OF INTEREST TO CANVASSERS.

At this time much is being said in regard to the canvassing work. We think those interested in that very important branch of the message will be benefited and encouraged by the following from the pen of Sister White:—

"In order to enlighten souls it is not necessary to bring up controverted points of doctrine, and thus create opposition. Christ is the center of all our faith and hope. Those who can preach the matchless love of God, those who with softened hearts can lift up Jesus, and inspire hearts to give him their best and holiest affections, are doing a high and holy work. By diligence in canvassing, by faithfully presenting to the people the cross of Calvary, the canvasser doubles his power of usefulness. But while we present these methods of work, we can not lay out an undeviating line, in which every one shall move, for circumstances alter cases. God will impress those whose hearts are open to truth, who are longing for guidance, and he will say to his human agent, Speak to this one or that one of the love of Jesus. No sooner is the name of Jesus mentioned in love and tenderness than angels of God draw near, and soften and subdue the heart.

"Doctrines of all kinds are proclaimed with no special effect; for men will seek to press upon them their doctrines; but when the matchless love of Jesus is dwelt upon, the grace of Christ is there to make its impression upon the heart. There are many who are sincerely seeking for light, who know not what they must do to be saved. O tell them of the love of God, of the sacrifice Christ made on Calvary's cross to save souls from perishing! Tell them to place their will on the side of God's will, and the Lord will open the way before them. Tell them, 'If any will do his

BROTHER W. H. COFFIN, State agent for the North Pacific Tract Society, writes to us as follows :—

A brother who has been hauling wood for about ten years has felt for some time that the Lord wanted him in the canvassing work. He has quit the wood business, offers his team for sale, and learned a canvass for "Heralds of the Morning." He and I went out Wednesday, called on eleven families, securing eight orders, seven for the best binding.

Another brother who disposed of his store to engage in the canvassing work, without taking time to make any other preparation than to read over the printed canvass, secured fifteen orders in his first eleven hours' work. Total value, \$22, thus making a profit of one dollar per hour. LETTER FROM INDIA.

WE are in receipt of the following letter from Brother W. W. Quantock, who spent a number of years in the Battle Creek College preparing himself for work in the Master's vineyard. Last spring he received a call from the Foreign Mission Board to make India his future field of labor.

Review and Herald.

DEAR BRETHREN: I had a very pleasant trip all the way from America. I spent three weeks in England, and arrived in Calcutta on March 2, the rest of the company having reached here three weeks before. When I arrived here, Brethren Yeoman and Richardson had been out in the field about two weeks, and were doing good work.

I remained in Calcutta about ten days in order to make preparations for my work in the field. I then went to Allahabad to meet Brother Yeoman, with whom I was to work. However, I was not permitted to remain in the field long, as I was called to act as secretary and treasurer of the International Tract Society here. I have now been in the office three weeks, and am much pleased with my work.

While canvassing, my largest day's sales was six orders for one of our large publications, and the average per week between twenty-five and thirty orders. We are selling many books, when we take into consideration the few workers in the field. Brother Richardson secured forty-nine orders one week, and his last week's report shows thirty-two orders.

There are advantages and disadvantages in the canvassing work here the same as in America.

The weather at present is about 105° in the shade, so you see it is quite warm. Most of the people go to the mountains during the hot weather, where it is cooler.

The work in all its various branches is making good progress. We are meeting with quite a little opposition from the other denominations, but this only has a tendency to cause us to draw nearer to the Lord, and put our trust wholly in him.

The manners and customs of the people here are much different from those of the people in the United States.

Glad to hear of the good experiences you have been having in the College since I left. How are the canvassing classes getting along?

I am of good courage in the Lord, and rejoice in the gospel of the third angel's message.

THE CANVASSING WORK IN WALLA WALLA COLLEGE.

It was thought best by those in charge of our work that I should devote some time to the canvassing work in Walla Walla College, and arrange a course of study for the students who were planning to engage in this branch of the Lord's work.

There is quite a missionary spirit among both teachers and students, a seeming desire to be engaged in some branch of the work, letting the Lord do the choosing.

Two or three of the teachers, and some twenty-five students, will take up the canvassing work during the summer vacation. A good feature in the work is that three fourths of this number will work for our large books.

We have daily classes in "The Desire of Ages," "Great Controversy," "Prophecies of Jesus," and "Heralds of the Morning."

We are sure that there will be many books sold in the three conferences represented in this canvassing class, — Montana, Upper Columbia, and North Pacific. The times have been and are prosperous in this part of the district. The Upper Columbia Conference last year placed more dollars' worth of our books in the field, we understand, than any other conference for the number of agents at work.

From all indications, the canvassing work in both the North Pacific and Upper Columbia Conference has received new life. The conference officers are planning to push this branch of the Lord's work also.

New plans are being tried which we believe will prove a blessing to the canvassers, and place many earnest workers in the field.

ON THE RIGHT SIDE.

WE are in receipt of the following encouraging words from Prof. W. T. Bland, President of Union College, Nebraska, in regard to the canvassing work, setting forth the importance of training workers for this line of missionary work:—

In regard to the canvassing work, I will say that I have always taken a deep interest in this matter, and for several years have in every possible way encouraged our students to take up this line of work. I have found that it was one of the most satisfactory branches of the work that our young people can engage in, and that many of them, after having received proper training, and becoming somewhat enthused with their work, being made to feel that it is as important a branch of the Lord's work as any other in the denomination, have taken hold of it in earnest, and have made it a success.

Where I have been connected with our schools I have advised, and even insisted, that a course of trainings should be carried on to prepare young people especially for this work. In the South I know that this has been very successfully done.

Union College ought to send out a large number of earnest young people throughout this district to handle our publications, and with the right encouragement I believe that it can be made a success. We have many bright young people here preparing for various lines of work, who would find the experience in canvassing very helpful to them, and they would be doing great good at the same time.

I am quite sure that canvassers can and should be trained in all of our schools. We are planning to have in connection with Union College a canvassers' institute, especially for the benefit of the students, which will begin June 5. I have invited the canvassing agents from the different States to be present and give instruction, using their influence with the young people to induce and encourage them to take up this work during the summer.

Our summer vacation will last for four months, and this will be a splendid opportunity for them to do good work in this line. Times are brightening up quite generally, and I see no reason why the canvassing work should not make a much stronger growth than it has had during the past few years. I shall do all I can in this line, for I am interested in it, believing it to be a part of the Lord's work, and shall appreciate anything you can do for us, or any suggestions you may have to make.

THE SECRET OF SUCCESS.

OUR success in any work depends largely upon the energy that we put into it. Canvassers can not expect to succeed unless they keep right out in the field, and constantly apply themselves to their business. . . . At one time I knew a canvasser to take first premium because of his success in taking orders, and I afterward asked him how he managed to succeed. . . . He told me that the secret of his success lay in the fact that he applied himself more constantly than any one else. . . . Customers are not very apt to hunt up a salesman who is expected to go out into the field to work. He must go and hunt up the people. When he gets to them, he must make known his business with proper energy and tact, and as soon as he has finished one customer, let him immediately hunt another; and so on, day after day, week in and week out. If the thing he is selling is worthy, he will most certainly succeed in disposing of it. . . . The successful canvasser is scarcely controlled by circumstances; but, being a success, he largely controls circumstances, and for this reason he sells books.

I meet a good many young people who ought to be doing something to forward the message. I am sure that many of them could succeed in this good work if they would take hold of it with faith, and follow it with energy. Of course, discouragements will be met in this work, for the enemy tries to hinder everything that is good; but obstacles overcome only prove to be helpful in the end. Those who labor in this work should be like the Master, of whom it is said, "He shall not fail nor be discouraged until he hath set judgment in the earth." This should be the canvassers motto. If it is, he will not fail nor leave his field until the work is done.— *Wm. Covert, in the Wisconsin Reporter.*

"ONE OF THE BEST TEACHERS."

HAVE you ever heard expressed a fear that our periodicals might prejudice readers, particularly when they have contained plain truths? We have heard of those who have heard of others who have feared such a fear, but we are a long way from believing that truth rightly presented will prejudice honest hearts. We know of a sister who was giving Bible readings and distributing literature in one of our large cities. An old and supposedly careful plan of presenting "present truth" was being pursued with one family who were interested, the "plan" being to lead up

gradually to a consideration of the "Sabbath question."

At one of her regular calls the worker left a bundle of papers. After leaving, the sister, to her dismay, discovered that a copy of the *Signs* containing a symposium on the Sabbath was among the papers. "That settles the matter," was her verdict; "I fear they will be so prejudiced now that they will not care to have anything more to do with us, for I have said nothing about the Sabbath question yet."

Something prevented her calling on the family for several weeks, but she had concluded in the meantime to give a reading on the Sabbath question the first thing, and undo, if possible, the mischief that had been done (?) by the *Signs* with its silent message. With fear and trembling the matter was broached at her next call. To her intense amazement she was met by the statement that they had all been keeping the Sabbath for several weeks,—in short, from the time the *Signs*, packed full of information on the subject, had been left with them. On Monday I walked ten miles out into the country, and secured orders for "The Coming King" to the amount of \$13 for my first day's work. Tuesday it rained, so that I could not work, and on Friday I only worked two hours. My total sales for the week amounted to \$50.55. The Lord has blessed me, and I have learned much since coming here.

"THE DESIRE OF AGES."
