PRAYER BRINGS POWER

"Ask ye of the Lord rain in the sacred hours, with thankful time of the latter rain; so the Lord shall make bright clouds, and give them showers of rain." "He will cause to come down for you the rain, the former rain, and the latter rain.' In the East the former rain falls at the sowing-time. It is necessary in order that the seed may germinate. Under the influence of the ferspring up. The latter rain, falling near the close of the season, ripens the grain, and prepares it for the sickle. . . . The ripening of the grain represents the completion of the work of God's grace in the soul. By the power of the Holy Spirit the moral image of God is to be perfected in the character. We are to be wholly transformed into the likeness of Christ. 'The latter rain, ripening That though the storms and shadows earth's harvest, represents the spiritual grace that prepares the church for the coming of the Son of Man.

Many have in a great measure failed to receive the former rain. They have not obtained all the benefits that God has thus provided for They expect that the lack them. will be supplied by the latter rain, when the richest abundance of grace shall be bestowed, they intend to open their hearts to receive it. They are making a terrible mistake.

The work that God has begun in the human heart in giving His light and knowledge, must be continually going forward. Every individual must realize his own necessity. The heart must be emptied of every defilement, and cleansed for the indwelling of the Spirit. It was by the confession and forsaking of sin, by

ing of the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost. The same work, only in greater degree, must be done now. Only those who are living up to the light they have will receive greater light. Unless we are daily advancing in the exemplification of the active Christian virtues, we shall not recognize the manifestations of the Holy Spirit in the latter rain. It may be falling on hearts all around us, but we shall not discern or receive it. . . .

We may have had a measure of the spirit of God, but by prayer and faith we are continually to seek more of the Spirit. It will never do to cease our efforts. If we do not progress, if we do not place ourselves in an attitude to receive both the former and the latter rain, we shall lose our souls, and the responsibility will lie at our own door.

"Ask ye of the Lord rain in the time of the latter rain." Do not rest satisfied that in the ordinary course of the season, rain will fall. Ask for it. The growth and perfection of the seed rests not with the husbandman. God alone can ripen the harvest. But man's co-operation is required. God's work for us demands the action of our mind, the exercise of our faith. We must seek His favors with the whole heart if the showers of grace are to come to us. We should improve every opportunity of placing ourselves in the channel of blessing. Christ has said, "Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst." . . .

It is not an immutable law that all who attend general gatherings or local meetings shall receive large supplies from heaven. The circumearnest prayer and consecration of stances may seem to be favorable for themselves to God, that the early a rich out-pouring of the showers of disciples prepared for the out-pour-grace. But God Himself must com-

mand the rain to fall. Therefore, we should not be remiss in supplication. We are not to trust to the ordinary working of providence. We must pray that God will unseal the fountain of the water of life. we must ourselves receive of the living water.

Let us, with contrite hearts, pray most earnestly that now, in the time of the latter rain, the showers of grace may fall upon us. . . If we pray for the blessing in faith, we shall receive it as God has promised. . . . The whole heavenly treasure awaits our demand and reception, and as we receive the blessing, we in our turn are to impart it. Thus it is that the holy lamps are fed, and the church becomes a lightbearer in the world.

This is the work that the Lord would have every soul prepare to do at this time, when the four angels are holding the four winds, that they shall not blow until the servants of God are sealed in their foreheads. There is no time now for self-pleasing. The lamps of the soul must be trimmed. . . . We should daily receive the holy oil that we may impart to others. All may be lightbearers to the world if they will. We self are to sinkout of sight We \mathbf{are} to receive in Jesus. the word of the Lord in counsel and instruction, and gladly communicate it. There is now need of much prayer. Christ commands, "Pray without ceasing," that is, keep the mind uplifted to God, the source of all power and efficiency. . . . But those who do not cultivate the spirit and habit of prayer cannot expect to receive the golden oil of goodness, patience, long suffering, gentleness, love.

The dispensation in which we are now living is to be, to those that ask, the dispensation of the Holy Spirit. Ask for His blessing. It is time we were more intense in our devotion. To us is committed the arduous, but happy, glorious work of revealing Christ to those who are in darkness. We are called to proclaim the special truths for this time. For all this the out-pouring of the Spirit is essential. We should pray for it. The Lord expects us to ask Him. We have not been whole-hearted in this work. . . hearts, let us confess it to God and

A MISSIONARY'S HOME IN THE 5 WEST INDIES

(The following letter was written § by Mrs. Ruth McCulley - Cochran, who spont one year at the Washington Foreign Mission College after graduating from the St. Helena Sanitarium in 1914. Her full address is San Claudia, Province Pinar del Rio, Cuba.)

San Claudia, Cuba, May 20, 1919. "Dear Classmates:

"This finds us way up in the hills starting a mission school for the natives. It is very interesting work. There has never been a school here before, therefore few of the parents know how to read. I have 15 in my school besides one girl who is preparing for the work. There are waiting now those who desire to come as for some months past. Quite an inboarding students, who will be here terest has been developed there, and just as soon as we can make room for them by building.

"Our house is made of palm leaves and my stove is very similar to Jacob's altar-just a heap of stones on which I pile wood for a fire. My gathering! father has just sent me a check to plete reports of the work accombuy a real cook stove, so I can smile plished during the week ending Nothrough the tears that fill my eyes from the smoke, knowing that it will be only a little longer.

"There is no wagon road that reaches us, so everything must be brought up on horseback. It is very interesting at times to get stoyes and such things up these stony hills.

"It is beautiful here, timbered hills everywhere, with a cleared spot here and there, and with palm leaf houses just full of interesting little chaps. One of our neighbors has 24 children.

"We have an abundance of fruit of many kinds.

"The Lord has blessed us greatly since coming here, and He seems nearer than ever before. Pray for us that we may be able to bring this people from darkness to light."

Our next thirteenth Sabbath offering, December 27, is to be used in building homes for our missionaries. This will help us to see the need of homes where scorpions, centipedes, etc., cannot enter, not to mention larger unpleasant visitors. Reader. try to imagine your children in some of the homes where our missionaries are living.

California Conference bulletin number five shows 15 churches over the goal. It is nearing the \$6,000 mark in its steady march to the goal. One of the conference workers gathered \$125.

Arizona's bulletin for the eighth week of the campaign shows a total of \$2.596.24. This leaves but \$698.76 to be raised to place this field over the goal. One minister reached his \$300-goal and plans to make it \$500. Six churches are over the goal.
