oil-cloth, fourteen and one-half yards of good carpet on the back parlor, bought one new bracket lamp, and seven reflectors, and it has made such a change in the rooms that one would hardly know them; and the whole bill amounts to only \$15.51. We had quite a pleasant time of rejoicing, and then the money began to come in freely. Sister Higgins, \$3.00; sister North, \$2.50; sister Howeth, \$2.00; sister Ghee, \$1.00; sister Ross, of Rosevelt, \$1.00; brother F. E. Hitchcock, \$2.00; sister Markham, .50; sister Morgan, .50; sister Blake, .25. Brother Burdick offered to pay the balance but I felt that I wanted some part in the giving and the blessing. And surely "The Lord has blessed his people," and a good spirit seems to be manifested, and I look for a brighter future for this church.

But to show you how the Lord has further helped, we would say that right at this time we were brought face to face with the fact that \$32.00 interest is due Feb. 15. We appointed an evening when we would take a collection for that, and the collection amounted to nearly \$16.00. Yesterday (Sunday) afternoon another collection was taken, amounting to \$4.41. Sister Booth of Brooklyn, who is still a member of this church, has sent \$2.00 toward the interest in February. This makes between \$40.00 and \$50.00 that has been raised here since the meetings began. I have felt that if others knew of the circumstances they would be glad to do, at least, a little. Whoever reads this, if you have not given some already, will it not be consistent for you, and a blessing to you, to send us some on the interest and some for the accumulative fund toward a new church building.

I firmly believe that if earnest, prayerful, efforts, and sacrificing devotion can be put forth by this church that ere long a good harvest of

souls for the kingdom might be reaped from this city. Would it not be pleasing to the Lord for you to lay aside a few cents each week as sacred to the work of God in Syracuse? If you are not able to send any money, now please write us a letter that we may know that your eyes are often turned in prayer toward this place.

One party here has promised \$500.00 cash as soon as we are ready to build. One brother pledges \$25.00 for the first brick or stone that is laid. Another brother pledges \$25.00 for the second brick or stone that is laid. Many others, some I believe not of this church, will respond as soon as they are made aware of the circumstances as they exist here:

All money, either for interest or the church fund, should be sent to C. V. Gilbert, 127 Renwick Ave., Syracuse, N. Y.

The church building fund is on interest in the Onondaga Co. Savings Bank. In closing this I would once more express my desire, which is the desire of all here, that we may hear from each member of the Syracuse church far and near in some way on this matter, and we pray that the God of all grace may bless you all abundantly.
