GIVE FOR THE TEMPERANCE WORK ON OCTOBER 25

Men and women across the nation are turning to Seventh-day Adventists for help. People are increasingly recognizing smoking as a major health hazard; and, thank God, they also recognize that Seventh-day Adventists have developed a program that works, that has helped at least a million smokers break the habit.

NBC Television has filmed the Hinsdale Sanitarium and Hospital Five-Day Plan team and already shown these half-hour programs in Chicago, Cleveland, Washington, D.C., New York, and Los Angeles.

NBC Television in Detroit featured Dr. A. W. Weaver, an Adventist physician active in the Five-Day Plan. This resulted in a massive response—13,000 letters and 600 phone calls—all looking to Seventh-day Adventists for help.

Do temperance exhibits at fairs pay? Two thousand people signed their names in a northern California temperance booth asking for help to break the smoking habit.

The General Conference Temperance Department has developed an exciting new program to help people with a drinking problem. It is called "The Four Dimensional Key to the Cause of Alcoholism," or "The Four D.K. Program." This pro-

gram has been successfully tested in Miami and Philadelphia and will soon be added to the regular temperance arsenal.

Two new 16 mm movies have been completed during 1969: "Countdown," a space-oriented smoking film, and "A Crutch for All Seasons," a film contrasting life's natural and false dependencies. A series of four films to be used in the "Four D.K." alcohol education program will be completed by December.

Listen magazine is providing valuable information for Seventh-day Adventist adults and young people in recognizing and avoiding the drug menace.

Public school districts and health agencies picture the United States as beset with burgeoning problems of smoking, alcoholism, mental illness, and drug users. They are asking Seventh-day Adventists to join in a cooperative work in providing health education for youth to combat these social evils.

Yes, Temperance is booming! Seventh-day Adventists are being brought to the forefront. Your active and sacrificial gift is needed in the Temperance Offering on October 25 to swell the Temperance Boom.

Educator Reports on Bible Conference for Student Leaders

Jesus' promise, "My joy I leave with you," was fulfilled to overflowing at the Wawona Missionary Volunteer Bible Conference attended by student leaders, Bible teachers, and principals from all the schools of the Pacific Union October 2 to 6.

The objectives were clear: To set the stage for a spiritual awakening on each campus at the beginning of the school year; to give student leaders a vision of the potential of campus and community witnessing; and to unite the young people of the Pacific Union in a common bond of fellowship.

The radiant joy on the faces and in the voices of the students as they told of their personal witnessing experiences seemed a very fulfillment of Joel's prophecy that in the last days the youth would be blessed with an enlarged vision of the work God wants them to do.

I have seen youth in other parts of the world share in the unspeakable joy of witnessing to the love of Jesus Christ, but never have I seen such a free and spontaneous spiritual movement on the part of our young people in America.

One missionary group working in a city near one of our academies found a hitchhiker bearing all the outward adornment of the disenchanted youth of our generation. They asked him to a meal at their center and invited him to follow Jesus.

This young man lingered awhile and then began slowly to share in their activities. Soon he surprised the group by appearing smooth shaven. Next he appeared with a full haircut. These external

changes were mere symbols of the complete reformation inside his life. Today he is attending Pacific Union College, a baptized member of the remnant church.

An entire town was touched with a singing group and deeply moved by the sight of clean-cut young people joyously sharing their faith and love of Jesus Christ.

The stories of these academy and college youth read like the next chapter to the book of Acts, and in reality this is an extension of the work of the same Spirit. As one of the visitors remarked, "It seems as if God is preparing the young people for the very closing days of this world."

Dr. E. Stanley Chace, of Walla Walla College, spoke at the Sabbath sermon hour on the privilege and joy of personal, one-to-one witnessing whether it be on the campus, at the airport, in the streets, or in public meetings. Hungry hearts are everywhere.

Elder Clark Smith, of the General Conference, spoke earnestly in the keynote address of the witness our servicemen are continually bearing.

God does have an army of earnest youth who are even now standing as His witnesses and who are preparing for greater achievements. The plans for this year as reported at the last meeting reveal courage and faith on every campus.

Tragedy Strikes at PUC—Two Students Are Attacked

Tragedy struck the Pacific Union College campus late Sabbath, September 27, when two young people—one a student and the other a former student back for a weekend visit—were attacked by a hooded assailant as they sat reminiscing about school life and classmates on the shore of a cove at Lake Berryessa, a county park 20 miles from campus.

Cecelia Ann Shepard of Loma Linda, 22, a fifth-year senior music major at the University of California, Riverside, and Bryan Hartnell of Oregon, 20, PUC junior prelaw major, were stabbed repeatedly by a man police believe to be a sexual psychopath.

A Chinese fisherman from San Francisco, passing by on the lake, sounded an alarm and summoned an ambulance. Park rangers immediately converged upon the scene by water and road to assist the stricken youth until medical assistance could arrive.

Both were taken to Queen of the Valley Hospital, Napa, where they underwent emergency surgery and were placed in the intensive care unit for observation and further treatment.

Cecelia, who was stabbed about 10 times, lived about 45 hours before she passed away. Bryan, who was knifed six or seven times, remained in "critical" condition in the hospital's ICU for five days before his condition improved to "satisfactory" and he was transferred to a semiprivate room.

Prayer and Anointing

On the morning following the attack, while both young people were still fighting for their lives, a service of special prayer and anointing was conducted for each at the hospital by Elders Robert W. Olson and Roger W. Coon of the PUC religion department.

Cecelia gave up the unequal struggle on Monday, September 29, at 3:45 p.m., and her funeral was held in the college sanctuary the following Thursday afternoon, October 2.

It was attended by more than a thousand former teachers, classmates, and friends. The service was covered by field film units from three Bay Area television stations.

The funeral sermon was preached by Elder Ted Wick, college youth pastor. He was assisted by Elders Robert Olson,

close friend of the family, and Ervin L. Sorensen, a former missionary colleague of the slain girl's parents in India.

Cecelia was born at Nuzvid, South India, on New Year's Day, 1947.

The graveside ceremony at St. Helena Cemetery was conducted by Elder Carl Coffman, a distant relative. Six former classmates served as pallbearers, and ten others as ushers. Music for the service was provided by the Collegiate Chorale, directed by Prof. James Kempster, and by soloists from among Cecelia's wide circle of friends on campus.

The daughter of Elder and Mrs. Robert Shepard, Cecelia was a graduate of San Gabriel Academy. She attended the La Sierra campus of Loma Linda University for two years, and Pacific Union College two years. Her father teaches physics and mathematics at Loma Linda Academy.

Bryan, whose father, Elder Calvin Hartnell, is chaplain of the Portland Adventist Hospital, hopes to return to his studies soon. He has studied at both PUC and Walla Walla College.

An intensive manhunt for the killer, still at large, continues by the Napa County Sheriff's Department as these lines are being written. Local law enforcement officers are being assisted by two investigators from the California State Department of Justice, Criminal Investigation, Sacramento.

Police theorize that the attack is linked to three previous murders committed several months ago in the Vallejo area of neighboring Solano County. There are a number of similarities between the Berryessa slaying and the Vallejo killings, some details of which are still being kept secret by the investigating authorities.

A campus pastor has been assigned to the La Sierra Campus of Loma Linda University by the Southeastern California Conference with the beginning of the fall semester. Elder David D. 
Palomar Nature Club Presents Two Disney Films at La Sierra

For the first time in the history of the La Sierra Church, a minister has been appointed whose main responsibility is that of caring for the personal spiritual needs of the student body. THOUSANDS ATTEND NORTHERN CALIFORNIA YOUTH CONGRESS

On September 19 and 20 thousands of young people and friends of young people assembled at the Sacramento Memorial Auditorium for the 1969 Northern California Youth Congress. Approximately four thousand were in attendance at the weekend event.

The speaker for the opening night was Elder James Londis who told the story of his conversion to Christ. He grew up as a poor boy in Coney Island. He belonged to a gang that often was in trouble with the law. His interest was awakened by the kindness of a young Adventist minister who was giving studies to relatives. When he was converted he succeeded in arousing the interest of a friend who was vice president of their Coney Island gang. This other boy also came into the church and is now a prominent minister.

The congress was climaxed by a commitment service in which Elder Londis spoke once again. He told of how God had blessed his efforts to witness as a teenager, and challenged all present to give their lives in service. Scores of youth came forward in the appeal that he made.

Tremendous music was provided at the congress by the five academies in the conference, Sacramento, Lodi, Pacific Union College Preparatory School, Golden Gate, and Rio Lindo. The Capitol City Church of Sacramento also provided some fine music.

Messages were sent to the congress from President Nixon, Governor Reagan, and Lt. Governor Reinecke. A speech was given at the Sabbath morning worship service by State Senator John Harmer, as a representative of Governor Reagan. He gave a ringing appeal to return to traditional standards of morality to stop the moral erosion that is taking place in our society.

Mission Family Bible Study Program at Monument Valley

Just inaugurated is our Mission Family Bible Study program. This plan is for the mission families to visit once a week with their "adopted" Navajo family for the purpose of Bible study and fellowship. Often a meal is shared before the study. Every family at the mission is participating in the program.

Tom Holliday and I are beginning a series of meetings each Wednesday morning over at the Katso camp.

Sunday, September 21, another "first" was recorded at Monument Valley. Tom and I were flown to an appointment 25 miles southeast of Mexican Hat over some of the roughest desert country. It usually takes one and one-half hours one way by auto. In the mission aircraft one way was 13 minutes. We make this trip every Sunday afternoon and hold a church service. Attendance is anywhere from five to 25. The cost for the use of the aircraft is about \$4.75.

We have again started our branch Sunday School at the Kayenta Indian Boarding School. The Presbyterians have 200 children in attendance; we have 130 or more and the Latter-day Saints about 60. We leave the mission at 7:45 each Sunday morning and arrive to conduct our four classes about 8:45. In every case, the parent of each child must sign him up before he is allowed to attend a particular church program.


Las Vegas Church Delegate to Youth Congress Gives Report

THE VOICE OF HOPE RETURNS TO THE AIR WAVES IN HAWAII

The Voice of Hope Ilocano radio program is returning to the Hawaii air waves, beginning Sunday, October 19, at 7 a.m.

Elder Victor Aladen, who had previously spoken on this broadcast for some 14 years, will be presenting Biblical and doctrinal presentations over Station KAIM,

870 kc, in Honolulu. KAIM is a 5,000 watt station which covers the entire island chain, and at times can be heard as far away as the Johnson Islands, and is both an AM and an FM station.

Elder Aladen will also offer the Bible correspondence lessons in the Ilocano dialect.

Baptism at Kaimuki Is the Largest on World Baptism Day

Hawaii's largest baptism on World Baptism Day was held in the Kaimuki Church, Sabbath morning, September 27. Twelve new members were added to the church.

This was the largest single baptism in Kaimuki in the memory of most of the members. Also it was a day of special rejoicing for the laymen of the church, as 11 of the 12 candidates were readied for baptism by the efforts of lay members, past and present, of the Kaimuki Church.



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Petaluma Publisher Speaks to Student Assembly October 9

Ross P. Game, publisher of the Petaluma *Argus-Courier*, spoke to the Pacific Union College student assembly on "What's Right With Today's Young People" Thursday, October 9, in the second of a series of addresses on contemporary society.

Lead-off speaker October 2 was Rolf Peterson, American Broadcasting Company commentator heard nightly on KGO-TV, Channel 7, San Francisco.

Before assuming his present position in early September, Mr. Game served as managing editor of the *Napa Register* for 11 years, and, as such, was a frequent visitor and guest speaker on campus.

At the close of his address in Pacific Auditorium, Mr. Game was presented with a desk set upon which a gold cordless electric clock, pen, and four-inch bronze figure of a newsboy hawking his wares were mounted on an Italian marble base, together with an engraved gold plate honoring him for more than a decade of distinguished service to the people of Napa Valley.

The award was presented by Myron Widmer, newly-elected editor-in-chief of the Student Association fortnightly, the *Campus Chronicle*, on behalf of the office of college relations.

Following the assembly period Mr. Game spoke to the newswriting class of Mrs. Ila Zbaraschuk on the subject of the journalism profession as viewed from the standpoint of a newspaper editor and publisher.

At noon an informal buffet luncheon was held in his honor, attended by college administrators and faculty, Student Association representatives, and some of Mr. Game's former colleagues, members of the working press of Napa County.

On October 1 the Total Number of Students Registered Was 1,863

As of 12 noon on October 1, seven days after the beginning of class instruction for the Autumn Quarter at Pacific Union College, a total of 1,863 students were registered, according to Dr. James N. Scott, director of admissions and records.

This figure includes 43 enrolled for the Adventist Year Abroad program, and another 95 nursing students on the Glendale

Adventist Hospital campus in southern California.

The total "full-time-equivalent" for fall term registration is approximately 1,760, Dr. Scott said. This is a more accurate figure for comparing the enrollment of one college with another than is the "head count" which includes anyone registered for one course or more.

The FTE for 1969-70 is some one hundred higher than for last year at this time, he added.

Residence halls on campus claim 1,165 students—613 in three women's dormitories and 552 in the two men's homes, a net gain of 16 over last year which marked the "population explosion" in these units. Crowded conditions continue this year, with rooms originally built for two occupants being obliged to serve three and even four students.

Special permission to live off campus has been granted to 150 students this quarter who would normally be living in dormitories, thus easing congestion somewhat. Last year 70 students were given such permission in the autumn quarter, but the figure rose to 120 by year-end.

Only 164 students (8.8 percent of total enrollment) have come from North American Division union conference territories outside the Pacific Union; and 54 foreign students, from 23 different nations, account for 2.9 percent of the quarter's enrollment.

Pacific Union College Given Unrestricted Grant of \$1,000

An unrestricted grant of \$1,000 has been given to Pacific Union College by The United States Steel Foundation, Inc., announced Dr. Floyd O. Rittenhouse, college president.

The grant was given as part of the foundation's 1969 program of aid to higher education. Because of its unrestricted classification, it may be allocated to any area college officials select.

President Rittenhouse said the money will be used in the college's general operating fund.

Esther Ambs Is President of Adventist Dietetic Association

Esther D. Ambs, director of food services at Pacific Union College, has begun a one-year term as president of the Seventh-day Adventist Dietetic Association. She took office during the association's annual meeting recently on the combined campus of Columbia Union College and Washington Sanitarium and Hospital in Washington, D.C.


While in the East, Miss Ambs also attended the week-long Fifth International Congress on Nutrition in Washington. This was the first time the congress had been held in the United States. More than 7,000 delegates from 27 countries attended.

The dietitian reports one of the most interesting outcomes of the meeting was that some non-Adventist delegates told of an increasing trend among their people toward adopting a lacto-ovo diet, long practiced by many Adventists.

She predicted that more and more non-Adventists will accept this diet as information on flesh foods becomes available.
