"Psychiatrist Found Hanged"-these were the words of a headline in a recent morning newspaper. The article that followed stated that this man had held the rank of number-one psychiatrist, a top authority. As I read this account of a man who had studied the workings of the human mind, and who had important degrees after his name, I thought of the 8,000,000 alcoholics and addicted drinkers in the United States, ninety-five per cent of whom are among the average or intellectual group of our country.

The wisdom of this world does not satisfy the deeper longings of the heart. We are told in the book Temperance, page 132: "Lift up Jesus, crying, 'Behold, the Lamb of God, that taketh away the sin of the world!' John 1:29, A.R.V. He alone can satisfy the craving of the heart, and give peace to the soul." (Italics supplied.)

God has entrusted us with a knowledge of His saving grace in a world where men and women everywhere are seeking to satisfy the deeper longings of the heart by socalled pleasure instigated by Satan, the destroyer of souls. These intemperate habits of using stimulants or depressants are universal, from the devil worshipers in Borneo to the Christian nations of the Western Hemisphere.

In regard to tobacco, a stimulant, Mrs. White states: "Multitudes have fallen victims to its poisonous influence. They have surely murdered themselves by this slow poison."-Ibid., page 57. She also states, "Strong drink is re-

garded by many as the only solace in trouble;" then adds this sobering thought: "but this need not be, if, instead of acting the part of the priest and Levite, professed Christians would follow the example of the good Samaritan."-Ibid., page 127.

Yes, God has entrusted to us a knowledge of His saving grace. In a world that is made insensible to the gospel through intemperance, "Publications upon health reform will reach many who will not see or read anything upon important Bible subjects. The gratification of every perverted appetite is doing its work of death. Intemperance must be met. With united, intelligent effort make known the evils of beclouding the powers that God has given, with wine and strong drinks. The truth must come to the people upon health reform. This is essential in order to arrest the attention in regard to Bible truth. . .

Just think of the blessings that people from "every nation, kindred, tongue and people" have been denied because five hundred missionaries have been kept from serving. This almost overwhelms us. Now think of the blessings that 38.5 per cent of our church membership have missed because they have not participated in the program of the Sabbath school, and then the many who not only have stayed away from Sabbath school but have also denied themselves the blessings that come from giving.

Something to think about, isn't it? "Five hundred missionaries kept from serving!" Are you responsible? W. J. BLACKER.

Glendale Academy Temperance **Club Promotes Bumper Strips**

The Glendale Union Academy Temperance Club, with a membership of about 60 students, has been carrying on a very active temperance program. The first activity of the year was a field trip to Glendale Municipal Court. Chapel programs have included speakers such as Deputy Lee Stahl of the Los Angeles County Sheriffs Narcotic Detail, speaking on narcotics, and Elder F. A. Soper, editor of Listen magazine. One of the most successful activities has been a project to put the "Safety Demands Sober Drivers" bumper strip on hundreds of Glendale cars, with the bumper strips provided through the courtesy of the Southern California Conference MV Department.

In promoting these strips, our first contact was a call upon Glendale Chief of Police Carl R. Eggers and Traffic Lieutenant Charles M. Kneller. These men gave their hearty approval to the project, and we made an appointment for the club officers to put these bumper strips on Glendale police cars. Pictures of Temperance Club officers putting on these strips appeared in two local newspapers. Chief Eggers also invited representatives of the club to attend the December meeting of Operation Safety to present the bumper strips to officials there.

Coordinated Evangelism in Hawaii

December 19 was a very important day for the pastors of Hawaiian Mission. Planes from the neighboring islands brought our pastors together with the pastors of Oahu in the Honolulu Central church where a new plan called "Coordinated Evangelism" was to be discussed. First, Elder B. W. Mattison presented a spiritual challenge to each pastor to do his best in soul winning along with the laymen. He stated that we must not draw back, but go forth with a new vigor to urge people to accept Christ regardless of the cost. The individual who accepts Christ may have trials to bear, but we must not limit the power of God to help them out of their difficulties and make of them strong Christians, he said, Several statements were read from the Spirit of prophecy on the subject of winning our neighbors to Christ, and then the objective of "Coordinated Evangelism" was set forth in this brief statement of purpose:

Coordinated Evangelism is an effort to apply the above counsel [Spirit of prophecy statements] by uniting all the departments of the local church and Mission into an all-out evangelistic thrust. It proposes to send out church members two by two in Bible study teams, presenting one cottage meeting per week for eight weeks, followed by some type of public follow-up campaign in which the pastor, with the help of all the church, will endeavor to bind off the interest.

The pastors carefully studied the plan as it was presented step by step until all understood how it was to operate. A vote was taken and the group of pastors as a whole voted enthusiastically to implement this program in their local churches. They were convinced that such a program would bring more souls to Christ as the ministry and laymen work together. The observation was also made that such a program meets the divine blueprint as laid down by the Bible and the Spirit of prophecy.

Into non-Seventh-day Adventist homes during 1960 went \$204,000 worth of Seventh-day Adventist literature in Central California Conference. This is the largest delivery record in the history of this conference, placing Central California in fourth place among the conferences of the United States. In addition, your faithful literature evangelists prayed in 5,917 homes, and enrolled 7,895 in Bible correspondence courses. The Voice of Prophecy tells us that at least one in each 150 of these applicants will result quite immediately in a baptism. The colporteurs gave away 31,417 pieces of free gospel literature, took 111 people to church with them, and started studies with 237.
