# The "Right Hand" Reaches Tribes People

Drs. Reuben Sprengel and Clark Lamberton with their wives joined the writer's group on a trip to the mountain village about forty kilometers from the City of Chiengmai to visit with our two Maeo boys working there among their fellow tribesmen. The group took medicines, a few simple dental instruments for teaching the boys how to extract a decayed tooth, and a few items of food which those boys need very much. With enthusiasm the group started happy and strong. Everything went wonderfully well until the group of hikers were resting on a mountaintop half way there when the rain poured down upon them. Soon the trail which led to the village became a rivulet. Everybody and everything was wet and dripping. In spite of the chilly wind which blew on their wet bodies, the group continued their journey up and down the mountains. Reaching the village just before sunset, they aired their wet clothes and bedding, while others sat by the stove inside the house to warm themselves. (The Maeo stove is more of a bonfire inside the house.) The smoke filled the house offending the visitors eyes.

That night a meeting was called which filled the village chief's house. The Maeo people love to listen to the wondrous story of Jesus' wonderful love. The impressive meeting lasted until nearly midnight, for the villagers wanted the visitors to sing many songs. Going to bed was a most welcome treat after the strenuous trip and the prolonged meeting, but even after the group had gone to bed, many of the village people lingered around to see the sleeping bags and air mattresses. They talked and conversed until midnight. Then at about 4 o'clock in the morning the dwellers of the house started chopping greens for their pigs and resumed the loud talking. Many of the Maeo people spend more time in preparing the pig feed than they do in preparing their own food.

At daybreak, the group got up and got ready for taking care of the sick ones. Dr. Lamberton made a penicillin ointment by grinding penicillin tablets and mixing it with vaseline. That was very important for the boys to observe so that

they can made their own when needed. While the penicillin ointment was in the making, the ladies demonstrated how to wash sores and wounds and how to bathe a baby full of sores on the head. They asked permission to cut off the dirty strings tied around the patients's necks and legs that are there for superstitious beliefs. After the sores and wounds were washed clean, the penicillin ointment was applied. There were more diseases to treat than what the group was prepared for. Dr. Lamberton, demonstrated the extraction of teeth. It looked very easy to do. The dental instruments were left with the boys to use. As an expression of appreciation for the splendid medical service rendered them, one of the Maeo women handed a hen to Mrs. Sprengel. Thus the Maeo people were able to get an image of what Christian missionaries are. These people learned more of the Jesus of the Christians through the "right hand" of the ministry.

# George A. Huse Visits Southeast Asia

Elder George A. Huse, Publishing secretary of the General conference, Washington, D. C., visited the Southeast Asia Union's publishing houses, the MALAYSIAN SIGNS PRESS, VIETNAM SIGNS PRESS, and the THAILAND PUB-LISHING HOUSE, during December 1963. In addition to this he gave valuable instruction to the 88 literature evangelists of the Vietnam Mission during their annual gospel sales convention, December 26-29.

Elder Huse is the chairman of the General Conference Publishing House Rehabilitation and Expansion Committee which has appropriated more than M\$119,000. During the last three years for equipment to modernize our three publishing houses.

A native of Missouri, Brother Huse has headed the denomination's publishing department at the church's headquarters for fifteen years. His record of service for the church began in 1918 when he became a literature evangelist in Missouri. He was associate secretary of the department for three years prior to his present appointment.

His assignments for the church have included four years as manager of publishing houses in France and Spain, and management of publishing houses and Book and Bible houses at various places across the United States.

# History of the Teluk Anson Church By T. C. Chin

The Seventh-day Adventist Church in Teluk Anson was organized on the 31st of October, 1933. Five days short of thirty years today, this edifice is built and now solemnly set apart for the service and worship of God.

The membership of this church is made up almost entirely of people of the local municipality. The church held their meetings in a club house for many years through the courtesy of the club authority right up to the time when they moved over to this new church building.

Before the year 1955 the Mission endeavoured to secure a piece of State land from the government to build a church as it was our wish to see the work of God grow and expand in this district. A desirable site was located which was a hundred vards away from the club house where we had our Sabbath services. Negotiation was started with the government for that piece of State land on which we proposed to build the church. But we were told that the government themselves were short of land for their own need, and thus our request was turned down.

After much painstaking effort we found this present location, a beautiful location, and through the kindness of the former owner of this piece of land, Mr. Thong Park Seng, a small sub-division of land was arranged, and the transaction was completed in early 1961.

Mr. Khoo Ewe Boon, our Architect who designed the modern church plan for our church in Bagan Datoh, was contacted to design a plan for this church. It was approved by the Seventh-day Adventist Union of Southeast Asia in Singapore, and later the plan was approved by the Town Council of Lower Perak. Mr. Tan Kean Aun, the contractor who built our parsonage in Bagan Datoh, was given the contract to build this church. We are completely satisfied with his construction work. We do appreciate his splendid work and assistance. Without his fine services we might have not brought this project to a success. The total cost of this church project is nearly M\$ 30,000.00.

We are grateful to our heavenly Father for this new church building in Teluk Anson. It will seat approximately one hundred and forty people, and it is our hope that some day in the future this church will be filled to its capacity with worshippers of the True God. We are happy, today, to dedicate this building to the cause and service of God, and may this church be a gateway to heaven for those who enter its door, and at last the people of God may go home to join the angelic host where we may return to Him endless praise.

In order to raise funds for the MV Pathfinder Club to send as many members as possible to the camperee at Bukhet, the members rallied hand in hand in literature evangelism. Nangsao Pongsie Khammipon received the second prize while Nangsao Ban Yen Itakhit got the third prize.

# Bhuket Church Dedication

Bhuket, Thailand was the scene of dedication services for the new Ban Khian village church, Sabbath afternoon, October 19, 1963. It was a happy day for the one hundred members and friends who gathered to present this new house of worship to God. It was not only the first Seventh-day Adventist church building on the island but the first Protestant church as well. This island has a population of 80,000.

A large piece of land was obtained in December of 1962 and early in 1963 construction began. The building is of simple but functional design. At present there is no electricity in this village, but wiring was installed so that lighting could be made possible by using a generator. Members met in the church for the first time on the 15th of June, 1963.

The congregation was pleased to have many guests with them on the dedication Sabbath. Among them who were present; Pastor A. E. Gibb, Secretary for the Far Eastern Division who delivered the sermon at the morning worship service; Pastor Sunti from Bangkok, who preached the Dedicatory sermon; Pastor P. G. Wick, Thailand Mission President, who gave the Act of Dedication, and Pastor G. O. Bruce, Southeast Asia Union Treasurer, who offered the Dedicatory Prayer. Pastor Sopan from Bangkok, the former pastor in Bhuket, gave an interesting history of the growth of the church on the island. The initial contact that led to the first baptism came as a result of our Bhuket clinic. Since that time nine years ago our membership has grown to nearly forty.

À new day is dawning for God's work on this island. Hundreds have been enrolled in the Voice of Prophecy Bible Course. Branch Sabbath School evangelism has taken root. Our fine medical team of Doctors Van Arsdell and Watson has done much to provide an atmosphere of friendliness and trust so necessary to a successful evangelistic program.

Three weeks before the new church was dedicated a full scale evangelistic program was begun in the church. The writer, assisted by Nai Cheun, ministerial intern, and the membership began a series of meetings presenting our doctrines in the setting of God's wonderful love. The meetings were geared to appeal to people who were looking for something a little better in life. On the opening night the church with a seating capacity of one hundred was filled to overflowing. People were sitting in the isle, standing in the doorway, on the porch, and at every window. It was estimated that at least two-hundred-fifty people were in attendance.

# **Colporteurs** Released

Last November two colporteurs were making a delivery of books in Vietnam about one hundred kilometers south of Saigon. These colporteurs were two young men of seventeen and twenty years of age. They were traveling by small boat down a small stream or canal with a large box of books for delivery.

These young men were stopped and held by a group of men in that area who are not supporters of the present government in Vietnam. The colporteurs were held for nearly two months but were not hurt in anyway. During this time the col-

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porteurs were often questioned and urged to support these men in their political aims.

When it was discovered that these colporteurs were not in anyway concerned with political affairs but were only concerned with the religious matters they were released and permitted to return safely.

Now these young men are again out in the literature ministry work happy to be preserved from harm and happy to have had an opportunity to witness for their faith and happy to be back in the work of the literature ministry. Please pray for these and the other Literature Evangelists in Vietnam.
