Walking Through Your Bible...

Many daily Bible study guide books have been written, but none can equal WALKING THROUGH YOUR BIBLE WITH H. M. S. RICHARDS. In one complete hardbound volume the diligent Bible student can find the outline for one year's reading of the Bible. What is unique about this volume is that the Bible is read in a chronological order which often brings together readings from several books of the Bible. Each day's reading also has a key memory text, appropriate commentary and additional background material.

Because the readings in WALKING THROUGH YOUR BIBLE WITH H. M. S. RICHARDS are not dated, the reading cycle can be begun on any day of the year.

178 in South America 160 in Africa-Indian Ocean 103 in the Far East 89 in former Trans-Africa

As of June 30, 1983 the SDA church membership broke the 4 million barrier with a total of 4,005,599! We praise God for this achievement. The 1,000 Days of Reaping has been described as the church's greatest evangelistic thrust in history. Certainly it fulfills the prophecy of 100 years ago.

According to the General Conference annual colloquium held in March, there were over 600 baptisms in a period of less than two months in China. In 1954 he became the President of the Malayan Mission for 9 years. Five years until his retirement Elder Chin worked as treasurer of the Hadd Yai Hospital in Thailand. He retired in Loma Linda where he worked in the medical center's patient business office.

He is survived by his wife, daughter, son-in-law, grand-daughter, and brother, T.M. Chin of Singapore.

Sabah Workshops

Sabah is the largest mission in the Southeast Asia Union Mission. With a Sabbath School membership of over 12,000, it is both progressive and aggressive in its outreach programs.

Both Pastor Martin Ya'ang, Sabbath School Director, and Miss Jupitah Gaban, Child Evangelism Director, have just been re-elected in the recent Mission Triennial Session in Tamparuli. A hearty congratulations to both of them for the good work they have done. Martin has about 7,000 youth and adult Sabbath School members in 161 Sabbath Schools under his care, while Jupitah is in charge of about 5,000 children from Cradle Roll to Junior divisions. The responsibilities are heavy and challenges great.

Two major Sabbath School workshops were conducted in March at Tamparuli and Goshen from March 18-23. The 70 strong delegates who attended the 3-day Tamparuli workshop represented 63 churches in 11 districts. Twelve pastors were also present at the the workshop held at the beautiful nearly completed cafeteria of the Sabah Adventist School. Many of them took prolific notes which would be used later when they train the Sabbath School officers in their churches upon their return. We were much encouraged by the quality of questions raised and the eagerness of the delegates to learn how to be more effective in their work. Both Martin and Jupitah are to be commended for organizing and conducting the workshops. They were assisted by Dr. Nancy Bassham and Pastor Ng Gan Theow of Southeast Asia Union Mission.

The workshop in Goshen was attended by some 45 delegates, 10 of which were district pastors. At this time of the year, Goshen is in the grip of evangelistic fever.

One of the pastors who was just ordained is Laini Gura. His goal this year is to hold Sabbath School training workshop for each of his 14 churches, and by the grace of God each church would have one Branch Sabbath School by the end of the year. Pastor Gondolos Langgaun had a real burden for daily lesson study. He would like to see at least 30% of his members study the Sabbath School lesson daily. He also plans to start Friday night teacher's meeting to improve the teaching quality of the teachers. Almost every church during the planning session reported their plan to hold at least one Vacation Bible School this year. —Ng Gan Theow, Sabbath School Director, SAUM.

New Periodical for Thailand

Thailand, for the first time in the history of Adventist work, is reading an Adventist magazine in the Thai language. The new periodical entitled "Family Health" will be an "entering wedge" into 50 million Thai homes of which 96% are Buddhists. SAUM Publishing Director Randy Horning took great pains to prepare this periodical which can be used as an evangelistic tool since about 20% of the articles are religious.

This new idea caught Thailand Publishing House quite unprepared for the gigantic task ahead. Pastor Rungsit Itsaringkarn was employed as the full-time editor of the magazine. Although it took some months to publish the first issue, it was worth it. 50,000 copies of "Family Health" rolled off the press on January 31, 1984. What a day it was! A giant step for the literature ministry.

The magazine has been distributed to students, medical associations, businesses, individual homes, and all of our churches and institutions. The Lay Training Department of Thailand Mission, under the leadership of Pastor Sopon Jaiguar, is making use of this periodical in its training program. Every Sabbath afternoon groups from the Chinese church, Thai church, English church, and hospital church of Bangkok distribute the magazine and enroll people in the Voice of Prophecy. Mr. Jerry Potter, Thailand Mission Publishing Director and Circulation Manager, with the help of colporteurs and the editor spent time in distribution.

About .02% of the readers replied to a questionaire stating that they wish to receive the magazine regularly, enroll in VOP courses, and enroll in the No Smoking 5-day Plan. It appears that the people of Thailand appreciate this new magazine. The time is ripe for the 'silent messenger' to carry the truth into thousands of homes every month in the Thai language. "More than one thousand will soon be converted in one day, most of whom will trace their first conviction to the reading of our publications." THE LORD HAS A WILL: The writing of Singapore SDA Church History

Although the Seventh-day Adventist mission has been in Singapore for 80 years, no one had as yet written a history until Rosie Ng accomplished this recently. Her thesis, a partial requirement of the history honors degree course in the National University of Singapore, is entitled "The History of the Seventh-day Adventist Mission In Singapore, 1904-1954." It includes the SDA doctrines and health principles as well as the history of the mission. It is a fitting tribute to the 80th anniversary of the SDA mission in Singapore.

Originally, Rosie had no intention of attending the university but friends encouraged her to do so. She realized that she was an average student and prayed that if it be God's will, He would provide the necessary grades and funds. When the A level results were out, Rosie knew that God had worked a miracle—out of the maximum 64 points obtainable, she scored 63 points. The road to the university was clear; she had the necessary grades and the finance problem was solved when the Public Service Commission awarded her a scholarshop.

Rosie had no desire to study history but she was persuaded to do so by the PSC. As her first year progressed, her interest in history increased. Until her third year, one of Rosie major papers was scheduled on a Saturday. In despair, she tried asking for a change of schedule but failed. "Why, Lord, did this have to happen in the most crucial year?" she asked in frustration. She had her heart set on doing well in order to enter the honors program in history. The refrain of the sond, "The Lord has a Will" kept running through her mind.

"Should I take the exam?" Rosie debated within herself. She yearned for an answer to her dilema. That day, her Scripture text was Luke 12:31 and Rosie knew then that God wanted her to "Seek, first the kingdom of God..." She did not sit for the Sabbath paper. She failed. Friday she learned the results, the next day she was comforted by the solo sung at church, entitled, "I will trust when I cannot see."

Sailors Baptized In The Sea

Three sailors of Sri Lanka were baptized off the coast of Singapore March 17, in the South China Sea where their ship often traveled. Last year Captain Herman Onsent of a Malaysian cargo ship met Jonathan, an Indonesian sailor at the home of Harold Soriton in Singapore. Capt. Onsent, and SDA, hired Jonathan, also an SDA to work on his cargo ship. While Jonathan worked on board ship, he shared his faith with other sailors. In the eight months he traveled the Malaysian waters he taught Kevin D'Silva, Percy Silva and Lal Dharmasiri all the SDA doctrines. Early in 1984 these three men decided to be baptized when they came to Singapore. On March 17 they were baptized by Elder George Johnson and soon after returned to Sri Lanka. Lah, a former Buddhist, has since written that his wife has also accepted Christ and will be baptized. Encouraged by Mr. Soriton, the three men plan to study for the SDA ministry. - Gail Schatzschneider

BAH Has New President

Dr. Ronald Brody has replaced Dr. Russell Standish as president of the Bangkok Adventist Hospital in Bangkok, Thailand. Both men are Australians, studied at Avondale College, and received their medical degrees at the Sydney University.

Dr. Russell Standish received his post-graduate degree in internal medicine in England. He has worked at Warburton Adventist Hospital, Penang Adventist Hospital, as staff physician at the Sydney Adventist Hospital, deputy medical superintendent at the Austin Hospital in Melbourne.

He came to Bangkok Adventist Hospital in 1978. The next year he was made the medical director, a particularly hard place to fill at that time, since the hospital was losing money. Under the blessing of God and His skillful management, the hospital was not only on a paying basis, but the Ralph Waddell Wing was dedicated free of debt on March 17, 1983. In that same year he was made a fellow of th Royal College of Physicians of Edinbourgh.

However, the Enton Hall Clinic needed a doctor with a post graduate degree and administrative experience, who was registered to work in England. Dr. Standish fulfilled these requirements, and accepted the call.

His wife, the former Enid Evans, is a teacher who has taught in the Bangkok Overseas Church School, and presently in the Pattana International school.

Dr. Ronald Brody graduated from medical course, University of Sydney, 1963, after spending a year as a junior resident medical officer at Canterbury District Memorial Hospital. In 1964, he transferred to the Warburton Sanitarium and Hospital, now Warburton Health Care Centre, as a salaried physician in Family Practice. The poor of the area were treated with love and kindness. many owe their lives to the work there. The tragedy of Helen's death cast a great sorrow over all her colleages in Thailand and her friends in other parts of the world.

The clinic has been renamed in her honor. Dr. Russell Standish, President of BAH along with Mr. Billones, Vice President, recently visited the Helen Morton Memorial Clinic. As vet no physician has been found to replace her, but two very dedicated and skillful nurses are carrying on the work. Mrs. Kaw Po. a graduate from the SDA Rangoon Sanitarium School of Nursing, is in charge of the clinic and continues to lead in a most dedicated and Christian way. She is assisted by a young graduate from the Bangkok School of Nursing, Miss Reiwanna. The hospital continues to be full and often additional beds are set up. Each year thousands of patients of little means are receiving first-class attention in this facility.

Mrs. Kaw Po has had a wonderful spiritual influence upon many of the village folk nearby. She is fluent in one of the tribal languages, also speaking Thai and English. Her branch Sabbath Schools bring many souls. Seven individuals from one village had been baptized as a result of her evangelistic efforts and five from another village. — Dr. Russell R.
