A LAST

AGENCY IN FINISHING THE WORK

Sometime ago a challenging and thought-provoking pamphlet was written, entitled "A Drop of Ink Can Make a Million Think." Many drops can make many millions think. I wonder sometimes if we fully appreciate the tremendous power of literature, and the important part it has to play in finishing this work.

A few years ago there was a newspaper strike in a large city, there had not been such a thing for over a hundred years. It is reported that eight out of every ten people were asking "What, no newspaper?" Radio and television will never take the place of the daily newspaper which a man can sit down and read at leisure. Nor will they ever supersede the place of literature in the finishing of this work. They will be silenced but no government nor any other power can stop the literature which is already in the hands of the people from speaking its message to the seeking heart.

When we reach the final critical moments of this world's history it would seem that only two forms of organized work will exist, the literature ministry and the medical work. All other organized work will be brought to a standstill.

The Protestant churches in general are not making the use of literature that was made by the early church. The Reformation was very largely brought about by an



attack with literature. During the sixteenth century, more than one million pieces of literature were printed on slow, hand-operated printing presses, in Germany alone.

What was it that made William Carey such a great influential force in India? Not his preaching, but his pen. Before he sailed from England he said to William Ward, a printer and editor, "If the Lord blesses us we shall want a person of your business to enable us to print the Scriptures." William Carey was directly or indirectly responsible for publishing the Scriptures or portions thereof, in some forty different languages. What was the effect of this great printing achievement? The historian Richter wrote, "During the first thirty years of the last century, so fresh and far-reaching was the influence of the men of Serampore, (that) literary work was the main item on the programme of every mission and every large and well equipped station possessed its printing press."

It is claimed that even unjust government officials feared the pen of the missionary. I believe that today our crying need is for our national and overseas workers to get some ink into their pens, and do some writing.

In India today you could buy a copy of every Christian book that is written in the four major languages, Tamil, Telugu, Hindi and Bengali for less than the amount of literature delivered by one of our leading colporteurs in one month.

This lack of Christian literature is not peculiar to India alone. In Africa there are still 94 different languages which have only one Christian book in each language. In Japan where literacy is very high they have only 57 different orthodox Christian books.

In India today literacy has greatly increased. It is estimated that there are 200 million more reading adults today than there were only 25 years ago. What a tremendous opportunity and challenge this is to us as a people. The apostle of the adult literacy programme, Frank Laubach is reported to have said concerning India, "I am unloosing something

Even Mahatma Gandhi doubted the wisdom of teaching the multitudes of India to read, if no better reading material was available to them, than that which is found on the streets and railway bookstalls.

To teach a child or an adult to read and then send him back to his village with nothing but the current trash to read is to make him an educated villain. It is like the evil spirit going back into the house which has been swept and garnished. "The last state of that man is worse than the first."

The whole Protestant world is faced with the tremendous challenge of providing books and periodicals that can compete with the flood of atheistic, secular, and anti-Christian literature which is sweeping the world.

The Roman Catholic Church is using literature as never before to convince the world that she is the only true church. In Japan they are publishing a type of "digest" which is competing with secular magazines in circulation figures. They are also preparing to move a team of twenty-three men into West Africa, in an endeavour to capture the religious market in that area of the world.

They have chosen the psychological moment to do this because many nations are planning to help make the coming generation of Africans much more literate. They will probably succeed, because for the first time in history the masses of Africans are beginning to understand that success and progress depends very largely on the ability to read and study.

The communists have long since realised the mighty power of literature, they claim that the pen is mightier than the sword. With an estimated one-third of the world communists, it would seem that they have proved that books are more powerful than bombs. Bombs may compel submission but books bring the mind and will into subjection. Communists claim that they won China by pen.

In a concentration camp in China a Missionary was studying her Bible. The guard came up and laughed at her. He said that Communists could place two of their books in the hands of any Chinese who could read and make a communist of him, because their literature is so powerful and effective.

Communism is flooding the world with literature, spending tremendous sums of money on the enterprise. In 1954 alone, Russia and her satellites set as their goal the publishing of five billion pieces of literature—enough to place two pieces in the hands of every man, woman and child in the world.

They are spending \$40 for every \$1 that the United States is putting into literature to reach the minds of the uncommitted peoples of the world. They increased the volume of literature which they are publishing in twenty-four free world languages by 41 per cent in one year. It is a tragic fact that non-Christian cults are spending more money to win converts, than the combined all Protestant denominations put together.

In India where we have some 700,000 villages there is an ample supply of communist literature available in almost every village, even those in the most remote areas.

The following is from the Communist publication Paix et Liberte, reprint in "Dawn."

"The gospel is a much more powerful weapon for the renewal of society than is our Marxist Philosophy, but all the same it is we who finally will beat you. We are only a handful and you Christians are numbered by the millions. But if you remember the story of Gideon and his three hundred companions, you will understand why I am right. We communists do not play with words. We are realists and, seeing that we are determined to achieve our object, we know how to obtain the means. Of our salaries and wages, we keep only what is strictly necessary, and we give up the rest for propaganda, we also "consecrate" all our free time, and part of our holidays. You, however, give only a little time and hardly any money for the spreading of the Gospel of Christ. How can anyone believe in the supreme value of this Gospel if you do not practise it, if you do not spread it, and if you sacrifice neither time nor money for it? Believe me, it is we who will win, for we believe in our communist message and we are ready to sacrifice everything, even our life, in order that social justice shall triumph. But you people are afraid to soil your hands."

This may not apply to us in the same way as it does to other church groups, but it is at least a challenge to us.

What are we doing to reach the remote villages of this country? It is estimated that of the 700,000 villages in India 600,000 do not have a resident Christian living in them. But what do they have in Christian literature? If the communists can get their literature into these places, then we ought to be able to do the same. It will cost money but it will bring results and bring them perhaps faster than any other way we can spend the same amount of money. This is a task for the whole organization to tackle. It cannot be left to the Publishing Department and the Home Missionary department but must have the support of every section of the denomination. Not only the sympathy—but the support. Allowing one colporteur to every quarter of a million people throughout Southern Asia, we would need 2000 colporteurs.

Who will respond to this stirring challenge? Who will say "Here am I, O Lord, send me." The Lord is calling for men and women, "not from the floating element in society, not from among men and women, who are good for nothing else and have made a success of nothing, but from among those who have good address, tact, keen foresight, and ability. Such are needed to make a success as colporteurs."—Colporteur Ministry, page 28.

SAVED TO SERVE

IN A LITTLE village named Kellyville, about twenty-five miles west of Sydney (New South Wales), there lived a young woman named Mary Pryce. Her father was the local school master. She taught sewing in the school, was the local post-mistress, and the Church of England school teacher.

While Mary Pryce was absent on a vacation, a tent mission came to Kellyville, with Pastor Robert Hare and David Steed in charge. When Mary returned from her holiday the mission was well under way. One day an old gentleman acquaintance came into the Post Office and asked, "Miss Pryce, have you been to the mission yet?" Miss Pryce answered in the negative, stating at the same time that she had too much to do to be bothered with missions outside the Church of England. The old gentleman then expressed the wish that she would attend the mission "... because they say we are keeping the wrong day."

"What utter nonsense," said Miss Pryce, "I can show them from the Bible that we are keeping the right day."

"Can you?" hopefully asked her friend. "I wish you would find it for me. I have been searching, but have not been able to find it."

That night Mary Pryce sat up with her Bible and Concordance and spent almost the entire night in a vain search for evidence in support of the Sunday sabbath. Disillusioned, she decided to attend the mission, and on the next meeting night, with Bible and notebook in hand she selected a front seat, determined to find out more about this strange new teaching.

The evangelists were perturbed, thinking that the local Sunday school teacher had come for one purpose only, namely, to upset the really good interest that had developed. But Mary Pryce the teacher, came to be taught.

At home she studied over carefully all that she had heard in the tent, compared the Scriptures, and found the truth for herself. In the Sunday school she commenced to teach her new found faith until the Rector of the Parish informed her that unless she quit such teaching she would have to leave the church. The inevitable happened. Mary Pryce left the church of England, and with her went almost the entire Sunday school class.

The members of the James family, still living at Kellyville, are the children and grandchildren of those who left the Church of England with Mary Pryce.

Shortly after the Kellyville tent mission the first Seventh-day Adventist camp meeting was held in Brighton, Victoria. Mary Pryce attended this meeting during which time she was taken seriously ill. Dr. M. G. Kellogg and Mrs. E. G. White from U. S. A. were delegates at this same camp meeting.

Dr. Kellogg was called to attend Miss Pryce, and his diagnosis of her condition was of the gravest. She was in a rapid decline, and, humanly speaking, there was no hope of recovery. However, to be doubly assured, Dr. Kellogg requested the privilege of consulting with another physician, and messengers were sent from the camp ground to the Government Medical Officer, who at the time was resident in Brighton. His reaction to the request was at first abrupt and discourteous. He refused to consult with an "American quack." "Oh, but this is not an American quack," protested the messenger. "This is Dr. Kellogg, of the Battle Creek Sanitarium."

"Dr. Kellogg!" said the surprised medical officer. "I will most certainly come." The fame of the Battle Creek Sanitarium, and the name of Kellogg had gone around the world.

The united opinion of the two doctors, following their joint examination, was as stated above. Mary Pryce's case was hopeless.

One night at the camp ground Mrs. E. G. White had a dream, the subject of which was Mary Pryce. In the morning she told her dream to the nurse and others vitally interested in the very sick girl. Mrs. White had seen that if charcoal poultices were prepared and applied to Mary Pryce where her pain was most severe, she would recover. The method of preparation for the poultice as revealed was also explained, and the nurse carried out the instructions.

Mary Pryce felt relief immediately this treatment was commenced, and began to show signs of recovery. Although carried from the camp ground weighing only six stone (84-lbs.), Mary continued to improve until her recovery was complete. She attended the first school this denomination ever conducted in Australia in St. George's Terrace, St. Kilda Road, Melbourne, and later became one of our earliest colporteurs, selling the books "Great Controversy" and "Patriarchs and Prophets." In the course of time Mary Pryce married, and the third child born of this union was the writer of this article.

Mrs. Mary T. Gane lived to her eighty-first year, devoting her life in a lay capacity, to the truth she espoused as a young woman in the little village of Kellyville, New South Wales. She sleeps now after a life of faithful service, miraculously snatched from the brink of the grave in her early twenties.

Mary Pryce was saved to serve.

cover. What a wondrous gift this 10% is! Colporteurs must experience for themselves this secret blessing.

NO OTHER WAY

enough LARMINGLY the A Roman Catholic Church is launching a great literature promotion campaign on all fronts. Other denominations are going 'all out' for literature promotion. In Africa one conference leader confided, "Brother Bucy, if we do not reach the people this year and next we shall find ourselves the very 'tail." Yes, friend of mine, I say again as I have so oft repeated before-What we do must be done quickly! The Spirit of Prophecy bears this out. We should be the head and not the tail. Our literature offensive must be the greatest -now and until probation closes. Do you agree with me?

Yea, thousands upon thousands would enter the portals of the true church if it were not for the offshoots and fallen churches of Babylon and their false propaganda. In England I have been in contact with one of the leaders of the Jehovah's Witness group there. I asked them how they were able to win 26,000 converts in1955. another 30,000 in 1956 and another 34,000 in 1957 making 90,000 converts in the three-year period in the British Isles alone. I was interested because I was told that less than 4% of the 56 million people in Britain attend church, and our own membership is only 8,000. The answer to my question came from the Jehovah's Witness leader quickly and softly, "We give some 30,000 Bible studies every month to the people of Britain. We use our own Bible and text books. We have been told that the best way to reach the people is in their homes. House to house labour was Jesus' favourite way of reaching people. His disciples used the same method. We, too, use Jesus' method. We are not interested in numbers, we want converts who are

true to our church. By reaching the people in their homes through church members who desire to do the work, we were able to add the 90,000 members in Great Britain. In fact other churches have other ways of reaching the people but we have no other way of doing our work."

Friend of mine THINK !! -- 90,-000 converts in three years. If others can do it, we can too! But we must go where the people are. This was Christ's method. It was highly successful. If we followed it as religiously and faithfully as Jehovah's Witness people, we too would have tens of thousands of converts more each year. What do you think? The inspired pen wrote so long ago, "How can the work of the third angel's message be accomplished? It must be largely accomplished by persevering, individual effort; by visiting the people their homes." Historical in Sketches, page 435.

MV WEEK IN SALISBURY PARK

THE Salisbury Memorial Church MV society enjoyed a most profitable MV Week of Prayer during July 18-26, 1958, with Pastor E. P. Wolfe of Surat as the guest speaker.

The executive committee under the leadership of E. G. Moses and his associate, George Thomas, laid plans well in advance for this week of special spiritual emphasis. Madhukar Ohol, the SYF secretary, with his committee prepared the youth census. Upon his arrival Pastor Wolfe was informed of the number and the ages of the youth, the types of homes from which they come, the schools they attend or the work they do, and the present state of their spiritual experiences as far as could be judged from conduct and appearances.

Amirtha Ganesh, the recreational secretary, served as chairman of the platform committee. Four MVees, consisting of a different group each time, were associated with the speaker for every service. These youth announced the hymns, introduced those taking special parts, offered prayer, pronounced the benediction and on five evenings one of their number related an experience which, it was felt, would be an inspiration to the other youth. The story told by Elsie Joseph, of Sikh parentage, illustrated the power of the gospel to draw souls to Christ despite persecution and the influence of age-old traditions. The conversion of Amirtha Ganesh furnished an interesting and vivid picture of the reactions of the Hindu to the efforts made to bring him to Christ. Ganesh told us that at first the Hindu is often drawn through curiosity, and that in his case the patience, love, kindness and perthe workers severance of in presenting the appealing love of God eventually led him with his father and brother from Brahminism to Christianity. The experiences of Douglas Montgomery and his family through the dark days of World War II in Burma

and later through the terrors of Burma's civil war gave evidence of the Lord's leading in individual lives. Like Martin Luther of old, Y. John Wilson, when urged by his professors to sit for his university examinations "just this once" on Sabbath, declared, "I must remain true to my convictions. The blessings of God are more precious to me than these examinations. Here I stand. I can do no other." As a climax to these thrilling experiences, Alexander Job gave a clear, convincing testimony of the power and influence on his life of his well-ordered, well-disciplined Christian home.

The music committee, under the chairmanship of Emil a b l e Fernando, worked early and late to provide inspiring and appropriate music for every meeting. A lively song service accompanied by instrumental music provided a favourable atmosphere for Pastor Wolfe's timely messages. The special numbers, given by a sextette of ladies' voices and a male quartet, together with duets and a few chosen solos, were varied and appealing. One incident serves to illustrate the direction of the Lord in the details of the programme. When Pastor Wolfe arrived in Poona a day early he inquired about a theme song and when told that one had been chosen his face clouded. He said, "I had a song which I particularly desired to use, but we shall go ahead with the one you have already prepared." At that juncture he was handed a mimeographed copy of the one which had been selected. What was his joy and amazement to find that it was the one he had planned to use, "I Choose Christ"!

Douglas Montgomery, the devotional secretary, with his associates, made the prayer band arrangements. Due to the various institutions and departments located at headquarters this MV society draws its members from many language areas. So in addition to the prayer bands whose members used the medium of English there were bands representing several of the Indian languages. The older people attending the meetings formed themselves into two prayer bands. All of the bands met in appointed places at the close of the service each evening. Once each day Pastor Wolfe met for special prayer with the following prayer band leaders: D. C. Christopaul, Merry Crussiah, Yuimi D. Luikham, Douglas Montgomery, R. N. Singh, I. D. Solomon, Gloria Thomas, A. D. Wilson, George Zachariah and Sosamma Zachariah. Some very definite answers to prayer encouraged the hearts of the participants. They saw some who had at first refused to attend the meetings yield to the Spirit's pleadings and begin attending and then heard them publicly express their determination to follow all the way.

Pastor Wolfe followed the order of subjects as outlined in the MV Week special of The Kit, enriching his talks with illustrations from his own experiences in soul winning. evening bv evening As he presented Christ in all His beauty and purity conviction gripped the hearts of his hearers and when Friday came, the consecration of the youth, who were joined by their elders, was full and complete. This service, marked by the dedication of youthful lives, was followed on Sabbath by an appeal to the church to continue its interest in the young people and to the youth leaders to plan SYF activities not only to win others but to help the MVees to hold the victories gained. After the church service a baptismal class was organized.

On Sabbath afternoon the SYF secretary and the MV society officers put into action the MV Community Service programme which included every member of the senior society as well as the children from the local school JMV societies. Literature bands called at the homes of Hindu, Moslem, Parsee and Christian neighbours, making friendly visits and wherever possible leaving truth filled literature or enrolling persons in the VOP Bible courses. OUR thousand years ago, one of God's greatest men lived in a place called Ur of the Chaldees. But Ur was a stronghold of idolatry, so God called His servant to leave Ur. "And Terah took Abraham his son and Lot . . . and Sarai ... and they went forth with them from Ur of the Chaldees to go into the land of Canaan." Genesis 11:31. But the idolators of Ur continued on in their round of heathen ceremonies and licentious living and God withdrew His prospering hand from this once fertile valley, turning it into a desolate wilderness. The hot sands of the desert swept across this dreary plain and Ur sank into oblivion. Less than 40 years ago the exact site of Ur was unknown and skeptics of the Bible even questioned that such a place ever existed. But God foretold that "truth shall spring out of the earth." Psalm 85:11. And when archæologists began excavating some mysterious mounds 120 miles north of Basra they were startled to find the buried ruins of Ur of the Chaldees.

After crossing the Iraq border near Basra we turned our car and caravan northward. Ten miles out of Basra we photographed a huge oil fire burning fiercely. Oil was apparently sweeping out of the ground and fire had turned it into a seemingly unquenchable blazing inferno with black smoke rolling upwards into the blue heavens. I had often wondered how "the flame of the fire" slew those men who took up Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego and flung them into the fiery furnace for not worshipping Nebuchadnezzar's golden image, but the answer is quite obvious. Nebuchadnezzar used just such a fire for his furnace and a sudden change of wind at the crucial moment could easily cause the flame to turn and lick up the soldiers like a molten tongue, snuffing out their lives.

The drive to Ur was tedious. After a few miles the road ceased to exist and the wind blown track wound across the arid plains with only an occasional 44 gallon drum to mark its direction. We battled for nearly 8 hours against a hurricane of a headwind which drove sand and dust against the windscreen like a miniature meteoric shower. We arrived at Ur Railway Junction about noon next day, but the dust storm made sightseeing impossible so we had to close all the doors and windows and batten ourselves inside the trailer with a temperature of 110 F. and sweat out the rest of the afternoon in the hope that a new morning would bring better conditions. Ur Junction is a small railway station and its only inhabitants a few Arab railway employees, so we fervently prayed for the wind and heat to subside so that we could proceed.

Next morning the wind was still buffeting the trailer but strange to say there was not so much dust, so at 5:30 a.m. we drove to Ur and parked our car a short distance from the huge ziggurat. This was once an immense brick temple devoted to the worship of the moon, and as we mounted the remarkably well preserved stairs we marvelled at the diligence with which men will worship the objects of God's creation while those who worship the Creator of all, often seem too indolent to give their neighbours a Bible tract.

The walls of some of the houses were still in quite good condition, due no doubt to their thickness of eight or nine feet, probably to insulate the inmates against the burning heat. The excavations went very deep in places and the walls were infested with nesting owls at which the Arab boys trailing us delighted to throw ancient bricks and pieces of pottery.

Many civilizations have lived at Ur, for many layers of broken pottery and other utensils can be seen up the sides of the excavated

walls. The inhabitants had the custom of burying the dead inside their houses and I found one pit that contained many old bones. I picked up a chalky looking bone and found it quite fascinating to imagine that perhaps I was holding a shin bone of Haran, Abraham's brother, who died in Ur (Genesis 11:28).

We finished our sightseeing and photography within a couple of hours, and after breakfasting on what might easily have been the site of Abraham's dining room when he dwelt at Ur, we had no regrets about leaving Ur, for by 9 a.m. the wind was again whipping the sand into our faces and it was only with difficulty that we could walk against its furious onslaught.

Again we chugged across desert tracks for another 50 miles before anything like a road materialized. though the headwind had not abated. Another 80 miles and we drove into Hilla, a large city 5 miles from ancient Babylon. We purchased some food supplies and procured some dirty water for drinking (all that was available) and drove into Babylon just as night was falling. The prophet Jeremiah had foretold that "Babylon shall become heaps, a place for dragons dwelling (jackals), an astonishment and an hissing, without an inhabitant." Jeremiah 51:37. Babylon is right near the main road and the track into the ruins led us to a small house and compound where Arab caretakers live. We parked between two big "heaps" and settled down for the night. Before I dropped off to sleep I heard the mournful wail of jackals answered by the yelping of dogs from a small Arab village which has grown up outside the western limits of the Babylonian ruins. Two neat white tents were pitched on top of one of the high mounds where modern Arab workmen temporarily live. But Isaiah said "Neither shall the Arabian pitch his tent there." Isaiah 13:20. And of the nomadic bedouins to which Isaiah refers, we could see no sign. I understand that they never pitch their hand woven tents in or around Babylon's ruins and while there are the few people already mentioned living among Babylon's heaps, certainly no man, woman or domestic beast ever inhabits the streets or buildings which once constituted mighty Babylon.

God is not glorified, but greatly dishonoured; the Spirit of God is grieved."—Testimonies to Ministers, p. 189.

Through the years we have observed certain brethren and sisters who have made it their lifework to criticize the endeavours of church leaders. They have fed themselves on the faults and failings of others. And what an impoverished diet it has been! It has resulted in leanness of soul.

LAKPAHANA TRAINING INSTITUTE PIANO FUND

NEW DISTRICT ENTERED THROUGH VOICE OF PROPHECY

FOR the last few years the Northeast Union has been entering into a new district almost every year through the Voice of Prophecy. This year we decided to hold an effort in Hazaribagh Town, the headquarters of the district of Hazaribagh, which is one of the many districts in our Union where the message has never been preached in a direct way. We knew very few people of the town except for a few Voice of Prophecy graduates whom the writer had visited a few times in the past.

When the writer, together with two assistants, Pastor H. Lakra and Brother Jyotish Barla, went to make arrangements for holding an effort there, we had some difficulty in finding a suitable location, but we finally procured a nice plot of land which was centrally located where we erected our pandal.

On April 7, at our first meeting, we were overjoyed to welcome a big crowd—more than could be accommodated in the pandal. These people were from a very fine class of people, well dressed and well educated, and by the grace of God, throughout the meetings we had a steady and fairly large audience who were eager to hear the message of the hour.

From the beginning we took the following word of God to be our motto: "I, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw all men unto me." We had a very simple pandal; our handbills, too, simply announced the meetings giving the subjects and the dates. No pictures of any kind were used on the handbills. We showed no moving pictures during the series of lectures, but an S. V. E. film-strip was shown to the audience at the close of each meeting.

Before starting our meetings we had sent invitations to our Voice of Prophecy students. These responded in good numbers and formed the nucleus of our interested group. So far we have baptized four people, all of whom were Voice of Prophecy graduates. Besides the baptisms we have sent three boys to Falakata, and one to our school at Khunti. At present we have about six families who are definitely interested and are preparing for baptism.

Special mention should be made of Mr. G. P. Hembrom who was baptized with his eldest daughter on the 7th of July. Mr. Hembrom finished the Voice of Prophecy course several years ago, but because he was in Government service he felt that he could not keep the Sabbath and was not baptized. His eldest daughter, Aruna, was a student at the St. Columbia's College here. She attended the meetings without missing a single one. Each night she accepted the doctrines as they were presented in the meetings. When the message of health reform was presented. she at once determined to give up harmful things. From that day she made it a rule that no more tea

was to be served in her home. From the day the jewellery question was presented, she has not worn her bangles and earrings and necklaces. When she learned of the Sabbath and baptism she at once declared that she could not continue her studies in the Government College and that she must join the remnant church without delay.

When her father saw the bold stand she had taken he felt it keenly, that though he had known the truth for several years and had not accepted it openly, now his daughter was going ahead of him in this all-important step. He follow Christ determined to openly, made arrangements with his officers to keep the Sabbath properly, and came requesting baptism. Father and daughter were baptised together, Aruna had been sent to Nuzvid for nurses's training to prepare herself for the Lord's service.

There are other precious souls in the valley of decision—those who will have questions of home and work and studies to be answered in their hearts before they make their decision. Pastor Lakra is staying on to continue the work here. We solicit the prayers of our believers throughout the field that a strong church may be established in the town of Hazaribagh.

• Dr. and Mrs. L. H. Rhymes and their two sons report an interesting trip through Africa enroute to the U. S. A. Dr. Rhymes gave valuable service for a year in Southern Asia at Karachi, Surat and Ranchi.

• U Pein Gyi, Secretary-Treasurer of the East Pakistan Section, writes of the many calls for workers coming into the office. Brother P. K. Rema has just returned from the Mymensingh District and reports excellent interests in that area. Pray for our workers and the work in this interesting and populous area of Southern Asia.

• Regular evangelistic meetings will be conducted during the last quarter at Pyapon, Bassein, and Kyaukpya in the Delta Section of Burma. Schoolhouse evangelism will be carried on during August and September in 12 places in the Delta Section. Pastor Ba Nyein and his fellow workers are of good courage and expect a rich harvest during the last half of 1958.

• Five of our representatives from the Burma Union attended the Prime Ministers' National Seminar on July 25 in Rangoon. U Kyaw Din spoke of the work of the Seventh-day Adventist organization and presented some of the needs of the Hospital.

• Saya Hla Pe reports an enrolment of 44 students in the Tahan school not far from Kalemyo. Enrolment of 18 is reported in our little school at Tiddim in the Chin Hills.

• The Publishing Department of the Southern Asia Division report that sales are Rs. 30,738 ahead of 1957. Study is being given to special plans to promote the circulation of literature during 1959, the Golden Jubilee Year of the "Oriental Watchman and Herald of Health."

• The Western India Union reports 98 baptisms during the first half of 1958. Brother B. K. Athavale reports the baptism of 39 in his district. This is indeed an encouraging report. • The comparative report of paid-up magazine subscriptions sent out by the Oriental Watchman Publishing House on August 1, 1958 shows that the trend is in the right direction for the "Oriental Watchman and Herald of Health," the "Good Way," "Swasthya Aur Jiwan," and "Marga Darsi." All showed a gain in the subscription list over the report on July 1, 1958 as well as over the report on August 1, 1957.

From August 15-17 a Home Missionary and Sabbath School Secretaries' Council was held in Bangalore. This council was attended by all the local section departmental secretaries, as well as the union and Division Sabbath School and Home Missionary Secretaries. Strong plans were laid for developing local talent in the churches of the South India Union. • The North and South Telugu Sections held their Constituency meetings in Nuzvid from the 7th to the 13th of September, with Pastors L. C. Shepard and D. S. Johnson attending as the Division representatives.
