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A Relief Campaign

"One million children are dying in Armenia, the very cradle of Christianity-slowly, surely starving to death, Slowly? No, not so slowly. A million have already perished, while 200,-000 mothers stood, powerless to help. with tearless eyes and desolate hearts." This is one paragraph from heartbreakingly sad picture presented by the "Literary Digest" in a recent issue.

Did you know of this awful condition in Bible lands? Have you read of the thousands of homes uprooted, of the fathers and brothers brutally slaughtered by the savage Turk, the indescribable tortures to which the women and children have been subjected? Did you know that dogs, dead animals, grass, and even human beings are being eaten by these starving people, in the very land where Jesus once walked?

In these days of the world's great need, many and urgent are the calls for help which constantly come to us -calls which stir the heart and loosen the purse-strings; and we gladly give our bit to each worthy cause. But here is an appeal which is de-

serving of special effort, of special self-denial, that its imperative need may be speedily met; for thousands of lives depend upon it. Every day in Lebanon alone, 1000 little ones perish for lack of food. Think of it, dear friends, 1000 every day! Can we who are comfortably fed and clothed and living in comparative ease, selfishly enjoy our blessings and refuse to share with those who are destitute and starving?

Beginning October 5 a relief campaign in behalf of stricken Armenia and Syria will be launched among our young people, and you are asked to have a part in it. The recent General Conference council recommended that such a campaign be undertaken by the Missionary Volunteer department, and in harmony with this action plans have been laid to enlist every young person in a strong, enthusiastic self-denial effort. The Missionary Volunteer secretary of each local conference is the campaign promotion officer in his field, and will inform the local societies of all plans relating to the campaign besides arranging for the promotion material to be sent to each one.

The Armenian Relief number of the "Youth's Instructor," which was dated September 10, will furnish least a faint idea of the great need in Bible lands, and how societies and individuals can help to meet it, Read this issue carefully, if you have not already done so.

A special program has been arranged for the Missionary Volunteer meeting on October 5, which presents an earnest plea for Armenia Syria-a plea which cannot fail to touch the hearts of all who hear it. Let every society, both senior junior, carefully plan and carry out this program, which appears in

October "Gazette." This meeting will mark the beginning of the relief campaign in which every Missionary Volunteer is asked to participate; therefore, the program should be a strong one that will stir to action. Harley Hageman Writes From France

A letter received from Harley Hageman, who is now in France, to the Palisade church, will be of interest to the "Recorder" readers in the Inter-Mountain Conference. We quote a part of his, letter:

"The Lord gave me an enjoyable and safe trip across the Atlantic, and has kept me in excellent health at all times. I have nothing but praise and honor to offer Him. I know you folks have thought of me often, and have asked God to protect me and bring me safely home again. The Lord is very good to me, and although I can not frame my circumstances in accordance with my wishes, I am trying to put my will in harmony with my circumstances so that God can work out the plan of my life's work, no matter where I am.

"These experiences are what make us rely upon God, and He does not afflict willingly. These trials boys are having seem to temper our ambition. They burn out the dross of selfishness and worldliness, and I often think they teach patience. of David, when he was fleeing through the wilderness from his own He didn't know he was taking son. some lessons to become the sweet singer of Israel. Poor Joseph didn't know that the pit and dungeon were suffered them both. this just happens to Christians, but that everything that enters into his life is sent or permitted to come by an all-wise and all-loving heavenly Father, and is sent for the perfection of character and to fit him or her for service.

"I realize more each day that faith we overcome the world, and it is best strengthened by our every-day simple, childlike trust in God, with strict obedience to His word. I am of good courage, and feel that the wonderful encouragement God gave Joshua through Moses when he was bordering the promised land is also the encouragement given to me in our nearness to the promised home.

"And Moses called unto Joshua. and said unto him in the sight of all Israel, 'Be strong and of a good courage: * * * the Lord, He it is that doth go before thee. * * * He will not fail thee, neither forsake thee; fear not, neither be dismayed.'

"Truly, the Lord does go before us. and prepares the way wherein we can serve Him best, and this is especially noticed in our preparation for Sabbath observance. Here the question arises, Can a man observe Sabbath in the army? As far as my power is concerned, it would be impossible, but God can change the hearts of wicked insomuch that unconsciously they make it possible for us to keep the Sabbath holy. God has made this possible ever since I came to the army, with very few conflicts. are never expected to do fatigue work on the Sabbath, as the officers know we are seventh-day observers.

"We have lectures by the officers every day, teaching us how to care for the wounded and sick. I feel it no violation to attend these lectures, as we must have this knowledge to do good on the Sabbath day, tending the sick and wounded in the trenches and on the field, when opportunity presents.

"Sabbath afternoon is usually a holiday, and we generally take a short walk out into the woods with the other boys. I continually ask the Lord just what I should consider as necessary on the Sabbath, without violating the commandments. I would rather suffer affliction from earthly than stand before God in judgment with a blotted record of appeared in the August "Signs Maga-

I don't believe disobedience to the commandments. The Sabbath question was the first necessary thing before God's people could be removed from Egypt to the promised land. Just so, it is with us before He will take us into the promised home. I will be faithful unto death, and try to write more often.
