#### Profession and Possession

"Not everyone that saith unto me. Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in Heaven." Matt. 7:21.

Not one thing in all of God's word is more emphasized than is the neccessity for every believer to have a personal experience in soul-winning. God said to Abram, "I will bless thee, .....and thou shalt be a blessing." Gen. 12:2. And Abram's life of faith-

ful ministry is made an example for the children of faith for all time. as we read: "In thee, .... and in thy seed shall all the nations of the earth be blessed." Gen. 12:3; 26:4. As a people the literal descendants of Abraham become negligent in the discharge of their sacred duties as ministers of righteousness, and were rejected as a nation.

"The message of salvation is communicated to men through human agencies. But the Jews had sought to make a monoply of the truth which is eternal life. They had hoarded the living manna, and it had turned to corruption. The religion which they tried to shut up to themselves became an offense. They robbed God of His glory, and defrauded the world by a counterfeit of the gospel. Reproving theirformalism the Lord said, "If ye were Abraham's children, ye would do the works of Abraham." John 8:39. Of His own ministry He said: "I must work the works of Him that sent me, while it is day: the night cometh when no man can work." "My meat it to do the will of Him that sent me, and to finish His work." John 9:4: 4:34. We believe, as a people, that God has set His hand to quickly finish the work of the gospel in all the world. At the recent General Conference Council held in Washington, Elder A. G. Daniells said: "I have traveled over the country, and I can tell you that from my observation, our small literature is the literature that is being looked at and given attention. I know, because I see so many people pull out a small book, paper or magazine on the trains and street cars and read it." A rapidly increasing number of earnest men and women are giving all, or a part of their time selling our truth-filled magazines. There is an abundance of promising territory for all who feel called to this line of work.

In a recent letter, a sister who has charge of the magazine work in one of our large cities says, among other things: "My heart is filled with perplexity at times as just how to best manage  $\mathbf{this}$ work in this large, wicked city, and the best part of it is, Brother --—, that more and more of our people are getting a burden of the magazine work. Some of our church members have said that when Fall comes, and the students return to school, they will take up the work where the girls have left off and go right on with it. I feel that this year may bring forth developments which will be very unexpected to our work."

Another sister closes her letter with these words: "I never thought I could sell magazines, but with the Lord's `elp I intend to do something with them every week. I do want to help spread the message."

During these twenty years something substantial has been done along these lines, but not a tithe of what ought to be done and what can be done if we turn our hearts and our means to the task.

Writing on the work in the South. in 1895 Mrs. E. G. White says: "God cares for the colored people, and if we would co-operate with Him for the salvation of souls, we must care for them too, and become laborers together with Him. We need to repent before God because we have neglected missionary work in the most abandoned part of God's moral vineyard. There needs to be a stirring up among the members of our churches. There needs to be concern created for our colored brethren at the great heart of the work."

This message is again due. Accordingly, the leaders "at the great heart of the work"-the General Conference Committee-have set apart Subbath, September 14, for offerings to our colored work. They earnestly hope for a "stirring up among the members of our churches" to give liberally to one of the most deserving missionary enterprises we are conducting at home or abroad.

# A Great Ouestion

It is written: "A certain man had two sons; and he came to the first, and said, 'Son, go work to-day in my vineyard.' He answered and said, 'I will not;' but afterward he repented, and went. And he came to the second, and said, likewise. And he answered and said, 'I go, sir;' and went not. Whether of them twain did the will of his father?" Matt 21:28-31.

In this parable the two sons represent two classes of individuals. The same commission is given to both but one does one thing and the other something different. The question is asked, "Whether of them twain did the will of his father?"

It is evident that the two classes brought to view in the parable must be church-members for they are sons of the owner, being born into the household. Then, too, both knew that their father had a vineyard, and that it required care to make it fruitful. and thus. others (strangers) would be needed to help in the work. The commission was very plain.

"Son, go work to-day in my vineyard." It mattered not what their answer was, or what they had previously done, the commission was for to-day, and what they actually did was what determined their faithfulness to their father.

The parable does not state that the second son did nothing. He may have had many cares and been doing a worthy work according to his own preference, but he did not do the will of his father.

To-day, we are living in a time when the cares and pleasures of this life are leading many away from doing the will of God. Many are serving their own preferences or will. Yet "all who would be sons and daught-. ers of God must prove themselves co-workers with God and Christ and the Heavenly angels. This is the test for every soul." "Christ's Object Lessons." Page 283.

Harvest Ingathering Campaign

## Success Foreshadowed

"First copy of this year's Harvest Ingathering 'Watchman' used in soliciting brought check for \$35.00.... All indications point to a greater interest in this campaign than ever before." This quotation is part of a telegram sent to the "Review and Herald" by the publishers of the Harvest Ingathering 'Watchman,' and demonstrates again that "there is no crisis with God."

In a large part of the Pacific Union Conference the Ingathering campaign will begin September 1, and plans have perfected for a vigorous campaign on the part of every churchmember. The goal set by the General Conference for this year's effort is \$250,000. This means a per capita average of \$2.86, but we should far exceed this. Five dollars seems small for individual goals in this time of great prosperity, and the larger part of our people will go beyond this mark. The General Conference goal for last year was passed by many thousands of dollars, and faithful work on the part of every member will pass the goal again.

The General Conference action asks that we endeavor to secure at least 25 cents for every paper circulated. Small gifts are to be thankfully received, but often a tactful suggestion will secure a larger offering.

Often the one soliciting is asked how much is expected for an offering. It will be well to say in reply: "Some make a very liberal gift. Many, however, are able to give but a dollar, or half-dollar, and some only twenty-five cents." Twenty-five cents is the smallest sum received by the Government in the War Savings campaign, and the people have been educated to give that much, or more, so set your aim high.

Pray for large things and let your faith take hold of God's assurance of success. Remember the great success achieved by the children of Israel in their Ingathering campaign in plague-stricken Egypt. Surely, there was every outward indication of failure then, but the people took hold of God's promises and He gave wonderful success. So He will NOW. The time has come to hasten forward the work of the Lord in all the earth. He has opened wide the doors of opportunity, and we must provide workers who can step into these opening providences. Speaking of the need for haste in mission work, Mr. John "The evangelization R. Mott says: of the world in this generation should be a commanding reality in the life of every Christian. Let us keep it as an ideal; and let us translate it into terms of self-denial; for this watchword must be not only regarded as an ideal, but must also be worked out in action. This is a truth, not only to be contemplated. and to stir us but also to be done. Whether or not the watchword is needed for any other part of the world, it is certainly needed for the Far East, because whatever we wish to do in the Far East must be done in this generation. God help us to work, and so plan, not as though we had two or more generations in which to do the work, but as though we had but one: or, it may be but part of one."

"The Lord wants His people in these days to believe that He will do as great things for them as He did for the children of Israel in their journey from Egypt to Canaan. We are to have an educated faith that will not hesitate to follow His instructions in the most difficult experiences. 'Go forward' is the command of God to His people." Testimonies, Vol. 9, page 271.

#### Lakeport and Mendocino City

Since leaving Fort Bragg, in May, where two souls were buried in haptism, and a third re-baptized, an effort was opened in Lakeport associated with Brother Lester Bond, who had been giving private Bible studies in the vicinity. The wall of prejudice seemed invulnerable for a while: but the Lord finally gave us six souls who continue to rejoice in the great light. These were received into the Lakeport church, formerly known as the Kelsevville church. The Finley Sabbath school was also transferred to Lakeport.

After camp-meeting, a visit to Covelo resulted in bringing the Sabbath school together again. Two persons await baptism there, when a favorable opportunity permits, and several others are considering the step. Candidates have to travel quite a distance to the river for immersion.

An effort is now progressing in Mendocino City, twelve miles down the coast from Fort Bragg. Brother Alzo Edwards is assisting the writer. Sisters Olive Dorward and Hazel Brown are visiting and giving Bible studies. the latter playing during the song service. The town is almost wholly Catholic, and overwhelmingly foreign, the Portuguese predominating. After strenuous efforts some interest is at last being created. The attendance is on the increase. May we not feel assured of your prayers? The harder the battle. the more precious the fruits. We are truly thankful in serving a Leader who goes forth conquering and to conquer.

#### Changes In the South

For the information of those who may be interested in the colporteur work—and that ought to include all our people—I wish to call attention to some changes in leadership that have taken place in the Southern and Southeastern California conferences.

For several years Brother C. C. Morlan has been at the head of the colporteur work in the Southern California Conference, and Brother H. A. Hebard in the Southeastern, both of these brethren also carrying the work of home missionary secretary. For some time it has been felt that each line of work should have its own secretary, and this has now been arranged.

Brother V. L. Beecham, formerly of Nebraska, has been called to take the work of field secretary of the Southern California Conference, while Brother Morlan will devote all his time to the home missionary work. This change, in fact, took place some time prior to the camp-meeting, and was confirmed at that time by the election of both these brethren to their respective offices for the ensuing year.

At the conference meeting in Santa Ana. Brother Hebard was elected as missionary secretary. and home Brother L. A. Reynolds, of Northern California, was called to take charge of the book work. Henceforth all correspondence relative to the colporteur work should be addressed to L. A. Reynolds, at the Riverside office address. These changes I am sure will make for the more rapid development of both lines of work.

In this connection I wish to call attention again to the colporteurs' institute to be held in Los Angeles, beginning September 1. Surely there are many who have felt that God

is calling them to take up this line of work, and I trust that all such persons will get in touch with Brother Beecham through the office address at once, and arrange to attend this meeting, and make a practical preparation for the work. F. E. Painter.

#### Obituaries

**Trickle.**—Agnes Trickle nee Dwire was born in Seneca County, Ohio, Oct. 6, 1833, and died in California July 15, 1918, having passed the 84th land mark.
