The Channel of Blessings

THE HOME of our first parents was a beautiful garden. In that lovely paradise God planted trees that were good for food and pleasant to the eye. Everything necessary to the health and happiness of Adam and Eve was provided in great abundance. There was one tree, however, which the all-wise Creator reserved as a reminder of His ownership. To refrain from partaking of the fruit of this tree of knowledge of good and evil would be, on the part of mankind, an acknowledgement of love and loyalty to the eternal Father. To eat of it in disobedience would bring death.

Today our Heavenly Father supplies all that is necessary for our good. He bestows upon us in great measure benefits both temporal and spiritual. Those who withhold the tithe not only rob God of that which He intends shall be used to give the message of salvation, but also rob themselves. The personal loss sustained by the unfaithful steward is far greater than the loss which is suffered by the work of God through his negligence. On the other hand, all who return the tithe to God are promised both temporal and spiritual blessings.

"Ministers should by precept and example teach the people to regard the tithe as sacred."—Gospel Workers, page 225.

Those who, with thankful hearts, bring their tithes to the Lord's storehouse as an act of sincere worship, place themselves in the channel of spiritual blessing. The surrender of hearts, the consecration of means, and the dedication of lives, open the windows of heaven.

God's Special Treasure

IN THE days of kings and emperors, a man's wealth was measured partly by his accumulation of gold, silver and precious stones. Members of royal families embellished themselves with garments inwrought with gold and with ornaments of precious stones. The wealthier the king the more costly his ornamentation. Doubtless monarchs found a sort of satisfaction in occasionally looking over their vast treasuries. Here were the evidences of their wealth and power.

God also has His treasure store. All the silver and the gold are His, the Bible says. But God has a special treasure, worth more than all the gold, silver, rubies, and diamonds in the world. We read about it in Malachi 3:16 (last part), 17. "And a book of remembrance was written before Him for them that feared the Lord, and that thought upon His name. And they shall be Mine, saith the Lord of hosts, in that day when I make up My jewels (margin, special treasure)." Although the most costly gems are in His treasury, His special treasure is His people -those who believe and obey Him.

Many times people argue that obedience to God is a light matter.

"After all," they say, "that regulation applied to people hundreds of years ago. But it's outdated now. God may have fulfilled His promises literally for a time after the promise was given. But not now!"

In the same chapter—Malachi 3 —where God's system of tithes and offerings is so forcefully presented—we are told that that argument was used against the system of tithes and offerings by the Children of Israel in Malachi's day. Notice verse fourteen. "Ye have said, It is vain to serve God; and what *profit* is it that we have kept his ordinance."

But God says, "I am the Lord, I change not." (verse 6). It doesn't matter how many hundreds of years have passed since God gave the command and the promise. He will fulfil His promise just as surely in 1960, when we fulfil the conditions, as when the promise was given. Read again His valuable promises in verses ten to twelve. They are meant for us here in Southern Asia in 1960!

God takes the matter of tithes and offerings further. It is not merely a question of receiving or not receiving His blessings, but it is a question of eternal life or eternal death. In verse eighteen we read, "Then shall ye return, and discern between the righteous and the wicked, between him that serveth God and him that serveth Him not." It is that important! God says in the last part of verse seventeen, "And I will spare them, as a man spareth his own son that serveth him."

In the days of God's judgment, I want to be spared. Don't you? When the financial accounts are opened before the God of heaven and earth, I want my tithes and offering account to be paid up-todate. What an awful thing to appear before God with the words "robber of God" written beside our account. May we be faithful in giving to our Father His tithes and our offerings, that we may be accounted as His special treasure, and that we may shine as the stars forever and ever in His kingdom.

Do We Keep God's Covenant?

IN JOHN 15:16, we read, "Ye have not chosen Me, but I have chosen you," and in John 6:44, "No man can come to Me, except the Father which hath sent me draw him."

Each one of us who names the name of Christ has been drawn to Him by a loving Heavenly Father. We owe all things to God, and without His upholding power and Spirit of truth we would be poor and hungry and naked and blind.

Considering this great grace of God in choosing men and drawing them, the Apostle Paul told the Ephesians, "For this cause I bow my knees unto the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, of whom the

whole family in heaven and earth is named, that He would grant you, according to the riches of His glory, to be strengthened with might by His Spirit in the inner man; that Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith; that ye may be able to comprehend with all saints what is the breadth, and length, and depth, and height; and to know the love of Christ which passeth all knowledge, that ye might be filled with all the fulness of God." Ephesians 3:14-19.

As well as having been chosen and drawn, it is God's will that we be filled. This remnant church was established in its beginning by God, and He used in its establishment, faithful men and women who were filled with all the fulness of God.

From earliest times God established a system by which His work should be maintained and by which the Gospel should be preached around the world. He said "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in Mine house, and prove Me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it." Malachi 3:10.

The early believers in this remnant church, filled with all the fulness of God, faithfully obeyed this command, and churches, schools, hospitals, radio work, all geared to the preaching of the Gospel, were raised up and have prospered. To us and to our children in these last days has been given the task of carrying on the work these founders began under God. In considering our task we would do well to remember the Master's words of warning, "He that is faithful in that which is least, is faithful also in much."

We may have barely enough of this world's goods, but our tithe belongs to God. By honestly paying that portion to Him we demonstrate the quality of our faithfulness. He says, "Bring ye *all* the tithes into the storehouse." He does not want just a portion, but all. In this way His blessing may be full and complete and the whole church may prosper. He wants every man, woman and child to keep this covenant with Him. He wants all of His children to share in the work of the ministry in this way.

One of God's noble laymen, a medical doctor, was asked what he had done during the week. He replied, "On Monday, I preached the Gospel in Brazil. Tuesday, I ministered among the Mexicans. Wednesday, Ι operated on patients in a hospital in Africa. Thursday, I taught a mission school in Japan. Friday, I helped to establish a new church in India. Sabbath, I preached in New Guinea. Sunday, I distributed Bibles in Korea." The astonished questioner asked, "How could you be in so many places, doing so many different things?" "I wasn't," the doctor said, with a twinkle in his eye, "for I have been busy with my patients every day. But you see, God gives the finances from my work; and my tithes and offerings have gone to the places of need I have mentioned."

The Sabbath school membership goal of Southern Asia is 36,000 in 1960. Elder G. R. Nash counsels us on one method of reaching this. Read his article on Branch Sabbath School. —O. W. Lange.

We read in *Desire of Ages*, pp. 616, 617, "So with every gift bestowed and every act performed with a sincere desire for God's glory. It is linked with the purposes of Omnipotence. Its results for good no man can measure." "All that God commands is of consequence. Christ recognized the payment of tithes as a duty."

As the year of 1960 opens bright and fair before us, will not *all* the members and workers of our church make a new covenant with our Heavenly Father, to be scrupulously faithful in the matter of tithing our income, be it small or great?

Do Thyself No Harm

THROUGH ignorance, through indifference, and through weakness we are constantly harming ourselves in some area of life, mostly with regard to our bodies. The tragedy of this fact is that it might mean the loss of eternal life. How should a Christian, the Church of God, react to this suicidal situation? Paul's experience in the Philippian prison gives us an answer to this question.

When Paul became conscious of the prison keeper's intent to kill himself, he "cried with a loud voice, saying, Do thyself no harm." To the world which is killing itself the church should cry—and cry with a loud voice—saying, Do thyself no harm! Sabbath, February 27th, is the annual Temperance Commitment Sabbath. On this day the attention of God's people around the world will be called to the subject of Christian Temperance. A clarion call should be made to the church abstinence from all things harmful and the judicious use of that which is healthful. God has given His people much instruction on how to live to be able to render effective service to the cause of God. This vital information must be imparted to God's people.

The Commitment should also . include a vigorous programme to stop the rising tide of intemperance in the world today. "God wants us to stand where we can warn the people. He desires us to take up.

Every heart was thrilled as the songs of Zion were played and sung by men and women whose talents have been truly dedicated to win souls. The theme of the Council-LOOK! PRAY! GO! was vividly etched into each mind by the theme song:

The power of God was manifested as the ministry of the word and song opened responsive hearts.

At the opening business meeting on the morning of 30th reports of the President and Secretary were presented. Brother Mattison reported that the church membership has now passed the 22,000 mark, and portrayed the outreach of the message into the far corners of the field. The Secretary reviewed the developments of the work since Miss Georgia Burrus arrived in Calcutta, January 23, 1895: D. A. Robinson opened meetings in the Corinthinian Theater in 1898; the Mookerjees, Belchambers, Myers and others were baptized in 1896; the publication of the first regular edition of the Oriental Watchman with W. A.

Spicer as editor in 1898; the appointment of J. L. Shaw as superintendent of the Seventh-day Adventist Mission, Calcutta in 1901; the opening of an effort in Ceylon by Harry Armstrong and G. K. Owen in 1904; the advance of H. H. Votaw and L. F. Hansen into Burma in 1905; the opening of the work at Prakasapuram in 1909; the formation of the India Union Mission of Seventh-day Adventists with J. L. Shaw as superintendent in 1910; the opening of a Union Training School at Lucknow in 1916 with I. F. Blue as Principal; and the organization of the Southern Asia Division at the "Ranchi Conference" in 1919 with J. E. Fulton as President.

It was pointed out how the business and organization of the work are sandwiched between evangelism. From the old minutes of the Mission of 1902 came this revealing comment: "Looked over the trial balance of both mission and

sanitarium. Mrs. Simon came for Bible Reading and hence Brother Shaw had to leave and meeting broken up." Nurses Gibbs and Reid arrived in 1910, but the minutes read: "That Miss Gibbs make Burma her field of labour, that she devote this cool season to work with our literature, later to take up medical work." "That Miss Reid enter the canvassing work for the present, later to connect with the Sanitarium."

God blessed this liberal use of talents and means and by 1920 there were 1,097 baptized church members in the Southern Asia Division. It was thrilling to report at this Council that baptisms during the current quadrennium were over 7,000 and the net increase in church membership will be well over 5,700. By comparison this shows that during this quadrennium more than five times as many entered the church as made up the total membership in 1920. The

truth is now proclaimed in 791 languages in the world field, 48 of these languages are used in Southern Asia. In Southern Asia live 20.5% of the world population, and next on the list is the Far Eastern Division with 10.9% of the population of the world. Our largest field is the Northwestern India Union with 33.7% of the population of Southern Asia. The South India Union now has 10,940 members, which is 49.3% of the Division membership. There are 341 organized churches, 662 Sabbath Schools, 162 ordained ministers, and a total of over 2,000 workers in the field. The literature evangelists topped the Rs. 600,000 mark in sales during 1959, Broth-\er Lange reported Uplift receipts of nearly Rs. 450,000 during 1959, and over 1,000,000 applicants have now received lessons for the Bible Courses.

M. E. Kemmerer, Treasurer, titled his report, "Blessings Multi-

plied" and showed how the giving of our people in other lands has resulted in much blessing to the church here, and how our giving here has swelled our blessings. Lay tithe for the current quadrennium totalled Rs. 956,365.00 which was an increase over the past quadrennium of over Rs. 200,000.00. By practical illustration the Treasurer pointed out how the yearly per capita tithe for workers has increased whereas the per capita tithe for laymen has decreased. It was very heartening to note that the percentage of tithe to appropriation in the Ceylon Union has reached 34%. In this respect some fields run as low as 15%. Much prayer and study was given during the meetings to the development of supporting power in the church. A committee will continue to study this and report to the Division Committee at the midyear meeting in July.

The great guide-book for Chris-



tian workers was referred to many times as the need for unity of planning and purpose was stressed. "Christian is to be united with Christian, church with church, the human instrumentality co-operating with the divine, every agency subordinate to the Holy Spirit, and all combined in giving to the world the good tidings of the grace of God."—Acts of the Apostles, p. 96. The work was done in this spirit.

Council the challenging theme for 1960 MV work: "Spotlight on the Bible." Good things are ahead in this field with another Youth Evangelism month. A great Youth Leaders Camp is scheduled for 1961. T. E. Lucas, world youth leader, will probably be in Southern Asia for this camp.

J. W. Nixon led out in setting goals for literature sales for the next four years, increasing them a minimum of 12% each year. The colporteur force by 1963 should have climbed to over 200.

The goal for Uplift is to rise from Rs. 450,000 in 1960 to over Rs. 700,000 in 1963. Already the ests, and the recommendation is: "Every worker a Voice of Prophecy representative." The Voice of Prophecy work is supporting a great upswing in evangelism during the coming years. Every worker and layman must be a part of it.

The temperance work has advanced into the churches and S. James reported on the work done by F. A. Wyman, Faqir Chand and W. H. McGhee in holding rallies and circulating temperance literature. At the present time C. N. Abraham and S. James are cooperating in presenting the work of temperance, literature, and the message we as Seventh-day Adventists believe at the exhibition in Madras. Cottage industries are being taken up by many church members and this is resulting in stronger church support and better living.

Educational work in the Division has grown from small beginnings until 171 schools are now being operated; 23 of these are fullfledged boarding institutions and one is a senior college. The enrolment in these schools is 7,500 and growth both in institutional buildings and in enrolment continues apace.

The schools are real soul-winning agencies with 10.2% of the baptisms in Southern Asia being credited to the evangelizing agency of the schools.

The schools have made scholastic development as well and now all of the schools at the secondary level, with the exception of one are either recognized, in the process of obtaining recognition, or are in a position to prepare students for recognized examinations as private candidates. During the next quadrennium these schools will complete their recognition.

The thrilling evangelism symposium on Sabbath afternoon highlighted the reporting at the Council. William Moses pointed to the 50,000,000 people in Western India and told of the success in the efforts in Bombay, Ahmedabad, Dhulia, Jalna and Sholapur. A. M. Akbar reported the baptism of approximately 300 in the Punjab Section during 1959, and K. S. Brown of East Pakistan told of faithfulness, sacrifice and soul winning there inspite of hardship and famine. Over 300 have been won during 1959 in the Pakistan field. In Ihansi and Allahabad in the Northwestern Union I. M. Chand and G. J. Christo are working with teams and many have been baptized. In the South India Union nearly 1,000 have been baptized during 1959.

On Sabbath afternoon, L. R. Burns, E. A. Streeter, and Dr. Philip S. Nelson were set aside by ordination. These brethren have given years of fruitful service and the work of the ministry has been greatly strengthened as they step into the ranks. This Division Council gave opportunity to LOOK at the vast, waving and fruitful fields of Southern Asia, and to PRAY together for that power which alone prepares men for devoted and undivided service. Our workers now GO to their respective fields to share the blessings and plans enjoyed during these meetings so that the finishing of the work may be hastened. We are told, "Throughout his ministry, Paul had looked to God for direct guidance. At the same time he had been very careful to labour in harmony with the decisions of the general council at Jerusalem; and as a result, the

1. QUESTION: What are some of the reasons for establishing Branch Sabbath Schools?

ANSWER: Some of the reasons for establishing "Branch Sabbath Schools" might be summarized as follows:

(1) Gives *Opportunity* for Members to Work for Others: "Those who have the spiritual oversight of the church should devise ways and means by which an opportunity may be given to every member of the church to act some part in God's work. Too often in the past this has not been done. Plans have not been clearly laid and fully carried out, whereby the talents of all might be employed in active service. There are but few who realize how much has been

(2) Gives Opportunity to Reach Out Into Dark Areas and Establish New Churches: "I saw jets of light shining from cities and villages, and from the high places and the low places of the earth. We believe many Sunday schools should be established even at times in our own Seventh-day Adventist churches. Sister White, in the *Testimonies*, volume 9, page 201, recommends the establishing of Sunday schools and again on page 232, she states Sunday is a good day for missionary work. It is hoped that any Sunday school will eventually become a Branch Sabbath School and finally a regular Sabbath school.

3. QUESTION: What is the goal for Branch Sabbath Schools?

ANSWER: The goal is at least one Branch Sabbath School for each organized Sabbath school. However, many Sabbath schools are promoting the idea of one Branch Sabbath School for each adult class in the Sabbath school. We think this is a good idea. Surely the aim of each Sabbath school should be to have several outposts for God.

At the time of the Columbus, Ohio, National Sunday School Association meeting. I learned of

one Sunday school, in North America that has 35 branch Sunday schools or missions, with the sole purpose of strengthening and enlarging the mother church.

4. QUESTION: Is it the idea that each Branch Sabbath School will eventually become an organized Sabbath school and ultimately an organized church?

ANSWER: No! Many will eventually be absorbed into the mother Sabbath school and thus strengthen and enlarge the mother church. Nevertheless, many will also become organized churches.

5. QUESTION: How many individuals must one have before a Branch Sabbath School can be organized?

ANSWER: No definite number is required. If you are branching out and reaching for souls, you may have a branch Sabbath school in an isolated member's home with only one person present other than the immediate members of the

home. "The Sabbath school is a missionary field, and very much more of the missionary spirit should be manifested in this important work than has been manifested in the past."—Counsels on Sabbath School Work, p. 10.

6. QUESTION: Is there a financial policy for the operation of Branch Sabbath Schools?

ANSWER: Yes! Branch Sabbath Schools are to be supported from the regular Sabbath school expense fund of the mother church.

Some fields follow the practice of receiving a special "Branch Sabbath School" offering in all churches once each year and then distribute extra help to the churches that need special assistance.
