NEW YORK SABBATH-SCHOOL ASSOCIATION.

THE first meeting of the eighteenth annual session of the New York Sabbath-school Association was held at Auburn, N. Y., Sept. 6, 1895, at 10.00 A. M., the President Elder A. E. Place presiding. This meeting was called simply to organize, and appoint the usual committees. Two other meetings of the Association were held. The minutes of the last session were read and accepted. The President made a few brief remarks concerning the Sabbathschool work in the State the past year.

The work in this branch of the cause has prospered. Fifteen schools have been added to the Association increasing the membership three hundred and eighteen. The present membership is ten hundred and sixty. The donations to missions, we are sorry to say, are not quite as large as they were last year. The hard times that have swept over the country have been felt in this line of the work, as well as in others. May the Lord help us to put into practise the lessons which we are now learning that our Sabbath-school offerings may be increased, that we may be able to more substantially help carry the message to foreign fields. The work is rapidly growing, and it needs every support we are able to give.

The following resolutions were fully and quite freely discussed, and unanimously adopted.

Whereas, The blessing of God has attended the Sabbath-school work in this Association, and much good has been done in the past year; therefore,—

1. Resolved, That we as an Association unitedly express our sincere thanks to God for the blessing that has attended this cause in the past year, and bespeak a still greater measure of His care for the future.

Whereas, This branch of work was instituted in the providence of God, and has been the means of diffusing much light to us as a people; and,

Whereas, Evidences show that increased interest is being manifested in this line of work, and in order to meet the demands and thus raise the Sabbath-school work to a higher basis ; therefore,— 2. Resolved, That it shall be the duty of the President and Vice-President to spend a portion of their time in visiting and corresponding with the schools in the interest of this work.

3. We recommend, That our ministers take a more live interest in the Sabbath-school work in instructing our schools as to the object and importance of this branch of God's work.

Whereas, There is a great need of literature for our young people that is free from the contaminating influences connected with current literature; therefore,--

4. Resolved, That we recognize the Youth's Instructor as a periodical that should be in the hands of all our young people, and that we recommend all our churches and Sabbath-schools to put forth efforts to increase the circulation of this periodical.

Whereas, The plan adopted by our State Association, at the last annual meeting for supplying the superintendents and teachers in our schools with the Sabbath-School Worker proved beneficial; therefore,—

5. Resolved, That the same plan be continued for another year, it being understood that the same reduced rates are guaranteed us by its publishers.

Whereas, In the providence of God, our president, Elder A. E. Place, has been appointed to fill another office ; therefore,—

6. Resolved, That we extend our thanks for his faithful labors in behalf of the Association, and wish him God's blessing in his new line of work.

7. Resolved, That all the donations above that required for the legitimate expenses of our schools, be used for the enterprise for which they were donated, under the direction of the International Sabbath-school Association.

8. Resolved, That we hereby express our thanks to the Secretary of this Association, and as a token of such thanks we tender to her from the funds of the Association the sum of thirty-five dollars for her labors during the past year.

Elder Porter's talks were very practical, and hence valuable, and they seemed to be well received. I greatly enjoyed the privilege of laboring with him at this meeting, and becoming better acquainted. Each day as we went out into the grove to seek the Lord together we were drawn nearer to each other, and nearer to the Lord. We feel that some good results of this meeting will be seen in the eternal kingdom. I expect to leave here to-night (Sunday) on my return to New York.
