Progress of the Work in Ubol, Thailand

The Ubol Church appreciated very much the series of meetings held by Pastor Soh Sek Tong. The meetings were made very interesting by the use of many colored slides and Black Light. At most meetings the school building was so full of people that many had to stand outside and the attendance held up all through the meetings.

At the close of the meetings there was a baptism in which eleven persons were added to the church. We rejoice to see the work grow here in Ubol. Much credit for these baptisms goes to Pastor Hall, who recently went to Laos. The baptism was conducted by Pastor Wick.

We are just beginning to build a new church that will seat 375 people. It will be made of reinforced concrete construction to match the hospital building. When it is completed the church will be used for chapel exercises for the school. This church is needed very badly at Ubol and when it is completed it should give a real boost to our Mission.

The village work is progressing nicely. Plans have been made and money has been raised to build

November 16-23 will go down in history as the first week of prayer ever observed by our churches in Viet-Nam so far as any can remember. Through the Viet-Nam war years such evening meetings in most places were prohibited, and people would have feared too greatly to venture out during the curfew hours to attend. We thank the Lord for now giving us a time of peace in which to work.

For this year, the readings of the Week of Praver issue of the Review and Herald were all translated, mimeographed and sent to every church. The Phu-Nhuan church nightly prayer sessions were well attended with a good half of the pews filled. It was with considerable enthusiasm that members participated, realizing that they too were joining the Adventist family around the circle of the earth in drawing nigh to God for this event. A real blessing was realized by all as we were drawn closer to the Lord in faith and worship by the presence of the power of the Holy Spirit.

The liberality of God's people remains a marvel to the world. Here in the city of Singapore we have seen this spirit of liberality demonstrated in a most tangible

The construction of the way. Seventh-day Adventist Chinese church by Brother and Sister C. M. Lee was also an act of faith. God richly rewarded this faith, and today one of our most beautiful churches in the Far East testifies to their trust and confidence in God. On the morning of November 12, 1957, Brother and Sister C. M. Lee, Elders W. L. Pascoe (representing the Far Eastern Division), T. C. Chin (representing the Malayan Mission), and H. C. Currie (representing the Union of Southeast Asia) gathered at the Wee Swee Teow and Company, Lawyers, office. This was to be a very special occasion. For nearly two years Brother and Sister Lee had longed for the day when all would be in order for their turning over to the General Conference this evidence of their love for the Master. The time had now arrived and all was in readiness. The church and the land were clear of all obligations. Now the papers were waiting to be signed. The ceremony was simple, but the presence of God's Spirit was truly in the law office that morning. As Brother Lee picked up the pen to sign this church over to the General Conference, the writer offered a short prayer, first of all thanking God for the spirit of liberality that He had placed in the hearts of Brother and Sister Lee, asking His blessing upon these two loyal believers who had given their lives and their means to the Master; and also pleading with the Father of Lights to bless this memorial to His name, that through its doors a great host of souls might find their way into the kingdom of God.

Elder W. L. Pascoe signed on behalf of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, and then the lawyer added his signature, making it an official document. Thus this beautiful church, to be known as the Seventh-day Adventist Chinese Church, and over 31,000 feet of land became the property of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists.

According to Elder F. A. Mote, President of the Far Eastern Division, this is the largest single donation ever made by a Seventhday Adventist within this Division. The value of the church, including property, is estimated at nearly M\$300,000.

Are You Breaking the Health Commandments?

"It is just as much a sin to violate the laws of our being as to break one of the ten commandments, for we cannot do either without breaking God's law." — Counsels. an Diet and Food p. 45. Good health is not an accident. It is the result of careful planning and study, end the following of God's laws of health. Perhaps it would be worthwhile for us to review some of the health habits which we probably have known since childhood but may have frogotten or grown careless about observing.

In the Spirit of Prophecy we find the following quotations:

"Disease never comes without a cause. The way is prepared, and disease invited, by disregard of the laws of health. Many suffer in consequence of the transgression of their parents. While they are not responsible for what their parents have done, it is nevertheless their duty to ascertain what are and what are not violations of the laws of health. They should avoid the wrong habits of their parents, and by correct living place themselves in better condition.

The greater number, however, suffer because of their own wrong habits of eating, drinking, dressing and working. Their transgression of nature's laws produces the sure result; and when sickness comes upon them, many do not credit their suffering to the true cause, but murmur against God because of their afflictions. But God is not responsible for the suffering that follows disregard of natural law." — Ministry of Healing p. 234.

"The disease and suffering that everywhere prevail are largely due to popular errors in regard to diet." — Counsels on Diet and Food, p. 127.

Eating is something that we all engage in and enjoy several times a day. Let us consider *how* we should eat. We should eat our meals slowly and chew our food thoroughly. The first step in the

digestion of our food begins in the mouth where the food is broken into small particles by the teeth, and where the food is mixed with the saliva. The saliva contains Ptylin which is one of the digestive enzymes. We should be relaxed and not excited, worried, or angry while eating. The conversation at the dining table should be pleasant. Have you noticed that your food feels heavy in your stomach if you eat when excited or angry? When a person is emotionally upset, the digestive processes are slowed down, secretion of the gastric juices, and the peristaltic waves are greatly diminished. Sister White tells us that if we are in a hurry or emotionally upset that it is better to eat very little or wait until we have sufficient time for eating. She gave us this instruction fifty years ago. and there is a scientific reason for it as there is for all that she has written. Very hot or cold foods interfere with digestion. A lowering of ten degrees in the temperature of our food will double the length of time necessary for the digestion of the meal. Extremely hot foods will destroy the enzymes which are necessary in the digestive process.

When should we eat? We should eat our meals regularly. Breakfast is the most important meal of the day. We have not eaten since the evening before, and it is important that we supply our bodies with the necessary food for energy before starting out on the day's work. If we eat little or no breakfast it means that we go as long as 18 hours without food, or from the evening meal until the noon meal of the following day. Some who are doing mental work will find that they get along better on two meals a day, and if they eat three meals they should eat a very light evening meal. A heavy evening meal will cause the digestive system to work during the sleeping hours, and the individual will not sleep soundly, I'm sure you all have had the experience of eating a heavy meal late at night and waking up the next morning having dreamed all night long, and having no appetite for breakfast.

Nothing should be eaten between meals. In Counsels on Diet and Foods, we find the following quota-

tion: "Should these persons change their practice and eat . . . nothing between meals, not even an apple. a nut or any kind of fruit, the result would be seen in a good appetite and greatly improved health." It requires several hours for the digestion of a meal, and if anything is placed in the stomach between meals, it means that the digestion of the previous meal is prolonged. The stomach has no chance to rest between meals, and there is no appetite for the next meal. Children, especially, need to be educated by their parents on this point.

The most prevalent affliction of mankind today is obesity. It is conservatively estimated that 30,000,000 people in U. S. A. are at least 10% overweight. The Metropolitan Life Insurance Company made a special study of mortality rates as affected by obesity, and they found that in those between the ages of 20 and 64, the mortality rate was 150%, or more than twice that of those whose weight was normal. This was true of both men and women. A list of diseases which are much more common in overweight people includes the following: Diabetes, heart diseases, hardening of the arteries, high blood pressure, cerebral hemorrhage, chronic nephritis and other kidney diseases, pneumonia, cirrhosis of the liver, gallstones, appendicitis, and injuries due to accidents.

You may say, "I realize I and overweight, but what can I do to reduce my weight?" In practically every case the cause of being overweight, is over-eating. The "glandular" cause for obesity is a rare thing. Sister White has much to say regarding over-eating: "The sin of intemperate eating, eating too frequently, too much, and of rich unwholesome food, destroys the healthy action of the digestive organs, affects the brain, and perverts the judgment, preventing rational, calm, healthy thinking and acting . . . Therefore, in order for the people of God to be in an acceptable state with Him, where they can glorify Him in their bodies and spirits, which are His. they must, with interest and zeal deny the gratification of their appetites, and exercise temperance in all things. Then may they comprehend the truth in its

beauty and clearness, and carry it out in their lives, and by a judicious, wise, straightforward course, give the enemies of our faith no occasion to reproach the cause of truth." — Counsels of Diet and Foods, p. 50.

Sister White makes the statement that if we conquer our appetites we will be able to conquer every other sin.

In closing I want to recommend to you the systematic reading of the book "Counsels on Diet and Foods." Every page is filled with practical instruction for our everday habits of eating and living. It is not just a reference book. Every page is worth your careful study.

"There are but few as yet who are aroused sufficiently to understand how much their habits of diet have to do with their health, their characters, their usefulness in this world, and their eternal destiny." Ibid. pp. 51, 52.
