PRESIDENT of the GENERAL CONFERENCE

Dear Brethren and Sisters:

It is a privilege to address the membership of the Seventh-day Adventist Church through the pages of the "Review and Herald." This is my first opportunity to do so since returning to Washington following the General Conference session in San Fran-'cisco. Many of you were in attendance at that great meeting. Every reader of the "Review" has had the reports, which were so carefully prepared and promptly published. It was an occasion of real moment to the cause of God, marking another high point of progress in carrying the message of a soon-coming Saviour to a distracted and troubled world.



The session is now in the past. The delegates from North America have returned to their fields of labour and taken up their tasks. A few of those from overseas have lingered a bit, but by this time most of them too are back at their posts of service.

We are living in a day of intensity, a day of great advancement, a day of thrilling accomplishment by the Lord of the harvest. Thousands are embracing the message God has commissioned us to give the world. During the coming four years, if time should last, we confidently expect to see a net gain in our membership of at least four hundred thousand. No one can study the reports that come in to us and not be convinced that God has set His hand to accomplish a quick work and that it will soon be cut short in righteousness.

While this is true, we do not forget that the present hour is one of great trial. In some lands our people suffer severely, being persecuted, defamed, falsely accused, and imprisoned for their faith. In others we are able to conduct our services only under the most rigid restrictions and unfriendly surveillance. Then there are large areas of the world field from which we receive few reports of any kind. We have some idea of the condition of our people at those places, but our knowledge is meagre. We are persuaded, however, that the truth of heaven is making its way into honest hearts and that those whose faithful lives have been an inspiration to us in former years are continuing their noble witness as they stand stiffly for the truth under the most adverse circumstances. Let us never forget to pray for our brethren and sisters who cannot write us or send representatives to our meetings, but who meet us only at the mercy seat.

It is not alone in lands of open hostility to the message that there is danger to the remnant people. Satan spreads his snares where conditions are outwardly favourable. The allurements of worldly position and influence with their temptation to compromise principle, the love of ease with its benumbing of spiritual preception, the tendency to trust in numbers and in the material prosperity of churches and institutions—all these constitute dangers to the child of God and are to be zealously resisted.

These are days of test and trial. The times are changing, and the changes bring us face to face with new problems, new situations, new complications, and perplexities. We must press on undaunted with the divine assurance that these are also days of fulfilling prophecy. Events of which we have been preaching for so long are now actually occurring before our eyes. The opportunities were never so challenging or so momentous as now. The mighty arm of God is not shortened, but is stretched out in glorious power for the support of His consecrated witnesses in all parts of the earth.

May the choice blessings of heaven rest upon each one of you, dear brethren and sisters of the Advent faith, as you carry on your faithful service in the sphere to which God has called you. "Look up, and let your faith continually increase." Let us press together in Christian love, in sympathetic understanding, and in tireless service as we endeavour under the blessing of God to bring into the circle of our fellowship those whose hearts are being stirred by the message we have to bear.

NO MEN WANTED!

I T WAS during the depression years and millions of men throughout the world were out of work. The majority of these men had families, and they were desperate. Their children were hungry and starving and ill-clothed. Day by day they walked the streets of the great cities of the world searching for work that would provide the funds to buy life-giving food for their families. But always the result was the same. At the entrances of factories and shops were huge signs with the discouraging words—"N O M E N WANTED."

Yes, it would be discouraging to constantly be in search of work and always be turned away with the statement "NO MEN WANTED." There is only one situation that could be more discouraging and that would be if God were to put a sign on every church saying "NO MEN WANTED." That would mean that His work on earth was finished, probation's door was closed, and there was no more hope for sinners. That would be discouraging for the unsaved, and it would be hard on those who were looking for the coming of the Lord, because some of their loved ones might be amongst the unsaved, and it would be hard to live through the last year of time and know that these unsaved loved ones were suffering the torments of the Seven Last Plagues.

How wonderful to know that the doors of probation are still open and that God wants men for His work and His kingdom. There is no need for any churchmember to be idle in God's work. He still wants men! "As the Head of the church, Christ is authoritatively calling upon every one who claims to believe on Him to follow His example of self-denial and selfsacrifice *in working for the conver*sion [italics mine] of those whom Satan and his vast army are exerting every power to destroy."-Testimonies, Vol. 7, p. 30.

If we are standing idle in the market place, heeding the "NO MEN WANTED" signs that Satan is cunningly holding before us to turn us away from doing God's work, then it is certainly time for us to answer the challenge in the above statement and go to work for Christ, working for the conversion of loved ones and neighbours, who might otherwise be still unsaved when probation's doors close.

In Testimonies, Vol. 2, p. 632, our attention is again called to the fact that God still WANTS MEN; that He still has a work for us to do. "Every follower of Jesus has a work to do as a missionary for Christ, in the family, in the neighbourhood, in the town or city where he littes."

Every follower means you; it means the elder; it means the churchmember sitting beside us in the pew. And the statement is an invitation to us to take an active part in searching for souls in our own neighbourhood, because God still WANTS MEN, the men and women who are not yet walking in the light, the men and women for whom Christ died.

The doors of probation will soon be closed and still there is a great work to do. To neglect to do that work will mean that souls will be lost. No one else can do our work, therefore we must not $n \in g l \in ct$ to do what God has invited us to do. "When personal work is neglected, many precious opportunities are lost, which, were they improved, would advance the work decidedly."—Gospel Workers, p. 364 (1915 edition). Are we advancing or retarding the work?

God has not yet hung out the sign "NO MEN WANTED." He still has a work for His church to do. Home Visitation Day gives each one of us an opportunity to prove our loyalty to God and our interest in finishing His work. On Home Visitation Day, Sabbath, October 2, Seventh-day Adventists all over the world will be systematically visiting their neighbours giving them truth-filled literature, praying with them, studying with them, and searching for those who are seeking light in these troublous times. There is a place for you in the ranks of those who will take an active part in this Home Visitation Day, Share Your Faith, Soulwinning Effort. Will you rise to God's challenge and invitation?

Wesley once said, "Give me one hundred men who fear nothing but God, who hate nothing but sin, and who are determined to know nothing among men but Jesus Christ and Him crucified, and I will set the world on fire." If Wesley could do that with one hundred men what could we do here in Southern Asia with the 14,-640 believers who profess their belief in the soon-coming of the Saviour?

It must be largely accomplished by persevering, individual effort-by visiting the people at their homes."-Evangelism, p. 411. We cannot over-estimate the importance of house-to-house work. It has been the plan of God from the very inception of the gospel. When Jesus sent out the seventy, He gave them instructions to visit in the homes of the people. They went out two by two and did a marvellous work for the cause of Christ. So, today, God calls His faithful and loyal people, the lay members in the churches, to go out two by two to visit the people in their homes. There is no substitute for this method. Contacting people where they are in their homes, around the family circle, will enable us to get close to the hearts of the people, to help them to understand that we are sympathetic and that Jesus has the solution for their every problem.

Again, the Spirit of prophecy tells "this house-to-house labourus searching for souls, hunting for the lost sheep—is the most essential work that can be done."-Evangelism, p. 431. Surely, we as God's remnant people realize the truthfulness of this statement. We must be searching and hunting for the lost sheep. We must find them where they are in their homes. We cannot expect them, in every case, to come to us; but we must come closer to them: search them out; show our friendliness toward them. This is the most essential work that we can possibly do for the Master and God lays the responsibility on every faithful churchmember

churches are called upon to assist an evangelist in his public campaign. When members co-operate in this way with the evangelist, a great work can be done in getting into the individual homes of the people. Before the effort begins the churchmembers can be helpful in distributing literature in the homes and during the effort these contacts can be followed ap by faithful laymen. It is possible for the members of our church to get closer to certain families than can the evangelist himself. The personal contact which they have, the humble spirit and sincere desire to see souls saved, will impress the people as nothing else will.

It is not enough simply to preach our message from the pulpit: "Not only is the truth to be presented in public assemblies; house-to-house work is to be done. Let this work go forward in the name of the Lord."----Evangelism, p. 490. This is the work that you, dear lay brother, can do for the Master. This is the work which God has called you to do. There is work everywhere-in the villages, in the towns, and in the cities. Multitudes are crying for this gospel message which God has placed in our hands. How wonderful it is to search these folk out and to enrol them in our Voice of Prophecy course! In this way we can place in their hands the opportunity to know this third angel's message and to follow the truth of God for today.

Many churchmembers are engaged in distributing our magazines and papers. In one of our large churches in South India, there is a faithful couple who go out every week with about fifty copies of the Signs of the Times. I wish you could hear some of their experiences! They are thrilling. The courage of these two people does not wane, but their enthusiasm. for the gospel seems to grow greater and greater because they are contacting people in their homes and turning hearts toward the gospel.

I remember one Home Visitation Day when my wife and I went out as a team and we were thrilled with the wonderful response we received. As we went from one house to another, we had prayer with some of the people; we were able to enrol several in the Voice of Prophecy course; and in addition to that, our own souls were greatly helped, because we felt that we were doing the work that Christ has appointed us to do in these last days.

We must remember that every member of the church is called to be a worker. "Go ye," Jesus says. He means you; He means me. "Go work today in My vineyard." In a special sense, can we not think of this "today" as October 2, and go and work for Christ in a special way on that day? This is following the plan of God. This is walking in the footsteps of the Master. "By being social and coming close to the people, you may turn the currents of their thoughts more readily than by the discourse."-Gospel most able Workers, p. 193. Yes, you may do the work of Christ and in many cases more effectively than the man who is trained as a gospel minister. Won't you join whole-heartedly in the houseto house visitation programme this coming October 2? Won't you be among those who will go forth with the precious seed? Listen to the words of the Psalmist as he brings to us the suggestion of the reward that awaits us when we follow God's plan: "They that sow in tears shall reap in joy. He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him." Ps. 126:5, 6.



HOUSE-TO-HOUSE VISITATION

S A people we believe with all our hearts that this gospel of the kingdom must be preached in all the world before the end can come. And, I believe, the majority of us are trying to do our part in preaching this gospel. But I am afraid that in our zeal we have lost sight of one of the most important ways of hastening the coming of Christ's glorious kingdom. This is true of workers and lay-members alike. Let me quote: "The Lord desires that His word of grace shall be brought home to every soul. To a great degree this must be accomplished by PERSONAL LAB-OUR. This was CHRIST'S METHOD. HIS WORK LARGELY MADE UP OF PERSONAL INTERVIEWS."-Christ's Object Lessons, p. 229.

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C. G. Trumbull writing in *Taking* Men Alive sayes, "Individual soulwinning is the GREATEST WORK that God permits men to do. IT WAS CHRIST'S OWN PREFERRED METHOD of work, and it is His preferred method FOR US TODAY for it is always the most effective way of working."

A study of Christ's ministry clearly reveals that the one soul audience was to Him the greatest challenge and the most precious opportunity. "It was in private, often to but one listener, that He gave His most precious instruction."-Education, p. 231. It was to the lone woman at the well of Sychar that He gave His wonderful discourse on the water of life. It was to the honoured rabbi on the Mount of Olives at dead of night, that He explained the need for the new birth. And yet dear friends, you and I today neglect this, Christ's preferred method, and turn our time and attention to those of our own devising. There is no room for doubt as to the Saviour's method for winning men. and we are told that "Christ's method ALONE will give the SUCCESS in reaching the people." -Ministry of Healing, p. 143. Can we hope for success when we do this? Dare we set our methods against those of the Master Soul-winner?

I have heard some of our ministers say that their work was public evangelism and that they plan to do that and that only. Brethren, public evangelism is important. The drawing of large crowds to a large auditorium to hear the word of God is good. But note these words from the pen of inspiration: "In the work of many ministers there is too much sermonizing and too little real heart-to-heart work. There is need for more personal labour for souls. . . . Ministry means much more than sermonizing, it means earnest personal labour. When a minister has presented the gospel message from the pulpit, his work is only begun. . . . He should visit the people in their homes, talking and praying with them in earnestness and humility. ... To my ministering brethren I would say, by personal labour reach the people where they are. Become acquainted with them. This work cannot be done by proxy. Money loaned or given cannot accomplish it. Sermons from the pulpit cannot do it. Teaching the Scriptures in families-this is the WORK OF THE EVANGELIST, and this work is to be united with preaching. IF IT IS OMITTED, the preaching will be, to a great extent, a FAILURE."—Gospel Workers, pp. 185-189.

I am sure, brethren, that none of us wishes his work to be a failure. So let us follow the instructions and plans outlined for us. Our churchmembers also have an important part in this important work. "God expects personal service from EVERY ONE to whom He has entrusted a knowledge of the truth for this time."—*Testimonies*, Vol. 9, p. 30. "Among the members of our churches there should be more houseto-house labour, in giving Bible readings and distributing literature."— *Testimonies*, Vol. 9, p. 127.

The need is great—"There are many who need the ministration of loving Christian hearts. Many have gone down to ruin who might have been saved, if their neighbours, common men and women, had put forth personal effort for them. "Many are waiting to be personally addressed. In the very family, the neighbourhood, the town where we live, there is work for us to do as missionaries for Christ. If we are Christians this work will be our delight. No sooner is one converted than there is born in him a desire to make known to others what a precious friend he has found in Jesus."-Desire of Ages, p. 141.

Brethren and sisters throughout our Division, may I appeal to you to consecrate your time and your energy to this most important work. The time is short and there is still a great work to do. And REMEMBER "the work of God in this earth can NEVER BE FINISHED until the men and women comprising our church membership rally to the work, and unite their efforts with those of ministers and church officers."—*Testimonies*, Vol. 9, p. 117.

If we have whole-heartedly taken part in the programme of the day neither can it be said of us as of Ahimaaz "And he stood aside and stood still." It should be said of no Seventh-day Adventist regarding our relationship to this message "I saw a great tumult, but I knew not what it was."

THE RALLYING CALL

W HAT do we mean by Home Visitation? Some are anxious to go, but do not know what to do. Others may be timid and afraid to go.

We do not need to be afraid when in the service of our Lord—"Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world."

When individuals become members of the remnant church, they pledge themselves to give their talents to the service of God and the finishing of His work. The chief purpose of each member should be to win souls.

"We are not to feel that the work of the gospel depends principally upon the minister. To every man God has given a work to do in connection with His kingdom. Everyone who professes the name of Christ is to be an earnest, disinterested worker, ready to defend the principles of righteousness. Every soul should take an active part in advancing the cause of God. Whatever our calling, as Christians we have a work to do in making Christ known to the world. We are to be missionaries, having for our chief aim the winning of souls to Christ.

Each member of the church can carry the message by the printed page and give to all he meets. Each member should enrol as many as possible in the Voice of Prophecy Bible Course. Also, those who are interested in the message should be invited to Bible studies, to help them understand our message.

"We wish that all the Lord's servants were labourers. The work of warning souls should not be confined to ministers alone, but brethren who have the truth in their hearts, and who have exerted a good influence at home, should feel that a responsibility rests upon them to devote a part of their time to going out among their neighbours and into adjoining towns to be missionaries for God. They should carry out publications, and engage in conversation, and, in the spirit of Christ, pray with and for those whom they visit. This is the work that will arouse a spirit of investigation and reformation."—Testimonies, Vol. 3, p. 61.

We cannot wait for friends and neighbours to come to us and ask for the truth, for the majority would never come. We must do as Christ did in his ministry, go to them, gain their interest and confidence by meeting them on a common ground interest.

"Christ did not wait for congregations to assemble. Some of the grandest truths He uttered were spoken to individuals. Listen to His wonderful words to that one woman of Samaria. He was sitting by Jacob's well as the woman came to draw water. To her surprise He asked a favour of her. 'Give Me to drink,' He said. He wanted a cool draught, and He wished also to open the way whereby He might give to her the water of life." --Gospel Workers, p. 194.

"How much interest Christ manifested in this one woman! How earnest and eloquent were His words! They stirred the heart of the listener, and forgetting her errand to the well, she went into the city and said to her friends, 'Come, see a man, which told me all things that ever I did: is not this the Christ?'

"Many left their employment to come to the Stranger at Jacob's well. They plied Him with questions, and eagerly received His explanation of many things that had been dark to their understanding. They were like people tracing a sudden ray of light until they found the day. "The result of the work of Jesus, as He sat, weary and hungry, at the well, was wide-spread in blessing. The one soul whom He sought to help became the means of reaching others and bringing them to the Saviour. This is ever the way that the work of God has made progress on the earth. Let your light shine, and other lights will be kindled."—Gospel Workers, p. 195.

In order to finish this work of spreading the gospel to all the world, every member must take an active part. Go forth in a spirit of love and consecration. God will bless and give results to His church.

"To human agencies is committed the work of extending the triumphs of the cross from point to point. As the Head of the church, Christ is authoritatively calling upon every one who claims to believe on Him to follow His example of self-denial and self-sacrifice in working for the conversion of those whom Satan and his vast army are exerting every power to destroy. When church members put forth earnest efforts to advance the message, they will live in the joy of the Lord, and will meet with success. Triumph always follows decided effort."-Testimonies, Vol. 7, p. 30.

"If the families around you are opposed to the truth, strive to lead them to yield to the claims of Christ. Work patiently, wisely, considerately, winning your way by the tender ministry of love. Present the truth in such a way that it will be seen in all its beauty, exerting an influence that cannot be resisted. Thus the walls of prejudice will be broken down."— *Testimonies*, Vol. 7, p. 11.

There are other ways besides Bible studies and Voice of Prophecy enrolments to bring souls to the truth. Invite them to evangelistic meetings, to Sabbath school and church services. Above all, the life of each member will preach a greater sermon than many sermons preached from the pulpit. If every member is living in harmony with the will of God, he is witnessing to the power of God. Let us fulfil our Lord's commission and contact all far and near, giving them the message of the soon-coming of our Saviour.

"Among those to whom the Saviour had given the commission, 'Go ye therefore, and teach all nations,' were many from the humbler walks of life —men and women who had learned to love their Lord, and who had determined to follow His example of unselfish service. To these lowly ones, as well as to the disciples who had been with the Saviour during His earthly ministry, had been given a precious trust. They were to carry to the world the glad tidings of salvation through Christ."—Acts of the Apostles, p. 105.

"Not upon the ordained minister only rests the responsibility of going forth to fulfil this commission. Every one who has received Christ is called to work for the salvation of his fellowmen. 'The Spirit and the bride say, Come. And let him that heareth say, Come.' The charge to give this invitation includes the entire church."-Acts of the Apostles, p. 110.

"Hundreds, yea, thousands, who have heard the message of salvation, are still idlers in the market place, when they might be engaged in some line of active service. To these Christ is saying, 'Why stand ye here all the day idle?' and He adds, 'Go ye also into the vineyard.' Why is it that many more do not respond to the call? Is it because they think them-selves excused in that they do not stand in the pulpit? Let them understand that there is a large work to be done outside the pulpit by thousands of consecrated lay members.

"Long has God waited for the spirit of service to take possession of the whole church, so that every one shall be working for Him according to his ability. When the members of the church of God do their appointed work in the needy fields at home and abroad, in fulfilment of the gospel commission, the whole world will soon be warned, and the Lord Jesus will return to this earth with power and great glory."-Acts of the Apostles, pp. 110, 111.

Will you, dear churchmembers, do all that you can on this Home Visitation Day, October 2, to make it a soul-winning day?

FOLLOWING CHRIST'S PLAN

UR Saviour went from house 66(to house. . . ."-Christian Service, p. 113. I have seen souls won by laymen who have used Christ's method!

Responding to our call to the church to distribute literature, our missionary leader in the Astoria, Oregon church set a good example. He lived on a farm about ten miles away. Not having too much time or money, because of the confining nature of his work, he made every moment count for the Lord. After church services he would stop at ten farm houses on his way home in his car, distributing tracts. This meant that he delayed eating his dinner for at least an hour, but he was happy to do his bit for the Master. Every Sabbath for five or six weeks he stopped at the same homes. This resulted in interest in the teaching of Seventh-day Adventists. An old couple, retired, asked for Bible studies. Our brother took his projector and studied every Tuesday night. He took me with him on one occasion, just before I left for Southern Asia. How happy he was! How thrilled I was! In a few months this old couple was baptized, and their children are becoming interested.

Never would I have reached that couple in public meetings, as they had no conveyance to travel ten miles to the city.

"The presentation of truth . . . from house to house, is in harmony with the instruction that Christ gave His disciples."-Christian Service, p. 114.

As a child I was brought up on a diet of soul-winning! My father, a local elder, raised up several churches through the lav house-to-house method, one of the last was the Pierre, South Dakota church, about twenty years ago. As a boy I used to accompany my father when he gave studies in the homes of the people. He succeeded in places where public efforts by trained evangelists failed.

We believe in the house-to-house

method in Lahore. Following up Voice of Prophecy contacts and a spring effort keep our members busy nearly every night praying, visiting, and studying with over fifty souls, about half of whom are already preparing for baptism. Three have been baptized thus far. Our workers are going into high class homes, as well as poor ones. Some Muslims are definitely interested. Souls are being reached that could never be reached in a public meeting.

Being very busy with my pastoral programme, departmental duties in the Union, besides cottage meetings and follow-up work, I appealed to the church to help in the house-tohouse work. The members here have come to the aid of their pastor. Brother Abid Ditta, our translator, of his own volition began a cottage meeting in Dharampura, where he has more than a dozen people definitely interested, among them a doctor and his wife, a school teacher, and a book seller. Brother Webster, a layman, with his projector is giving studies nearly every night in English. There is no end to the possibilities in Urdu. Calls come that we cannot fill. Recently a call came from a layman in Moghulpura, another suburb, to hold meetings. He has about twelve neighbours interested. This brother has borne a faithful witness, having obtained Sabbath privileges from the railway workshop, and pays his tithe faithfully. He wanted someone with more education to conduct the meetings. Brother Ghosh, a worker in the Voice of Prophecy office, responded to the call and is doing well, preaching from his Bible without aids of any kind. There is no electricity there, so he uses no projector.

Sabbath school attendance is increasing here in Lahore; in fact it has increased one hundred percent since we arrived a year ago. Members are conducting four branch Sabbath schools with a total attendance of nearly sixty. Last Sabbath at our baptism the church was packed. On Sunday nights members bring fifteen to the baptismal class, where we conduct a class both in Urdu and English preparing them for baptism. We held baptisms in May, July, and August, and plan for a baptism every month of the year. This would not be possible without the active cooperation of our laymen and churchmembers.

In preparation for an cfiort, we use the "house-to-house" method to reach people. There is no better plan than that of the Home Visitation programme scheduled for October 2.

"House-to-house labourers are needed.... My brethren and sisters, visit those who live near you.... And remember that those who know the truth for this time, and yet confine their efforts to their own churches, refusing to work for their unconverted neighbours, will be called to account for unfulfilled duties."— Christian Service, pp. 114, 115.

HOME VISITATION IN MYAUNGMYA

ING dong, ding dong, ding dong. "There is the two o'clock bell and it is time for our Voice of Prophecy field day." This statement has become almost a habit on the campus of the Burma Union Training School at Myaungmya. For since September of 1953, when the Burmese branch of the Voice of Prophecy Bible Correspondance School was opened, the students of the school have faithfully, as weather and circumstances permitted, gone out in active Home Visitation every alternate Sabbath afternoon. This has been our major Home Missionary project. Through it many in the surrounding area have come in contact with the message.

For successful work the school student body was divided into nine bands under the leadership of teachers or workers who reside on the school campus. A territory in the town of Myaungmya or its adjacent villages was assigned to each group.

On reaching its territory on Sabbath afternoon each group breaks up into smaller groups to visit those already studying or to look for new enrollees.

Today, with over 600 names from this area alone, our hands are full. Contacts are being made which are the training ground for many of the future workers of this field.

As in all such work, some we meet are interested and some are not, but many today are studying eagerly the lessons given them and can hardly wait for the two weeks to pass until they can get new lessons.

The loving interest shown towards one family, in which the Voice of Prophecy lessons were being studied, and towards their little girl who was sick unto death and the consequent prayers for healing, although negatively answered, were the means of awakening the community.

The district jail has not been forgotten and today a small group

are following up the interest created there and over forty prisoners are reading carefully the lessons placed in their hands.

This Home Visitation programme has, and is, paying dividends in friends for the Lord Jesus as well as giving definite training to our young people in the art of "Home Visitation."

The final results will never be completely seen until we reach the mansions above. But today the Lord is blessing and we thank Him for it.

FLOODS AND UPLIFT IN EAST PAKISTAN

R. S. FERNANDO

EAST Pakistan is in the grip of unprecedented floods affecting seven million people. The damage caused to crops is immense. Mymensingh and Faridpur districts in which live eighty per cent of our believers are among the eight districts involved. Jute godowns, post offices, railway stations dispensaries and school buildings are floating, not to speak of dwellings of villagers who have lost their properties and all their life savings. Trade and business is at a standstill and boats are plying where only a few days ago other vehicles used to ply.

The suddenness of such calamities were impressed upon the four uplift workers who unaware of floods left their homes to find even the city of Dacca, which was least affected whenever other parts of the province were hit by floods, being threatened. Because of a *khal* (canal) running through the city certain parts of the town were under water choking the drains and threatening the health of the people. If any group of workers had legitimate reason to return home this group had one. But in order to get an experience of working in the midst of such calamities they decided to make a start. This, by the way, was the second attempt to launch out in this year's uplift work at Dacca. With much prayer and preparation the challenge to do a work which we failed to do when things were under more favourable circumstances was accepted.

A little announcement calling the attention to "Your Radio Doctor"

broadcast over Radio Ceylon gave us an excuse to enter every home. Holidays which some felt would interfere with uplift turned out to be of no hindrance for the men folks were at home. The presence of a lady in the group made it easy to reach the ladies behind purdah. Many in zenana who listen to our radio programmes were met. One declared, "I am almost a Christian and if I ever publicly declare it, I would join no other church but the Seventh-day Adventist Church." We have no place of worship at Dacca.

Due to the floods the scattered believers could not get together for Sabbath school at Brother Haslam's home. Communion was celebrated in the various homes and some met in our hotel room. A field day was organized for the benefit of the believers.

The Lord honoured the faith and courage of our believers by helping them to raise the largest collection ever raised in this flood-stricken city. The donations ranged from two annas hundred rupees. His three to Excellency the Governor of the province was one of the donors. Though we have no established work in the city our village work is very much appreciated. Many thanked us for doing a work that they themselves cannot do and gave of their mite. Brother Arinda with his helpers cared for 40,000 patients at Gopalganj. Brother Chitta Boll from his centre at Jalirpar went out in boats and treated more than 11,000 patients in one year. Let us pray for the UPLIFT workers in East Pakistan as they now endeavour to render help to the flood victims. The calamity is serious and the need of the sufferer is great.

RECENTLY one of our colporteurs in England was entering one of the large city printing presses, and noticed a large sign board above the entrance. "Have it in print, The Right Message, In the Right Words, at the Right Time.'

As our colporteur was about to close his canvass, the manager of the press hesitated to give his order for the set of books offered by the colporteur. Just then our good brother remembered the sign. So with new courage and enthusiasm he said, "Have it in print, The Right Message, In the Right Words, at the Right Time." Immediately recognizing his own advertisement, the manager took his pen in hand and signed the order for a set of our books containing God's message for the lost world today.

After reading this experience, I have thought much about how accurately the words of the signboard describe the work of the Publishing department today.

HLVE IT IN PRINT

"I have been shown that the press is powerful for good or evil. This agency can reach and influence the public mind as no other means can. The press, controlled by men who are sanctified to God, can be a power indeed for good in bringing men to the knowledge of the truth."—Colporteur Evangelist, p. 28. "The Lord gave the word: great was the company of those that published it." Ps. 68:11.

Today we do not have a great "host" in Southern Asia publishing the message God has given us. We need more literature evangelists to help proclaim the message through the printed page.

"If there is one work more important than another, it is that of getting our publications before the public, thus leading them to search the Scriptures. Missionary work—introducing our publications into families, conversing and praying with and for them—is a good work, and one which will educate men and women to do pastoral labour."—*Colporteur Evangelist*, p. 80. "God will soon do great things for us, if we be humble and believing at His feet. More than one thousand will be converted in one day, most of whom will trace their conviction to the reading of our publications."—*Review and Herald*, Nov. 10, 1885.

THE RIGHT MESSAGE

"In those days came John the Baptist, preaching in the wilderness of Judæa, and saying, Repent ye: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." John the Baptist preached the "right message" for the people in those days. Christ not only preached this same message but He also commanded His disciples to preach it too. And today we are to preach this message through our publications.

Today the nations are making great preparations for war and any emergencies that might arise. But are we preparing ourselves and those around us to meet God? Jesus says in Revelation 22:7, 12, 20, "Behold, I come quickly." We have the message for the people today. Let us give it.

IN THE RICHT WORDS

"Then said Simon Peter, 'Lord to whom shall we go? Thou hast the words of eternal life.'" God has given us the "right words," the words of eternal life. In our magazines and books we have used "words easy to be understood." "For if the trumpet give an uncertain sound, who shall prepare himself to the battle? So

likewise ye, except ye utter by the tongue words easy to be understood, how shall it be known what is spoken? for ye shall speak into the air." 1 Cor. 14:8-9.

AT THE RIGHT TIME

The Lord speaking through the apostle Paul says: "(For He saith, I have heard thee in a time accepted, and in the day of salvation have I succoured thee: behold now is the accepted time; behold now is the day of salvation.)"

Today we are living at the end of the world. "Now all these things happened unto them for ensamples; and they are written for our admonition, upon whom the ends of the world are come."

During the month of May while on hill leave, Pastor O. A. Skau told us of an experience that recently took place in Iceland. Pastor Stokesbury, previously in India, was walking along Iceland's seashore with a VOP student one day. They were studying about the second coming of Christ. As they walked along, they saw some words written in bold letters in the sand, "The second coming of Christ is nearer than the Adventists think." This was indeed a strange message to be written in the sand.

Returning to the car parked some distance from the beach, a stranger was there requesting a ride into the city with them. While on their way to the city, Pastor Stokesbury and the VOP student continued their discussion on the Second Coming of Christ. During the discussion, the stranger in the rear seat of the car said, ""The second coming of Christ is nearer than the Adventists think." It was the very same message they had seen written in the sand! Pastor Stokesbury turned his head to ask the stranger a question and behold the back seat was empty! This heavensent message should impress us more than ever that we are now living in the "right time."

BY THE RIGHT MESSENCER

Suppose we do have it in print, the right message, in the right words, at the right time. But what about the "right messenger"? God's work requires "faithful messengers." And He is asking "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" In Colporteur Evangelist, page 42, we read, "He has sent forth His angels with the message of mercy; but, as if they did not speed on their way fast enough to (Continued on p. 9.)



•HE above question is one we I may ask ourselves occasionally, especially when we are tempted to stay away from Sabbath school. It is easy for us to think that the Sabbath school can get along without us; that there are plenty of members and we won't be missed.

Now, if we are honest with ourselves we will have to admit that we really need the Sabbath school. When was the last time you attended Sabbath school? A week ago? Two weeks ago? A month ago? Six months ago? Whether it was two weeks ago or six months ago you must admit that by staying away from Sabbath school you missed some thing.

Every member of the church is to show his loyalty by inviting the thirsty to drink of the water of life. A chain of living witnesses is to carry the invitation to the world. Will you act your part in this great work?" Jesus says, "Go ye." That means you. It means every member of His remnant church today.

We have it in print, the right message, in the right words, now at the right time! But what about the messengers? We need more of the right messengers to carry this glorious message into every nook and corner of Southern Asia. Will you say, "Here am I, send me"?

What was it you missed the most? Was it the fellowship with the other students? Yes, I'm sure that fellowship would be missed. And did you miss the opportunity to advance God's cause throughout the world field because by missing Sabbath school you did not give your offering for missions? God has a wonderful blessing in store for those who give willingly and liberally.

What else did you miss? I'm sure you must have missed the opportunity of listening to the thrilling weekly missionary report, and the special music, and the inspiring review. And above all, you must have missed the blessed experience of meeting with your class for that special thirty minutes of study as the teacher leads out in the discussion of the lesson.

All of these things I know you must miss and because of that you need the Sabbath school, but there is one thing more that I would miss if I stayed away from Sabbath school, and I am sure you would too, and that is the sweet spiritual strength that comes to one by making the daily lesson study and its discussion in the class on Sabbath a source of inspiration that builds up one's character experience and strengthens and for the trials of daily living. When we consider all of these things we must conclude that we need the Sabbath school.

But our question is "Does the Sabbath School Need You?" Of course there is only one answer to that question—"It Does!" It needs you because the Sabbath school is made up of God's children who are not only judgment bound, but heaven bound—and you are one of God's children. Without you the Sabbath school is not complete! If you are a teacher it needs you. If you are a musician it needs you. If you are the quietest member in the class it needs you. You may be the one who has the most influence on the fellowstudent who has a secret burden. Your

presence may comfort that individual. When you are absent the comfort and assurance your presence gives is missing and someone's experience may be affected.

Your presence in the class may be an inspiration to the teacher, and the questions you may ask, or the thoughts you express, may challenge the teacher to deeper study and thus bring a greater blessing to the class and the Sabbath school.

There are other reasons why you should always be in Sabbath school, but time and space will not permit recording them. We suggest a little self-analysis. Two things are established-You Need the Sabbath School. and the Sabbath School Needs You. September 25th, is Sabbath School Rally Day. A special programme has been planned in every church for that day. We invite you to be there. We want you there. God wants you there. You may disappoint us but don't disappoint Him. Plan to make this Rally Day the beginning of a new Sabbath school experience and strengthen YOUR Sabbath school by being an active member, present every Sabbath until the great Sabbath School Rally Day in Heaven.

was the Friday evening testimony service, when almost the entire audience of two hundred gave individual testimonies. Some public confessions were made, and the Spirit of God drew near.

An outstanding feature of the week was the question box, to which the students contributed in written form the problems which confronted them. The nature of the many questions indicated that the Holy Spirit was impressing the students to do a thorough job of seriously searching their own hearts. Usually two questions were answered preceding each service. Yet there was such an abundance of good questions that the entire Young People's Hour on the final Sabbath was given over to the answering of the remainder of the questions.

Perhaps the reaction of the students to the renewing power of God's Spirit can best be summed up in a statement one student wrote on his question slip which he turned in the last day of the meetings: "Last week was a blessing week for me. I like to travel on the way to victory, so I accepted Jesus as my personal Saviour. I wish your prayer for my success."

COMMENTS ON THE GENERAL CONFERENCE SESSION

F. D. NICHOL

S WE look back on that great A meeting we should be able to find rather accurately an answer to such questions as these: What kind of people are Adventists? What are their prime interests? What do they have to show for their long years of ardent, sacrificial giving in behalf of a great idea? How has the movement grown? What is its standing in the world to day?

AN UNUSUAL GATHERING

We wish to share with our readers a few of the distinctive impressions made on us by the General Conference session. First and most evident was this: Our gathering, which was more than twenty thousand in number on weekends, was unusual, and from standpoints. several Among the twenty thousand or more people present we saw none that seemed to give evidence of belonging to the financially elite. That in itself is unusual. In so large a gathering there should be, on the law of averages, a certain fraction who would be described as belonging to the upper strata of society, financially speaking. So far as outward appearance was concerned, the worshippers all seemed to belong to about the same level in society---to use a homely expression, they seemed to be just ordinary folk.

Now we can hardly believe that the financial level of all our people is essentially the same. In fact, we are quite sure it is not. To some God has given much more of this world's goods than He has to others. But evidently there must be something about the Advent Movement that keeps men and women from making on outward display of affluence. The very message we believe tends ever to lead us to simplicity of life and of dress. Certainly it turns us completely away from outward display in jewellery—and it is in this respect that wealth often makes itself most manifest. There is also something in the Advent Movement that leads us to spend our means on the great cause of God rather than on ourselves.

We do not attempt to give any full or dogmatic answer as to why all the

thousands present seemed to belong on the same level in society. But we think we have offered some valid suggestions that provide at least a partial answer. Further, we think that that partial answer should bring courage to our hearts and a renewed conviction that there is power in the message to change our lives and our sense of values.

There was something else unusual about the great gathering. Those present were most evidently happy, but they were not hilarious. How different from many great conventions held in large cities. We talked with policemen and firemen on duty at our meeting. Said one policeman to us: "I've got nothing to do here except sit around." Even the janitor could testify that the auditorium was left in good order each night, and of

course there were no cigarette stubs to sweep up.

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A great convention is considered a boon by the various businesses in a city. But the thousands at our meeting were a disappointment to the managers of theaters, bars, and similar kinds of business. Generally, bars have their most prosperous days when a convention is in town. We are different-no doubt about it. One of our brethren with a delegate badge prominent on his lapel, entered a taxicab in front of the Civic Auditorium. The cab driver looked at him and said: "Oh, you are one of the folks from the Adventist convention. You don't like tobacco. I guess_I'd better throw my cigarette away."

But unusual as were these features of our meeting, there was something still more striking. Great conventions representing big business of one kind or another invariably talk of building ever larger and of going on indefinitely into the future. It's true we talked about growing larger, but not about going on indefinitely into the our discussions future. Instead, always had as their most distinguishing mark the idea that we hope to

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that unless the military power of Japan were broken, it appeared that the Christian effort must cease. Today Japan is free, and its people may accept Christianity if they so choose. This experience has helped us to realize that the cause of truth must triumph, even in the face of apparent defeat, and we must believe that in those countries still closed, doors must eventually open for the message to enter. In these times we must hold fast our faith, enlarge our vision and plans, and make greater effort and sacrifice for the finishing of the work.

Brethren and sisters, I sometimes wonder whether we are not too cozy and comfortable in our religion, for as one man put it, "The thing wrong with religion today the world over is that it is too centrally heated." Christian evangelism will never make its maximum impact until it regains the genius of the cross, the capacity for sacrifice. The Advent Movement began in sacrifice and will end in sacrifice. We must never forget this. Indeed, it is the sacrifice of God's people that has made possible the sending of missionaries into nearly every land of earth and the sustaining of our evangelistic and institutional work in the countries where these are labouring; missionaries and wonderful have been the results.

There are many doors of opportunity still standing ajar. Appeals come to the various local, union, and division headquarters in all parts of the free world telling of earnest, sincere souls who are longing for light, and who are pleading for someone to come and tell them of the Word of Life.

However, doors of opportunity will not always be open. We need now to press forward with renewed vigour, enthusiasm, and sincerity, disregarding our adversary, and finish the task before us. FRUITAGE IN SHEFFIELD, ENGLAND

A LMOST exactly two years ago Brother R. M. A. Smart and the writer were invited to move into the Sheffield area of the North England Conference, to make advance preparations for the evangelistic drive in the city planned for the autumn of 1953.

Before undertaking this effort the writer participated in the great crusade in the city of London. It was felt that the experience gained in this way would be of infinite value in our work in Sheffield. This has proved true time and time again. We deliberately modelled our approach in this city of steel after the methods learned during those thrilling months in the metropolis, and God has truly blessed wonderfully.

Back in Sheffield, where in the meantime Brother Smart had been carrying on alone, we were joined by Sisters E. Hanna and M. M. Thomson and Brother J. Cuthell.

During the early days of our evangelistic effort some forty thousand Voice of Prophecy cards were distributed, and five thousand invitations were sent to the better-class homes. Later, many thousands of handbills were distributed from home to home. These with billboard announcements and the newspaper advertisements repeated the invitation to attend the opening city hall meetings.

The first night about 1,200 listened to the message of God and warned to the assurance of His abounding interest in their personal lives.

But where the Spirit of God is manifest, opposition is not far away, and so it proved in no uncertain way in this campaign. The first blow fell on the very day before our opening night, when Mrs. Elias was stricken down with rheumatic fever. God in His mercy preserved her from the dreaded complications, and although weak, He gave her strength to carry through her appointed tasks in the latter part of the campaign. Hardly had she left her bed before Brother Smart was involved in a motor-cycle accident in which his arm was broken, and as a result his help was severely limited for about three months at the very height of the campaign when this help was so vital. But we took courage during these and sundry other smaller troubles in the fact that where Satan actively opposes, much good must be pending; and so it proved.

Our team was temporarily augmented by the welcome and most valuable addition of Dr. J. Shone of Leeds. His health lectures during our early mid-week meetings were greatly appreciated, and they have done much to stabilize these services and to establish those attending in the message of present truth. Demonstrations in home nursing and cookery were given in conjunction with these talks and they aroused great enthu-siasm. Sister Fielding of Leeds kindly and effectively demonstrated home nursing and Sister Elias, following her recovery, took over the cookery demonstrations and carried them through weekly until the end of March.

The third angel's message was proclaimed from meeting to meeting, and God's Spirit was manifested in a wonderful way. One sister, later received into church membership, told us how for years she had gone from church to church seeking one where Jesus and His message was uplifted, and how always she was disappointed until she came to our services. Thank God, it is still true that "I, if I be lifted up . . . will draw all men unto Me." Never have we felt the Spirit of God so near as when we presented the Sabbath truth for the first time in this series.

THRILLING VICTORIES

We only wish we had space to tell you of some of the thrilling victories involved. Of the brother who for ten years had been dogged by this precious Sabbath truth and found peace and surrender during this series even though it meant losing his job and forfeiting his pension to keep God's Sabbath holy; of another brother who for many weeks absented himself from work on Saturdays without specific permission, until finally his employers decided that the whole department would pay better on a five-day week, and gave him, and all who worked under him, the sacred hours free! of the sister suffering from heart trouble, who was told by her doctor that these meetings had done more for her spiritually and physically in six months than all he had been able to do for her in years.

The fruitage of our winter's work came in two stages. On April 10 in the Manor Baptist church, kindly loaned to us for the occasion, a packed audience rejoiced with us as thirty-eight new believers publicly testified to their faith in Jesus and joined God's remnant people. We were honoured to have with us J. H. Bayliss, president of the North England Conference, who spoke before the baptism.

So far, fifty souls have been given us by the Lord of the harvest. How we praise His holy name, and thank Him for all He has done for us!— *Review and Herald*.

seems to be no room for doubt that Pinyara's life was illuminated by "the true Light, which lighteth every man that cometh into the world." Because he lived by whatever light he had, the way was prepared for his speedy acceptance of all God's truth. Soon after his baptism he developed pneumonia and complications followed. He was sent to the hospital and later died, but his last words to us were, "If I die, I will see you in heaven." He was a shining example to his people.

There is no doubt that our first baptism here has struck a powerful blow for the cause of truth. It was witnessed by a crowd estimated at two thousand, some having come from long distances. It was the first step along the road to victory.

Offi union president once said to $\frac{3}{43}$ "It seems that God raises up powerful leaders in every place to strengthen His work." This has been so in Wabag, where we have a natural leader and recognized chief as our most influential adherent. Like Pinyara, Daboiya was always a good

man and soon accepted the truth. A man of faith and prayer, he has a genuine burden for his people and is very active on behalf of the mission. Now practically all of his tribe are Seventh-day Adventists, and a large number of them, particularly the influential men, have long since joined the baptismal class, despite opposition from the other paramount chief of the tribe. Because of this, attempts have been made to intimidate Daboiya, but he has stood firm throughout. He is now preparing for baptism.

Through the influence of Daboiya two chiefs of another tribe joined the pre-baptismal class many months ago and these are zealous missionaries among their own people. Yet another tribe surprised us by asking for a Seventh-day Adventist teacher. They said, through their spokesmen, the chiefs, "We are impressed that we should have a Seventh-day Adventist teacher to help us. We have also heard of the remarkable answers to prayer received by Adventist teachers on behalf of sick people and, as we have had many deaths in our tribe recently, we wish to worship the true God in the proper way so that He may hear our prayers." We have since built an outstation amongst these people, and despite strong opposition attendance at our meetings there has been large and consistent

there has been large and consistent. For years we have been receiving calls for teachers which we have been unable to fill. At the present time we have over twenty such calls outstanding. Pray for the work in Wabag that we may find the means to feed the multitude calling for the Bread of Life.—Review and Herald.

THE SACRED BANANA OF THE GOLD COAST

CLOSE to the seat of the paramount chief of Kokofu in Ashanti, West Africa, is the village of Sebedie. In this settlement was a fetish known as "Takora." All the people in this neighbourhood gave reverent respect and honour to this idol. A sacred banana was planted near this juju, and no one was allowed to touch or eat the fruit from the tree. The idol and the grounds around were kept very sacred, and special servants swept it periodically.

One day one of our members in this town named James Adu, who had watched this foolish idea going on for years, thought to try his Christian experience on this fetish and see what would happen. In the night he took his sharp cutlass, his sword of the Lord, and utterly destroyed every one of the sacred banana trees, and quietly went back to his bed.

In the morning there was commotion and confusion in the village such as had never before been witnessed. The sacred trees were down. What had happened? Who might have committed this terrible crime? Someone wanted to die an untimely death. All this and more were an indication of the hushed and frightened remarks of the worshippers. Reports were sent to the chief and to the fetish priest. The whole town was moved and awaited tragedy. Old and young were heard weeping. Clothes were rent and burned. The chief of Sebedie humbled himself and went through the streets

in sackcloth, weeping bitterly. Now Satan was at work. The evil spirit came upon the fetish dancer and he predicted that the offender would die within ten days. His prediction did not come to pass. Another important fetish priest came and he

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predicted that the culprit would report himself after twenty days had passed. This also proved false. Guns were fired into the air and yet the offender was not traced.

Through all this commotion and ceremony our faithful brother in that village was watching what was being done. All their enchantments, all their heathen practices, all their superstitions, proved false, and under a cloud of shame the hopes and efforts of the servants of Satan failed.

The sub-chief and the priests were not satisfied; so they went to the divisional chief of Kokofu and reported to him all that had happened. The Kokofu chief looked into the case and helplessly said, "Let Takora take care and find the evildoer."

Time has passed and now Takora has proved itself a sham. No one worships it any more and many of its followers are now Seventh-day Adventists, rejoicing in a new birth of freedom from Satan and his hosts.

Here in the Gold Coast many people are afraid of these idols and jujus because of ignorance. The lazy

fetish priests are exploiting these benighted souls. It is left with us to preach Christ and Him crucified, to break these bonds of Satan, and to release them from his grip.—*Review* and Herald.

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POLIO INSURANCE AVAILABLE FROM GENERAL CONFERENCE INSURANCE SERVICE

Word has just come in from the General Conference Insurance service that insurance is available which protects for twelve diseases as follows:

Polio—Spinal Meningitis—Leukemia—Diptheria—Tetanus—Scarlet Fever—Encephalitis—Rabies—Tularemia— Elephantiasis—Multiple Neuritis—Smallpox.

Coverage for polio under the policy pays up to \$ 5000. for each case. The policy includes help for other diseases up to \$ 2,500. for any disease listed. The amount specified would be available for each separate case or separate disease.

The rate is very reasonable. For one child or individual adult \$ 5.00 premium for two years. For a family unit any size, \$ 12.00 for two years. The family unit includes all members of the family and unmarried children up to 25 years of age.

We are also informed that all polio insurance placed with the General Conference Insurance Services expires on September 15, 1954. If any of our workers in Southern Asia are interested in insuring under this plan, forms will be sent to them on application to the Secretary, General Conference of S. D. A., P. O. Box 15, Poona 1. India.
