

Malaita

(The following article comes to us from the Australasian Division in connection with the 13th Sabbath Overflow for the fourth quarter of 1953. It is written by one of the native pastors, told in his own quaint English).

After the murder of Pastor Simi's wife at Uru Harbor, Pastor J. D. Anderson took Pastor Simi to Makwano in the village called Malatobi in the northern end of Malaita to open up the work there, and when Pastor Simi makes his station a call come to him to visit one of the heathen villages, so he want one boy to be with him because there are many cannibals lived there. When they came to a village they heard weeping and mourning, so they afraid because the custom of the people in that place is, when somebody die the people of the village must kill a stranger if they found one. So they step back and kneel down on the side of the road and pray to God for protection. After the prayer they came to the village, and Pastor Simi asked them of the trouble they have. They said, "There are an old woman here is very sick nearly die and the people mourn for her." Some of the relatives come to Pastor Simi asked him that we heard of your God is able to heal the sick and raise the man who nearly die, and we want you to come and see the woman and pray for her. So they went into the house where she was laying. When they open the door Pastor Simi looked in and saw two lights, one was near her head, another was near her legs; there are two snakes lying near her like the candles. Pastor Simi asked of the snakes, and they said they are her devils; they came to comfort her because she is ready to die. Pastor Simi told them that he cannot pray to God if these two snakes laving near her because they are devils; so one of them went in and talks these two snakes and they went out. Then Pastor Simi prayed and asked God to heal this sick woman.

Pastor Simi and his boy stayed there in that night, and in the midnight the woman asked for food. One came to Simi and told that the sick woman asked for food, and he told them to give her to eat. and the sick woman was restored to life again. In the morning the relatives of the woman told her of how Pastor Simi prayed for her and her sickness is finished. Then Pastor Simi started to walk back to his village Malatobi and the old woman took her walking stick and followed Simi. The relatives of the old woman asked her to stay for awhile and goodbye to her devil first, then go down to Pastor Simi in Malatobi: but she did not, for she want to come down with Pastor Simi and his boy on the mission station. Pastor Simi said God did this wonderful work upon this heathen woman and many people came to the misson. The church of Malatobi today reached up her Sabbath School membership 103 and her church membership 48. We thank God for His mighty power breaking the power of Satan and bring people out of heathen darkness into His marvelous light of the gospel.

I want to let you know small reports about Malaita. Nine months now since I take the work on Malaita, and I see that big work will do among over thirty thousands on Malaita. We have only 60 in baptism class when I came, 31 of them is baptized now, 29 still in the baptism class. I hope they will be baptized this quarter. Our church membership is 312, and Sabbath School membership 1,015. 703 of our Sabbath School members are not entered into church membership, so our plan is to get those Sabbath School members into baptism class and baptize them next year. Over 20,000 on Malaita are not Adventists. This mean we have lots of work to do on Malaita.

Sabbath School membership in Bonrum is now 40, with a zealous superintendent, Brother Ha Brang. Our urgent need is to open a church school in the vernacular (Koho). Brother Brang would be a capable teacher.

There are excellent prospects for the work among this simple, sincere people. When presenting your petitions before the Master, won't you remember the work among the Mois?

Singapore Jumble Sale

After weeks of enthusiastic activity on the part of the members of the Malayan Union Seminary church and the Singapore English church, THE day finally arrived—November 8, the day of the annual Jumble Sale. Gray skys were anxiously scanned, last minute preparations quickly checked, various foods expertly prepared.

Excitement ran high among the students of the Seminary as the various classes competed for the largest amount of clothing brought in. Other members of both churches also worked untiringly in collecting articles for sale, and the ladies spent every spare moment for weeks sorting and pricing the over 20,000 pieces of clothing that were donated.

By two o'clock on the afternoon of the eighth the dining room of the Seminary had been transformed into a huge "second hand shop," and a long line of customers were queued up, waiting to enter. In spite of the drizzling rain that never entirely cleared away, a record crowd attended. The food stands featured Chinese, Malay, Indian, and American delicacies, and within three hours had sold every item. When the doors were closed at six-fifteen, the weary workers felt that it had been well worth the effort—both in the \$1,900 raised for welfare work, and in the opportunity that had been given the people to purchase needed items at extremely low prices.

Since all the clothing was not sold, the remainder will be sorted and suitable pieces donated to the poor and needy of the city.

Notes of Progress at Youngberg Memorial Hospital

We feel that a true note of progress can be heard as we survey the accomplishments of Youngberg Memorial Hospital thus far this year. Its location is a desirable one, situated as it is on the outskirts of the busy metropolis of Singapore. Its patronage from all classes and races holds to a very consistent and balanced level. The in-patient department is filled to capacity most of the time.

It was not until the middle of this year that the institution enjoyed adequate medical personnel, since its expansion over a year ago. Dr. J. H. Nelson accepted a call in May, transferring from the Penang Mission Hospital. Dr. G. H. A. McLaren joined the staff in July, coming to us from the Australasian Division. We are very happy for the help that these two doctors have brought to the hospital.

For good patronage and for adequate personnel, we are thankful; but our real note of progress has been in the evangelism carried on. Thus far eight precious souls have been baptized this year from among our patients, who have been contacted and with whom Bible studies have been conducted by our two faithful Bible instructors, Mrs. H. L. Dyer and Mrs. Amy Tan. A number of others are attending Sabbath services regularly, and we feel they will take their stand for the truth before very long.

We rejoice that the stories of these conversions are continued stories. One young man, age 21, came to the hospital just over a year ago. He was suffering from typhoid fever and was near the point of death. Through loving ministry combined with the power of God, he rallied. The Bible instructors visited him; the Malayan Union Seminary Sunshine Band sang for him, and his heart was touched. Mrs. Dyer studied with him after he was dismissed from the hospital. Soon he was attending church. Next he was faced with a decision regarding his employment and the Sabbath. He chose the Sabbath and lost his employment. When we learned that he had stood the test, we invited him to take up employment with the hospital as a bookkeeper. Now he holds the post as cashier.

This young man was the first of our eight to be baptized; the date was January 24, 1953. He wrote the story of his conversion a number of months ago. This I have just reread, and I think of how his story is truly continuous. He is active in church activities, leading others to Christ, assisting in the Junior department of the Sabbath school, and is now broadcasting the truth in the Chinese language over the hospital's program distribution system.

Literature flows in an abundant stream from tract racks, personal distribution, and by mail. Over US\$100 is used per month for this phase of evangelism.

The broadcast services, or program distribution system, is the latest step that has been taken by the institution to aid in the progress of its mission in Singapore. The system provides loudspeakers in each waiting room and nurses station and pillowphones to each patient's bed, each having individual volume control. From the control desk, both live and recorded programs can be broadcast to the patients in both the out-patient clinic and the hospital. We are fortunate in having nearly one hundred Voice of Prophecy transcriptions which can be broadcast to the English-speaking patients. The staff's morning worship, an afternoon health lecture, evening meditations, uplifting music, evangelistic sermons, and selected radio programs are among the other items which are made available to the patients. This service will incorporate suitable evangelistic material in the English, Chinese, Malay, and Tamil languages. Many of the workers from the four local churches and our other institutions in Singapore are contributing their time to bring messages of faith and hope, health and healing to our patients. We feel that this means will bring many to a knowledge of the Saviour.



An Exhibition of Handwork

For the past month the students of Standard III of the Malayan Union Seminary have been very diligent, working on even during recess time. Their diligence aroused the curiosity of all the other classes, and on November 12, 1953, their curiosity was turned into amazement as they witnessed for





the first time the handwork of these students. Many could scarcely believe that this was an exhibition of the handwork of only Standard III students, because the articles exhibited seemed to be beyond their power and skill. Under the guidance of their teacher, Mrs. Daniel Tan, they had worked hard during the entire year to make this exhibition possible.

Each class took its turn in inspecting the handicraft in the Science Room, and when it came to the Senior's turn, they swarmed in like flies, eagerly asking questions of the Standard III student guides and jotting down notes, for they were to write an essay on what they saw.

Upon entering the Science Room, a wide range of beautiful fretwork caught the eyes of the spectators. There were picture frames in various shapes and designs, caskets, mottoes, and some decorations for the walls, all of which involved the most intricate designs.

Posted on huge cardboards along the walls of the room were samples of screen paintings, parchment paper, straight-stick figures, paper cutwork, fancy stitching of portraits and fruits, leatherbraiding, and a 25-foot mural depicting an important phase of Elijah's life from the time of King Ahab till his transfiguration.

On the table next to the fretwork were displayed the students' booklets of art which were done in connection with their English and Bible. On the same table were some coloured jointed toys made of cardboard.

The display on the next table attracted the attention of all the girls and not a few boys. The whole table was bedeeked with beautiful knitted garments for adults, babies, and even dollies. Highlight of this section was a crocheted cape—something which any girl would be proud to possess. Then there were the little baby frocks—the designs, though not elaborate, were attractive and many asked if they were for sale, to which they were given a negative answer. Among these dresses were two embroidered cushions, some embroidered pillow-cases and baby jackets.

Then last, but certainly not the least, was the table of glorified glass painting which brought forth many exclamations of wonder and delight.

The students of the Senior class were greatly impressed with this fine exhibition and with the fact that these Standard III students were greatly privileged to have Mrs. Tan as their teacher, who had put in much effort in her teaching. The students' untiring work and efforts 'did not go unrewarded, for many were the spectators who voiced their praises in no uncertain terms.

This exhibition was the first of its kind in this school put up after the war. It is hoped that this will be a means of arousing the interest of the other elementary school teachers so that handwork will be introduced into all their classes in the near future. This, according to Mrs. Tan, was her ulterior motive in displaying her class's handwork before the entire school.

Chiengmai Effort

The old city wall and ancient pagodas testify to the fact that picturesque Chiengmai has had a long history. The teachers of Buddhism in Chiengmai have long been aware that their religion holds small chance to survive if it becomes static. Perhaps one of the first threats was felt years ago when an early Thai king transplanted several hundred unruly Moslem subjects from South Thailand to this ancient center.

Approximately a hundred years ago Christianity was first introduced into this area. But it was following the late war that the greatest threat was felt. In just a few years time nearly a dozen different Christian groups sent their representatives to this rather quiet center. To meet this challenge the Buddhist leaders have modernized their approach as you seldom see it in other places. Young people's groups were organized and preaching services conducted. Even an evangelistic center was opened on one of the main corners of town. It is significant that preaching services are held every Sunday morning in spite of the fact that the Buddhist sabbath falls on every eighth day.

In this setting it was decided that the warning message of Seventh-day Adventists should receive a public hearing. Providentially an attractive school auditorium facing on a main street was procured.

Chiengmai is the second largest city of Thailand. While it is not large by western standards, it is not a small town but has the many social attractions of the modern eity. Fortunately there are good facilities for advertising here.

Brother S. T. Soh is the speaker for the ten weeks series of meetings. He is assisted with the music by Brother Gunjohn (Kok Chee). Pastor and Mrs. E. B. Smith and Brother Sopon with the church members assist with the visiting and the many other letails so important to this type of meeting.

The opening meeting was held Sunday evening, October 11. The people came early and we were all happy to have over two hundred out which nicely filled the hall. Following the meeting, one of the listeners expressed an interest in a plan for a discussion period. We found that this same interest was so general that we had our first discussion that evening. This plan has especially interested the young people.

Tuesday night we had a bit of a scare when only a few came early, but by the time the meeting opened there were over a bundred present. The second Sunday night there were over a hundred present and quite a number are showing considerable interest.

After only the second meeting the way opened to hold studies with a very nice family, so we praise the Lord for this token of His blessing and solicit your prayers in behalf of these meetings.

Mapau and the Mockers

"I am the leader of a company of thirty Sabbath School members at Monsolog. We have been subjected to much ridicule by the heathen people of our village. When we had our Sabbath School they would start a rival meeting nearby. When we sang they would keep quiet; but when we prayed or taught they would shout and laugh, so that we could hardly hear our voices. Mockingly they said, 'If you get blessings, we will have a share of them, too!'

"It is the custom of these people that if any person is sick, all must keep quiet. Someone fell sick in the village, so we went elsewhere for our meetings. The sick man died. Another man fell sick while working in his rice field, so they sacrificed pigs to appease the spirits; but more people became sick. The spirit said that it was because they did not sacrifice enough pigs. However, the more pigs they killed the more people got sick.

"Finally the leader of the mock meetings took sick and could not recover. He sent a man to call us from Sabbath School. After meeting we went to see him. He tried to rise up, but couldn't; so he extended his hand and thanked us for coming and asked us if there was any hope. We said that there was hope in God. He then requested prayer, and said, 'I know I am sick because of my sins against God. Now I confess. When Majuman was baptized I refused to go to the ceremony; but now he is very happy. Before, he always sacrificed pigs when planting rice, because his field was a place of Satan. Now he does not sacrifice, yet his field is bearing better than before. This is God's blessing, and I know that your teaching is true.' We prayed for God's mercy on him, shook his hand, and went home. Next Sabbath we found him much better and able to wash himself.
