"OUR PIONEER MISSIONARY"

It is now more than two score years since the work of the third angel's message was pioneered on the Pacific Coast by Elder J. N. Loughborough, and others.



AN ENCOURAGING SHOWING

The treasurer of the Pacific Union Conference, Brother B. M. Emerson. has just handed me a statement of the standing of the twenty-five-centa-week fund in our field for the first ten months of this year. The full amount to be raised, according to the goal, was \$141,418.25. The statement shows, however, that we have received up to October 31, \$158,633.58, or a net amount over our goal of \$17,215,33. Figuring a little more, reveals that we have reached 28-04 cents per member for the first ten months.

It would seem quite clear that the Pacific Union Conference will not come far short of 30 cents a week per member for the entire year. This accomplishment should be an inspiration and encouragement to throughout the field.

A little further study reveals this interesting fact, that for the first time in the history of the Pacific Union Conference, each conference and mission field in the union has passed its goal. This is truly encouraging. The Nevada Mission field, for instance, the weakest in membership in the entire union conference, has passed the 35 cents per week mark.

Two months of this year yet re-What shall be the history when the year closes? We are believing that the Pacific Union Conference will easily make the 30 cents per week per member for the entire field.

Beginning with 1920, our goal will be 50 cents per week per memberquite a different undertaking, but quite within the possible—and we believe that Pacific Union Conference will go to work with courage, and strong, tremendous cable."

the assurance that even this goal can be reached, though twice as great as has been our goal in former years. Surely the unrest among the nations of the earth, and the conditions in the world generally, tell the advent band that we are nearing our haven of rest. We have been assured by the Saviour's word that it will take all to buy the field.
