# Central California Conference

The sixth annual camp-meeting and the first biennial session of the Central California Conference of Seventh-day Adventists was held in Recreation Park, near Fresno, Cal., May 29 to June 9, 1918, Elder N. P. Neilsen, president of the conference, presiding.

One hundred forty-one delegates were seated, representing every church in the conference.

The following named churches, organized since the last session, were received into the conference: Fairmead, with a membership of 21; Barstow (German), 21; Madera, 45; Wasco, 22; Hanford (Mexican), 19; and Exeter, with 22 members.

Upon request of the members, the name of the Exeter church was changed to Caplin. Because of removals, the churches of Wallace and Reedley dropped  $\mathbf{from}$ the list were of churches.

# **Resolutions Adopted** Gratitude and Consecration

Resolved, That we express our sincere gratitude to the Giver of all good for the continuation of all these, with many other blessings, and that we renew our consecration to faithful service, and we earnestly plead for the power of the Holy Spirit to quickly finish the work of carrying the gospel of the kingdom to all the world, that a people may be made ready for the coming of the Lord.

## Condolence

Whereas, Since our last biennial session, the ranks of our workers have been entered by the hand of death, taking from among us two of our faithful laborers, Elder J. W. Bagby and Sister Lida Ackley; therefore,

Resolved, That we would first express our sincere appreciation of the earnest and faithful labors of these dear co-workers, and while we acknowledge the loss which our cause has sustained by their decease, we would bow our heads in submission to Him who doeth all things well; and we hereby pledge ourselves to renewed devotion to the work in which our departed co-laborers spent their lives.

We extend our deepest sympathies to the bereaved families and relatives of our fallen comrades in the loss and sorrow which have come to them, and we give to them the assurance of our earnest prayers to the end that sustaining grace may be granted them from Him who alone can truly comfort those who mourn.

### Sabbath School Work

Whereas. It was the expressed wish Colporteurs' licenses: B. T. Meyers, of our late secretary, Sister Lida

Ackley, that our small Sabbath schools and our isolated members, now numbering 105, receive the help greatly needed in Sabbath school work; and believing this would bring added blessings to these small Sabbath schools and isolated members, as well as those who would visit them; therefore,

Resolved, That in every Sabbath school, where it is deemed necessary. a Sabbath school missionary committee of three members be appointed by the conference committee. These Sabbath school missionary committees shall supervise the visiting of other Sabbath schools and isolated members in counsel with the secretary of the Sabbath school department.

## **Religious Liberty**

Whereas, Sunday law champions have launched a movement to compel all California cities to adopt enforced Sunday observance, preparatory to an effort to force a state Sunday law through the Sacramento Legislature, in spite of the repeatedly expressed will of the people against such measures; and,

Whereas, Separation of church and state, and freedom to worship God without hindrance, according to the dictates of the individual conscience. is a fundamental principle of the American government; and,

Whereas. Sunday laws, of whatever kind, are based upon the religious nature of the day, and therefore are religious laws, and in conflict with true American principles; therefore

Resolved, That we, the delegates of the Central California Conference, in biennial session assembled, hereby respectfully, but most earnestly and emphatically protest to the various law-making bodies against the passage of Sunday ordinances or other religious laws.

## **Red Cross Work**

Resolved, That we urge our members to join the Red Cross, and that our sisters especially enlist in the relief work being carried on by that organization, sewing, knitting, preparing surgical dressings, and doing other work for the relief of human suffering; and that our children be enlisted especially along the line of making clothing for Belgian orphans and others in need.

## Prohibition

Resolved, That we urge our people to support heartily any movement for the securing of absolute prohibit.on, and that we urge our representatives in the State Legislature to support the federal amendment.

## Departmental Secretaries

Whereas, The officers of the departmental secretaries in the General Conference, and most of the union conferences, are elective rather than appointive; therefore,

Resolved, That this plan of electing our departmental secretaries be followed in the Central California Conference.

## **Mission Offerings**

Whereas, The expansion of our world-wide missionary work has compelled the General Conference Committee to recommend that our missionary offerings be increased from 20 cents to 25 cents per week per member; therefore,

Resolved, That we adopt this plan in the Central California Conference; that it be the basis for our goal in missionary offerings, and that under the blessing of God, we individually endeavor to reach it.

#### **Conference** Sessions

Whereas, The General Conference has recommended the holding of biennial sessions of our local conferences; therefore,

Resolved, That our constitution be so amended as to be in harmony with this recommendation.

#### **Constitution and By-laws**

Whereas, The conference in session has voted that the regular sessions of our conference shall be held biennially instead of annually as heretofore; therefore.

Resolved, That wherever the word "annual" or "annually" occurs, in the constitution and by-laws, it be so changed as to read "biennial" or "biennially" as the case may be.

Whereas, By action of the conference in session, the offices of departmental secretaries have been made elective instead of appointive as heretofore; therefore,

Resolved, That the following be substituted for section II, article 5, of the by-laws:

"That the departmental secretaries the campaign in be elected, and that the executive fornia Conference.

committee appoint such committees as may be provided for from time to time by the conference in session."•

Whereas, The State law requires the payment of laborers in the employ of any person, agent, or corporation semi-monthly; therefore,

Resolved, That section I of article 8 of the by-laws be amended by substituting the words "from time to time as directed by the executive committee" for the expression "from month to month," and that the words, "at the close of the month" be stricken out.

#### **Home Missionary Department**

Whereas, The Spirit of the Lord has told us that "church members are to do evangelistic work in the homes of their neighbors who have not vet received full evidence of the truth for this time," and realizing that "time is short, and our forces must be organized to do a large work," therefore,

Resolved, (a) That a home missionary secretary be employed to devote his whole time to this important department.

(b) That the conference be thoroughly organized to reach every family, definite districts being assigned to each church; each church to subdivide its district with leaders for each subdivision.

(c) That short institutes be held at certain centers to instruct leaders and such others as might attend.

Resolved, (a) That the incoming conference committee give early consideration to the plan of having the fourth Sabbath home missionary meeting a regular morning service, consisting of a short sermon or study, and campaign reports and plans.

(b) That the leaders and missionary secretary of each church be provided with the "Church Officers' Gazette" from church expense funds, where necessary.

#### Harvest Ingathering

Whereas, The Harvest Ingathering compaign has proved a great blessing both in raising funds to help swell our gifts to missions, and at the same time acquaint the public with the character and growth of this worldwide movement, be it

Resolved, (a) That the month of October of 1918 be the time to open the campaign in the Central California Conference.

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(b) That the goal for the conference be set at \$5,797.22.

(c) That we ask our church-members to set their individual goals at \$2.86, endeavoring to realize an average of 25 cents for every paper circulated.

Resolved. That the incoming conference committee plan for a thorough campaign to reach every person in the conference.

(a) By enlisting and thoroughly instructing the whole membership for the campaign.

(b) Districting the conference, and placing a minister or other leaders in actual charge of each district.

(c) Districting the territory of each church to include the whole conference, and placing leaders with assistants over each local section who shall be responsible for the covering of the territory assigned.

(d) That the weekly report system be followed as in last year's campaign.

# **Tithe Appropriation**

Whereas, The Lord has greatly blessed our conference financially during the past year, and as we had a good surplus of tithe on hand at the close of the year; therefore

Resolved, That we give \$4,000 of our surplus tithe as a donation to foreign missions for the extension of the work in other lands.

### **Missionary Volunteer**

Resolved, That we urge our conference workers, church elders and others to familiarize themselves with the aims, literature and methods of work of the missionary volunteer department: and further-

Resolved, That in view of the need of bringing to our young people a deeper experience in things most important to their salvation, strong evangelistic efforts be put forth in their behalf this year.

#### Appreciation

Resolved, That we hereby express to the "Fresno Republican" and the "Fresno Herald" our sincere appreciation of the courtesy they have shown us in publishing from day to day extended reports of our conference sessions, and excerpts from the discourses of our speakers.

Whereas, Sherman, Clay & Compuny and Esther Roach very kindly loaned us pianos for use during our

conference and camp-meeting; therefore.

Resolved, That we hereby extend to them our hearty thanks for these courtesies.

# Address of the President of the Central California Conference of Seventh-day Adventists

Two years, and more, have passed into eternity since our last conference session. In harmony with the action taken at that time, no meeting of the conference was called during 1917 These two years have been years of unparallelled war and bloodsned in the world; but also of ad vincement and progress in the cause of Lod. It is always a source of encouragement to recount the blessings of the Lord so generously bestowed upon us and His cause, and I esteem it a privilege to be given the opportunity of presenting a brief report of the progress of the work in our con-With profound gratitude ference. would we acknowledge the rich blessings of God bestowed upon us during this time.

We welcome the delegates to this our sixth session, and we are pleased to place the burden of the conference work into your hands. You have been chosen by our churches to represent them in the business of this conference, and upon you will rest the responsibility of saying what the policy of our conference shall be for the coming year.

Our people have stood by us and have upheld our hands in times of perplexity, and we thank the Lord for their loyal support. There is a spirit of union and of pressing together among our people, and it gives us added courage to know that our people are praying for our conference workers, and are presenting their names before the throne of God. This is as it should be.

Looking out upon the world strife and unrest can be seen on every hand. The past two years have been the most eventful years we have ever experfenced. The greatest war in the history of the world has been in progress, and millions have been mown down in the death struggle of the nations. But, dear brethren and sisters, we are nearing home, and we soon ten. Let us, then, with greater ear-

of the golden morning, and can almost hear the celestial songs wafted to us from the better land. But the work must be finished ere we can go home, and the key-note of this conference should be, a preparation for the speedy finishing of the work that God has committed to us. The time has come when the message of the coming of Christ must sound throughout the world. From the pen of Sister White we quote the following stirring words:

"The time has come when through God's messengers the scroll is being unrolled to the world. The truth contained in the first, second. and third angels' messages must go to every nation, kindred tongue, and people; it must lighten the darkness of every continent, and extend to the islands of the sea. There must be no delay in this work.

"Our watchword is to be, Onward, ever onward! Angels of heaven will go before us to prepare the way. Our burdens for the regions beyond can never be laid down till the whole earth is lightened with the glory of the Lord."

This is our work. This is the task committed to this people. And it will be done. But listen to the servant of God again: "The work of God in this earth can never be finished until the men and women comprising our church-membership rally to the work. and unite their efforts with those of ministers and officers." Vol. 9, page 117. Yes, we must all have a part in this great work and we must all help to finish it.

During the time covered by this report, two of our laborers have been called away by death,-Elder J. W. Bagby and Sister Lida Ackley. Elder Bagby was well known, as he had labored many years in this denomination, and had grown old in this precious cause. As a tired, aged warrior, he was laid to rest until the Lifegiver shall call him forth in the resurrection morning. Sister Ackley was suddenly called from us in the prime of her life, and while the cause has sustained a great loss, we would humbly submit to the will of God. who doeth all things well. Her unselfish life and untiring efforts to lead others to Christ will not soon be forgot; shall be there. We can see the gleams nestness carry forward the work laid

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down by her.

The Lord has given us devoted, earnest workers, and we thank God for their faithful and untiring efforts. Let me express my appreciation for the pleasant associations --hich we have had with these workers during our labors in this field. But while our conference workers have labored untiringly, we must also recognize that our lay-members have had a large share in the winning of souls. as they have worked so faithfully in connection with the different efforts, and in scattering the truth-laden literature.

Fruits of the labors put forth are seen in the conversion of souls. During 1916, 186 new members were added to our numbers, 147 by baptism, and 39 on profession of faith. During 1917, we received 224 new members into our churches, 174 by baptism and 50 on profession of faith. The following table showing additions for the past six years may be of interest:

After all the winning of souls is the great work before us. One soul saved is worth more than all the riches of the world. It may be necessary for us to consider financial matters, to form resolutions and shape policies, but all of these things should only be a means toward the giving of the message of warning to the world, and of rescuing perishing souls from impending doom. O, that God would roll upon us a greater burden for the lost, and that we may taste the joy of leading souls to the Lord!

Six new churches have been organized since our last session, and these will ask to be admitted into the sisterhood of churches-one at Fairmead with a present membership of 21, one at Madera with a present membership of 45, one at Exeter with a present membership of 22, one at Wasco with a present membership of 22, the Barstow colony German church with a membership of 21 and a Mexican church at Hanford with a membership of 19.

We now have 35 churches in our conference, with a membership of . We hope and pray that during 1918 port.

2,002 at the close of 1917. Our delegates will be interested in the growth of our membership. It is as follows: At the close of 1911 it was 1.064: for 1912, 1,138; for 1913 it was 1,218; for 1914 it was 1,341; for 1915 it was 1,452; for 1916 it was 1.748, and for 1917 it was 2,002. This surely shows a steady growth in our small field of six and one-half counties, for which we thank the Lord.

Since our last conference, church buildings have been erected at Bakersfield, Madera and Barstow; and at Porterville and Shafter, the recently erected church school buildings are being used for church services.

Our tithe has more than doubled during the last two years, as will be seen by the following table, and it will be of interest to notice the amount of tithe received each year since the organization of the conference:

We can but thank the Lord for this good increase in the tithe, and continually pray that our people may be faithful in returning to the Lord His own. This will be a blessing to our people as well as to the cluse. This tithe has not all been consumed in the home-field, for during the last year we sent \$2,193.42 more of our tithe out of the field than was consumed in our field in paying our laborers' salary, laborers' expenses, general expenses, and all other expenses added I believe this is right. together. and I would recommend that some of our surplus tithe be given to foreign missions for the extension of the work in foreign fields. I believe the Lord will bless us in so doing.

Our mission offerings show a steady increase, not only in the amount received, but also in the amount per capita, as will be seen by the following table:

we shall not only reach our goal of 25 cents per week per member, but that we may exceed this by a substantial sum for missions. The opening providences of God are loudly calling us for best efforts. Let us not disappoint our God.

We must train our children and youth for the message. Not alone. on the Sabbath day should our children be taught the message, but during the week they should be learning the things that will prepare them for a place in the Lord's work, for from them must come our recruits for mission fields. This year we had 17 schools, 24 teachers and 536 pupils enrolled. Marked progress has been made, as will be evinced by our educational superintendent's report. Sinceour last session of the conference, six new church buildings have been erected, and a number of buildings have been enlarged. Better equipment, however, is needed in most of the schools. and our church school work should receive careful attention by our delegates.

We have 21 senior young people's societies and 16 junior societies, with a combined membership of 812. Their offerings for foreign missions for 1917 were \$2,345.64, and for home missions, \$364.50. The secretary of this department will be able to show advancement along all lines of this work. When converted to the Lord our young people are a great asset to  $\mathbf{this}$ denomination, and a great strength to our churches.

Our Sabbath school work is one of the important departments of our cause. Under the efficient leadership of our late beloved Sister Lida Ackley this department has made remarkable gains the past two years. At the close of 1917 we had 38 Sabbath schools and three home department schools with a combined membership of 1886. This is little less than our chu ch membership, and earnest steps should be taken to get every church member to become a member, either of the regular Sabbath school or of the home department. This work should not be left for our conferencesecretary alone, but all should assist in trying to reach this much desired Our offerings for 1917 were goal. \$10,122.74, which was a good gain over previous years, as will be seen when the secretary renders her re-

Our literature must be scattered like the leaves of autumn, and earnest efforts should be put forth to carry it into every home in our conference. Not only are our loyal canvassers carrying the books into the homes of the people, as will be seen when our field missionary secretary, renders his report, but our conference territory has been divided between our churches, and plans laid for carrying our literature into every home in a systematic way. This work should not be permitted to lag, but the enthusiasm that has been kindled should be fanned into a brighter flame. It would be well if our home missionary secretary could devote all his time to this important work.

Having thus briefly cast a glance backward over the work of the past two years, we can but acknowledge that the Lord has been merciful to us and greatly blessed us in spite of mistakes that have been made. We would now reconsecrate ourselves to Him for service, and shall endeavor to be more faithful to our sacred calling. We are weak, but He is strong, and in His strength we would go forward to victory. We crave the prayers of God's people, that whatever duties may fall to our lot, we may perform them to the glory of God and the salvation of souls,

We pray that this coming year may bring greater success and richer blessings to the cause in our conference than has any preceding year. We trust that, as churches and individuals, you will stand by those whom you may ask to carry the burdens of the administrative work for the coming term, the same as you have stood by us in the past years. Press together, labor for souls, be often found in prayer to God, and success will crown your efforts. Soon the glad day will come when the work is finished, and all the ransomed will go home to Father's house on high with sheaves we have been able to gather for Him.




