# THE FAMILY ALTAR

RECENTLY the General Conference Committee felt the need of drawing up a series of resolutions on the matter of family worship among our church members. These recommendations should be taken most seriously.

From the very beginning God designed that His people should have a family prayer altar. In connection with the sanctuary service we find the altar of incense. The morning and evening offerings represented the prayers that ascended to the Lord.

If we were to take inventory we should find that the family prayer altar in many Seventh-day Adventist homes has been broken down. The neglect of prayer is always the first step away from God and His truth. The slogan we hear so much today, "The family that prays together stays together," is a good one for every believer to adopt.

We rejoice to know that many parents are most faithful in their morning and evening devotions. No matter how much work needs to be done they always find time to pray around the family altar. Their prayers mean much in the lives of their children. The family prayer altar helps us to begin the day aright. It keeps us from saying or doing sinful things during the hours of the day. It keeps our hearts open to the Spirit's voice, and it binds the hearts of the

members of the family together as nothing else will.

Prayers offered around the family altar will open the windows of heaven



and bring the blessing of God upon the home. These devotional periods increase our zeal for missionary work, fill our hearts with love for those who are lost, and stop criticism, fault-finding and back-biting. As fathers and mothers, we cannot afford to neglect the family altar. If we feel that we are too busy for family worship, then we are busier than God ever intended that we should be. Let us make first things first in our lives. Jesus said, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God."

The question that came to Hezekiah

comes to us today—"What have they seen in thy house?" Hezekiah showed the visitors the gold and the silver but was silent about the One who said, "The Almighty shall be thy gold." He showed them the spices and precious ointments and all his treasures, but said nothing about the prayer key that unlocks the storehouse of God. If this question were asked us today, "What have they seen in thy house?" what would our answer be? Do we have a family prayer altar that has been erected, or has it been discarded? If the altar has been broken down, shall we not build it up without delay? God calls for a reformation along this line. His call is back to God, back to our knees, back to the inner chambers of intercession.

Prayer offered around the family altar not only helps the children to be true to the Lord and this message, but it inspires them to want to work for the Lord. An outstanding example of this we find in one of the families of the early days of this movement. We quote from a letter written by one of the children:

"My parents had twelve children. Three of them died before they grew up. Of the rest, five became ministers in the Lord's cause, and my youngest sister died as a missionary's wife in Africa."

"Our parents gathered their household every morning and evening for family worship, and we listened to their prayers until we ourselves felt the need of seeking God.

"I shall never forget the Friday evening worship hour in our home at the beginning of the Sabbath. We used to sing and pray and confess our sins to God and to one another. Then peace and happiness reigned in our hearts and in our home. The cords of love bound us very close together.

"No burden weighed more heavily upon my mother than the salvation of her children. She had a great faith in God and prayed for her children one by one by name, from the oldest to the youngest, and one by one they gave their hearts to God and joined the church. When the youngest had been baptized my mother said, 'My mission work is now finished.' My parents' greatest happiness was the salvation of their children."

The family prayer altar is a great aid in making it possible for the parents to be able to say, when Jesus comes, "Behold, I and the children which God hath given me."

## A New Church Building in Alexandra

SABBATH, May 27, 1950, was a great day for the members of the Alexandra church, as well as for many other members on the Reef. On this memorable day a large number crowded into the beautiful new church which has just been erected by Brother C. van der Molen, a member of one of our European churches. The opening ceremony was conducted by Pastor C. H. Mackett, secretary-treasurer of the South African Union Conference, and the officers of our field. Pastor E. A. Buckley invoked the blessing of God upon the new church, and the Sophiatown church

choir rendered a special song which was greatly appreciated. The writer, in his opening remarks, mentioned that God has richly blessed His people in opening a way for them to build this church, and that it is the privilege of every member to be a soul-winner so that very soon the church may be filled with residents of Alexandra who do not now know Him. He also expressed appreciation for the work of our friends, Brother Van der Molen, the builder, and Mr. D. M. Sinclair, the architect, who have done so much in helping to build the church at a very reasonable figure.

Pastor Mackett, in his address, emphasized that this church is not to be merely a beautiful building, but that it is a place in which to meet with God. He expressed the hope that God's presence would remain with us. This house will mean nothing to us if we do not allow Jesus to come in and lead us. He stressed the point that God does not dwell between four walls, but in the hearts of His people which have been sanctified by His Holy Spirit.

It was very gratifying to see the response of our people when the offering was taken. It proves their willingness to sacrifice for the Master's cause. Brother A. A. Pitt, a former secretary-treasurer of the North Bantu Mission Field, and one who has given much valuable service in this field, closed the service with prayer.

We are hoping to have more such services in the very near future. Already we have started the church building at Taungs. At the time of writing the walls are over eight feet high. Mr. R. A. F. O'Reilly is assisting us to erect this church building, and we hope to have it completed by August or September. In July we hope to begin building a church in the Brakpan location, and another at Claremont, Natal. We have waited long for these churches, and the members will greatly appreciate having them. We also plan to start building our secondary school at Orlando this year. Already we have over seventy-five applicants. Our worker at Louwsburg is in need of a house and before the year is out we hope to have his need supplied. We hope that next year and in the years to come we will be able to continue building so that churches may be dedicated to the Lord, and that our faithful members may have places of worship. There are places where we have organized churches but no buildings in which to worship. We have for example, a company of over sixty believers, who, because they have no building, are obliged to meet in rain or sunshine under a large tree. We hope that it will not be long before houses of worship will be built for them.

Plans have been laid to strengthen the evangelistic work. It is hoped that this year efforts will be held at Brakpan, the chief's kraal in Swaziland, and in each of the other districts in our field. Pastors W. Claude Tarr and J. M. Hlubi with other helpers have just completed a very successful and interesting effort at Richmond, Natal. A full report will be sent in later. We are glad to report that the Richmond council has granted us a church site and we hope to be able to build a church in the near future.

A very interesting and profitable M.V. rally was conducted on Sabbath, June 3, by Pastor P. H. Coetzee, the Missionary Volunteer and Home Missionary Department secretary, of the South African Union Conference. Pastor Coetzee stressed the all-important point of sharing our faith with others. The discussion hour in the afternoon proved profitable to all and many things were clarified.

Plans are now being laid for a big youth congress to be held in the Western Native Township from October 6-8, 1950. Members from all parts of the field will be present. This is going to be the biggest rally ever held in our field, and will be a great incentive to both young and old.

The Lord is certainly blessing the efforts of our workers and lay-members, and we press onward with Christ beside us to help finish the work which has been allotted to us.



## Camp-meetings

OUR camp-meetings for 1950 have come to a very happy and fruitful end. Although these spiritual feasts are in the past, happy memories still linger in our minds. The words of encouragement, songs of praise and inspiration, joyous reunion with friends and acquaintances of like faith and purpose have all found an abiding place in our hearts.

We were happy to have our union president, Pastor Hanson, and Pastor A. Bristow, president of the Northern Rhodesia Mission Field, to help us at these camp-meetings.

There must have been rejoicing in heaven as Jesus and the holy angels witnessed the reconsecration of both faithful and back-slidden members. The amount of the offering revealed sacrifice on the part of our people. No doubt the greatest joy was experienced when several souls were baptized.

We do not have the space to give a full report of touching incidents which testify to the loyalty of the members in our field. The following figures will, however, give some idea of what took place at these camp-meetings:

During fifteen camp-meetings, with a total attendance of 3,615 people, 339 souls were baptized. It is very gratifying to report that a large percentage of this number was won by the laity. As a result of the "win one" plan introduced by the late Pastor Lewis a total of 231 souls was reported won in 1949. This year the combined churches and companies set a goal of 762. We sincerely trust that God will help them not only to reach the goal set, but actually to exceed it. The camp-meeting offering received amounted to £543-16-8.

Readers of the *OUTLOOK* will be interested to know that we have strengthened the work in Zululand in a substantial way by purchasing the property

## Oudtshoorn

At the time of the camp-meeting at Rosebank, last January, plans were laid to evangelize the large town of Oudtshoorn in the South-Western Districts of the Cape.

Brother N. Josling and Sister G. Snyman were asked to lead out in this effort. Owing to a shortage of evangelistic workers, Pastor J. M. Coetzee, our Sabbath School and Home Missionary Department secretary, joined them as song-leader and Bible instructor. In addition, Sister L. Roberts of the conference office was associated with the effort to play the piano and to help carry forward the departmental work.

This effort was held in the Drill Hall. Our workers encountered bitter opposition from the start, but God blessed with a consistent attendance. The interest grew and many souls have accepted the message.

I would like to mention an interesting and encouraging feature of the work. For many years the late Sister Nuns lived and witnessed in Oudtshoorn. She was an ardent distributor of the *Signs* and *Tekens*, and she conducted many Bible studies with her friends and acquaintances. These long years of seed-sowing were not in vain, for at the very time when she died in George, the effort was in progress, and a number with whom she had laboured, joyfully took their stand for the message. Here is a typical example of successful home missionary and evangelistic work.

On Sunday, June 4, the baptism was held. Believers from Riversdale, George and Ladismith gathered with the new converts at Langkloof. The new church was crowded, and many had to stand in the entrance. There must have been over 200 in attendance. Brother Josling preached on the subject of the prodigal son, and the writer examined the thirty candidates and conducted the baptism. During this long baptismal service a hush was upon the large congregation for God's presence was felt by all. Afterwards the brethren and sisters of Langkloof took the visitors home to dinner.

In the afternoon a large congregation gathered to celebrate the ordinances of

the Lord's house. Old and new believers mingled in a spirit of true fellowship with the Lord and with one another. As the writer spoke on the subject of "The Cross" the Holy Spirit moved upon all to surrender their lives to the Lord. This was a truly heart-searching service, with a quiet infilling of the peace of the Lord and the joy of salvation.

At Oudtshoorn opposition continues. Let us all pray that in spite of opposition, the new company may grow in numbers and that they may be organized into a church in the near future.

## Die Huisaltaar

DIE Wêreldkonferensie het dit onlangs nodig geag om 'n reeks voorstelle op te stel in verband met die huisgodsdienst van ons lede. Ons behoort hierdie voorstelle ernstig op te neem.

Van die begin af, wou God hê dat Sy volk huisgodsdienst moes hou. In die heiligdom het die altaar van wierook gestaan. Die oggend- en aandoffers was 'n voorstelling van die gebed wat na die Here opstyg.

As ons gaan ondersoek instel, sal ons uitvind dat die huisgodsdienst in baie Sewende-dag Adventiste wonings afgeskaf is. Verwaarloosing van gebed is altyd die eerste stap weg van God en Sy waarheid. 'n Goeie slagspreuk vir elke gelowige is: „Die gesin wat saam bid, bly saam.”

Ons is bly om te weet dat baie ouers getrou soggens en saans godsdienst hou. Dit maak geen saak hoeveel werk gedoen moet word nie, hulle vind altyd tyd om godsdienst te hou. Hulle gebede beteken veel in die lewens van hulle kinders. Die huisgodsdienst help ons om die dag reg te begin. Dit keer dat ons nie gedurende die dag verkeerde dinge sê of doen nie. Dit help ons om die stem van die Gees te hoor en dit bind die harte van die lede van die gesin saam soos niksoanders kan doen nie.

Die gebede wat tydens die huisgodsdienst opgaan, sal die vensters van die hemel oopmaak sodat God daardie gesin sal seën. Dit is daar waar ons sendingywertoeneem, waar ons harte met liefde gevul word vir diegene wat verlore is, waar kritiek, foutsoekery en agterklapery gekeer word. Vaders en moeders kan dit nie bekostig om die huisgodsdienst te verwaarloos nie. As ons te besig is om huisgodsdienst te hou, is ons besiger as wat God van ons verwag. Laat ons in ons lewens aan die belangrikste dinge die eerste plek afstaan. Jesus het gesê: „Soek eers die koninkryk van God.”

Ons moet antwoord op dieselfde vraag as Hiskia vanouds—„Wat het hulle in u huis gesien?” Hiskia het sy goud en silwer getoon, maar hy het niksgesê van Hom wat gesê het: „Dan sal die Almagtige jou goudstukke wees,” nie. Hy het die speserye en kosbare salf en al sy skatte aan hulle getoon, maar hy het niksgesê aangaande die gebed—die sleutel wat die skatkamers van God oopsluit—nie. Hoe moet ons antwoord as ons gevra word: „Wat het hulle in u huis gesien?” Word daar in ons wonings huisgodsdienst gehou, of het ons dit verwaarloos? As die huisaltaar in puin lê, sal ons dit nie dadelik weer oprig nie?

God verlang hervorming in hierdie opsig. Hy roep ons na Hom, na die gebed, na die binnekamer van voorbidding terug.

Die gebede wat in die ouerhuis gehoor word, help die kinders nie alleenlik om getrou te wees aan die Here en aan die boodskap nie; dit besiel hulle met 'n verlange om vir God te werk. Een van die gesinne van die vroeë dae van hierdie beweging is 'n goeie voorbeeld hiervan. Een van die kinders van daardie gesin het geskryf:

„My ouers het twaalf kinders gehad. Drie van hulle is klein dood. Van die ander het vyf predikante geword, en my jongste suster is as sendelingsvrou in Afrika dood.

„Ons ouers het die gesin elke oggend en elke aand saamgeroep om godsdienst te hou, en ons het hulle gebede aangehoor totdat ons self gevoel het dat ons die Here moes aanroep.

„Ek sal nooit vergeet hoe ons op Vrydag-aan die begin van die Sabbat godsdienst gehou het nie. Ons het gesing en gebid en ons sondes aan God en aan mekaar bely. Daarna het vrede en geluk in ons harte en in ons huis geregeer. Die liefdesbande het ons baie styf saamgebond.

„My moeder was oor niksoanders bekommert as oor die redding van haar kinders nie. Sy het groot vertroue in God gehad, en sy het haar kinders in haar gebede een vir een by name genoem van die oudste tot die jongste, en een vir een het hulle hulle harte aan die Here gegee en by die kerk aangesluit. Toe die jongste gedoop is, het my moeder gesê: „Nou is my sendingwerk gedaan.” Die feit dat hulle kinders gered is, was vir my ouers die grootste vreugde.”

Die huisgodsdienst is een van die belangrikste dinge wat dit vir ouers moontlik sal maak om te sê: „Hier is ek en die kinders wat die Here my gegee het,” wanneer Jesus kom.



## Ywerig tot die Einde toe

DIE Oesinsamelingsveldtog is aan die gang, en luidens die berigte wat ons reeds ontvang het, is die mense gewillig om by te dra tot ons werk. Dit is nou die tyd om middele in te samel. En wanneer ons die bydraes ontvang, moet ons ook onthou om die aandag van die mense te vestig op die erns van die tye waarin ons leef. God maan ons om te werk, want die einde is naby. Die Heilige Gees maak van elke uur gebruik om op hierdie aarde 'n volk te berei wat kan deel aan die naderende stryd teen die sonde.

Al die gelowiges was ywerig toe die Oesinsamelingsveldtog vanjaar begin het. Die Here het die werk geseen, en ons gee Hom al die eer en die heerlikheid vir wat verrig is. Sommige gemeentes het hulle doelstellings in die eerste week bereik en in die tweede week verdubbel. Dit is die regte gees! Helderberg Kollege het vanjaar minder terrein as verlede jaar, maar in die eerste week het die studente meer gekollekteer as gedurende die eerste week verlede jaar.

Uit die berigte wat ons ontvang, blyk dat die lede vanjaar meer belangstel as in die verlede. Ons is nou in die middel van die veldtog, en die Here seën ons werk ryklik. Baie mense was bang dat dit nie vanjaar so goed sou gaan nie omdat daar soveel oproepe gedoen word, maar die Here lei en die mense gee net so gewillig soos in die verlede. Waarlik die Here is in hierdie werk, en ons is dankbaar vir die bewyse van Sy leiding. Nie een huis moet oorgeslaan word nie. Ons moet elke huis besoek, nie alleenlik met die doel om 'n bydrae te kry nie, maar ook om kennis te maak en om uit te vind wat die geestelike toestand van die bewoners is. Ons leef in die laaste dae. Duisende mense wat in die verlede min aandag aan geestelike sake geskenk het, wil weet wat die hedendaagse gebeurtenisse beteken. Dit is nou ons voorreg om nie slegs geld in te samel nie, maar om die boodskap te verkondig aan diegene wat in die duisternis verkeer.

Tot dusver vanjaar het God ons waarlik voorspoedig gemaak. Dit geld vir almal wat probeer het. As u dus nog nie alles in u vermoë gedoen het nie, sal u die Here nie nou die kans gee om u ook te laat drink uit die lewensfontein waar u besiel sal word om vir Hom te gaan werk nie?

Ons het 'n doelstelling wat ons moet bereik. Ons kan dit bereik. *Moenie wag nie!* Laat ons werk solank dit nog dag is. Die nag kom wanneer niemand meer kan werk nie. Laat ons nou waar ons die laaste groot gebeurtenisse van hierdie ou wêreld se geskiedenis tegemoet gaan, aan die werk spring sodat ons elke gesin in ons gedeeltetjie van die wingerd kan ontmoet. Ons moet vashou aan wat ons het, sodat iemand anders nie dalk ons kroon afneem nie.



„God handel nie met ons soos sterfelinge met mekaar handel nie. Sy gedagtes teenoor ons is gedagtes van genade, liefde en die teerste ontferming. Here se werk. Broeder A. A. Pitt, voormalige sekretaris-tesourier van die Noord-Bantoesendingveld en 'n persoon wat die veld baie getrou gedien het, het die verrigte met gebed afgesluit.

Ons is van plan om in die nabye toekoms nog meer sulke dienste te hou. Daar word reeds op Taungs 'n kerk opgerig. Terwyl ek hierdie artikel skryf, staan die mure al agt voet hoog. Mr. R. A. F. O'Reilly help met die oprigting van hierdie gebou, en ons meen om dit teen Augustus of September gereed te hê. In Julie sal ons aan 'n nuwe kerkgebou in die lokasie te Brakpan begin werk, en ook aan een in Claremont, Natal. Ons het reeds lank op hierdie kerke gewag, en die lede sal baie gelukkig voel wanneer hulle gereed is. Ons is ook van plan om vanjaar aan ons sekondêre skool in Orlando te begin bou. Vyf-en-sewentig leerlinge het reeds aansoek gedoen om opgeneem te word. Ons werker op Louwsburg het nie 'n huis nie, en ons is van plan om teen die einde van die jaar in sy behoefté ook te voorsien. Ons vertrou dat ons volgende jaar en in die jare wat daarop volg, nog steeds meer kerke sal kan bou sodat die gelowiges plekke kan hê waar hulle kan aanbid. Daar is sommige plekke waar ons georganiseerde gemeentes het, maar waar ons geen kerkgeboue het nie. Daar is byvoorbeeld een groep van meer as sesig gelowiges wat geen gebou het nie, en hulle moet in mooiwer en in onweer onder 'n groot boom byeenkom. Ons hoop dat ons eerlank vir sulke gemeentes ook kerke sal kan bou.
