Pacific Union Conference S.D.A. DIRECTORY

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General Conference and North American Division Council

Several years ago, when action was taken extending the interim between the General Conference sessions from two to four years, making it a quadrennial period instead of a biennial one, it was decided to hold a council of the General Conference committee, including as far as possible other leading workers such as conference presidents, etc., midway between the General Conference sessions. Such a council is to be held this autumn in California. It will be convened at Loma Linda, November 5 and will continue until November 27.

It is expected that all the members of the General Conference committee and the North American Division committee in this country will be in attendance, also Elder L. R. Conradi, president of the European Division Conference; Elder J. T. Boettcher, vice-president of the European Division Conference: J. E. Fulton, president of the Australasian Union Conference; Elder R. C. Porter, president of the Asiatic Division; Elder H. R. Salisbury, superintendent of the India Union Mission; Elder J. C. Raft, president of the Scandinavian Union: and Elder W. J. Fitzgerald, president of the British Union Conference. It may not be possible for all of these brethren to be present at this meeting, but they are expected. It is quite possible that Elder J. W. Westphal, president of the South American Union Conference. and Elder F. W. Spies, president of the Brazilian Union, will be in attendance. It may be that Elder Conradi cannot leave Europe to attend this meeting, but his presence is greatly desired.

There will be many large questions that will be considered at this council. In fact, it will be larger than the General Conference meetings were a few years ago, and much larger questions will be up for consideration, due to the fact that the message has grown so rapidly of late years. There will probably be about 140 to 145 delagates in attendance. It is not expected that there will be a general attendance of our people at this meeting. In fact, it is desired that the attendance be limited in order that business may be attended to more rapidly than it could be if a large number of our people were in attendance. We do ask, however, that our brethren and sisters will earnestly pray that God may greatly bless His servants with wisdom as they plan for the extension of His work in all parts

of the world. More will be said about this meeting at a later time.

The Harvest Ingathering

The following experiences from last year's work show that it is quite possible to collect the entire \$100,000 if only enough church members would work.

One very busy housekeeper with a large family collected \$14.55 at odd times. Another took twenty-five papers, and brought back \$2.50. One sister who was very unwilling to respond to the call to solicit money for foreign missions, finally went out, and brought in \$9.40 and a face glowing with happiness.

Two sisters drove around among their neighbors and realized \$41.75. A Sabbath-keeper for one year collected over \$6.00 from nearby neighbors. One church elder worked part of two days, and brought in \$7.95 for sixteen papers. A sister who at first had not intended to go out changed her mind, and the result was nearly \$7.00.

One man while waiting for a train secured \$5.85. A sister used 100 papers and brought \$31. One successful solicitor obtained \$19.50 for four papers. A sister who prayed earnestly for her work received \$50. A brother who could only work Sundays collected \$22. One man and wife brought in \$18, and another \$12. One member brought a sister into the truth through his Harvest Ingathering work in 1913, and in 1914 she collected \$12.

Several of the ministers are working quietly on the \$150,000 Educational Fund in the northern part of the State of California. We trust also that the Holy Spirit is working quietly but effectually upon the heart of every loyal Seventh-day Adventist in the Pacific Union Conference, to help finish this important fund. Since our last report in the "Recorder," some \$2000 more has been added to the fund, leaving about \$17,000 yet to raise to complete the grand total. \$100. A sister whose nearest neighbor lived two miles away sent in \$3.85. Two nurses received \$11.45 from their efforts. A member gave 105 papers, and received \$34.23. A brother obtained \$5.60 for his first fifty papers. A faithful old sister sent in \$5.00 and started in to get more. A farmer's busy wife collected \$12 for six papers. A brother new in the truth took fifty papers, and soon returned for them \$25.

These are not picked experiences, but are taken from a list just as they have come in. Scores of others could be added to them, but enough have been given to show that when the members go out in faith, praying for their work, the Lord goes with them and gives success.

Let us all work unitedly this year for a completed work.

Machinery Palace Day at the Exposition

September 25 was called "Machinery Palace Day" for the reason that extra inducements were given to the public to visit this building on that day.

First, quite a sum of money was raised by contributions from the 250 exhibitors of this building which was given to the visitors in the form of prizes, among which were an automobile, piano, player piano and a phonograph. Every visitor passing the gates on the 11th, 18th and 25th of September received a coupon with a number which was good for a chance in the drawing for prizes.

As the day had been widely advertized, these attractions drew increased numbers to this building on the above dates, especially the 25th, when 73,000 visitors entered.

In order to get the people well distributed in the building, tin can receptacles for the tickets were placed in the various exhibits, each bearing a range of numbers; as, for instance, 110,000 to 111,000. Then each recipient of a coupon was obliged to hunt from place to place until the can admitting his number was found. In the hunt for the proper receptacles the people had to go over the entire building.

During the hours from nine A.M. until eleven P.M., entertainment was provided by six bands of music, who played in various parts of the building.

To add to the interest, the prize piano was placed in an auto-truck and whirled through the streets of the building, making frequent stops in order that the public might enjoy the singing of soloists who sang to the accompaniment of the piano.

Although we could not approve of the above methods to draw the people, in view of the fact that many on that day would visit our booth who otherwise would never come there, we decided, after consulting our brethren of the Pacific Press, to keep open our exhibit. The elimination of everything of a business nature in our work made our program entirely consistent with Sabbath-keeping, and the results attained justified the effort, since we secured on that day the results of four or five ordinary days.

At times the crowd was so great in our thirty-six-foot frontage that passing was difficult, and thus the attention of many was called to our work. Many availed themselves of our invitation to select literature from our free supply of periodicals and tracts around the globe stand.

Some of the more interested left their addresses with requests for literature to be sent by mail. The number of the latter reached sixty, distributed among various states of the union. While the day was one of care and toil, we thank the Lord for experiences enjoyed.

The canvassers in Stockton are having most remarkable experiences. In their house-to-house work they are finding many who are anxiously looking for light. Some have said as soon as they knew that we were Seventh-day Adventists: We believe that you are right about the Sabbath, and we want to know more about these things. One great need that confronts us is compevotent, consecrated, Bible teachers,sisters who can go from house to house and hold a connected chain of readings with the ladies in their homes. Lodi Academy opened its fall term September 28 with good prospects for a prosperous year's work. The academy is offering this year a good academic course besides a commercial course and other strong lines of work.

The *Review and Herald* keeps its readers closely in touch with what is being done in all lines of work connected with this cause. Are you keeping up with the progress of the third angel's message? The *Review* will help you to do it, and it is impossible to do so without this record of current happenings and advancement in this work.

Forty persons were baptized recently from the tent meetings in Oakland, Cal., which have been in progress during the summer. A number of others expect to join the church soon. These meetings in a large tent right in the heart of Oakland's business district have been in charge of Elders J. W. McCord and R. S. Fries, with a company of Bible workers and helpers.

The second "Record of Orders" for the Harvest Ingathering Signs for missions dated September 21 shows sixteen conferences in the North American Division where more papers have been ordered up to that date than were used in the territory during the entire year 1914. Of these sixteen conferences on the honor roll, five are in the Pacific Union Conference, leaving only three conferences and a mission field in our territory that have not yet But the five conferences attained. that have exceeded their last year's record in this field have placed the entire union conference territory ahead of its report of the year previous. Up to Sept. 21, 1915, 80,836 Harvest Ingathering papers had been ordered by

all the conferences in the Pacific Union Conference, whereas during the entire year 1914, there were ordered 78,676 papers; 38,685 papers were ordered during the week ending on the date above mentioned. This is certainly an excellent record. The next step, however is to get these good papers into the hands of the people. They will do no good unless put into use, and the earlier this is done, the more there will be accomplished. This is the week set apart for the special campaign with the Harvest Ingathering papers, but the effort should not close with the week. Persecution in Oklahoma

Brother C. S. Longacre, editor of *Liberty*, writes in a personal letter:

"At the present time our brethren in Oklahoma are having a rather tough time. Two of them were convicted before the court for Sunday law violation. However, they have appealed their case to a higher court. A week ago last Sunday a mob was organized, went out into the fields, and beat up three of our brethren, one of whom was lying at the point of death when I left Oklahoma a week ago. They were beaten up by the mob because they had been working on Sunday.

"A number of our brethren have been indicted in Tennessee for Sunday law violation, and will be tried before the court some time this fall. Persecution seems to be breaking loose again."
