Loma Linda Foods indicates that during 1971 their organization paid almost \$14,000 for labels that were turned in through the Sabbath schools. Since this label-saving plan was inaugurated many years ago, a total of \$276,871.97 has found its way into the mission budget of the church.

On Sabbath, April 8, all of the churches in the North American Division will be given the opportunity of donating to an offering that will be used to provide scholarships for young people who are students at our Theological Seminary or the School of Graduate Studies of Andrews University. These are worthy young people who merit our assistance as they prepare to serve the church either as ministers or teachers. Thank you for anything that you can do as the April 8 date approaches.

A recent report indicates that only 17,561 copies of the Review & Herald are arriving in our Union each week. The mailing list for the Pacific Union Recorder is 43,000 which approximates the number of homes represented in the Union Conference membership. This would indicate that more than half of our homes are not receiving the Review. If you are not a subscriber, please give this matter some serious consideration. There is no better way of keeping up with the work of the church throughout the world field than by becoming a regular subscriber to and reader of our church paper.

Speeches were given by history and German teacher William Dutton, Principal Robert Hamilton, and board member Dr. Thaine Price.

Mr. Dutton talked about the history of the academy, tracing it back to the Centralia school, perhaps the first Seventh-day Adventist school in California.

Elder Hamilton discussed the school's

need for the new building, emphasizing the shortage of classroom space and the need for a place where school and church groups could meet for recreational activi-

Dr. Price told where the money was going to come from. Fullerton Church Purchases Artificial Limb for a One-armed Pastor in Burma

Little Victor Kipzanang, 9, was small even for his tender years. He got lost in the crowds of other children in the North Chin Hills of Burma. However, he was old enough to work in the rice mills where he worked alongside other children until that day when the accident happened. Victor lost his arm above his elbow and began life, hard enough in that region, without his right hand.

Defying the handicap, the young lad gained an education in an American Seventh-day Adventist mission school. In spite of the odds, he completed his education at Spicer College in Poona, India, and be-

came a minister.

The year before Pastor Kipzanang was ordained, in 1969, he was first-place in soul-winning endeavors in the conference. Continuing his successful efforts, in spite of the fact that 85 per cent of the Burmese people are Buddhist, the young minister baptized another 25 during the last quarter of 1971.

The story became known to Oscar and Jerry Lund of the Fullerton Adventist Church last year when Pastor and Mrs. Frank Wyman addressed La Sierra College alumni on Alumni Day. The Wymans were long-time missionaries in Burma, but were forced to leave the country when the Adventist hospital was nationalized. According to the Wymans, many nurses and teachers could no longer work in the American sanitarium and hospital at Rangoon. Those who worked so hard for so many years for their countrymen there are now living in poverty in isolated places, according to the Wymans.

The missionary couple supplied Oscar

and Jerry Lund with names of persons needing and deserving help in Burma, and the Lunds chose the name of Victor Kip-

zanang, the one-armed pastor.

With the help of many other members of the Fullerton Church, a series of mailings began between this city and the hills of Burma. The primary and junior divi-sions sent Crayolas and song books. The home missionary department sent Bible-lesson papers, and the Dorcas sent clothing. Pencils and yardage remnants were supplied by a Baptist church, music instruction books came from local music teachers, and soap came from an Anaheim motel.

Mrs. Jerry Lund also sent many items from Martin Luther Hospital in Anaheim, where she is employed. She also became dedicated to a new project when she read a line from the Burma minister's letter thanking them for the items sent.

Included in the box was a bunch of outdated rubber surgeon's gloves. Pastor Kipzanang wrote, "After receiving one box of supplies, I find an operating hand glove which I could use when I perform bap-tism. My right artificial hand is getting

very old. It is made of wood and is pealing away. I must be very careful with it if it is to last much longer and I must especially keep it out of water. The gloves, therefore, are very helpful." The message set many local people to work and Mrs. Lund headed up the effort.

Correlating details between the Bur-mese family and local medical personnel to ascertain correct features, dimensions, color and availability of a correct prosthe-sis, was the first step. Various companies were contacted and exact measurements of the deteriorating artificial arm now being worn by Pastor Kipzanang had to be determined. The limb, to be made here, fits over the artificial arm that extends from above the elbow, nearly to the wrist.

After months of work, including interviews with local persons who have been to that section of Burma, the hand and connection was completed. This week, the hand is on its way to the hardworking little minister.

Because of the efforts of many people in this area, including the Fullerton Dorcas Society, the new prosthesis is now in the mail to the rugged teakwood forests in Burma. Victor Kipzanang will no longer have to wear a rubber glove to protect a crumbling artificial hand when he "performs baptism."


