I LEFT Boulder. Colo., June 9, and reached this place August 8. On the way I made some ten or twelve stops for the purpose of holding meetings, visiting friends, and business. I made a side trip of sixty miles and return by team, and spent the Sabbath with a family who had long been Adventists, but who had become somewhat discouraged. They had not seen a Sabbath-keeper for years, and the visit was an enjoyable and profitable one. I have held during the time, to the present writing, about forty meetings, about the same number of personal

and family Bible readings, besides earning with my hands a little over fifty dollars. Some of the meetings, Bible studies, and personal interviews, have been with those wholly unacquainted with our views, some with those who had recently embraced them, and more with old friends who have long been believers in the special truths we hold. But with all it has brought rich blessings to my own soul, and I trust, through the influence of the Holy Spirit, encouragement to others to present the character of God as manifested in His "Word," (Christ, and Him crucified) in His "works," (all nature) and in His personal dealings, which, though sometimes affliction, are, however, never anything else but a manies tation to us, if we will understand it rightly, that He is "very pitiful, and of tender mercy." When one really sees and knows God this way, all truths adjust themselves harmoniously in His system of personal belief; and when presented to others for the one and only object of exhibiting His infinite love toward us personally, they lose, in the minds of all who desire to see God as he is, the objectionable features with which Satan has so maliciously clothed them.
