"Our Way Ihat We Should Go"

I T WAS an unnamed hired man that made the suggestion. Some three thousand years ago two young men for three days had been looking for some stock that had wandered from the father's farm in old Palestine. Their food was gone, their money was nearly all spent in fruitless search. In discouragement Saul suggested "Let us return." Then his companion spoke.

"Behold now, there is in this city a man of God, and he is an honourable man; all that he saith cometh surely to pass: now let us go thither; peradventure he can shew us our way that we should go." I Samuel 9:6. And so the two young men turned toward the village where dwelt the prophet Samuel, for we are told that "Beforetime in Israel, when a man went to enquire of God, thus he spake, Come, and let us go to the seer, for he that is now called a prophet was beforetime called a seer." Verse 9.

Before the young men could explain their visit to the prophet he answered their question, and then Samuel delivered to Saul a message of great importance, a message concerning his life work—indeed telling

him the way he should go-for he was to be Israel's first king.

"Men went to enquire of God," says the Scripture. God wants His people to understand His purposes; to know the times in which we live and to be informed of the events of the future. In these words God declared His purpose: "If there be a prophet among you, I the Lord will make Myself known unto him in a vision, and will speak unto him in a dream." Numbers 12:6. This is the means by which God communicates with His people, informing and instructing and guiding them in the way they should go Not only in past centuries have God's children benefited by this guidance, but also in our own day, the Lord has spoken to His remnant people through the Spirit of prophecy.

A little over a hundred years ago, as the remnant Sabbath-keeping church came into being, according to the prediction of Revelation 12:17 and 19:10, a voice was heard among this people saying: "As God has shown me in holy vision." It was the voice of the Spirit of prophecy manifest in the experience of Mrs. Ellen G. White. For seventy years

that voice was heard among us guiding, counselling, instructing, and informing. What a blessing that voice has been to this people! And that voice is still heard from the thousands of pages that have come to us from the tireless pen of Ellen G. White telling us the way we should go.

Through this special gift to the church the Lord has nurtured the church and has led and counselled this people into the great lines of work being conducted around the world, and all through the years we have been guided in the conduct of this work through the many visions that were given to Mrs. White. Often the visions led us to a broader understanding of the work before us. It was so in the winter of 1874-1875.

In 1874 we had one publishing house in all the world and only one sanitarium. Both of these institutions were located at our old head-

quarters in Battle Creek, Michigan. In the fall of 1874 we sent out our first missionary. Elder Andrews was sent to Europe. In that same year we built Battle Creek College. But somehow as the buildings were being erected, some of the church members could not understand why, in view of our beliefs of the soon coming of the Lord, we should be building a college, for they felt time was too short to give our youth a college education.

Elder and Mrs. White were persuaded to remain in Battle Creek for the dedication service scheduled for Tuesday morning, January 5, 1875, so that Mrs. White especially could help our people understand why we were establishing a college. As the time for the meeting neared, Mrs. White took sick and grew worse from day to day. When they reached the day before the important dedication service, Mrs. White was very ill, and Elder White sent for the doctor to come to the home and examine her. Mrs. White was pronounced a very sick woman, and Elder White was urged to send her to the sanitarium for proper treatment. But she was needed the next day at the dedication sevice, and so Elder White sent for the elders of the church.

The three ministers prayed for Mrs. White's healing as she sat wrapped in blankets in a rocking chair in the living room of the White home. After the ministers had prayed, Mrs. White in a whisper began to plead with God for strength and health, and while praying was taken off in vision. The men knew that she was in vision, for there was that familiar shout of "Glory to God! Glory to God!" Then she was breathless for a full ten minutes. During the vision Mrs. White arose and walked about the room, exclaiming at first: "Dark, all dark, so dark!" And then "A light, a little light, more light, much light!" After the vision she returned to her bedroom, and when Elder White returned home later in the afternoon, he found her completely healed and busy with her work of writing. She attended a night meeting with her husband, and the next day took her place at the dedication service.

As Mrs. White explained the vastness of the work before Seventh-day Adventists and the need of educating our young people, she related the vision of the day before. She told of how she saw the world enveloped in darkness and then later covered with light, which typified the extent of the work before us and the need of a training school. It was this she was seeing as she had made the exclamations in the vision. Then she told the assembled group that she had seen printing presses in different parts of the world printing the message in many languages. James White, eager to know where we should send workers and establish publishing houses, interrupted her and inquired if she could name the countries, but she replied that the angel did not give her the names, but if she should ever see those printing presses she should recognize them. This vision led all present to see the wider scope of the work than any had anticipated.

Ten years after this vision, Mrs. White was in Europe, and as she was taken to our headquarters' building she recognized the surroundings, the building and its equipment.



As she entered the printing office she exclaimed: "I have seen these presses before. These are the printing presses shown me ten years ago in the vision in Battle Creek." Then as she was introduced to the two pressmen, she inquired for a third man she had seen in the vision ten years before, but whom she missed as she entered the room. Upon inquiry she learned that the man she missed was in town on business. The next day she met him and delivered a message given her for him. Ten years earlier she had seen in vision not only a publishing house not yet established at the time of the vision, but also the man.

Mrs. White later recognized the presses in the printing offices in Norway and Australia, and it brought courage to the hearts of the workers and confidence as they contemplated that the institutions and equipment had been shown her in vision so many years before. Again

and again the Lord has led His people to a broad and correct understanding of the work before us through the visions given to Mrs. White. As we contemplate this we are reminded of a precious promise found in Psalms 32:8: "I will instruct thee and teach thee in the way which thou shalt go: I will guide thee with Mine eye." This promise is for us personally in these uncertain days. How tender the thought that God guides His children with His all-seeing eye, an eye that sees from the beginning to the end.

But, dear friends, God can teach us in the way we should go, only as we do as the two young men did of old. We must go to the seer or the prophet. This we can do by studying and applying the many messages of counsel and guidance which God has given us in His Word and in the Spirit of prophecy writings given us in our times. "Come, and let us go to the seer."

of healthful living that will insure good health and clean minds and make us fit dwelling places for His holy spirit. He has given us counsel as to the education of our youth, and He has given us our wide medical programme that brings relief to thousands throughout the world. The spiritual paths that we should follow have been outlined for us. May we as church members search the pages diligently that we may know what God requires of us. I am sure that all of you, with me, value the writings of the Spirit of prophecy as we value no other book, outside of the Bible. We do not want them to take the place of the Bible, but they can be a handbook for a better understanding of the precious truths that God has given us, they can enrich our lives and help us to reach the standard that He wants us to obtain before He takes us in through the gates into the kingdom that He has gone to prepare for us. How good God has been. Let us show our appreciation by heeding His counsel and becoming better acquainted with the writings of the prophet of God in our private devotion and study.

THE SPIRIT OF PROPHECY AND OUR MEDICAL WORK

THE world is sick, and whereever the children of men dwell,
suffering abounds. In all lands,
notwithstanding the advancement of
medical and surgical science, sickness and disease are increasing. The
"great white plague" takes its tens
of thousands; degenerative and
malignant diseases exact their heavy
toll; and many lesser complaints
undermine the physical constitution
and sap the strength. On every hand
mankind is seeking relief from pain
and sickness.

It is not the Creator's purpose that the human family should be weighed down with a burden of pain; that his activities should be curtailed by illness, that his strength wane and his life be cut short by disease. But all too frequently the laws established by God to govern the life and emphasized by the Spirit of prophecy, are flagrantly transgressed; sin enters the heart, and man loses sight of his dependence upon God, the source of life and health. Then follow the penalties of transgression—pain, sickness, and death.

To understand the physical laws governing the body and to bring the life practice into harmony with these laws is a duty of first importance. There is need for an understanding of the many factors contributing to true happiness—a cheerful home, obedience to the laws of life, proper relationship to our fellow-men. When sickness comes, it is essential that we employ the varied agencies which, in co-operation with nature's efforts, will build up the body and restore the health. There is also a larger and more vitally important question, that of our relationship to the Creator, who originally gave man his life, who made every provision for his continued happiness, and who is interested in his welfare.

From the early days of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, the importance of living in harmony with the principles that make for health has been prominently featured in the writings of the Spirit of prophecy.

In August, 1864, a 32-page article entitled, "Health," was written and published by Mrs. E. G. White. This was the first comprehensive treatise on the subject found in any Seventh-day Adventist publication. This article brought to view the present widespread condition of sickness, disease, and deformity in the human race, and pointed out that the cause could be traced back to disregard for the laws of health. Since the fall of man, she stated, there has been a

violation of the laws of health by the human family, with the result disease has been steadily increasing. The cause has been followed by the effect. The prevalence of perverted appetite was traced through Bible history, with reference to the antediluvians, to the inhabitants of Sodom and Gomorrah, to the attempted diet reform when the children of Israel were in the wilderness, with their rebellion against it, and to the story of Nadab and Abihu as illustrating the results of intemperance. Emphasis was laid upon the express command against the use of swine's flesh. The evils of presentday indulgence in liquor and tobacco were vividly portrayed, and the stimulating effects of tea and coffee were pointed out.

From this small beginning our present world-wide health programme originated, and all under the direction of the Holy Spirit as revealed through the writings of Mrs. E. G. White.

PUBLISHING PROPHETICALLY PLANNED

HE birth of the Publishing department traces back to the Spirit of prophecy. Before ever there was a church, conference, or mission organization the Lord's messenger said, "You must begin to print a little paper and send it out to the people. Let it be small at first; but as the people read, they will send you means with which to print, and it will be a success from the first."—Colporteur Ministry, p. 1.

Later there came this counsel, "As long as probation continues there will be opportunity for the canvasser to work."—Colporteur Ministry, p. 11.

The first statement has been abundantly fulfilled, and we have faith to believe and evidence on which to base our faith, that the latter will yet meet its complete fulfilment.

From its beginning clear through to its consummation the publishing work is based on the positive instruction of the prophetic gift to this movement. All through the years when a crisis would arise the Spirit of prophecy would point the way out of the difficulty and when the counsel was followed prosperity invariably resulted.

The work which began just about a hundred years ago with a small edition of a paper which was carried to the post in a carpet bag, has grown into a mighty stream of literature pouring forth from some forty publishing houses strategically situated around the world.

If the pages of the literature published in the year 1954 were placed end to end and side by side it would form a band of paper clear round the world at least three feet wide. In value this amounted to over Rs. 80,952,381-10.

And since the work began the paper used would cover a street over thirty yards wide belting the entire earth, and valued at the sum of Rs. 1,274,391,407-5.

Consistent follow-up work has made the literature ministry more effective, and this in turn has been of great benefit to the minister in souls baptized into the truth.

An elderly minister was baptizing as many people into the truth each year as the outstanding younger evangelists. The secret was discovered in his refusal to work in a given

area unless he had two or three literature evangelists working with him. He followed their contacts and obtained many a decision.

If only all our evangelists would follow the divine blue print in this matter how many more souls would be won!

RE-ORGANIZATION OF THE NORTHWEST UNION

T. R. TORKELSON

READERS of the "TIDINGS" will be interested to know of the recent developments in the work in Northwestern India, especially since the re-organization of the field at the time of the last year-end Division session.

At that time a new church organization was created out of a part of the territory of the former Northwestern India Union. It now presents its news separately to "Tidings" under the heading readers "Bombay State Section." With Bombay separated from the territory of the Union, it became necessary to select another site for our headquarters. The place chosen was Delhi. The move has already taken place and now the functions of the Union office are being carried on normally from there. Pastor L. E. Allen, who for many years has been connected with the work in Northwestern India, is the secretary-treasurer.

A new staff of departmental leaders has also been chosen. Pastor I. M. Chand is the Voice of Prophecy secretary; and Mr. C. H. Tidwell, principal of Roorkee High School, is Educational and M. V. secretary. Pastor C. R. Holford, who is now on furlough, is to be the Home Missionary and Sabbath School secretary upon his return this summer. Mr. L. D. Paul, who has been leading the colporteur forces in two of the local sections for the past two years, is the union Publishing carry department as well, in an acting capacity.

Doctors Bazliel, who have been on an overseas programme of advanced study, returned to India in February, and are now busy getting the Simla medical work going again. Dr. I. R. Bazliel is the Medical secretary for the Union, as well as the Director of the Simla Sanitarium and Hospital.

In addition to the Roorkee High

School, there is another boarding school in the Union, located at Hapur. Pastor B. M. Shad is the principal there. Both these schools have just reported a profitable Week of Prayer, with Pastor W. H. Mattison leading out at Roorkee, and Mr. C. A. Chacko at Hapur.

There are three local sections within the Union as it is organized at present. The Central India section, with headquarters at Nagpur, is under the direction of Pastor M. D. Moses. The North India Section, with its headquarters at Jullunder, is under the leadership of Pastor W. H. Mattison. In between these two comes the Upper Ganges section, which at present is being administered from Delhi by Pastor S. P. Vitrano, who is acting president along with his duties as Union evangelist.

Negotiations are still going on for the purchase of a piece of property for Union headquarters in Delhi. It is hoped that this work may be finalized soon and the offices moved to church-owned premises.

A Bible colporteur called at a home and asked the lady if she had a Bible. "Do you think I am a heathen? Of course I have a Bible," she replied. Then she sent her daughter to bring the Bible. After some searching it was brought. On opening the Book, the woman of the house said, "Well, I am glad you called. Here are my glasses, which I lost several months ago and never could find." How sad it is that in millions of homes the Bible, though it may be found, is seldom opened.

"And in their home there is a Book With pages seldom turned, Whose messages of truth and hope Are still by them unlearned—

The Book that tells of Him who came
To earth that we might know
The beauty of a sinless life,
Lived here so long ago.

"'Tis sad they do not really know This man of Galilee, Who healed the lame, the blind, the de

Who healed the lame, the blind, the deaf, Beside the sapphire sea! And still they read and laugh and cry O'er stories of the hour,

And let the Book, dust covered lie Unopened in its power."

Blessed is the man, the woman, who keeps close to the Bible. We are living in perilous days, in days of lawlessness, perpexity, and fear. We have long been forewarned of them by the prophetic pages of the Book, particularly certain pages of the New Testament. Can any thoughtful man er woman help feeling serious now? Little that is human will abide the coming ordeal. How thankful we should be for the living and abiding Word of God! Let us consult it often and treasure its guiding counsel, and prepare ourselves for eventualities, and for the glorious things promised the faithful children of God.—Review and Herald.

Introduction:

1. God's picture of the kind of men and women He intends to take into His eternal kingdom is clear-cut and unblurred. He knows what type of person He can trust to maintain the principles of His government and never again rebel against, His loving authority. Through every means at His command He is working to bring His people to that perfection of character. But perfection does not come suddenly. It is a growing experience. Sister White speaks of it this way:

a. "You have watched the rising sun, and the gradual break of day over earth and sky. Little by little the dawn increases, till the sun appears; then the light grows constantly stronger and clearer until the full glory of noontide is reached. This is a beautiful illustration of what God desires to do for His children in perfecting their Christian experience. As we walk day by day in the light He sends us, in willing obedience to all His requirements, our experience grows and broadens until we reach the full stature of men and women in Christ Jesus."-Messages to Young People, p. 15.

b. "Self-denial, self-sacrifice, benevolence, kindness, love, patience, fortitude, and Christian trust are the daily fruits borne by those who are truly connected with God."-The Sanctified Life, p. 10. (Read 1 Thessalonians 5:23; Matthew 5:48.) These are the characteristics God is trying to develop in each of His professed children.

- 2. Character must be developed in God's way. For man to follow his own pattern of growth is disastrous.
- a. The Holy Spirit teaches us all we need to know about the plan of salvation, and leads us to accept the plan and apply it in our own lives. He convicts of sin and glorifies Christ as the deliverer from sin. (John 14:26; 16:13-15.)
- b. The Holy Spirit works largely by means of the revelations given through the prophets. It is He who through the ages has moved God's spokesmen to speak and write as they have (2 Peter 1:21). It is He who has applied the messages of the prophets to individual lives, and worked out in behalf of the indi-


vidual the salvation Christ has provided for all.

- (1) The Bible is the primary means through which this work has been accomplished. It is the message of the prophets in the written Word, portraying the life, and power, and salvation of the living Word-Christ Himself.
- (2) In the last days, as was clearly predicted in the Bible, God has given another manifestation of the prophecy-through gift of ministry of Ellen G. White. Seventhday Adventists recognize this demonstration as a part of God's plan for leading men and women to a full knowledge of Bible truth and helping them apply its principles to their lives in making preparation for the soon-coming kingdom.
- 3. Paul included both of these manifestations of the Spirit of prophecy -he calls it "the testimony of Christ"-in speaking of making preparation to be "blameless in the day of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Text: 1 Corinthians 1:4-8 (Read)


a. Note that they were enriched "in all utterance, and in all knowledge; even as [or to the extent that] the testimony of Christ was confirmed" in them. They grew spiritually to the extent that the messages of God through the prophets were established in their minds.

b. These declarations were made with the people in mind who



were "waiting for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ." Paul's desire for them was that they should come behind in none of the gifts Christ had placed in the church.

4. What is the place of this last-day manifestation of the gift of prophecy in the church? "As the end draws near and the work of giving the last warning to the world extends, it becomes more important for those who accept present truth to have a clear understanding of the nature and influence of the Testimonies (Generally speaking, the word "testimonies" as used in this sermon

refers to any or all of the Ellen G. White writings, and not simply to the nine volumes of Testimonies for the Church.) which God in His providence has linked with the work of the third angel's message from its very rise."—Testimonies, Vol. 5, p. 654.

5. The writings of Ellen G. White are one means God is using to lead us into the kind of spiritual experience essential for those preparing for entrance into the kingdom of God.

Rightful Place of the Spirit of **Prophecy Writings**

Here is a brief summary in the words of Mrs. White of what God intends the place of the Spirit of prophecy writings to be.

"You are not familiar with the Scriptures. If you had made God's Word your study, with a desire to reach the Bible standard and attain to Christian perfection, you would not have needed the Testimonies. It is because you have neglected to acquaint yourselves with God's inspired Book that He has sought to reach you by simple, direct testimonies, calling your attention to the words of inspiration which you had neglected to obey, and urging you to fashion your lives in accordance with its pure and elevated teachings. . . . Additional truth is not brought out; but God has through the Testimonies simplified the great truths already given, and in His own chosen way brought them before the people to awaken and impress the mind with them, that all may be left without excuse. . . . The Testimonies are not to belittle the Word of God.

but to exalt it and attract minds to it, that the beautiful simplicity of truth may impress all."—Testimonies, Vol. 5, p. 665.

Three principal purposes of the Testimonies are given: (1) to exalt and call attention to the Bible, (2) to simplify great Bible truths, (3) to urge us and help us to apply Bible principles in fashioning our lives. 1. To call attention to the Bible. From the very beginning to the close of the ministry of Ellen White she sought not to call attention to her own writings, but through them to focus minds on the Bible. Her kevnote ever was: "I recommend to you, dear reader, the Word of God as the rule of your faith and practice. By that Word we are to be judged."-Experience and Views, p. 64.

Every page of the writings must be allowed to direct our minds to some phase of Bible truth. Every time a portion is studied, the thinking of the student should be urged on to deeper Bible study. The lastday Spirit of prophecy writings cannot be separated for a moment from the Bible. If one would have them occupy their rightful place in his life, he must permit them to turn his thinking to the Word of God as the rule of his faith and practice. 2. To simplify great Bible truths. After millenniums of the inroads of sin on men's minds, and gross neglect of the Bible, human thinking is so out of harmony with God's thinking that it is difficult, if not impossible, for many to grasp some of the simplest of Bible truths. Erroneous teachings are so widespread, and confusion regarding spiritual matters is so general, even though nearly all men have access to the same Bible, that the Lord has graciously given the Spirit of prophecy writings to serve as a guide that we might discover from the Bible what is truth. Here are some examples:

Few definitions or descriptions make prayer seem so simple and so real as do these words of Ellen White: "Prayer is the opening of the heart to God as to a friend."—Steps to Christ, p. 97. Who can misunderstand or fail to grasp such a simple but sufficient definition?

Many learned discussions have failed to result in producing satisfactory definitions of faith. But the Lord has given, among others, one that is simple and understandable in Education, page 253. "Faith is trusting God, believing that He loves us, and knows best what is for our good."

The meaning of sanctification is clearly set forth in Life Sketches, page 237. Sanctification is "daily dying to self and daily conformity to the will of God." It is simply a matter of setting our own will and wishes aside when they conflict with the will of God, and doing what He wants us to do rather than what we might naturally choose. This practice may be followed until, in the words of Sister White, "if we consent, He will so identify Himself with our thoughts and aims, so blend our hearts and minds into conformity to



His will, that when obeying Him we shall be but carrying out our own impulses."—The Desire of Ages, p. 668.

3. To urge us and help us to apply Bible principles in fashioning our lives. It is not enough to turn one's attention to the learning of Bible truth, nor is it sufficient to grasp the meaning of the simple explanations given in the writings of Ellen White. We need to know how to apply these principles to our daily living. A little later we shall notice how the writings help us to apply the principles of truth so that they become a part of our character.

Danger of Indifference

No message that our God has sent to us is unessential. That being the case, serious attention should be given to all the counsel and instruction He has provided for us.

- 1. It is not necessary for us consciously to set aside instruction in order to reject light. "To disregard light is to reject it."—Testimonies, Vol. 5, p. 680. If one fails to put into practice in his life instruction that applies to him, he is as truly rejecting light as though he turned away from it altogether and bitterly opposed both the messenger and the message.
- 2. The most serious consequence of indifference to light is this: Through light sent from heaven it is God's plan to lead us into His kingdom. He has made no other plan for our guidance. If we ignore the light He has sent, what more can He do?
- a. "The Testimonies of the Spirit of God are given to direct men to His Word, which has been neglected. Now if their messages are not heeded, the Holy Spirit is shut away from the soul. What further means has God in reserve to reach the erring ones, and show them their true condition?"—Notebook Leaflets, Vol. 1, No, 22, pp. 1, 2.

b. In Testimonies, Volume 8, p. 298, it is stated: "Perilous times are before us. Everyone who has a knowledge of the truth should awake and place himself, body, soul, and spirit, under the discipline of God. The enemy is on our track. We must be wide awake, on our guard against him. We must put on the whole armour of God. We must follow the directions given through the Spirit of prophecy. We must love and obey the truth for this time. This will save us from accepting strong delusions. God has spoken to us through His Word. He has spoken to us through the testimonies to the church, and through the books that have helped to make plain our present duty and the position that we should now occupy. The warnings that have been given, line upon line, precept upon precept, should be heeded. If we disregard them, what excuse can we offer?"

What the Messages of the Books Can Do for Us Today

The moment we willingly allow the messages of God to occupy their rightful place in our thinking, God is able to work mightily to use them to bring about a transformation in our lives and give us a series of uninterrupted victories. (The Desire of Ages, p. 679.)

1. To the unconverted heart the achievement of the kind of character portrayed in the Bible as required of the Christian appears to be an utter impossibility. Even the converted man cannot fully grasp the idea that God can actually perfect his character. That the life of every Christian may bear the full fruit of the Spirit-love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, and temperance (selfcontrol)—seems incredible. Yet it is not only a possibility but a distinct necessity for the ones who will enter the kingdom of God.

2. The writings of Ellen G. White are intended by God to guide us in developing these characteristics. We shall notice only two of them briefly.

a. Love. The supreme mark of identification of one possessed of the Spirit is love. (Read John 13:35; Matthew 22:37-39.) What is there in the Ellen G. White writings that will help us to know how to experience this first and most conspicuous trait of Christian character?

First, the need is forcefully pointed out. "No matter how high the profession, he whose heart is not filled with love for God and his fellowmen, is not a true disciple of Christ."-The Acts of the Apostles, p. 318. Next, we are told how love comes into the life. "As they feed upon His Word, they find that it is spirit and life. The Word destroys the natural, earthly nature, and imparts a new life in Christ Jesus. The Holy Spirit comes to the soul as a Comforter. By the transforming agency of His grace, the image of God is reproduced in the disciple; he becomes a new creature. Love takes the place of hatred, and the heart receives the divine similitude. This is what it means to live 'by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God.' "—The Desire of Ages, p. 391.

MAINTAINING

THE SPIRITUAL GLOW

HARRY M. TIPPETT

"Listen—it is the Eternal speaking—be not too proud to hearken; do honour to the Eternal, to your God, before the darkness falls, before your footsteps stumble on the twilight hills, before the gleam you look for turns to a dead gloom." Jer. 13:15, 16.*

In his spiritual autobiography the poet Dante described himself as being in a dark forest, apparently lost

"I found me in a gloomy wood, astray."

He saw that the way out of spiritual gloom, then as now, was in the upward look. Suddenly coming to the base of a sunlit mountain, he got a glimpse of the vision splendid and in allegorical figure wrote:

"I looked aloft, and saw his shoulders broad

Already vested in that planet's beam

Who leads all wanderers safe through every way."

The hill, of course, was the life he fain would live. It was steep and difficult, but led out of the valley mists and gloomy entanglements of the wood into the light of the hilltop illumined by the Sun of righteousness. The poet then described the dangers that Beset his journey: first, a panther, symbol of youthful lust. which he drove away; then the lion of the pride of successful manhood overtook him and nearly vanquished him; finally, when the zenith of the hill came into sight, a lean wolf, suggestive of avarice, the sin of advancing age, appears. But he held true to his vision and emerged triumphant.

The spiritual gleam that lures us on is not always to be found in a blinding flash of light such as struck Paul down on his way to Damascus. It must be sought in the means of grace God gives us, for there must be a guiding star of hope and inspiration in every life that aspires to measure up to what God requires of His followers.

Nothing is sadder in one's experience than when he loses the glow of the eternal out of his heart. For when one has lost that gleam, all the roads of life are lonely, and the shadows take a heavy toll of courage. Daily tasks become wearisome, and their routine is unrelieved by hope. Unless the light breaks through, the march of years will inevitably touch with gray those symbols of faith that once shone with glory.

It is so easy to lose the spiritual glow that suffused our hearts in our first experiences with God. And when the preacher has lost it, his sermons are arid rhetorical wastes. When the statesman has lost it, the nation he serves bends its neck to new burdens. When the toiler has lost it, his toil is fretful and prodigal of strength. When duty has lost it, the paths of life are flinty and cut our feet. When love has lost it, the heart can never soar again, and time becomes what Carlyle describes as "Only a little space between two eternities."

But when the light of God's holiness shines on the eternal hills, beckoning us on, no matter how many battles we lose, we shall win the war, for our faces will be ever forward.—Review and Herald.

In the *Index* to the Writings of E. G. White there are more than twenty columns of references to the subject of love, many of them pointing out how love may be made a growing part of our character.

b. Self-Control (temperance). As the word temperance is used in the inventory of characteristics

making up the fruit of the Spirit, its primary thought is the broad one of self-contol.

"The highest evidence of nobility in a Christian is self-control."—The Desire of Ages, p. 301. "No other victory we can gain will be so precious as the victory gained over self."—Gospel Workers, p. 475. "The real greatness of the man is measured by the power of the feelings that he controls, not by those that control him."—Patriarchs and Prophets, p. 568.

These simple suggestions from Gospel Workers, page 475 will help you. "We are to live, not to guard our feelings or our reputation, but to save souls. As we become interested in the salvation of souls, we cease to mind the little differences that so often arise in our association with one another. Whatever others may think of us, it need not disturb our oneness with Christ, the fellowship of the Spirit. . . Do not retaliate. So far as you can do so, remove all cause for misapprehension."

Are you sometimes tempted to give way to discouragement? "If you do not feel light-hearted and joyous, do not talk of your feelings. . . . Instead of thinking of your discouragements, think of the power you can claim in Christ's name. Let your imagination take hold upon things unseen. Let your thoughts be directed to the evidences of the great love of God for you. . . Then talk of the promises; talk of Jesus' willingness to bless. He does not forget us for one brief moment."—Gospel Workers, p. 478.

Similar practical, workable suggestions for putting God's great principles of life to work in your own experience will be found in connec-

tion with every phase of your daily experience. This is God's way of helping you to make daily preparation for the kingdom.

Conclusion and Appeal

1. The Ellen G. White writings do not present something new and different in spiritual thinking or Christian standards. They are Bible truth simplified and brought to bear on practical problems of today's living.

2. They leave us without excuse for failing to grasp and apply Bible principles. "Additional truth is not brought out; but God has through the Testimonies simplified the great truths already given and in His own chosen way brought them before the people, to awaken and impress the mind with them, that all may be left without excuse."—Testimonies, Vol. 5, p. 665.

3. They wall us in to keep us from neglecting or rejecting God's counsel. "As the Word of God is walled in with these books and pamphlets, so has God walled you in with reproofs, counsel, warnings, and encouragements."—Testimonies, Vol. 5, p. 666.

4. It is not necessary to tear down the wall to destroy its effectiveness. We need only to refuse to accept its protection. But in these days we need all the advantage that God can give us in our battle with the enemy.

After reading the nine volumes of the Testimonies for the Church, one said, "The blessing I got out of that reading leads me to think of my life as 'before I read the Testimonies through,' and 'since I did.' The overall picture I got has meant much to me. I was impressed with the perfect timeliness of the writings. I was greatly impressed with the good business judgment sense, balance, reasonableness, acumen, wholesomeness, and encouragement in them. I found no fanaticism, no extremes, no morbidness. I found psychological, and even scientific and medical information that anticipated the best in modern thought and faithfully warned against the peculiar evils of the age.

"I am repeating that reading. If every professed Seventh-day Adventist did such reading, in simple faith, I do not see how there could be any apostasies, offshoots, or fanatic parties within us, or 'new light' upsetting confidence."

Results like this can be accomplished because these writings tie men and women to the Scriptures.

5. Today is the day to decide to begin reading according to some simple plan, such as the one suggested for reading the Testimonies, or Testimony Treasures. It may be you will want to read the Character Classics, or the Health Classics.

a. God wants us to use what He has put in our hands. If we leave our books on the shelf, are we not in practice rejecting the counsel by ignoring it?

b. How many will determine and pledge today to begin to read the precious Spirit of prophecy books? (Call attention to Spirit of prophecy books)

I was a little discouraged and the boys' hotel bills were going up, so I asked them to go to Aijal and I would spend the next two days canvassing. I told them that if I made any sales I would send the amounts in their favour to the book depot. The boys, according to my instructions, packed up everything and off they went on the third day.

After sending the boys away, I took my Bible for my evening worship. When I opened it casually my eyes fell on the 6th chapter of Judges wherein the beautiful story of Gideon is mentioned. I read the first few verses and I was very much interested. I came to the place where the Lord told Gideon, "Go in thy might, thou mighty man of valour." Then I kept on reading the chapter till I came to the experience of Gideon, how he proved the Lord with the fleece.

After reading the Bible I knelt down and prayed and told the Lord that I fully believed He had called Gideon to lead out the children of Israel against the Midianites. Also that if I made a sale in the first house that I would go to in the morning I would definitely believe that the Lord had called me. So next morning I went out early with a bag full of books and as I went along I felt that someone was going along by my side. Several times I looked back to see if anyone was following me. There was no other human being on the road on that cold morning. I went to a house which happened to be the house of the Additional Superintendent of Police, Silchar. I knocked at the door. The gentleman was still in his bed but on hearing my knock he came out in his night clothes to see who was knocking at the door so early in the morning. He greeted me and invited me to come in. Before I was half way through the canvass, he told me that he was not interested in the magazine but in some way or other he was impressed to give me something that morning. For Youth Seeking Denominational Employment

WHAT IS THE ESSENTIAL QUALIFICATION?

Louis K. Dickson

HE greatest need of the church is for men and women who are qualified for the finishing of God's work. Qualifications for service and for leadership in this final hour of God's cause are becoming more and more exacting. Those whom the Lord can use most effectively are the men and women who are chosen by Him not only because of training as ordinarily considered, but because of spiritual fitness for the great experiences that are to mark these final hours.

The question is often asked, particularly by the younger generation within our ranks, "Are the possibilities for denominational employment lessening today as compared to former years?" In answering this question we are constrained to say that nothing has transpired in these later years to change the possibilities and opportunities before our young people for entering the service of God. It is true that the numbers of graduates from our educational institutions are continually mounting, but we must remember also that God's cause is expanding and the needs are multiplying. Because of the high spiritual qualifications that the Lord has held out, it is becoming more and more difficult, regardless of the multiplication of numbers, to find well-qualified men and women after God's own order.

Surely the Lord was with me that day, and as Gideon proved Him, even so I proved Him, and I am convinced that this Literature Evangelism is ordained of God and it must go forward under all circumstances.

Is Spiritual Fitness Assumed?

The consciousness of superiority in knowledge and material achievement has led dangerously to present-day claims to superiority in spiritual knowledge and achievement. We need to ponder well whether these two achievements have developed together in the lives of prospective workers, or whether spiritual fitness is but assumed. Until we reach out to scale greater heights in spiritual attainment, opportunities for denominational employment will seem to lessen. It is possible for one to have a fine equipment of material tools with which to do a work for God but hands too weak and trembling to use them. There is a significant meaning in Christ's own words to His disciples when He said, "Ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you." Acts 1:8.

In these final days of triumph there must come into our work a

new resurgence of the old pioneer spirit. We need men and women who are fervent and zealous for the cause of God, as were the apostles of old and the pioneers of this message. We need a new vision of the possibilities and opportunities for superior service there are in the church of God. The lack of this vision alone is the reason for the seeming lack of opportunities and possibilities in this present hour.

We should realize more than we do the temporary nature of present opportunities. Soon the work will be finished. As never before, Satan is seeking to disintegrate and undermine our judgment to the point where we will not sense the great needs of the work. There is no question but that God does find some whom He can trust with great responsibilities. Undoubtedly He sees some who have the capacity for leadership, devotion, sacrifice, and consecration commensurate with the present hour.

We must now gird ourselves for the final battles of the Lord. No spiritual giants of the past shall surpass those of today. Think of the apostles, the martyrs, the great spiritual stalwarts of the past, as well as the founders of this message.

Were the apostles "able . . . to stand"? We shall be more able. Were the apostles "able to quench all the fiery darts of the wicked"? We shall be more able. Were the apostles able to pull down the strongholds of the
