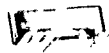

Participants in Reno's Recent Five-Day Plan Are Enthusiastic

"I wish I had known about it sooner." "I would never have quit smoking, if it were not for the Five-Day Plan." "I feel 100 percent better!"

These are just a few of the enthusiastic comments made by participants in Reno's recent Five-Day Plan to Stop Smoking.

Robert W. Hauser, M.D., and Howard M. Barron, conference temperance secretary, teamed up for the second time this year to hold a successful Five-Day Plan. The clinic was held August 31 to September 4 at the local YMCA, a name that is synonymous to many with good health and clean living.

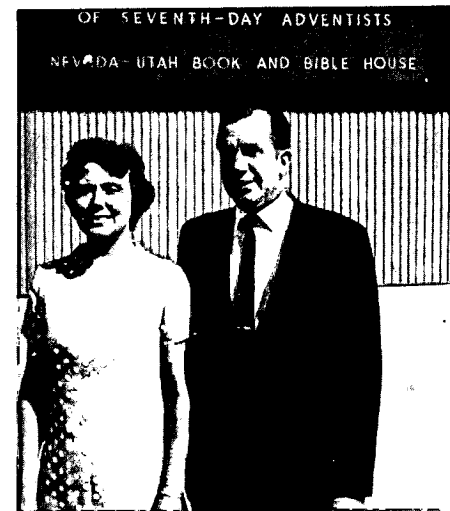
Thirty-five registered for the Plan, even though it began on Labor Day weekend. Of those registered, 27 finished the course, and 26 assured us that they had completely stopped smoking.

Of those who attended, some had smoked for just six to 12 years, and others for 40 to 45 years. One lady smoked only about six cigarettes daily, but many who attended smoked as many as 60 cigarettes every day.

One person said the Five-Day Plan was "A very painless way to stop smoking and start liking it!" However, not everyone got off so easily. The usual complaints and disagreeable symptoms were listed: irritableness, headache, nervousness, dizziness, numbness in extremities, inability to concentrate. Of course, there were good symptoms also: "A wonderful feeling of self-satisfaction because I have quit smoking," "breathing freer," "more energy," "sleeping better," "food tastes better," "wake up earlier," "clearer eyes," "can smell new smells," "taste new tastes," "feeling better mentally and physically."

A Five-Day Plan to Stop Smoking is a real service to a community, and people who really want to stop smoking are most grateful for this service. Why don't you plan one soon?

Hawaiian Mission Holds Its Fourth Annual Camp Meeting

The fourth annual Hawaiian camp meeting was held in MeeKague Hall on the campus of Hawaiian Mission Academy the weekend of August 22 and 23. It was followed by the annual three-day workers meeting.

Members gathered from all Oahu churches and other islands through the state to fill the academy gymnasium to its capacity at the Sabbath morning worship hour, hearing the message brought by Elder C. D. Watson, associate secretary of the Temperance Department of the General Conference. At the same time, the youth and earlites gathered in nearby Central Church to hear Elder E. R. Walde, president of the North Pacific Union Conference and former Hawaii pastor; and the juniors met in the school music auditorium to listen to Elder A. R. Mazat, manager of the Periodical Department of the Pacific Press Publishing Association.

Sabbath School was conducted at six campus locations for the various age groups.

Other weekend activities included the opening sermon on Friday evening by Elder Walde; a report from some of those who attended the World Youth Congress in Switzerland; a service of ordination for Pastor George R. Thayer; and the closing message by Elder Mazat. Many hundreds of loyal Adventists attended each of these meetings.

The annual Hawaiian Mission workers meeting was under the direction of Elder A. G. Streifling, president. Devotional meetings were held each morning in McKeague Hall music auditorium for all workers. For the balance of the instructional program, the elementary teachers held separate meetings in the faculty lounge. They had as their guest Miss Louise Amba of the Department of Education of Pacific Union College.

Other guests who brought inspiration and information to the worker group were Elder W. J. Blacker, president of the Pacific Union Conference; Elder J. F. Knipschild, director of the Department of Institutional Services of the Pacific Union Conference; and Miss Louise Meyer, assistant secretary of the Sabbath School Department of the General Conference.

A minimum of five instructional or devotional meetings was held daily. Various recreational and social activities provided fellowship for the worker group for the balance of the day.

By all reports, the high light of these events was a planned potluck, or luau, held at Haiku Garden in Kaneohe. After the meal, the group walked down a wooded trail to a meadow bathed in moonlight, beside a lily-covered lake, and were serenaded by a Hawaiian musical group singing from a palm-frond pavilion. It was an appropriate setting for an evening of reminiscing about the "old Hawaii" of which one reads.

After three days of counsel, planning, inspiration, and instruction, the workers returned to their various posts of duty as pastors, teachers, literature evangelists, medical missionaries, Bible instructors, administrators, departmental and office secretaries, all admonished to face the challenges of their work with courage and devotion, and to go forth with renewed vision to finish the work of the Lord here in Hawaii.

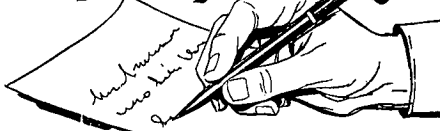

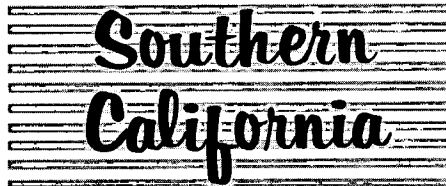

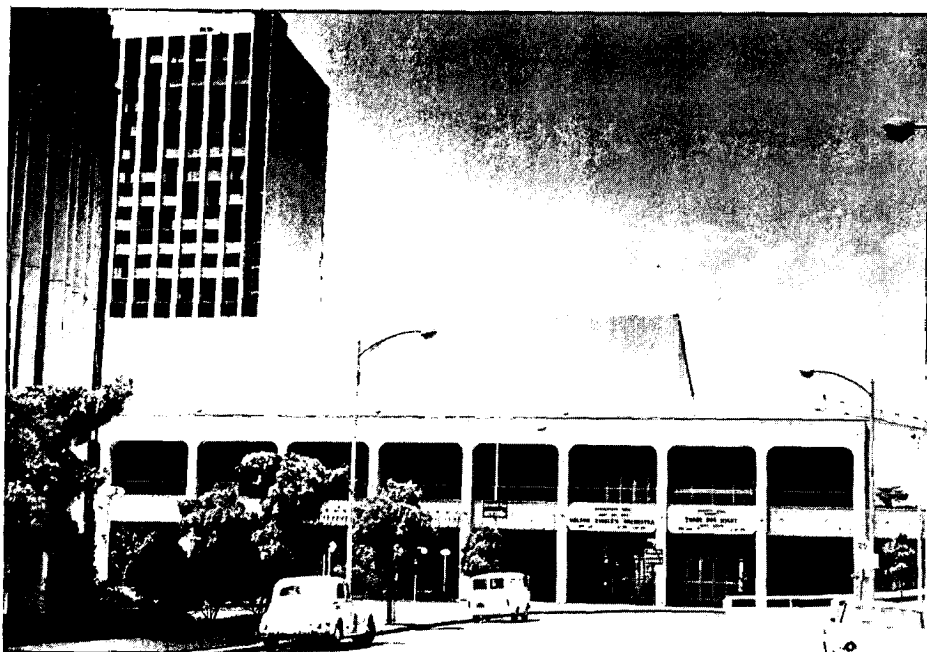
After the demonstrations by the children, Pastor Harold Rich gave a short talk of welcome and explanation of the purpose of Vacation Bible School.

Nazarene Church in Crestline Purchased by Adventist Group

Rufus Abell was placed in the Naval Hospital at Camp Pendleton to be near his parents who live in the Los Angeles area. Later he was to be moved to Letterman Hospital in San Francisco for further treatment.

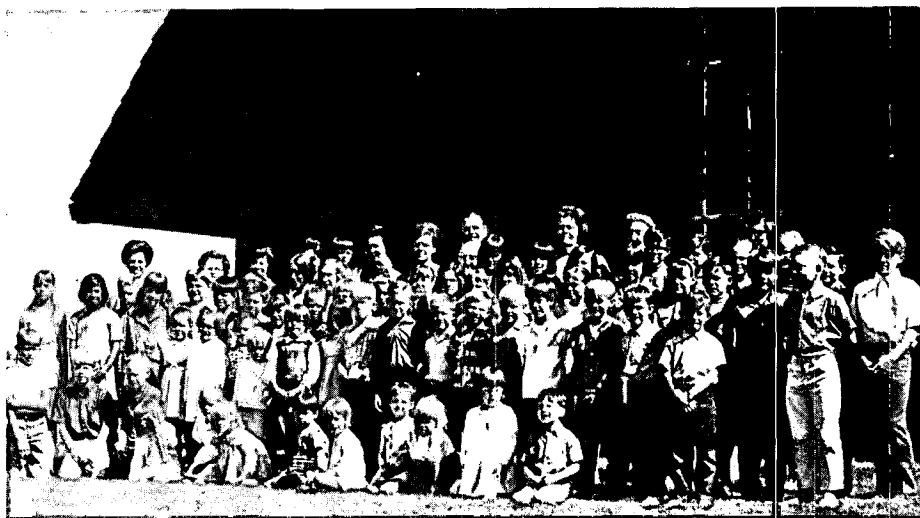

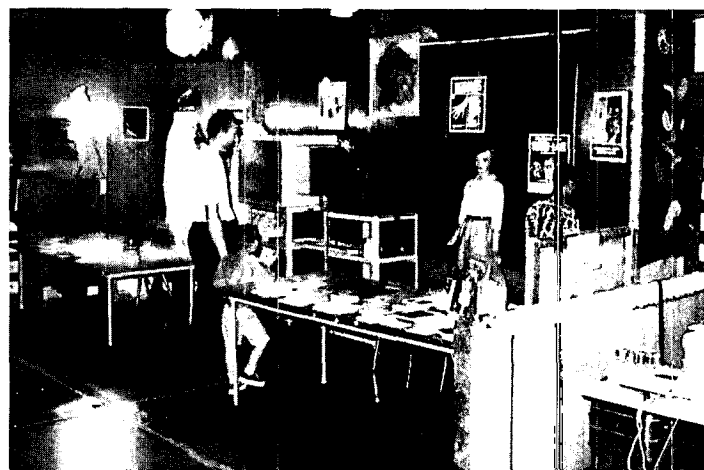
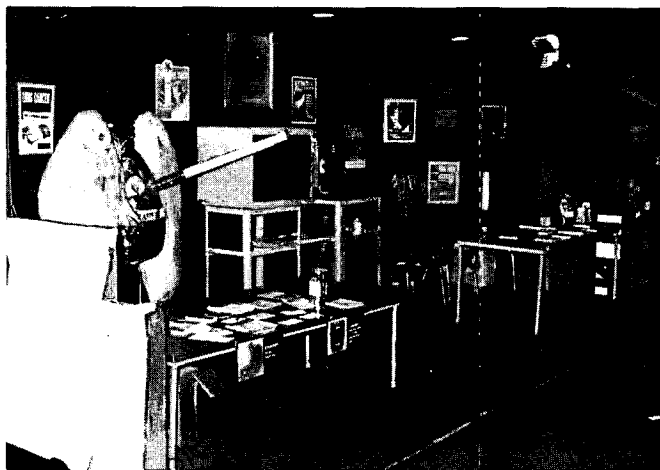

PACIFIC UNION COLLEGE

Record Number of Students Accepted for 1969-70 Term

A record-breaking total of 1,928 students have been accepted for Pacific Union College's eighty-eighth academic year, which begins September 24, and dozens of new applications continue to pour into the admissions office daily, according to Dr. James N. Scott, director of admissions and records.

The "normal" capacity of the college, in terms of its existing physical plant, is 1,600 students, Dr. Scott added, and last year the majority of residence hall rooms had three occupants instead of the two for whom they were designed.

"I just don't know where we're going to put everyone," the perplexed administrator sighed.

Enrollment for the 1968-69 year stood at 1,850, with the number resident on the

Angwin campus fluctuating between 1,750 and 1,800 during the year.

Of the 1,928 accepted for 1969-70, approximately 700 represent new students (including some 550 new entering college freshmen). The 1,928 figure is "net," not "gross," Dr. Scott explained, pointing out that the total excludes students accepted earlier who subsequently canceled their applications because of a change in plans.

Speech and Hearing Science Program Approved by State

The Pacific Union College program in speech and hearing science has now been approved for candidates desiring state certification as school audiometrists.

An announcement from the State Department of Public Health at Sacramento bringing news of this new accreditation was recently received by Dr. Norma K. Bork, associate professor of speech pathology and audiology.

Dr. Bork is also director of the college speech and hearing clinic.

A nine-quarter-hour program, all available at PUC, is necessary for certification of school audiometrists in California, Dr. Bork states. Three courses at the college meet all requirements: (1) "Anatomy and Physiology of the Speech and Hearing Mechanisms" (three hours); (2) "Introduction to Audiology" (three hours); and (3) "Aural Rehabilitation" (three hours).

A new brochure describing the academic offerings and facilities of PUC's speech clinic is now being printed and will be available for public distribution shortly, Dr. Bork added.

The speech and hearing clinic recently was the recipient of seven volumes on audiology. The donor of the \$75 gift, the Beltone Institute for Hearing Research, stipulated as a condition of the grant that the books be located in the clinic itself for use by student clinicians in their training.

Assistant Professor in Business Administration Is Appointed

Robert George Burgess, newly appointed assistant professor of business administration, comes to Pacific Union College from Taiwan where he was manager of the Taiwan Sanitarium and Hospital in Taipei. A man of varied experience, Mr. Burgess has served as secretary-treasurer of the Ceylon Union and also the Pakistan Union; credit manager of the Portland Adventist Hospital in Oregon; and assistant accountant at Washington Sanitarium and Hospital in Washington, D.C.

Robert Burgess graduated from Kingsway College Academy, Ontario, Canada, received his B.A. from Walla Walla College, and the M.A. from Andrews University.

An extremely active member in the Kiwanis Club, Prof. Burgess helped organize the first Kiwanis Club in the Republic of China and recently received two awards for outstanding service—one from the Taipei club and one from Portland, Oregon.

He is now established at PUC with his wife, Treva, and their two children, Beth and Marlowe.

Andrews University Plans 1970 European Study Tour

Plans for the 1970 Andrews University European study tour, sponsored by the English and history departments, are in progress, according to Dr. Merlene Ogden and Dr. Richard Schwarz, professors of English and history, respectively, and tour directors.

The tour, which will visit 17 countries, will leave from New York on June 8, 1970. The tour offers undergraduate or graduate credit to college students.
