A MONG the most potent forces that go to build up the spiritual life and aggressiveness of Seventh-day

Adventists is the camp-meeting. It is one of those contributory factors to the peculiarity of Seventh-day Adventists the world around. The annual gatherings have brought new hope and courage to many a struggling, faltering member; they have afforded vigour and freshness to the experience of those who, though already staunch and unwavering, were climbing with difficulty the upward way.

Some Startling Facts

For the past three years this Division has made a splendid showing in mission offerings as compared with the rest of the world-field. This has given us cause for much gratitude. However, we need to pause once in a while to check up on our *per capita* as church members and thus see where we stand. The following figures ought to stir our hearts anew to greater faithfulness in giving. I sincerely trust such will be the case. Now let us consider the figures.

While Brother Claude Conard, auditor for the General Conference, was with us recently he gave very careful study to many phases of our work. One thing he drew special attention to during his visit had reference to the position of our mission offerings. He certainly pointed out some very interesting, as well as some most startling facts. Feeling it would be helpful also to our people to learn what he discovered, we are passing the information on to you.

As you doubtless know there are two main sources from which we receive our mission funds here in South Africa: first, the Sabbath school, and other general mission offerings, and second, the Harvest Ingathering. The question naturally arises, therefore, which source furnishes the most money for our great missionary programme. Now a few figures from Brother Conard will suffice to tell the story. He deals with the period of time from 1927 to 1935. Let us take a look at what he found. Here it is.

In 1927 our total funds were made up in this way: £3,313-7-8 from Harvest Ingathering receipts, while £5,811-15-11 came through the offerings from our own mem-This means that 36.3% came bership. through the Harvest Ingathering whereas 63.7% came through the Sabbath school and other mission offerings from week to week. However, sad to say, a great change has come in the figures during the last few years. While the receipts from the Harvest Ingathering have been steadily on the increase, our own offerings have been on the decline. This you will note from the next comparison I shall give you. This comparison should not only interest you, but should deeply concern and stir the heart of every Sabbath keeper in Southern Africa. Here are the figures:

During 1935 the Harvest Ingathering receipts totalled $\pounds7,841-5-4$, while the church and Sabbath school offerings gave us the figure of $\pounds4,182-3-3$. This means that 65.2% came to us through the Harvest Ingathering, whereas only 34.8% came through the church and Sabbath school offerings. In other words the Ingathering from 1927 to 1935 increased from 36.3% to 65.2%, while our own gifts to missions decreased from 63.7% to the very, very


low figure of 34.8%. Certainly these are figures that relate a very sad situation, a situation which ought not to be!

Really my dear brethren and sisters, while I knew that our giving had fallen off somewhat during the recent years of depression, I did not realise the decline had been so much. To fall from 63.8% to the low ebb of 34.8% is a tremendous drop, and is a record of which we cannot feel wery proud. In fact I am sure that with me, you very greatly regret this terrible decline in our mission giving.

Well, the question is, WHAT ARE WE GOING TO DO ABOUT IT? Personally I feel this percentage in giving ought to be greatly changed for the better during the present year, don't you? I know you do! In fact it *must* be changed, for the needs and opportunities were never greater for doing aggressive work than NOW.

As we start the new year, let us unite in a mighty effort to bring our per capita giving to a more favourable showing in the eyes of the Lord. I earnestly appeal to you to help us achieve such an end. I feel confident that the figures which Brother Conard has given us cannot help but make a deep and lasting impression upon each heart and mind of our constituency here in Africa.

As I leave the matter with you for your prayerful and serious consideration, it is with the hope that 1937 will witness an upward trend in our mission funds received from all of our churches. Surely the Lord would have it to be so! The demands of the cause loudly call that it should be so. All of this being true, I know we shall each unite with the other in a new devotion and determination to make it so. *May God help us to do our best!*

Likewise it affords an excellent opportunity to demonstrate what a power for good a well-organised school can be in the onward march of our large missions programme in every part of the field.

During the morning service, the writer chose to base his remarks upon that beautiful verse of Scripture found in Psalm 144:12, which reads: "That our sons may be as plants grown up in their youth; that our daughters may be as corner stones, polished after the similitude of a palace."

It was pointed out that this text contains the ideal of heaven, the church and the home, for the student body now attending Helderberg College. Some very practical lessons were drawn, and the hope expressed that all present might be as tender, vigorous, plants in God's great garden, growing up to bear fruit to the glory and the praise of His name, also that each one might be polished after the character of Christ, the chief Corner Stone, reflecting the virtues of purity, integrity, and the righteousness of Him who hath called them from darkness into His marvellous light. Seemingly a very deep impression for good was made upon the entire congregation.

At the present writing just over 160 have been enrolled. Within the next few weeks, the principal and the business manager conservatively expect the enrolment to reach the 185 mark. Let us unite in humble, sincere prayer that the present year may prove to be the most blessed of all ever experienced at our beloved school,— Helderberg College.

A Reverie of the Future

Malamulo Mission Training Institute

A FEW months ago I was requested to write an article for the OUTLOOK on the subject of "A Survey of Progress," but this time the subject assigned is just the opposite. Anticipation! A visionary ideal! A dream of the future! What a contrast or change from a retrospect of progress!

We are to attempt great things for the Lord and expect great things from Him. Our command is, "Launch out into the deep." Our promise is, "Lo, I am with you alway." Surely we have cause to face the coming year with confidence and zeal. It is not our work and we do not have to do it alone. We have every reason to have courage and enthusiasm as we think of the magnanimous generosity of the promises of God. During my ten years' stay at Malamulo I have never faced a new year that looked more hopeful.

Training Institute

At times during past years we have been incredibly under-staffed. At one time I was alone on the mission and had charge of all departments — the training school, office, farm, etc. At that time there was no doctor and only one nursing sister in the medical department.

What a different story now! We have a fully-qualified head master for the school and five full or part-time European teachers to assist him. Never before have we been able to say that one person has absolutely no other duties aside from school problems. We are sure that all attainments of the past will have to step aside for new records. Although we are determined to raise the standards educationally we are just as determined to keep the true balance and ever make first things first. We recognise that education is just a means to an end and that the end is the salvation of souls.

As we start this new year we have 114 picked students in the teachers' training classes all of whom are loyal Seventh-day Adventists. We also have an excellent staff of native teachers. So with God's rich blessings upon our efforts what can we not expect to accomplish?

Girls' Work

It was not until a few months ago that we could boast of a full-time girls' worker who was giving her full and undivided attention to girls' work and problems. With a full-time worker, who has had two years' experience, a new industrial building, and a well-trained native staff, visualise the possibilities that lie before us in this department, and then permit your imagination to sweep you off into the realms of accomplishment that, as yet, have not been experienced in our work in this part of the field.

Village Welfare Work

Again the prospects are amazingly attractive. Mrs. Robinson with all of her teaching and domestic experience is well qualified to continue the splendid work already begun.

Medical Department

The outlook in this department is good. It has been almost two years since Dr. Marcus left on furlough, but we hope that within a few weeks we will be fully staffed again. The native orderlies' class has had time to take shape and therefore a better and more efficient staff is ours for the future.

In the leper colony we have introduced the community garden plan and we trust that this will make it possible for us to take in more lepers at less expense.

Industries

The future for all industries is bright. The printing department has just received a $\pounds75$ gift to be used as a trust fund to purchase paper stocks. We have been able to purchase several pieces of equipment such as type, perforators, etc., during the past year.

All of the other industries are running in full swing and are doing commendable work. Our dairy is proud of its new threeroomed building. The basketry is finding an outlet in Salisbury for a large amount of its productions. It gives every promise of a successful future.

New Homes

It has been voted to build two new dwellings for Europeans. When Elder H. T. Elliott visited Africa, you will remember in his reports he mentioned the fact that Malamulo buildings were not too imposing. For a long time we have wanted to remove the old tumbled-down coffee barns and put up decent dwellings. Now — 1937 is our time to start. Two houses will be built this year. Soon the old landmarks will be gone.

Our Dreams

I cannot close this reverie without mentioning some of our needs.

"Malamulo is no health resort" is an old expression. One reason is because of its abominable water supply. Soon, we hope, a decent water supply will be available and that we will have piped water throughout the institution.

Every night approximately twenty-five petrol and paraffin lamps are cleaned and lit to give their dim flickering light to European workers' houses and to the medical and educational departments. Some day we hope to have electric lights, not as a luxury, but as an economical necessity.

We need funds to complete our new church, for another dwelling for Europeans, to build isolation wards at the native hospital, for permanent brick huts for patients' friends and relatives who are visiting here, approximately fifty pounds for a model home to be a part of the girls' compound, beds for the girl's homes, desks for the school, and many more things.

Conclusion

During the past two years a score or more visionary ideals have materialised and, therefore, as we face this new year with the brightest of prospects we take renewed courage and have increased confidence and are sure that our hopes will be realised.

We pledge ourselves again to the task that lies before us. We ask you to remember us in your prayers, asking God's blessing to be upon us, as we endeavour to do our part in warning this part of the world field that has been trusted into our hands.

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Pentecostal Experiences in Nigeria

OUR recent camp-meetings in Ibo country have been excellent. A spirit of courageous enthusiasm pervaded the gatherings. Our two Yoruba pastors returned to their own field much encouraged. It was a new experience for them to attend a camp-meeting with five thousand believers present. Today a new record of the acts of the Holy Spirit is being written. Perhaps a few experiences may be of interest.

Africans generally indulge in long sermons, but our worker told how he had preached a "short but scaring sermon" which resulted in the conversion of several fetish worshippers. Another related the story of a young woman who had been possessed of evil spirits for a long time. Tortured by these spirits she had no peace and lived mostly in the forest. Finally she came into contact with our teacher, and through earnest prayer was delivered from the evil spirits and converted to the third angel's message. Now her mother, sisters and others have joined our church.

A poor woman had been seriously ill for nineteen years. She had spent large sums of money paying fetish doctors and making expensive offerings to the displeased gods. Still the disease continued unabated until Teacher Marcus told her of the Great Physician. Prayer was offered and a remarkable cure took place. The Lord is honouring the strong faith of these simple people. Answers to prayer are widely spoken of throughout the surrounding villages, and are followed by the conversion of many.

Two years ago I reported the conversion of a notorious medicine man. He burned his idols publicly, gave up seventeen wives, built a prayer house, and has given himself to lay evangelism. This has resulted in many of his former colleagues consigning their idols to the flames. Teacher Ukebu said: "One man burned his big 'juju' and sent one of his two wives away. She was unwilling and proceeded to take out a summons against him, but he said he could not keep two wives any longer, so took her by the hand and led her home to her parents."

The message exerts a strong influence on our young people. Boys go without food for days rather than partake of food offered to idols. This is a test, for African boys are generally ready for a meal, and food prepared for an idol feast is of a choice kind. However, these young people stood firm.

Stephen Obonna told us that fifty people were won to the message in his district as

a direct result of the Ingathering work. B. I. Tikili, an African pastor, said,

"Budo was a man-eating country not long ago, but now we have twenty believers there. The truth has been carried by some of our faithful members who had gone to that village to trade in fish." Following the camp-meetings, when over a hundred people were baptised, we visited Budo and had the privilege of immersing three souls. These people wanted to keep us over night, but we were pressed for time.

Brother Edmonds recently had a chief and some men come to see him. These told of a company of forty Sabbath keepers who were wanting an Adventist missionary. Pastor Tikili has just visited the village and reports over eighty observing the Sabbath. For a long time they did not know that there were any other people keeping the Sabbath other than the few at Budo.

We would ask God's people to pray for our workers and believers, that they may be filled with the Holy Spirit and prepared to do their part in finishing the work in Nigeria.

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No One Needs to be Disappointed

I HOPE that our friends everywhere will understand that our catalogue is to be had at any time merely for the asking. 'n Paar Sorgwekkende Feite

GEDURENDE die afgelope drie jaar het Divisie in vergelyking met die res van die wêreld-veld baie goed gedoen met sendingoffergawes. Dit gee ons baie stof tot dankbaarheid. Laat ons egter sien hoeveel offergawes per persoon ingekom het.

Soos u weet, het ons hier in Suid-Afrika twee bronne van inkomste vir ons sendingwerk: die eerste, die Sabbatskool en algemene sendingoffergawes, en die tweede, die Oesinsameling.

In 1927 was ons fondse: £3,313-7-8 vir Oesinsameling en £5,811-15-11 deur ons lede byeengebring; d.w.s. die Oesinsameling het 36.3 persent opgelewer en 63.7 persent is deur die Sabbatskool en sendingoffergawes inbetaal. Ongelukkig, egter, het dinge baie verander gedurende die tussenliggende paar jaar. Terwyl die Oesinsameling-fondse jaar na jaar toegeneem het, het ons eie offergawes aansienlik verminder.

In 1935 het die Oesinsameling £7.841-5-4

beloop terwyl die kerk en Sabbatskool--offergawes maar net £4,182-2-3 was. Dit beteken dat die Oesinsameling in daardie jaar 65.2 persent was vergeleke met 34.8 persent wat deur die Sabbatskool en ander offergawes ingebring is.
