SOUTH LANCASTER ACADEMY BIBLE SCHOOL.

At a recent meeting of the Board of Trustees of South Lancaster Academy it was decided to offer a select course of two years for the benefit of those who desire to prepare themselves in the shortest reasonable time for the ministry, or for Bible work in connection with some other department of the cause. The work will be largely elective, and will depend much upon the advancement of the student when he enters upon the course. The studies offered will be as follows:—

Old and New Testament History, Beginning and Advanced Classes in Bible Doctrine, Critical Study of the Acts and Epistles, Prophetic Books of the Old Testament, United States History in the light of Prophecy, three years in General History covering respectively the periods from Noah to the fall of Jerusalem under Zedekiah, from Babylon to the fall of Rome, and from Papacy to the present time, English Grammar, Political and Physical Geography, Physiology and Special Health Studies, Botany, Astronomy, Arithmetic, Book-keeping, and Shorthand; also the following drills,—Oratory or Public Speaking, and Voice Culture, Physical Culture, Vocal Music, and Drawing.

For those who have not done any portion of the work indicated, eight years out of the whole number of years' work will be required,—two years of Bible study, two years of History, two years of Science, one year of English, and one year of Arithmetic. Those who have done a portion of the work will be permitted to take such other work as the arrangement of the courses will allow. Each student will also be expected to take at least two of the drills. When leaving the school, those who have completed an equivalent of the two years' course, will receive a certificate indicating the studies pursued.

This course will be especially adapted to

those who can remain in school but a year or two. A cooking class will also be formed, and instruction in Christian Help Work will be given. For further information, address the principal,
