SAWS Thailand Needs Volunteers

Kampuchea is the name of a country that has been and is still being ravaged by war, starvation and an uncertain future. The news media does not carry much about the situation in Cambodia anymore. Some even say the crisis is past. The immediate crisis is past but there is a lot that must be done before this country and its people are able to support themselves once again.

SAWS Thailand has been working since December 1979 in Thailand to assist with the large scale relief program being conducted among the refugees in Thailand and along the Thai-Kampuchean border.

At the peak of the relief effort there were 500,000 to 700,000 displaced Khmer along the border and inside Thailand. The population has been reduced to 300,000 due to refugees being resettled in third countries and some have returned to Kampuchea.

In the six holding camps located within Thailand there are 138,000 persons. These people still require shelter, food, water, medical care and sanitation facilities. This must be provided by government agencies and private relief agencies.

Along the Thai-Kampuchean border the 490,000 refugees are facing an uncertain existence. They are

continually plagued with a lack of food and clothes. They do not know from one day to the next whether their safety and freedom will end that day.

SAWS Thailand is participating actively in the relief work at the present time. Gary Wagner, Director of SAWS Thailand says, "Currently we are working in five of the refugee centers. At Kamput Refugee Center we are operating a surgical unit staffed with a surgeon, anesthesiologist, operating room nurse and three registered nurses. We also have a health education worker and a dentist located in this camp. In the other centers we have similar programs."

SAWS Thailand is in need of personnel who are willing to volunteer their time to work in these centers. "We have an ongoing monthly need of one surgeon, one general practitiner, one operating room nurse, six registered nurses, one anesthesiologist, three dentists, three optometrists, one opthalmologist and one health education worker," says Wagner.

Here's The Way To True Life

Twice weekly the air waves in northern Thailand vibrate the Seventh-day Adventist message to a potential radio audience of nearly 2 million. Broadcasting from separate radio stations in Chiang Mai and Chiang Rai Provinces, this radio program called "The Way to True Life" seeks to exhalt the One who is "the Way, the Truth and the Life".

Elder Chalaw Artamapadung, Chiang Mai church pastor and district leader, is the writer, speaker and driving force of this Thai Language broadcast. His conversational presentation centering on current events and issues of general public interest seems to be the right approach for the mostly rural and small-town-oriented audience. One program was so attuned to current events that the station didn't air it lest it be too politically sensitive. But

without fail each program offers Bible solutions to everyday problems. The listeners are also invited to enroll in two different Bible correspondence courses and a health correspondence course.

After having successfully aired two different Christmas programs and an Easter program on several local stations who granted free radio time during these Christian holidays, Elder Chalaw was emboldened to launch a weekly radio ministry. God led as he approached radio station after radio station requesting time. One Chiang Mai station not only gave him a 15 minute time slot, but offered it free. This has particularly impressed us when we recently discovered that another Christian group who broadcasts from the same station has to buy their weekly radio time. The Chiang Rai radio station charges us for our weekly 15 minutes.

"The Way to True Life" programs are produced in the Tribal Cassette Ministry studio located in Mae Sariang. Your prayers for this pioneering venture of Adventist radio into northern Thailand are greatly needed.—Denns Tidwell

What Is Gnathostomiasis?

A 17 year old Thai Academy boy came into the clinic to show me a lump that had been moving under the skin on the outside of his right thigh leaving a red trail behind it. The lump was about one inch long and three-eights of an inche wide. When I touched it, it moved. I recognized the problem having learned about it while studying for the Thai Medical Boards. Since it was late on Friday, I suggested that he return Sunday and I would take care of it for him. He returned on Sunday for surgical removal. I made an incision and took out a fat worm nearly three-fourths of an inch long! There is no medicine that can be taken by mouth that will kill the worm under the skin.

This condition is called Gnathostomiasis. It is caused by eating raw fish which contains the larvae from which the worm grows. The boy left the Clinic with his worm on a piece of gauze to show his friends. I doubt very much that he will eat raw fish again!—Helen Morton, MD

Haadyai Mission Hospital Expansion

Haadyai Mission Hospital in South Thailand launched a bold multimillion Baht expansion and renovation program commencing the early part of 1981 to better minister to a million-plus Songkhla province population.

Phase 1 constitutes the development of the new building in the left wing. The first floor will be used as cafeteria and kitchen facilities, conference room, and a chaplain's office. The second floor will provide enough space for additional room facilities including 4 private-patient rooms, isolation room, and a female medical ward.

Phase 2 is the expansion of the right wing with the first floor to be utilized as doctors' offices and clinics, patients' waiting rooms, dental clinic, physiotherapy room, and a night-duty personnel quarter. The second floor will provide adequate space for both major and minor operating rooms with an adjoining delivery room, labor room, and dressing rooms for personnel. Included in this plan are the recovery room and a maternity ward.

Phase 3 includes the renovation and remodelling of the old physical plant which was built by Dr. Ronald C. Gregory the first SDA medical missionary in Haadyai. The estimated cost to finish the entire program is Baht 4,000,000 (US\$200,000). Phase 1 which is now in full swing, is made possible by generous donors from the community.

The Lord's direction has been felt in the undertaking of this project. Your prayers are being solicited for more funds to flow in, so that the full realization for the expansion and renovation of our Haadyai Mission Hospital can be successfully achieved - Willie Donato, U. A Glimpse At

Refugee Camp

Sometimes the fact that the Lord has the power to turn curses into blessings is overlooked. The Lord has done this for many of the poor refugees who have fled Cambodia, Vietnam, and Laos because of political reasons.

Many of these have lost everything they owned but finally made their way to a refugee camp in Thailand. One refugee who was formerly considered well off financially said that he now was poorer than the poorest beggar on the street.

Because most have lost all of the wordly possessions they are anxious by searching for a hope. Their unfortunate circumstances have conditioned them to accept the Gospel message of a soon coming Saviour.

It was my privilege during the month of July to spend more than three weeks at the refugee camp call Phanat-Nikom. It is about two hours by bus from Bangkok. What a challenge it was to teach the Bible to these hungry souls--hungry for the Gospel. The classes were mostly for these who have already accepted the message of Salvation, were baptized into the church and were holding Bible classes among other refugees.

In the classes were well educated professional people, some who had prominent positions in the country before they left it expedient to flee their homeland. One was a former major general of the army who had also been the governor of province, another a high official in the government, another a trained physician. These were all holding Bible classes with other refugees.

One young lady who was not a baptized member of our church when I began the classes came to three of the daily Bible classes which was held for the Khmer people. I should have realized that was not baptized for her appearance did not fit into our teaching of I Peter 3:34 and I Timothy 29, 10. But her ordornments quickly disappeared and she requested baptism. How could I refuse her when she had made a commitment to the Lord, knew the teachings of the Adventist church, and her life showed that she was a daughter of Christ. A few days after the baptism I suggested that she also begin a class to study the message with other refugees with whom she was acquainted. She looked at me with a quizzical look on her face and said, "I have already begun a class." Before her baptism she began studying with twenty women every day and all were looking forward to being baptized into the Seventh-day Adventist church.

The message in this camp is not going by addition, but by multiplication. I am not sure the number of Bible classes that are being conducted each day, for some individuals are holding as many as four classes each day--six days each week, but a conservative estimate is between twenty and thirty.

If there were only twenty Bible classes being conducted each day

and an average of only ten were in the class, it would mean that 200 people are studying our message for an hour or more six days a week in this camp.

Those who grow fruit will say the time to pick cherries is when they are ripe, before they become overripe and fall to the ground. A similar condition exists in this camp. God has used the plight of these unfortunate people to cause them to hunger and thirst for the message of a living Saviour and it is thrilling to see hundreds of lives that are being changed.—Boyd E. Olson

More Than Education By Mail

HOME STUDY or correspondence school are words which conjure up pictures of a lonely college student burning midnight kerosene in order to get that one course out of the way -the one course still needed for graduation. A number of college students and other workers do take courses by mail in order to get their education fast and cheap: A teacher who feels weak in Maths but has to teach it, a manager who cannot 'read' financial statements, a 'classroom evangelist' who wants to know more about teaching methods and about courses in religion. Such and many others are receiving help through HOME STUDY SCHOOL.

What we really want, however, is to help our leaders solve largescale problems with largescale solutions—at minimal cost. Have you ever wondered how our church is going to tackle the need of raising the

educational level of hundreds of poorly educated ministers, teachers, literature evangelists, nurses and other workers? It must be done. It must be done soon. But how?

So far the distribution of educational opportunities in our church has been sadly unequal. Whatever funds for upgrading we could find were channelled mainly into the M. A. and doctoral training of a fortunate few. The Far Eastern Division has tried to do more than other divisions in providing summer courses and Institutes for larger numbers, but even the best efforts such as the teacher meetings in North Sumatra reached relatively few. The obvious solution is to give subsidized summer courses to all types of workers during holiday periods. But there the problem of quality comes up: Will the usual upgrading course-(no books, no materials-just 'chalk and talk')-

make a lasting impression? No doubt, summer courses enriched and guided by HOME STUDY offer one solution. The expertise of a lecturer combined with the quality control of HOME STUDY courses is a proven way of providing large-scale quality education.

This approach has already been tried by the leaders of the Southeast Asia Union Mission (SAUM). Recently fifteen teachers have studied our course 'Philosophy of Adventist Education', by HOME STUDY. Under the direction of Pastor Roy Ryan, Education Secretary, a whole week was spent to get as far as the mid-semester exanination. The second half of the course was taken home as an assignment to be completed before the teachers get together again, in May, for continuing education. I am sure many will pass the final test. This weeklong study revealed that some teachers saw a new world opening up by getting contact with skills they had not mastered before-working with multiple choice questions or finding answers through reading Education. HOME STUDY is not only leading to knowledge but also to a more confident way of seeking knowledge independently.

In the near future there will be largescale HOME STUDY 'days' for literature evangelists in the Phillippines, Sabbath-school leaders and teachers in East Indonesia, and for ministers and teachers in Sabah.

One pastor in Singapore is presently conducting a HOME STUDY course for his Sabbath-school teachers on Sabbath afternoons. A far-from-college group of Ministers-of-tomorrow in Guam take HOME STUDY courses. There are many possibilities for leaders with a vision—Dr. Ronald D. Strasdowsky, Director, HOME STUDY SCHOOL [FAR EAST], Far Eastern Division

Special permission had to be obtained to take medicines into this restricted area which is within sight of the Laos border. Communist insurgents are quite active in the area and the authorities were concerned lest these medicines find their way into terrorist hands.

Miss Oswari treated many patients, including some who had recently defected from the insurgents. She finally had to start turning patients away when we began running out of some of our more generally-used medicines. The villagers were most grateful for her visit and asked us to return again. We hope other physicians will volunteer to continue this important ministry.

The first Lisaw Christian, at least in this area, will be baptized May 30, 1981. Her name is ly See and she is 19 years old. She was a student at the Tribal School last year and is attending again this year. This is our first breakthrough into this tribe. As is the custom here, the other members of her village will watch her progress for about a year, and if all goes well, others may then decide to join her. Please remember this girl and this tribe in your daily prayers.

We see the changing of guards again at Southeast Asia Union College with Dr. LeVerne Bissell accepting a call to Union College in Lincoln, Nebraska, and Drs. David and Mary Wong to Taiwan Adventist College. The college is now in the capable hands of Dr. Donald R. Sahly (formerly superintendent of education in Thailand) as president and academic dean, and vacant slots for the dean of students and English instructor. Mrs. Weslynne Sahly is working as office secretary in the Union Treasury department.

At the initiative of the Southeast Asia Union Mission the Hilltribe Training Center was merged with the Chiang Mai Academy from the first of this year. Dr. Nancy Bassham has taken over administration of this single institution which is called Chiang Mai Educational Center. Miss Pat Gustin, the last administrator of the Hilltribe Training Center has been transferred to Ubon in eastern Thailand. Pat's interest in and contribution to the tribal work will be sorely missed.
