## NATURAL BRIDGE.

WE closed our meetings in the tent at this place on Sunday afternoon. Our attendance has continued about the same since our last report, and the interest has deepened on the part of some. We are making arrangements to hold a series of meetings in what is known as the Aldrich settlement, where some have been keeping the Sabbath as the results of the labors of one of our canvassers. Others are interested, and they need help on other points. While here we shall continue to hold two or three meetings each week at Natural Bridge, and so follow up the work there. Pray that the Lord may add his blessing to the work here.

### NICHOLVILLE.

 $W_E$  have now, at the date of this writing, closed our labors at this place. And I am sure that in all my labors I have never found a field, in some respects, as peculiar as this. From the very first we have had difficulties to meet that have been perplexing, and prejudices that have been hard to break down.

The churches here have very carefully observed how the work progressed at Dickinson Center, and are acquainted with the results. The ministers said when we came here that they should profit by the experience of the other churches there. So instead of openly opposing us as the churches did at Dickinson Center, they have diligently labored among their members to keep them away from the tent, at the same time inspiring hate and prejudice towards the truth.

But for all of this, conviction is fastened upon the people that we have the truth, and they cannot shake it off. Several evenings as we have appealed to them to obey, they have been in tears; but most of them seem not to have the courage to obey. Only three from the town have signed the covenant; but others have given us encouragement that they would to-day.

But three miles from the village a little company has been brought out by the joint labors of Elder H. H. Wilcox and ourselves. Elder Wilcox had previously labored in that vicinity some, and about three weeks ago came here, and we went and looked the field over together, and we have labored as best we could in both places. Elder Wilcox expects to labor with them still, as long as he deems it best. Eight have signed the covenant at Independent Hill, three miles from here, and three here, making eleven in all. Yet we hope others will yield. We go from here to Moira, a town ten miles distant. We most earnestly pray that God's rich blessings may rest upon the efforts of the various workers this year, especially in this great State. Since our last report our donations have been \$6.40. Our book sales here have been light. Brother S. E. Hyatt is doing good here canvassing. Our post-office address will be Moira, Franklin Co., N. Y. Our cour-
