The Challenge of 1961

We are suffering in the Far Eastern Division from "growing pains." With a church membership that has grown from 38,225 at the close of 1947 to over 120,000 at the end of 1960—thirteen short years—it crowds us to keep up with the needs organizationally and every other way. It taxes our resources to provide for the needs in the educational, publishing and pastoral fields and also our church housing in nearly every part of the Division field. During this same span of years the number of church organizations has doubled and many of our churches are getting larger.

During the past ten years we have projected one new medical unit on the average each year, and 1960 saw more additions and buildings added to our medical institutions than any previous year for some time. It stands to reason that with a membership that has more then trebled in thirteen years, we likewise have more than three times the number of young people than we had in those postwar years. Many new academies have been built and others are in the planning stage. All of our union mission educational institutions are being swamped with applications. Several of our training schools have had to curtail their enrollment by turning away applicants for want of accommodations.

Our greatest cause for rejoicing has been the progress of our program of evangelism and the results we see. Much as we appreciate our many institutions, beautiful and well-equipped buildings will never take the place of souls won

to the kingdom. It is through the "foolishness of preaching" that God intends to save men and women from the impending doom. The number of ordained ministers in the Division today is about three times what it was in 1947. For this we are thankful. By adding forty or more ministerial interns each year to our force of field evangelistic workers we should continue to grow in the years to come.

Not all of the union mission statistical reports are in for 1960 but, from those that we have received and from information gathered in our recent tour of the field, it appears certain that our baptisms for last year in the Division will total close to eleven thousand. This is very nearly ten percent of our church membership at the beginning of 1960 and it is the largest number of souls won and baptized any one year in our history. The yearly report from Southeast Asia Union Mission has come to the Division and it reveals a total of 806 baptisms for the past year. This is considerably better than twelve percent of the

union mission's church membership at the first of last year. We surely want to thank all who had a part in making this wonderful result possible under the blessing of God.

It is not many years ago that our church membership and the Sabbath School membership in this Division were almost the same. At the present time we have at least 60,000 more Sabbath School members than we have church members. Everyone of these Sabbath School members is a potential baptismal candidate and church member. Let us make our Sabbath School classes real baptismal classes and continue to reap results. in new members for the church while at the same time increasing our Sabbath School membership.

We find that as we visit the various sections of our Division field in some areas there are a large number of "organized companies." Many of these have a rather large membership. In the year 1959 one new church was organized every three days, or a total for the year of 118. The previous three years the average was 52 each year. We had hoped for an average of 1,000 baptisms each month of 1960 but we did not quite make that goal. Surely we can set an even larger goal than that for 1961. Wouldn't it be wonderful if the Union Mission of Southeast Asia were to strive for an average of one hundred baptisms each month of this year. Your union mission has well over three thousand more Sabbath School members than church members. How would it be to strive for an average of one additional church organized each month this year of challenge.

Surely, we must enlarge and ad 1 institutions but let us not be so busy building "bigger and better barns" that we fail to harvest the ripening grain all around us. There have been many years of sowing, now is the time to reap the harvest! May we as workers arise and under the blessing and guidance of God meet the challenge of 1961 in the winning of souls for the kingdom of God.

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Waiting and Watching By Andrew Peters

The title of this article appeared as a sub-title in the February 24 issue of Time Magazine this year. Time correspondents uncovered a deepening concern by people about the present state of world affairs and how it would involve them. The observation of one interviewed reflects the rapid fulfillment of prophecy. This person remarks, "When I was younger and my husband was still alive, I saved headlines-the big ones, the important ones. I thought it would make learning easier for the kids. It got to be a habit, and even after they finished school I still saved them, but I don't anymore. His-tory happens too fast now." How many in perplexity are waiting and watching for a change for the better in the present course of events?

Mrs. E. G. White predicted a change—startling and overwhelming. "The agencies of evil are combining their forces, and consolidating. They are strengthening for the last crisis. Great changes are soon to take place in our world, and the final movements will be rapid ones." 9 T 11. This is now current history. No longer can we point to the future for its fulfillment.

The feeling of imminence must grip the minds of all Seventh-day Adventists now. This was the intent of Christ's warning in Matthew 24:42, "Watch therefore: for ye know not what hour your Lord doth come."

What did Jesus mean by the word, "watch"? "Watch against the stealthy approach of the enemy, watch against old habits and natural inclinations, lest they assert themselves; force them back, and watch. Watch the thoughts, watch the plans, lest they become selfcentered. Watch over the souls whom Christ has purchased with His own blood. Watch for opportunities to do them good." **4 T 610.**

Such watching is only effective when combined with earnest prayer. What is it that gives real meaning to the Three Angel's Messages, the Sabbath truth, the second coming and the various phases of the last day message? Is it not the fervor of secret prayer, the day by day personal fellowship with Jesus that stimulates the Christian to intense activity and watchfulness? This deep abiding joy is the seal of our acceptance and the smile of divine approval.

A host of faithful ones have witnessed personally the tremendous advantages that accrue from a concentrated daily prayer life. James White testified that when the pressures and duties of daily toil tempted him to pray less, he discovered greater accomplishments and victories in a shorter period of time when he prayed more. A mind at peace with God and trusting fully for divine counsel has the advantage of God's wisdom that comes instantly to save hours of time, annoying frustrations, and unnecessary mistakes.

Frequent warnings are given about the little time left to develop our characters for Heaven and to be able to endure the final conflict. Strange-the constant round of daily activities leads many to feel no special burden to increase the time spent in prayer and soul searching. It appears that the feeling exists quite generally because one is acquainted with the Advent message and is baptized into this truth, therefore he is secure. This may not be a con-scious thought. It may exist subconsciously; but this impression is conveyed by our daily habits that involve a constant bustle of activity. What would happen if less time were spent in active labor and more time on our knees in our closets? Would the work be hastened or delayed?

"Let not the destiny of your soul hang upon an uncertainty. Know that you are fully on the Lord's side. Let the inquiry go forth from sincere hearts and trembling lips, 'Who shall be able to stand'?" 6 T:404, 405. Then the answer to the searching question is assuredly given," . . . not one watching, praying, believing soul will be ensnared by the enemy." 6T:404.

Report of San Yu High School

At the Sixth Biennial Session, Pastor T. C. Chin, President of the Malaya Mission, made a report on the progress of the San Yu High School for the year 1958. He expressed the hope that both the Union of Southeast Asia and the Far Eastern Division would render their assistance to this school in its work in giving its students not only an education but also a knowledge of the love of God. The years 1959 and 1950 proved to be critical ones. Like a small vessel in the wide open sea, it is constantly battling against storms, winds and angry waves for its survival. The two chief problems the school is facing are financial aid and recruitment of teachers. As the president has rightly said, "There are problems ahead, but with faith we move forward" the school is tackling its problems in that spirit. With faith in the merciful guidance of God it is moving forward to achieve its goal. We wish to thank the local mission and the board of directors for their willingness in supporting the school. Young in age as a plant, it requires the necessary nourishment for its continued growth.

In 1959 the school increased its classes from four to six. Starting with four Junior I classes in the previous year, it began the year with three Junior I and three Junior II classes. The total number of enrollments was 267 as compared to 174 in 1958. The Holy Spirit was working in the hearts of the students as they studied the Bible resulting in the baptism of two of them. Both of them have enrolled at the Southeast Asia Union College for the next year. During the Ingathering Campaign, when the call came to the students to solicit funds, they put their whole heart into the work and collected about \$3,000 from friends, well wishers and the public. The school suffered its first loss when Mr. Tsai Shu Fong, one of its teachers who was connected with the school at its birth, left Singapore for Borneo towards the end of the year.

The number of classes remained at six in 1960. Out of an enrollment of 221 students, about one-

third of them were promoted to Junior III, occupying two classrooms. During the annual In-gathering Campaign in June, two days were set aside for this effort, and rain hindered our work on one of these days. The amount collected was about \$2,000. Elder J. V. Scully, Temperance Secretary of the General Conference, lectured to the students when he visited the school. The students took part in an essay competition on the subject of temperance after the talk by Elder Scully. Two Weeks of Prayer were conducted, on different occasions, by Pastor Joshua Chong and Mr. W. Y. Chen respectively. At the end of the meetings a number of students joined a Bible class studying "Hope for Today." Thirtysix of them completed the course. The school held its first Junior Middle Graduation this year in which thirty students received their certificates. More than ten of these students have applied for admission to the SAUC next year. In accordance with the education policy of the Singapore government, the number of years in a Chinese secondary school has been reduced to four years. The Board of Directors, after careful consideration, has decided not to have any fourth year classes in 1961. The school is thankful to the four graduates of the SAUC who know Chinese for joining the teaching staff.

North Borneo Trek By W. A. Hilliard

Several years ago Inauk, a Murut, became interested in the teachings of Seventh-day Adventists while studying at a trade school in Jesselton. After returning to his village fifty miles out from Keningau, he corresponded with Elder Oliver. After a meeting with Pastor M. Agian, he attended our Training Course at Tamparuli for about a year during which time he was baptized. Shortly after returning home, Elder Pohan baptized his wife.

About 18 months ago Elder Carl Currie made a trip with Elder Oliver. They had hoped to visit Inauk and his people, but floods prevented them from getting through, and after walking for two days they had to turn back.

From March 6 to 16, the Oliver family with Pastor P. R. Sibarani and the writer, made the trip to Takul Pinawan. After flying to Keningau and riding a jeep and trailer for 11 miles, we set out on foot. Because of a lack of carriers each of us had to carry a pack. Nights were spent in simple public rest houses. Nearly three days were spent at Inauk's home with clinic for the people from the surrounding area and a full day of meetings on Sabbath. Two were baptized in the stream in front of his home while all but one of the onlookers raised their hands indicating a desire to prepare for baptism. This brings our baptized Muruts to 15 people. In

We hope that this beginning among a thus-far unreceptive tribe, will grow until we see as fruitful work among these people as there is among the Dusuns of North Borneo.
