

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General Conference and Portland Meetings

The general conference, lately closed at Washington, afforded many opportunities for the discussion of vital interests affecting the message we bear as a people; and it was a rare privilege to be associated with the splendid body of men and women, coming from all parts of the world, to participate in the great world's conference. The interest centered in the general exercises in the immense pavilion; but the sectional meetings, devoted to special departmental work, were productive of definite results, tending to unify the plans of labor and to advance these special interests.

Particularly interesting were the departmental meetings of the Religious Liberty Association. Prof. W. W. Prescott presided at these gatherings until late in the session, when Prof. C. S. Longacre, who had been elected to succeed him as secretary of the association, assumed direction of the exercises.

Wise plans had been devised, in advance, for making the meetings profitable, and the program was one calculated to encourage discussion. The papers presented were thoughtful, and revealed the devotion with which the religious liberty work had been taken up and diligently prosecuted all over the land. and revealed the wide differences existing in the conduct of government in America, and in the countries less fully committed to the principles of liberty and justice.

In this brief report, it will be impracticable to discuss in detail the work of the religious liberty division. Perhaps an outline of the subjects considered will afford a sufficiently clear idea of the ground covered. The papers presented and their authors, most of whom were present in person to read them, were as follows:

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Spirited discussion followed the reading of nearly every paper, and it was voted to request the conference to arrange for the sale of "American State Papers," on the subscription basis, also for the publication of a cheaper volume, containing the same matter, which could be economically circulated throughout America. It was agreed that the organ of the association - Liberty Magazine -should be conducted on the broad principle of liberty to every man, of whatsoever state or persuasion, and that care should be exercised to avoid needless antagonisms by purely sectarian propaganda calculated to arouse enmity It was felt that the Protestant Magazine was better suited to the exposure of papal errors, and that Liberty should be kept free from this purely denominational controversy.

An excellent spirit prevailed, and the religious liberty workers were drawn together by the interchange of views. A more systematic prosecution of the work of this department in future is probable.

Going on, at the conclusion of the conference, to New England, it was my privilege to labor for two weeks among old friends and amidst the scenes of my early life, where one Sabbath I spoke in the old Reid meeting-house, at Richmond, Maine, where in early days Elder James White and Mrs. E. G. White often officiated. The light of truth still burns brightly there, and it was a pleasure to meet Elder S. J. Hersum, the faithful pastor, who for a long time was president of the Maine Conference, and h's devoted congregation.

Returning westward with my wife, after this brief visit to our old home, we are now attending the World's Christian Citizenship Conference at Portland, Oregon, where many noble men are voicing their faith in Christ and their belief in Christianity as the sole remedy for sin and sinners. While Sunday observance is one of the fundamental objects sought by many of the foremost speakers, a broader view is taken by others, and I can but feel that a more definite realization of the present truth would draw from the ranks a goodly company, willing to be guided by the divine word, free from human enactments.

I shall hope to be in attendance at our California camp-meetings, when with others of our brethren in attendance at the Portland gathering, we may be able to tell something further of the meeting. J. F. Blunt.

Pacific Press Notes

Southern California heads all the conferences in Pacific Press territory, in book deliveries, during the first six months of 1913. By referring to the comparative sales report for this union, it will be noticed that we show a gain of \$3,109.55 for that period. This is certainly very encouraging. On my way home, I spent four days in the Central Union Conference, and found crop prospects very bright, and a total enrolment of canvassers of 114. That union has already delivered books to the value of more than \$11,000, a gain over last year of a little over \$4,000.

Reports from Western Canada are nothing short of marvelous. One young Bohemian boy just writes me that during the past four weeks his orders amounted to \$852.

The great Northwest is forging steadily ahead. The report from Portland, received Thursday, shows a gain for the last six months of a little over \$1,000.

While at the conference, final arrangements were made with the brethren in Brazil for the translation of "Patriarchs and Prophets" into Portuguese. It is hoped that this translation will be complete so that we can begin typesetting sometime this fall.
